



PHILIPPINES SECURITY ANALYSIS REPORT

AI-Assisted Open Source Intelligence Assessment

Analysis Period: April 25, 2026 - May 02, 2026

This report was produced using open-source intelligence analysis. The assessment is grounded in publicly available reporting and should be cross-referenced with primary sources. RSS feed articles are listed in the annex for reference.

Executive Summary

The Philippines' security landscape from April 25 to May 02, 2026, was primarily defined by the ongoing, expanded Balikatan 2026 military exercises, marking a significant enhancement of multilateral defense cooperation with the United States and other allies. These drills, coupled with a substantial increase in the defense budget and plans for a domestic defense manufacturing hub, underscore Manila's intensified efforts to modernize its armed forces and bolster its maritime security posture in the face of persistent challenges in the South China Sea. Concurrently, the Philippines, as the 2026 ASEAN Chair, is navigating a delicate diplomatic balance, seeking to advance a Code of Conduct for the South China Sea while also pursuing economic engagement with China. Internal security concerns, highlighted by a deadly raid on Negros Island and ongoing cybersecurity threats, further complicate the nation's overall security environment.

Key Security Developments

- Military Activities and Exercises: Balikatan 2026

The annual Balikatan (Shoulder-to-Shoulder) 2026 military exercise, which commenced on April 20 and is scheduled to run until May 8, is the largest iteration to date, involving over 17,000 troops from the Philippines, United States, Australia, Japan, Canada, France, and New Zealand. During this period, specific activities included long-range maritime air assault training in Itbayat from April 23-25, counter-unmanned aircraft systems (C-UAS) weaponry exercises at Naval Station Leovigildo Gantioqui from April 26-29, and a multinational counter-landing live-fire event in Palawan on April 27. The exercises also featured the integration of new technologies like reconnaissance drones and 3D printers at Fort Magsaysay, emphasizing interoperability across land, sea, air, space, and cyber domains.

- China's Response to Exercises

On April 30, 2026, China's Defense Ministry announced it conducted naval and air combat readiness patrols around Scarborough Shoal (Huangyan Dao) in the South China Sea. This action was explicitly stated as an "effective countermeasure" to the ongoing Balikatan 2026 exercises, highlighting the escalating tensions and China's assertion of sovereignty over the disputed area.

- Defense Policy and Strategic Shifts: Increased Defense Budget

The Philippine government enacted the 2026 General Appropriations Act, which significantly increased the allotment for the Revised Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) Modernization Program to approximately Php 90 billion. This represents the highest allocation to date for military modernization, reflecting the country's urgent policy for national security in response to external challenges to its territorial integrity.

- Defense Policy and Strategic Shifts: Push for Defense Manufacturing Hub

As the Philippines and the United States commemorate the 75th anniversary of their Mutual Defense Treaty in 2026, their alliance is evolving into an industrial partnership aimed at transforming the Philippines into a defense manufacturing hub for the Indo-Pacific. This initiative is supported by the 2024 Self-Reliant Defense Posture Revitalization Act and the Partnership for Indo-Pacific Industrial Resilience (PIPIR), which plans to build manufacturing facilities in the Philippines to enhance domestic defense production and reduce reliance on foreign contractors.

- Defense Acquisitions and Arms Deals: US Defense Package

The Philippines is slated to receive a historic USD 3.5 billion US defense package starting in 2026, authorized under the US defense budget framework for the next five years. This package includes USD 2.5 billion in foreign military financing grants, distributed at USD 500 million annually from 2026 to 2030, and a USD 1 billion direct loan authority for large-scale defense acquisitions. However, a USD 1 billion loan component was reportedly not processed in time by the Philippines.

- Defense Acquisitions and Arms Deals: Planned Acquisitions

The Department of National Defense's Procurement Monitoring Report for the second semester of 2026 indicates plans for several key acquisitions. These include the purchase of two additional Miguel Malvar-class frigates (HDF-3200 variant), six anti-submarine warfare helicopters (likely Leonardo AW-159 Wildcat), and additional 155mm Self-Propelled Howitzers for the Philippine Army.

- Diplomatic Relations: ASEAN Chairmanship and South China Sea Code of Conduct

As the Chair of ASEAN in 2026, the Philippines is prioritizing the conclusion of a legally binding South China Sea Code of Conduct (COC). Foreign Secretary Theresa Lazaro has stated that working groups are expected to meet regularly to accelerate negotiations between ASEAN member-states and China. This diplomatic push aims to stabilize the volatile maritime domain, although fundamental disagreements, particularly on the legal nature of the code and China's rejection of the 2016 arbitral ruling, continue to pose challenges.

- Diplomatic Relations: "Reset" with China

President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s administration is pursuing a "reset" in relations with China, emphasizing economic collaboration, energy security cooperation,

environmental protection, and peaceful management of sea disputes. This approach recognizes China as the Philippines' largest trading partner and seeks to leverage Manila's ASEAN chairmanship to foster cooperation in less sensitive areas, aligning with the ASEAN-China Comprehensive Strategic Partnership.

- Security Incidents and Threats: Negros Island Raid

On April 26, 2026, the Philippines reported that two US citizens were among 19 people killed in a raid on an alleged communist stronghold in Toboso municipality, Negros Island. The incident, which occurred on April 19, led to over 300 residents fleeing their homes and has prompted an investigation by the country's human rights commission.

- Cybersecurity: Elevated Threat Landscape

The cyber threat landscape in the Philippines has significantly intensified, with rapid digital adoption outpacing security maturity across government, businesses, and critical services. Cyber activity has evolved into large-scale, automated, and increasingly AI-driven campaigns targeting trust, identity, and service continuity. Critical infrastructure, including telecommunications, finance, transportation, and energy sectors, faces increased targeting for service disruption and strategic intelligence collection, with regional geopolitical tensions driving sustained cyber-espionage.

- Maritime and Border Security: Border Management Modernization

The Philippines is actively modernizing its border management architecture in preparation for hosting the ASEAN Summit in 2026, positioning itself as a regional leader in secure, digitally enabled mobility. Initiatives include deploying biometric verification systems, optimizing traveler processing, and utilizing predictive analytics for enhanced risk management, signaling a transition towards fully automated, intelligence-led border ecosystems.

Geopolitical Impact and Regional Dynamics

The recent security developments in the Philippines have significant geopolitical implications, primarily centering on the South China Sea and the evolving power dynamics in the Indo-Pacific. The expanded Balikatan 2026 exercises, involving seven nations, clearly signal the Philippines' deepening alliances beyond its traditional treaty partner, the United States. This multilateral approach, which includes key regional players like Japan and Australia, as well as European partners like Canada and France, demonstrates a collective effort to enhance interoperability and project a united front in upholding a rules-based international order, particularly concerning freedom of navigation in the South China Sea. China's swift response with combat patrols around Scarborough Shoal underscores the persistent and escalating nature of the territorial

disputes and Beijing's determination to assert its claims, directly challenging the increased allied presence.

The Philippines' role as the ASEAN Chair in 2026 provides a crucial diplomatic platform to influence regional stability. Manila's prioritization of a legally binding Code of Conduct for the South China Sea, despite acknowledged difficulties, reflects a strategic effort to manage tensions through multilateral dialogue and establish a framework for peaceful resolution. This diplomatic initiative runs parallel to President Marcos Jr.'s "reset" with China, which seeks to balance security concerns with economic realities, recognizing China as the largest trading partner. This dual-track approach highlights the complex challenge of maintaining economic ties while simultaneously strengthening defense capabilities and alliances to deter aggression.

The strengthening of the Philippines-US alliance, marked by the 80th anniversary of diplomatic relations and the 75th anniversary of the Mutual Defense Treaty, is a cornerstone of Manila's security strategy. The substantial US defense package, including foreign military financing and loan authority, reinforces this commitment and aims to significantly boost the Philippines' defense capabilities. This enhanced partnership, along with trilateral dialogues with Japan, contributes to a broader regional security architecture designed to counter potential threats and ensure a free and open Indo-Pacific. The ongoing developments suggest a strategic recalibration by the Philippines, moving towards a more assertive and networked defense posture while cautiously engaging in diplomacy to de-escalate regional flashpoints.

Military and Defense Analysis

The Philippine military is undergoing a significant transformation, driven by an increased defense budget and a clear strategic imperative to modernize its forces. The 2026 General Appropriations Act allocates a record Php 90 billion to the Revised AFP Modernization Program, signaling a robust commitment to enhancing the nation's defense capabilities. This funding supports planned acquisitions for the second half of 2026, including additional Miguel Malvar-class frigates, anti-submarine warfare helicopters, and 155mm Self-Propelled Howitzers, which are critical for improving naval and ground forces.

The ongoing Balikatan 2026 exercises are central to the Philippines' capability development, focusing on enhancing interoperability with key allies. The drills cover a wide range of scenarios, from long-range maritime air assault and coastal defense to integrated air and missile defense (IAMD) and the deployment of advanced technologies like drones and 3D printers. This multinational training is crucial for developing a combined force capable of addressing diverse contingencies, particularly in maritime security and coastal defense. However, concerns remain regarding the

sufficiency of the Philippines' IAMD networks to effectively counter sophisticated threats, suggesting a need for further investment and integration of advanced air defense systems.

A notable strategic shift is the initiative to transform the Philippines into a defense manufacturing hub for the Indo-Pacific, supported by the Self-Reliant Defense Posture Revitalization Act and international partnerships. This move aims to bolster domestic production of critical munitions and uncrewed systems, reducing reliance on foreign supply chains and enhancing the country's self-sufficiency in defense. While the recent USD 3.5 billion US defense package provides substantial financial backing for modernization, the reported inability to process a USD 1 billion loan highlights potential bureaucratic or absorptive capacity challenges that could impede the rapid acquisition of high-cost systems. The Department of National Defense's push to remove financing restrictions and the 15-year timeline for modernization indicates an awareness of these hurdles and a desire to accelerate the defense build-up.

Outlook and Forecast

Short-term trends (1-3 months):

In the immediate future, the Philippines will likely continue to experience heightened activity in the South China Sea, particularly around disputed features like Scarborough Shoal, as China maintains its presence in response to ongoing multilateral exercises. The conclusion of Balikatan 2026 on May 8 will be followed by assessments of lessons learned, which will inform future joint exercises and defense planning. Diplomatic efforts related to the South China Sea Code of Conduct will intensify under the Philippines' ASEAN chairmanship, with a focus on accelerating working group meetings, though significant breakthroughs on a legally binding agreement remain challenging. Internally, the investigation into the Negros Island raid will proceed, potentially leading to further scrutiny of counter-insurgency operations and human rights practices. Cybersecurity threats are expected to remain elevated, necessitating continued vigilance and implementation of resilience strategies.

Critical flashpoints and risk areas:

The South China Sea, particularly the areas around Scarborough Shoal and other disputed features, remains the primary flashpoint. Any aggressive actions or miscalculations by either the Philippines or China, or their respective allies, could rapidly escalate tensions. The increased presence of multiple foreign militaries during exercises, while intended for deterrence, also raises the risk of accidental encounters. Internally, areas with active communist insurgencies, such as Negros Island, continue to be risk areas for security incidents and potential human rights concerns. The country's critical infrastructure remains vulnerable to sophisticated cyberattacks,

posing a risk to national security and economic stability.

Indicators to monitor:

Key indicators to monitor include the frequency and nature of Chinese maritime activities in the South China Sea, particularly around Philippine-claimed features. Progress (or lack thereof) in the negotiations for the South China Sea Code of Conduct will be a crucial diplomatic indicator. The implementation of the increased defense budget and the progress of planned defense acquisitions, especially the frigates and anti-submarine helicopters, will reflect the pace of military modernization. Developments in the proposed defense manufacturing hub and the success in streamlining defense financing will indicate the long-term trajectory of the Philippines' self-reliant defense posture. Furthermore, monitoring reports from human rights organizations regarding internal security operations will be important.

Strategic recommendations:

The Philippines should continue to diversify and strengthen its security alliances, leveraging its ASEAN chairmanship to build broader regional consensus on maritime security and the rule of law. While pursuing a "reset" with China on economic fronts, Manila must maintain a firm and consistent stance on its sovereign rights in the South China Sea, supported by its enhanced defense capabilities. Accelerating the AFP modernization program by addressing financing and bureaucratic hurdles is paramount, focusing on critical capabilities like maritime domain awareness, anti-access/area denial (A2/AD), and integrated air and missile defense. Investing heavily in cybersecurity infrastructure and capabilities across government and critical sectors is essential to counter the evolving threat landscape. Finally, the government must ensure that internal security operations adhere strictly to human rights standards to maintain domestic stability and international credibility.

Ridon also said the composition of the House Prosecution Team was now being discussed, with several names being floated, some having been included in the first team of prosecutors in the voided impeachment case of Duterte in the 19th Congress. These include Batangas Rep. Gerville Luistro, justice panel chairman, and Representatives Joel Chua, Jonathan Keith Flores, Ysabel Zamora, Lordan Suan, Jose Manuel Diokno and Leila de

Lima.Ridon also challenged Davao Rep. Paolo Duterte to prove his claims that several lawmakers were being called to vote for the impeachment or they will be defunded." I don't think there's any reward needed to impeach the vice president (because) the evidence is clear," Ridon said.

Because of this, women may experience slower physical activity recovery, lower energy levels, and increased risks of osteoporosis and cardiovascular conditions. “By intentionally building and maintaining strength, women can protect their independence and mobility, even long after their reproductive years,” she explained, highlighting the importance of better lifestyle choices.

The president said energy supply disruptions highlighted the urgency to step up the country’ s shift toward cleaner and more resilient energy systems. “We hope that we can continue our work in moving our countries away from fossil fuels and absorb more of the renewables technology that we have been trying to shift to,” he added. The president also expressed gratitude for Japan’ s continued support, particularly its commitment to honor and maintain existing supply contracts for various fuels. Marcos expressed hope that tensions in the Middle East would ease soon, citing the Philippines’ vulnerability, given the presence of around 2.5 million overseas Filipino workers in the region. Kishida reaffirmed Japan’ s commitment to advancing the initiative of AZEC, which he proposed in 2022 to push regional decarbonization and energy cooperation across Southeast Asia and the broader Asian region. He thanked Marcos for participating in the AZEC Plus Online Summit last April 15, and emphasized the importance of strengthening economic and energy resilience with the Philippines. Kishida also conveyed the intention of Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi to work closely with President Marcos particularly on the Philippines’ hosting of the 4th AZEC Leaders’ Meeting in November. He said Takaichi hoped to advance joint leadership with the Philippines in promoting zero-emission initiatives. Kishida, who is in the Philippines from April 30 to May 2 as special envoy of the prime minister, will participate in high-level talks focused on advancing AZEC initiatives. His visit follows the announcement of Japan’ s \$10-billion energy cooperation framework, Partnership on Wide Energy and Resources Resilience (Power Asia), during the recent AZEC Plus Online Summit. Present during Kishida’ s call were Executive Secretary Ralph Recto, Finance Secretary Frederick Go, Energy Secretary Sharon Garin, Trade and Industry Secretary Cristina Roque,

Presidential Communications Office Secretary Dave Gomez and Foreign Affairs Undersecretary Maria Andrelita Austria. Kishida was joined by members of Japan's House of Representatives and House of Councilors, as well as officials from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry, and key AZEC representatives. Kishida also handed over a letter from Takaichi to Marcos stating Takaichi's "desire" for closer Philippine-Japan cooperation on energy resiliency under the Power Asia. He told reporters he also expects that the Philippines will be one of the first countries to receive the assistance or the support from Power Asia. The \$10-billion Power Asia is a procurement and cooperation scheme aimed at supporting states in strengthening their energy supply. Japan envisions AZEC to create a new decarbonization market in Asia to attract capital from around the world. Kishida said AZEC is looking to "actually optimize" the platform to fit each of its 11-member countries' needs against the backdrop of the Middle East crisis that has disrupted the global energy market. He said there are at least 30 initiatives on renewable energy, biotechnology and liquefied natural gas in the Philippines "steadily progressing" through various public and private investments under AZEC. Garin reaffirmed Manila's full support for AZEC and Japan's vision of advancing the platform as a tool to ensure energy resilience in Asia.

- [Marcos vows better jobs, worker protection](#) (2026-05-01 16:15)

REFERRING to the country's workforce as the "backbone of our Republic," President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. vowed on Labor Day Friday to expand job opportunities and strengthen labor protections. In his message, Marcos said the working class continued to drive the country forward despite economic challenges and changing industries. "Today, we honor every member of our workforce whose hands carry the weight of our shared future—whether at sunrise, beneath the noonday heat, or in the long hours when the nation sleeps," he said. "Through your grit and sacrifice, families find stability, and the country finds strength. You are, and will always be, the backbone of our Republic," he said. Marcos stressed the need to build a system where "hard work is rewarded, and opportunity is real." He said this included protecting livelihoods, respecting honest labor and ensuring that progress reaches ordinary families. Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said the president would spend most of Labor Day in General Santos City, where he was to lead government job-generation and aid distribution activities. Marcos was scheduled to return to Malacañang on Friday afternoon. In Manila, human rights groups joining a Labor Day protest march called on the government to raise the minimum wage to P1,200 and to scrap the value-added tax (VAT) and excise tax on fuel amid the ongoing oil crisis. Thousands of marchers from the Bagong Alyansang Makabayan (Bayan), Kilusang Mayo Uno (KMU), and other human rights groups and student organizations converged on España Boulevard and were to proceed to Mendiola Street. But Mendiola, the entry point to Malacañang, had been heavily barricaded by police, so the protesters ended their march at Morayta Street. Later in the day, they moved to Kalaw Avenue to continue their demonstration near the United States Embassy. The protesters condemned the US and Israel's war on Iran, which led to the closure of the Strait of Hormuz and the spike in global fuel prices. Gabriela Women's Party Rep. Sarah Elago told The Manila Times that mass action — especially the

annual staging of the Labor Day demonstrations — is important, noting that many human rights gains were achieved through collective protests. Elago stressed that raising the minimum wage would help workers cope with the oil and energy crisis. Leody De Guzman, chairman of the Bukluran ng Manggagawang Pilipino, echoed Elago's sentiments, saying that many of the demands raised in the protests have remained unchanged since the 1970s. "What I have been shouting in protests since 1970, 1980, 1990 and 2000 until now is still the same: to increase the wages and keep prices on goods low; to make the water cheap, the electricity cheap. Yet, the government has done nothing to solve this," said De Guzman. The Philippine National Police (PNP) announced it would deploy 14,000 officers to maintain peace throughout the protest. KMU Chairman Jerome Adonis had assured that the demonstration would remain peaceful. Mong Palatino, Bayan secretary-general, accused the president of allowing the expansion of US military bases in the country. "That's why today's protest will end near the US Embassy — to condemn the US' war of aggression, to condemn Marcos Jr.'s war of aggression, and to show that the Filipino people stand against imperialism," Palatino said. The protesters also assured public transport drivers that demonstrations will continue until their demands are met. During a minor altercation, Police Lt. June Abrazado confronted protesters who burned effigies of Marcos, US President Donald Trump and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu near the embassy. The protesters condemned the members of the Bureau of Fire Protection for putting out the fire. Abrazado explained that they were only trying to prevent ashes from reaching Rizal Park. "I hope you could see how big the fire was. We are concerned for the rallyists because they could get burned. They could have been injured. Their safety was our priority. That's why we prepared for the water," Abrazado said in Filipino. Police also accused a protester of stealing a cell phone from an officer. Abrazado said the individual involved will be charged. Abrazado said that some officers were punched and struck with sticks by protesters, an accusation denied by Nito Luces, a KMU official. The PNP said overall, the celebration of Labor Day nationwide was peaceful and orderly. At least nine rallies were held in different parts of the country, drawing an estimated 3,410 participants. In his Labor Day message, Speaker Faustino Dy III described Filipino workers as the "strength and life" of the country and "the true lifeblood of our nation." "Through your diligence, perseverance and sacrifice, the industries, services and development of the Philippines continue to move forward," Dy said. He also recognized the challenges workers face every day, from wages and benefits, job security and working conditions. Dy said the House of Representatives continues to uphold the welfare of the workforce by promoting bills and measures that "strengthen the protection, opportunity and dignity of the worker." To mark Labor Day, the Department of Education, and the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) opened dedicated green lanes for senior high school (SHS) graduates at job fairs to accelerate their entry in the workforce. Education Secretary Sonny Angara said the partnership fulfills the mandate of the president to improve the lives of the underprivileged. The green lanes are part of the job fairs held by DOLE in 70 sites across the country, offering over 230,000 employment opportunities. The strategy was first showcased at the Bagong Pilipinas Serbisyo Fair rollout last March, where over 1,400 SHS and Alternative Learning System graduates were hired on the spot. "Through green lanes and removal of fees for documents, we are removing the burden for parents and give graduates the opportunity to

help their families,” Angara said.Sen. Bam Aquino on Friday called on the government to expand assistance to the working and middle classes, who continue to bear the brunt of rising fuel and commodity prices while remaining largely excluded from state aid.In his Labor Day statement, Aquino said these sectors comprise about 80 percent of Filipinos and should be prioritized amid the ongoing economic strain.Aquino warned against sidelining the sector and reiterated proposals to suspend excise taxes on fuel and cut the VAT from 12 percent to 10 percent to ease costs.He cited Senate Bill 2047, which seeks to reduce VAT across goods and services, including petroleum products, by amending provisions of the National Internal Revenue Code of 1997. - [Controlling inflation Filipinos’ most urgent concern – survey](#) (2026-05-01 16:14)

NEARLY half of Filipinos consider controlling inflation or the prices of basic goods and services as the most urgent national concern in the first quarter of 2026, according to a survey by OCTA Research.The survey, conducted from March 19 to 25, found that 45 percent of the respondents pointed to inflation as their biggest concern, an increase of 4 percentage points from the fourth quarter of 2025.The second most urgent concern at 33 percent is increasing wages of workers, down 12 percentage points from the previous quarter, when it topped the list.Fighting graft and corruption in government came in third at 26 percent, a 6 percentage points drop, and access to affordable food such as rice, vegetables and meat at 24 percent.Other notable concerns include reducing poverty (20 percent) and providing free quality education (17 percent).OCTA noted that the findings reflect sentiments before the oil price shock due to the war in the Middle East set in. It said the findings should be understood as a pre-shock baseline that captured public sentiment before high costs exerted pressure on household welfare, purchasing power and food security.Inflation is the highest concern among respondents in the Visayas (54 percent) and Mindanao (51 percent), as well as for socioeconomic Class E (56 percent) and ABC (54 percent).Wages are also among the highest concern among respondents in the Visayas, the National Capital Region and Mindanao, with Visayas respondents the highest at 46 percent.NCR respondents are worried most about corruption in government (36 percent), while food affordability is the biggest concern in the Visayas (32 percent).OCTA said the results suggest that public sentiment in the first quarter of 2026 are being shaped primarily by economic strain and the rising cost of living. “Inflation has once again emerged as the dominant national issue, indicating that day-to-day affordability has become the most immediate pressure facing Filipino households,” it said.It also noted that public concern has shifted away from longer-term structural issues such as education and poverty, and toward more immediate cost-of-living pressures, particularly inflation and purchasing power of income.Meanwhile, 67 percent of respondents said staying healthy is their most urgent personal concern, followed by having enough to eat daily (46 percent), having a secure and well-paying job (42 percent), having able to have savings (41 percent), and finishing schooling or being able to provide schooling for children (39 percent).The survey polled 1,200 respondents

and has a nationwide margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent.

- [Diesel, gasoline prices up next week](#) (2026-05-01 16:13)

THE price of fuel will go up yet again next week following a series of rollbacks as uncertainty over when the war between the United States and Iran continues. Local oil industry sources said on Friday they see diesel going up by P1 to P2 per liter, and gasoline by P2 to P3 per liter. The estimates are based on the trading of Mean of Platts, Singapore, the pricing basis of refined goods in Southeast Asia. The sources said that geopolitical risks are pushing up the price of oil again as the Strait of Hormuz remains closed, and the US and Iran struggling to reach a peace deal. This week, the per-liter price of diesel dropped by P12.94, and gasoline by 53 centavos per liter.

- [US issues alert after Negros clashes](#) (2026-05-01 16:12)

THE United States Embassy in Manila has issued a security alert to American citizens in the Philippines following intensified military operations against communist rebels in several parts of the country. In an advisory posted on its website, the embassy said recent offensives by the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) against the New People's Army (NPA) have led to violent encounters, including an April 19 clash that resulted in the deaths of two US citizens. "US citizens have been present during recent military actions against the NPA," the embassy said. The NPA, the armed wing of the Communist Party of the Philippines, is designated as a foreign terrorist organization by both the US and Philippine governments. The embassy identified rural and mountainous areas in Leyte, Mindoro, Negros and Samar as areas of heightened concern, citing recent fatal clashes between government troops and insurgents. It advised Americans to avoid any association with insurgent or terrorist groups and to immediately leave areas where armed individuals not affiliated with police or military are present. It also cautioned that some nongovernmental organizations may have links to insurgent groups. US citizens planning to do humanitarian or volunteer work were urged to partner only with organizations registered with the Philippine National Volunteer Service Coordinating Agency and to coordinate with local government units for security guidance. "Foreign terrorist organizations actively recruit Americans to participate directly in terrorist activities and/or provide financial support," the embassy said. On Friday, a ranking official of the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-Elcac) said the US Embassy security alert warning is a recognition that Americans are drawn into violence by organizations linked to the communist insurgents. "This is perhaps the first direct and explicit recognition by the United States government that its own citizens are being drawn into violence by organizations linked to the CPP-NPA-NDF (Communist Party of the Philippines-New People's Army-National Democratic Front)," NTF-Elcac Executive Director Undersecretary Ernesto Torres Jr. said in a statement. Torres said the warning highlights a "critical reality" that has long been denied or downplayed, which is "foreign terrorist organizations actively recruit Americans to participate directly in terrorist activities and/or provide financial support." "This acknowledgment affirms

what Philippine authorities have consistently exposed — that the insurgency is not merely a domestic security concern but part of a broader transnational network of recruitment, radicalization and terrorism,” he said. Torres expressed the NTF-Elcac’s appreciation to the National Federation of Filipino American Associations for its statement on the loss of lives, including of US citizens Lyle Prijoles and Kai Dana-Rene Sorem. “This development strengthens the shared commitment of the Philippines and the United States to combat terrorism in all its forms. It also sends a powerful signal to those who continue to enable, justify or obscure the activities of the CPP-NPA-NDF: the international community is taking notice, and the truth is becoming undeniable,” he added. Former members of the government’s exploratory and negotiating teams in past peace talks with communist rebels called for an independent investigation into the intense fighting in Toboso, Negros Occidental, which left 19 people — including the two Americans — dead. In a joint statement on Friday, former Transportation secretary Hernani Braganza, lawyer Efren Moncupa, economist Jaime Aristotle Alip, academic Francisco Lara Jr. and Roberto Ador said the clash highlighted the urgency of resolving the decadeslong communist insurgency. The signatories, who were involved in back channel and formal negotiations from 2014 to 2020 under the administrations of former presidents Benigno Aquino III and Rodrigo Duterte, said a “functioning and serious peace process” had made significant progress. They said negotiations at the time were close to securing a truce and an interim peace agreement, including the possible return from exile of CPP founder Jose Maria Sison, who died in 2022. “The Toboso tragedy compelled us to break our silence,” the group said. The military said the encounter dealt a major blow to the Northern Negros Front. However, the former negotiators said the killings could deepen the cycle of violence, particularly as public reaction — especially among younger Filipinos — has been marked by grief and heightened concern. They called for the creation of a fact-finding commission by Congress, with participation from executive agencies and independent civil society groups, to investigate what they described as the deadliest incident involving civilians in recent years. The group said President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.’s statement that he would not obstruct an investigation by the Commission on Human Rights was a positive development. “Accountability and justice... is not optional, it is imperative,” they said, stressing that addressing human rights violations must go hand in hand with tackling the root causes of armed conflict, including landlessness, poverty and lack of access to basic rights. The group also urged the administration to resume peace talks with the communists “without precondition,” saying a comprehensive and final peace agreement remains achievable. “We know, from our own experience at the table, that a lasting settlement is possible,” they said.

- [Sonza arrest ‘warning’ to fake news peddlers](#) (2026-05-01 16:11)

MALACAÑANG on Friday said the arrest of former broadcaster Jay Sonza should serve as a warning to those spreading fake news. In a statement, Acting Presidential Communications Secretary Dave Gomez said the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) acted promptly in filing charges and arresting Sonza over posts with alleged false information about the health of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. “It shows the government’s continuing effort to guard the

truth, protect the public from deception and preserve a free but responsible democratic space,” Gomez said. He said the case sent a strong signal to those spreading false information online. “Misinformation undermines public trust, endangers lives and will be met with swift, lawful consequences,” he said. Gomez said the Presidential Communications Office (PCO) would continue its crackdown on fake news peddlers to ensure they were held accountable under the law. “We will continue to work with law enforcement, the media and responsible online platforms to identify, investigate and prosecute those who disseminate falsehoods,” Gomez said. The PCO recently signed a memorandum of agreement with the Department of Justice (DOJ) and Department of Information and Communication Technology to stop the spread of fake news. The PCO has already submitted several cases of fake news to the DOJ for prosecution. According to NBI Director Melvin Matibag, Sonza was arrested Thursday night after being charged with violating Article 154 of the Revised Penal Code, in relation to the Cybercrime Prevention Act, for spreading a fake medical bulletin about the president. Sonza, a veteran media figure, had yet to issue a statement. In April, Gomez personally filed complaints against those behind the Facebook page “Malasakit News Pilipinas” for allegedly posting false stories about a supposed energy lockdown while the country was under a state of energy emergency.

- ['No payoff in unanimous votes on probable cause'](#) (2026-05-01 16:10)

DEPUTY Speakers Paolo Ortega V of La Union and Janette Garin of Iloilo on Friday dismissed as baseless and diversionary the claim that the House Committee on Justice’ s finding of probable cause in the impeachment complaint against Vice President Sara Duterte was the result of any “payoff” or political inducement. A report from a news website claimed that members received the funds in two tranches of P650 million each in an office at the basement of the Batasang Pambansa complex. The report’s source also claimed that there will be another fund release once the articles of impeachment are voted on at the House plenary once session resumes May 4. “What payoff? The record speaks for itself. The Committee’ s unanimous vote was anchored on overwhelming documentary evidence — official records, sworn testimonies, and verifiable financial documents presented in open hearings,” Ortega said in a statement. He said the proceedings of the House Committee on Justice were transparent, with members from political parties independently assessing the evidence laid before them. “No amount of spin can erase the fact that congressmen, regardless of affiliation, were confronted with hard numbers, official audit findings, and financial trails that demand accountability. The vote was not coerced; it was compelled by evidence,” he added. Ortega said allegations of bribery or coercion are a “disservice to the institution and an affront to the integrity” of House members. “To suggest that lawmakers abandoned their oath for a ‘payoff’ is not only false, it is an insult to the collective judgment of the Committee. These are elected representatives who understand the gravity of impeachment. They voted based on what was proven, not on what was peddled outside the halls of Congress,” he said. Ortega challenged opposition lawmakers and critics repeating the bribery narrative. “If you have evidence of a ‘payoff,’ then name names. Identify the members. Present the proof. Execute sworn statements. File the appropriate charges. Otherwise, stop maligning the entire House with reckless accusations,”

Ortega said. The House leader, meanwhile, reminded that a finding of probable cause does not determine guilt, but merely affirms that sufficient basis exists to elevate the matter to the plenary and, ultimately, to the Senate for trial. “This is the constitutional process at work. The House determines probable cause. The Senate tries the case. That is the rule of law. That is accountability,” Ortega said. In a separate statement, Garin categorically declared there were no payoffs and no coercion in the move by the House panel, saying the unanimous vote of its 53 members was driven by evidence against the country’s second-highest official. The Iloilo lawmaker issued the statement in response to a report alleging a supposed 1.3 billion peso “appearance fee” fund for Justice panel members. “There is no truth to the appearance fee, nor any coercion,” Garin said. “The evidence presented against the Vice President was strong and she didn’t answer it because she chose to remain absent in all the hearings, so, it’s not surprising that the vote was unanimous for probable cause,” she added. Garin said the unfounded allegations against committee members were an attempt to discredit the outcome and shift attention away from the evidence on record. “This narrative is meant to distract from the evidence. But the record is clear — the vote was based on facts, documents, and sworn testimony,” Garin said. “There was no pressure, no directive, and no money involved. What we saw was an independent body doing its constitutional duty,” she added. Voting 53-0 with zero abstentions, the Justice panel found probable cause to impeach Duterte after weeks of hearings that built a detailed evidentiary record on alleged fund misuse, unexplained wealth, and threats against top officials. The committee is set to approve its report recommending impeachment, which will be submitted to the plenary before possible transmittal of the articles of impeachment to the Senate for trial. Meanwhile, the vice president’s elder brother, Davao City Rep. Paolo Duterte, claimed that the Statement of Assets, Liabilities, and Net Worth (SALN) is now being used “not for the sake of transparency, but for the sake of timing.” “Supposedly, some of my colleagues in Congress only ‘remember’ these records when someone isn’t following the script. Coincidence? Of course, a ‘coincidence.’ If these stories are true, it seems we have a new system: vote wisely... or we’ll look closely at your SALN,” Duterte claimed. He also said that even in the Senate, people are being approached to fix votes to convict his sister. “An impeachment vote is not a raffle ticket, it is not a command, and it certainly should not be the product of pressure. It is a mandate from the people,” Duterte said. He called on his fellow lawmakers to “stand on principle” rather than to “follow whispers.” “Listen to the cries of your constituents... if you were promised any aid, remember the people who contributed to those funds,” Duterte said.

- [Lacson vows to escalate flood control scam probe](#) (2026-05-01 16:09)

SENATE President Pro Tempore Panfilo Lacson said Friday he would elevate flood control scam investigation to the plenary. Lacson, who chairs the Senate Blue Ribbon Committee, said he plans to deliver a privilege speech outlining the panel’s accomplishments after seven to eight hearings. The move comes as the committee’s partial report has yet to secure enough signatures for formal filing and sponsorship. “The Filipino people not only deserve to be updated but more so properly and accurately informed amid the false narratives being

floated,” Lacson said, adding that presenting the findings in plenary would allow debate, amendments, and eventual adoption. He emphasized that signing a committee report does not necessarily mean full agreement, and acknowledged differing views among senators. “While I disagree with those who do not want to sign, I respect and understand their individual decisions,” he said. Lacson credited the hearings with surfacing evidence that contributed to case buildups and ongoing investigations by agencies such as the Ombudsman, Department of Justice, Sandiganbayan, and Anti-Money Laundering Council. He said the probe was partly driven by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.’s call in his previous State of the Nation Address to hold erring officials accountable. Senate Minority Leader Alan Peter Cayetano called for a more comprehensive approach to the investigation. He warned that focusing too heavily on the draft risks narrowing the scope of the inquiry, which he emphasized is still in progress. Cayetano noted that several senators have already reviewed the document but expressed disagreements over certain portions. “In fact, many of us have read it, and we don’t agree with the report. It’s not that we don’t want to sign it, we just have a lot of disagreements there,” he said, adding that differing views among lawmakers are part of the legislative process. Cayetano stressed that the investigation is ongoing, with more testimonies, evidence, and potential cases expected in the coming hearings. He raised concerns about early narratives surrounding the probe, saying initial claims that all questioned projects were “ghost projects” have since been qualified. “Not all of them were ghost [projects],” he said, warning that premature conclusions based on partial findings could distort the broader picture. Cayetano emphasized that the Senate inquiry should ultimately expose systemic issues. “Corruption is systemic. It is not isolated,” he said.

- [4 Filipino crew members of MT Aqua 1 repatriated](#) (2026-05-01 16:08)

FOUR Filipino crew members of MT Aqua 1 returned to the country Wednesday, the Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) said. On April 1, 2026, the Panama-flagged oil tanker MT Aqua 1 was struck by an Iranian cruise missile approximately 17 nautical miles north of Qatar's Ras Laffan Industrial Hub, resulting in damage above the waterline but no environmental leaks or oil spills. Despite the strike and a subsequent onboard fire, all 21 Filipino crew members remained uninjured and successfully extinguished the flames. The DMW said in a statement Friday that the four seamen arrived via an unspecified commercial flight at Ninoy Aquino International Airport Terminal 1 in Pasay City. They were the final batch of Filipino crew members to be repatriated. The four were greeted by staff of the DMW and the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration. The first batch of repatriated crew members arrived April 15, followed by another batch a week later. “A total of 21 Filipino crew members were aboard a Panama-flagged oil/product tanker that was hit by a missile near the Ras Laffan Industrial Hub in Qatar on April 1, 2026. Despite the incident, none of the crew members were injured,” the DMW said. “The government, led by the DMW, assured that the crew members will continue to receive the necessary support to help them restart their lives,” it added. The DMW said around 1,200 seamen aboard various ships have already crossed out of the Strait of Hormuz. “The DMW also continues to ensure the safety and welfare of Filipino crew members on vessels that

remain in the Persian Gulf due to the closure of the said passage,” it added. ARIC JOHN SY CUA

SEN. Bong Go paid tribute Friday to Filipino workers as the country commemorates Labor Day. In a statement, Go recognized the vital role of workers in sustaining families, communities, and the country’s ongoing development. He highlighted the contributions of employees across various sectors, including laborers, overseas Filipino workers (OFWs), transport workers, farmers, fisherfolk, informal workers, and small entrepreneurs. “This Labor Day, I salute every Filipino worker. You are the strength of our families, our communities, and our country,” Go said in Filipino. The senator emphasized that beyond symbolic recognition, workers need concrete support, particularly amid rising living costs and economic uncertainty. He underscored the importance of accessible government programs that address basic needs, healthcare, and stable livelihood opportunities — especially for vulnerable sectors that often struggle to access aid during emergencies. Go is currently advocating measures aimed at improving workers’ welfare in the 20th Congress of the Philippines. Among these is Senate Bill (SB) 175, which proposes a nationwide daily minimum wage increase of 100 pesos. The measure seeks to cushion Filipino families from the effects of inflation and the increasing cost of essential goods. Labor groups have long pushed for wage adjustments, citing that current minimum wages in several regions fall short of the estimated family living wage. Economic analysts note that while wage hikes may provide immediate relief to workers, they must be balanced with support for small businesses to mitigate potential impacts on employment. “Work is not just a job. For many Filipinos, it is a way to support their families every day. That is why we must continue to ensure that public service cares for our workers,” Go added. Labor Day in the Philippines is traditionally marked by rallies and calls from labor organizations for higher wages, job security, and stronger protections for workers’ rights.

- [NLEX moves May 4 reopening of QC road project](#) (2026-05-01 16:05)

NORTH Luzon Expressway Corp. pushed back the May 4, 2026 reopening of a road in Quezon City that would have eased traffic in the area where construction works on the NLEX-C5 project were ongoing. The Quezon City government announced that the Katipunan Kaliwa Street/Lokaria Street from Mindanao Avenue to King Alexander Street would not reopen as scheduled to allow for the four-day curing process to ensure road integrity. Under the traffic scheme, Class 1 vehicles will be allowed to pass through the affected stretch only under a stop-and-go setup. Class 1 vehicles usually include cars, vans, motorcycles, and sport utility vehicles. Motorists passing through the area near Mindanao Avenue and King Alexander Street were advised to take alternate routes and plan their trips. Traffic enforcers will be deployed to help manage vehicular traffic, while directional signs will be placed to guide motorists. The Northlink Segment 8.2 Section 1A is the first 2-kilometer section of the China-funded NLEX-C5 project serving as an east-west 24/7 truck route to decongest Mindanao Avenue and Quirino Highway. It will add entries and exits in the Quirino Avenue area. Its construction started on Feb. 15, 2025, and was targeted for completion on Feb. 14, 2026. The NLEX-C5 North Link Project is

part of the Strategic Projects under the 10-point Agenda of the Metro Pacific Tollways Corp. (MPTC) Road to 100B Revenue by 2030.

- [11 NCR policemen sacked over ‘kidnappings’](#) (2026-05-01 16:05)

THE National Police Commission (Napolcom) has dismissed 11 police officers from the National Capital Region Police Office’s Regional Drug Enforcement Unit (RDEU-NCRPO) over alleged kidnapping cases. In a news release Friday, Napolcom said the officers were found administratively liable for two counts of grave misconduct and two counts of conduct unbecoming of a police officer. The commission identified the 11 as LtCol. Ryan Jay Orapa, Maj. Mark Phillip Almedilla, SMS Mark Anthony Manrique, SSg. Edmon Muñoz, SSgt. Robert Allan Raz Jr., SSgt. Denar Roda, Cpl. Alric Natividad, Cpl. Reynaldo Seno Jr., Cpl. Ronald John Lanaria, Pat. Rufino Miguel Panghulan, and Pat. Develyn Tapalla. Orapa, Almedilla, Manrique, and Muñoz have been linked to the missing “sabungeros” (cockfight enthusiasts) case and were charged and dismissed from service in January. The 11 officers were accused of involvement in two abduction incidents on Feb. 17 and March 24, 2021, allegedly under the guise of anti-drug operations. The case stemmed from complaints filed on Sept. 3, 2025. “The respondents’ actions, carried out while they were in active service and acting under the color of authority, seriously dishonored the Philippine National Police (PNP) and demonstrated a corrupt and unworthy moral character incompatible with public service,” Napolcom said. Given the gravity of the violations, Napolcom imposed the maximum penalty of dismissal, with accessory penalties. Napolcom Commissioner Rafael Vicente Calinisan stressed that due process was observed in handling the cases. “May due process tayo dito sa Napolcom. Hindi natin puwedeng paghaluin ang mga kaso. Kailangan nating tingnan nang hiwa-hiwalay, base sa ebidensya (We have due process here in Napolcom. We can’t combine the cases. We have to look at them separately based on evidence),” he said.

- [SHS grads hired at Marikina job fair on Labor Day](#) (2026-05-01 16:03)

SENIOR high school graduates were among those hired on the spot during the Marikina City Labor Day job fair, with officials urging them to continue their education even after entering the workforce, on Friday, May 1. Marikina City Mayor Marjorie Ann “Maan” Teodoro said the first applicant hired during the fair was a senior high school graduate from Jesus Dela Peña National High School. She said she talked with several newly hired applicants and observed that many had not yet pursued a college education. Teodoro urged them to continue studying while working to improve their long-term career prospects. “To those hired on the spot, congratulations. I was able to talk to many of you. Many of them are senior high school graduates. And what I always say is, go to college. Your learning should not end once you already have work,” she said. Teodoro, a former educator, said continued education helps workers expand their knowledge and enhance their skills, which can lead to better employment opportunities. She said the city established the Pamantasan ng Lungsod ng Marikina to provide residents with access to free college education. “That is why we established the Pamantasan to allow you to receive free college education,” she said. The Marikina City government organized

the job fair, in partnership with the Department of Labor and Employment and SM Supermalls, as part of 2026 Labor Day 2026 activities. A total of 45 public and private-sector partners joined the event, which also featured a one-stop shop for government services.

- [DOTr halts onboarding of new TNVS, riders](#) (2026-05-01 16:02)

THE Department of Transportation (DOTr) has ordered an immediate suspension of onboarding for new Transport Network Vehicle Service (TNVS) and motorcycle taxi drivers after regulators uncovered widespread violations of fleet caps, prompting a broader probe into ride-hailing firms. Transportation Secretary Giovanni Lopez issued the directive following findings that several Transport Network Companies (TNCs) and Motorcycle Taxi Platform Providers (MTPPs) had exceeded the number of drivers allowed under government regulations. In a memorandum, Lopez instructed the Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) to stop all onboarding activities for new drivers and riders, except those already holding valid franchises or provisional authority. The move came after President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. ordered an investigation into alleged abuses by ride-hailing firms, including their failure to comply with limits set on accredited drivers. Authorities said discrepancies surfaced during the distribution of government cash aid to transport workers, when the number of individuals claiming benefits exceeded the official lists submitted by companies. Subsequent checks revealed deeper irregularities, including the presence of so-called “ghost riders” — unregistered drivers included in subsidy records. The DOTr estimated about 30,000 questionable entries in four-wheel services and more than 200,000 in motorcycle taxi operations. Lopez said some firms continued onboarding drivers despite already reaching their authorized caps, effectively bypassing LTFRB rules. He also flagged reports that applicants were being charged onboarding fees ranging from P25,000 to P90,000 even without proper permits. The DOTr has likewise banned on-the-spot or same-day onboarding conducted without prior LTFRB approval, citing weak screening processes and compliance lapses. Officials said the agency is evaluating possible sanctions, including fines and other penalties, against companies found to have violated regulations. The review also covers potential accountability among regulators who may have allowed the practices to continue. Meanwhile, the DOTr and LTFRB are studying a possible amnesty program for so-called “tempo drivers” — those operating without full authorization — to help them regularize their status and continue earning a livelihood. Lopez said the suspension forms part of efforts to restore order in the ride-hailing sector, enforce franchise limits, and safeguard both drivers and commuters from risks associated with an unregulated system.

- [MOA roads to close for ‘Star Wars’ run](#) (2026-05-01 16:01)

MAJOR roads around the SM Mall of Asia complex in Pasay City will be closed overnight on Saturday, May 2, for the “Star Wars Night Run 2026,” affecting traffic flow in the area. The Pasay Traffic and Parking Management Office said the road closures would run from 10 p.m. until 4 a.m. the following day to ensure the safety of participants. Affected roads are SM MOA Blocks 16/20, Seaside Avenue, Diokno Avenue, Buendia Extension, Jalandoni Street, and Sotto

Street with a zipper lane on the Philippine International Convention Center and Star City side. Portions of Roxas Boulevard heading toward Manila, as well as Atang Dela Rama Street with a zipper lane near the PICC area, will also be closed. Motorists were advised to expect congestion and take alternative routes during the six-hour closure window. Event organizers said participants claimed their race kits at the SM Mall of Asia Main Atrium ahead of the run, with no distribution allowed on race day. The themed night run, organized by Runrio, is known for drawing runners in costume and staging activities around the MOA bay area.

- [Sonza arrest ‘warning’ to fake news peddlers](#) (2026-05-01 16:00)

MALACAÑANG on Friday said the arrest of former broadcaster Jay Sonza should serve as a warning to those spreading fake news. In a statement, Acting Presidential Communications Secretary Dave Gomez said the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) acted promptly in filing charges and arresting Sonza over posts with alleged false information about the health of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. “It shows the government’s continuing effort to guard the truth, protect the public from deception and preserve a free but responsible democratic space,” Gomez said. He said the case sent a strong signal to those spreading false information online. “Misinformation undermines public trust, endangers lives and will be met with swift, lawful consequences,” he said. Gomez said the Presidential Communications Office (PCO) would continue its crackdown on fake news peddlers to ensure they were held accountable under the law. “We will continue to work with law enforcement, the media and responsible online platforms to identify, investigate and prosecute those who disseminate falsehoods,” Gomez said. The PCO recently signed a memorandum of agreement with the Department of Justice (DOJ) and Department of Information and Communication Technology to stop the spread of fake news. The PCO has already submitted several cases of fake news to the DOJ for prosecution. According to NBI Director Melvin Matibag, Sonza was arrested Thursday night after being charged with violating Article 154 of the Revised Penal Code, in relation to the Cybercrime Prevention Act, for spreading a fake medical bulletin about the president. Sonza, a veteran media figure, had yet to issue a statement. In April, Gomez personally filed complaints against those behind the Facebook page “Malasakit News Pilipinas” for allegedly posting false stories about a supposed energy lockdown while the country was under a state of energy emergency.

- [Expanded private education subsidy eyes 2.4M beneficiaries](#) (2026-05-01 16:00)

THE Department of Education (DepEd) will continue providing subsidies for underprivileged learners in private schools for the upcoming school year, with more than 2.4 million beneficiaries targeted under the Expanded Government Assistance to Students and Teachers in Private Education (E-Gastpe). Nearly 990,000 junior high school students will be covered by the Educational Service Contracting (ESC) program, while around 1.47 million senior high school learners will benefit from the Senior High School Voucher Program (SHS-VP) for school year (SY) 2026-2027. Education Secretary Sonny Angara said the program will allow families to enroll their children in private schools, easing financial pressure while helping to decongest public classrooms. “President Bongbong Marcos’ priority is to ease the burden of Filipino families

when it comes to tuition and other school fees,” Angara said, as quoted in a news release Friday. “A child’s education should not stop just because of lack of money. Government assistance should reach the families who need it most. These subsidies are meant to keep children in school,” he added. DepEd has also rolled out revised guidelines for the E-Gastpe, which now unifies the implementation of ESC, SHS-VP, and the Teachers’ Salary Subsidy under a single framework. The new rules place stronger emphasis on prioritizing learners from disadvantaged backgrounds, including those in low-income households, Indigenous peoples communities, and geographically isolated areas — groups that are often most vulnerable to dropping out due to financial constraints. While the bulk of beneficiaries are learners, DepEd said support for private school teachers through the TSS, which has increased from P18,000 to P24,000, remains part of the overall system to sustain education delivery, particularly in schools serving subsidized students. Angara said the changes respond to a persistent problem: The cost of staying in school — including transport, uniforms, and private school fees — continues to strain household budgets, particularly among families just above the poverty line. The department also linked the subsidy program to broader system pressures, noting that congestion in public schools often forces students into overcrowded classrooms, affecting learning outcomes. By supporting enrollment in private schools, the government not only redistributes students but also preserves education quality across both sectors. The revised policy introduces a more systematic targeting approach, including stricter screening and monitoring systems to ensure subsidies are directed to learners who need them most, particularly those from low-income and vulnerable sectors. DepEd maintained that the role of private schools remains critical in this effort, describing the partnership as a practical way to expand access without overextending public infrastructure. The updated guidelines under DepEd Order 11, s. 2026, will take effect in SY 2026–2027.

- [NTF-ELCAC backs US warning on alleged NPA recruitment of Americans](#) (2026-05-01 15:27)

The National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-ELCAC) on Friday welcomed a security alert issued by the United States Embassy in Manila warning American citizens about alleged recruitment efforts by the New People’s Army (NPA). In a statement, the task force described the advisory as a “timely and significant” development, saying it marked one of the first explicit acknowledgments by US authorities that American nationals may be drawn into activities linked to the Communist Party of the Philippines–New People’s Army–National Democratic Front (CPP-NPA-NDF). The US Embassy advisory reiterated that the NPA is designated as a foreign terrorist organization by both the United States and the Philippine governments. It also warned that such groups “actively recruit Americans to participate directly in terrorist activities and/or provide financial support.” NTF-ELCAC said the alert reinforced long-standing concerns about recruitment and alleged links between insurgent groups and some civil society organizations. The Embassy, in its notice, cautioned that certain non-governmental organizations may have affiliations with armed groups, though it did not name specific entities. The advisory urged Americans in the Philippines and elsewhere to comply with local laws and avoid high-risk areas, particularly rural and mountainous locations in Leyte,

Mindoro, Negros, and Samar. These areas, it noted, have seen recent clashes between government forces and suspected NPA fighters. It also cited a reported April 19 incident in which two Americans were killed during an armed encounter, warning that individuals in proximity to NPA elements face risks of arrest, injury, or death. The task force expressed condolences over the deaths, including those of US nationals identified as Lyle Prijoles and Kai Dana-Rene Sorem. It also acknowledged the statement of the National Federation of Filipino American Associations (NaFFAA), which called for clarity, justice, and respect for the dignity of all lives affected. NTF-ELCAC said the incident highlights the risks posed by what it described as “deceptive recruitment and ideological manipulation,” adding that foreign nationals are not immune to being drawn into violent extremism. The group backed the Embassy’s directive for individuals to avoid affiliating with insurgent or terrorist organizations, stressing that the warning applies to both foreign nationals and Filipinos. It added that the advisory highlights what it described as the transnational dimension of the insurgency, involving recruitment and support networks beyond Philippine borders. The NTF-ELCAC called for continued vigilance and cooperation, saying recruitment into armed groups leads to violence and exploitation.

Visiting Ukrainian Deputy Foreign Minister Olexandr Mischenko on Friday expressed gratitude to Sen. Erwin Tulfo for his assistance to supply Ukraine with 40 generator units. In an interview with select group of reporters, Mischenko said the generator units would be used "for heating in time when Russia shell our critical infrastructure." Ukrainian Ambassador to Manila Yuliia Fediv said the embassy and Tulfo's office are "finalizing the process of shipment." "So, hopefully within the second half of May they will be leaving Manila for Ukraine. So, we are really thankful as a country for this generous support," Fediv said. "And it's a good timing because it will arrive end of summer. So, it's beginning of autumn when the cold season will start," she added. Foreign Affairs Secretary Ma. Theresa Lazaro met with Mischenko wherein they held the second political consultations between the two countries. "We hope to continue the positive trajectory of our bilateral relations and move forward concrete initiatives in sectors of mutual interest," Lazaro wrote on X.

- [SHS graduates to benefit from job fair "green lanes"](#) (2026-05-01 13:39)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Education (DepEd) and the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) have opened dedicated green lanes for Senior High School graduates at the government's Labor Day job fairs to accelerate their entry in the workforce. - [Ukraine 'unhappy' with crude importation from Russia, but understands Philippines' situation](#) (2026-05-01 13:15)

MANILA, Philippines — Ukrainian Deputy Foreign Minister Olexandr Mischenko said Ukraine is "not happy" with some countries' move to import crude oil from Russia amid the oil crisis but the Philippines managed to explain its situation. The Philippines has asked the United States for an extension of a sanctions waiver to allow it to buy more Russian oil and petroleum products, Energy Secretary Sharon Garin recently said. "Of course, we are not happy that some country uses Russian crude oil. We understand specific situation," Mischenko said in an interview with a select group of reporters. "We reiterate that any cooperation with aggressor, it brings the possibility to prolong the existence of this aggressor, because Russian gain money through this oil only for war, that means that you supply aggressor," he added. Mischenko said Ukraine asked their partners, or the countries which support Ukraine "to look for diversity and to escape from dependence with Russia because if you have deal with aggressor, you became theoretically part of this situation, supporting." "But fortunately, the leadership of Philippines fully understand the situation and they're looking for other possibilities," Mischenko said. "We understand that it is a small quantity. But nevertheless, as I mentioned, Russia tried to use conflict in Gulf to increase benefit and use it only for war with Ukraine," he added. Garin said the Department of Energy has coordinated with the Department of Foreign Affairs for the request of an extension or another window for the Philippines to import oil from Russia. "They have communicated this with our ambassador in the US. We are awaiting their response, but we are very positive on getting this other window," she said. The Philippines' sole oil refinery, Petron, secured nearly 2.5 million barrels last month after seeing at least four million barrels in shipments canceled since the start of the US-Israeli war on Iran. Washington in March eased some sanctions tied to Russia's war on Ukraine to allow countries to purchase Russian oil that was already at sea until April 11 to stabilize energy markets, following the effective closure of the Strait of Hormuz, a key waterway for the world's crude trade.

- [Chinese forces jam media drone ops in Pagasa Island - report](#) (2026-05-01 13:00)

MANILA, Philippines — Drone operations by members of the media as well as volunteers were reportedly jammed by Chinese forces as Atin Ito Coalition makes its fourth voyage to Pagasa Island across the West Philippine Sea (WPS) from April 30 to May 5. Atin Ito, a civilian-led coalition asserting Philippine sovereignty and conducting supply missions to the WPS, made a series of Facebook posts detailing how they were shadowed by Chinese maritime forces all throughout their trip. “Pati ba naman ang airspace natin, inaagaw ng Tsina?” (Is our airspace being invaded by China as well?), Atin Ito said. “Chinese presence is reportedly jamming drone operations used by media and volunteers of the Atin Ito during their 4th civilian mission to the West Philippine Sea. Currently, the civilian mission is 310 nautical miles away from Pag-asa Island. “We are still well within our EEZ (exclusive economic zone), yet China’s illegal presence is now felt not only in our seas but also in our airspace,” they said. In an earlier post, the Atin Ito coalition said that at 7:20 am, they were being shadowed by a Chinese Coast Guard vessel (3103) about 3.2 nautical miles away from their vessel MV Kapitan Felix Oca. “This mission sends a clear message to Asean leaders: the West Philippine Sea is an integral part of our nation and a zone of peace and solidarity, not one of military aggression,” David said aboard the vessel MV Kapitan Felix Oca. “It is also an act of bayanihan, as we extend much-needed support to the residents of Pag-asa Island and its fishers, who are reeling from the effects of the global oil crisis,” David said. The advanced party, led by ML Chowee, has already arrived at the island and reported encountering a Chinese vessel bearing bow number 525, believed by the crew to be a Chinese navy ship estimated to be about an hour away from Pag-asa Island. The mission also coincided with the Multinational Maritime Events happening in the WPS as part of the ongoing Exercise Baliaktan 41-2026 which heavily focuses on defending the Philippine territory from external threats. Present during the send-off were Akbayan Reps. Perci Cendaña and Dadah Kiram Ismula, as well as former Mamamayang Liberal Party-list Rep. Erin Tañada. Atin Ito will also hold a symbolic jet ski flag ride - a famous promise of former President Rodrigo Duterte to assert Philippine sovereignty amid continuing tensions in the disputed waters. “The promised jet ski ride that never happened—we will be the ones to fulfill it. Where one Mindanaoan failed and betrayed the West Philippine Sea, I, another Mindanaoan and a woman, will step forward to deliver,” Ismula said. .

- [Pasay to close MOA roads for 'Star Wars' night run](#) (2026-05-01 07:07)

MANILA, Philippines — Major roads around the SM Mall of Asia complex in Pasay City will be closed overnight on Saturday, May 2, for the “Star Wars Night Run 2026,” affecting traffic flow in the area. The Pasay Traffic and Parking Management Office said the road closures would run from 10 p.m. until 4 a.m. the following day to ensure the safety of participants. Affected roads are SM MOA Blocks 16/20, Seaside Avenue, Diokno Avenue, Buendia Extension, Jalandoni Street, and Sotto Street with a zipper lane on the Philippine International Convention Center and Star City side. Portions of Roxas Boulevard heading toward Manila, as well as Atang Dela Rama Street with a zipper lane near the PICC area, will also be closed. Motorists were advised to expect congestion and take alternative routes during the six-hour closure window. Event organizers

said participants claimed their race kits at the SM Mall of Asia Main Atrium ahead of the run, with no distribution allowed on race day. The themed night run, organized by Runrio, is known for drawing runners in costume and staging activities around the MOA bay area.

- [Arrest of ex-broadcast journalist Jay Sonza should serve as warning to fake news peddlers](#) (2026-05-01 07:03)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Friday welcomed the arrest of former broadcaster Jay Sonza, saying it should serve as a warning to those spreading fake news. In a statement, Acting Presidential Communications Secretary Dave Gomez said the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) acted promptly in filing charges and effecting Sonza's arrest over posts alleging false information about the health of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. Gomez said the NBI's actions showed the administration's firm and lawful response to alleged online abuse, especially where false information was published and circulated as legitimate news. "It shows the government's continuing effort to guard the truth, protect the public from deception, and preserve a free but responsible democratic space," Gomez said. Gomez said the case sent a strong signal to those spreading false information online. "Misinformation undermines public trust, endangers lives, and will be met with swift, lawful consequences," the Palace official said. "Public discourse must remain free, but it must also be truthful, fair, and orderly. Speak freely, but not falsely," he added.

- [Govt stops onboarding of new TNVS, motorcycle taxi drivers over cap violations](#) (2026-05-01 06:15)

MANILA, Philippines — Transportation Secretary Giovanni Lopez has ordered an immediate halt to the onboarding of new drivers and riders by Transport Network Companies (TNCs) and Motorcycle Taxi Platform Providers (MTPPs) after several firms were found to have exceeded government-imposed limits. The directive came following reports that some companies had gone beyond the maximum number of accredited drivers, leading to the emergence of so-called "tempo drivers" — individuals operating without proper authorization under the system. In a memorandum, Lopez directed the Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) to enforce the suspension of onboarding activities for Transport Network Vehicle Service (TNVS) and motorcycle taxi drivers, except for those with valid franchises. The order also prohibits on-the-spot and same-day onboarding activities conducted without prior approval from the LTFRB. Lopez said the Department of Transportation (DOTr) is studying possible penalties and fines against TNCs and MTPPs that will be proven to have violated onboarding limits. The DOTr has yet to release details on the number of companies involved and the extent of the alleged violations.

- [Controlling inflation most urgent concern of Filipinos in 1st Quarter — survey](#) (2026-05-01 05:37)

MANILA, Philippines — Nearly half of Filipinos say that controlling inflation is the most urgent national concern in the first quarter of 2026, according to a survey by OCTA Research. In its

Tugon ng Masa survey conducted from March 19-25, 45 percent cited inflation, followed by increasing wages of workers at 33 percent, fighting graft and corruption in government at 26 percent, and access to affordable food such as rice, vegetables, and meat at 24 percent. Other concerns include reducing poverty at 20 percent and providing free quality education at 17 percent. However, OCTA noted that the findings reflected household conditions prior to the inflationary effects of the oil price shock due to the war in the Middle East and stated that these findings should be understood as a pre-shock baseline before high costs exerted pressure on household welfare, purchasing power, and food security. Inflation is the highest concern among respondents in the Visayas at 54 percent and Mindanao at 51 percent, as well as socioeconomic class E at 56 percent and ABC at 54 percent. Meanwhile, wages are also among the highest concerns among respondents in the Visayas, National Capital Region and Mindanao, with Visayas respondents the highest at 46 percent. NCR respondents had the highest concern about corruption in government at 36 percent, while Visayas led in food affordability at 32 percent. OCTA said that these results suggested that public sentiment in the first quarter of 2026 were shaped primarily by economic strain and the rising cost of living. "Inflation has once again emerged as the dominant national issue, indicating that day-to-day affordability has become the most immediate pressure facing Filipino households," it said. Meanwhile, 67 percent of respondents said that staying healthy was their most urgent personal concern, followed by having enough to eat daily at 46 percent, having a secure and well-paying job at 42 percent, having savings at 41 percent, and finishing schooling or being able to provide schooling for children at 39 percent. The survey had 1,200 respondents and has a nationwide margin of error of plus or minus three percent.

- [Workers demand P1,200 wage hike, tax relief in Labor Day protests](#) (2026-05-01 02:51)

MANILA, Philippines — Labor groups and human rights organizations staged their annual Labor Day protest in Manila on Friday, calling on the government to raise the minimum wage to P1,200 and to scrap the value-added tax (VAT) and excise tax on fuel amid the ongoing oil crisis. The groups, led by the Bagong Alyansang Makabayan and Kilusang Mayo Uno, converged along España boulevard to unite for the mass action. During the protest, Gabriela Women's Party Representative Sarah Elago told The Manila Times that sustaining mass action was important, noting that many human rights gains were achieved through collective protests.

- [Diesel, gasoline prices up next week over supply worries](#) (2026-05-01 02:42)

MANILA, Philippines — Diesel and gasoline prices are expected to increase again next week due to supply worries as a result of the war between US and Iran, local oil industry sources said on Friday. They said that diesel prices would go up by around P1 to P2 per liter, while gasoline will increase by around P2 to P3 per liter. These estimates are based on the 3-day trading of Mean of Platts, Singapore, the pricing basis of refined goods in Southeast Asia. Sources had said that geopolitical risks were being cited as a reason behind the rise in oil prices as the Strait of Hormuz remained closed and that both US and Iran have yet to reach an agreement. Diesel prices dropped this week by P12.94 per liter, while gasoline prices slightly went up by P0.53 per

liter.

- [Philippines, Japan forge energy cooperation amid global crisis](#) (2026-05-01 01:41)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and former Japanese Prime Minister Kishida Fumio reaffirmed their commitment to deepen cooperation on energy security and accelerate the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy, as global instability continued to disrupt supply systems. Kishida, now serving as Supreme Adviser to the Parliamentary Association of the Asia Zero Emission Community (AZEC), paid a courtesy call on the president in Malacañang on Thursday. During the meeting, Marcos stressed the growing urgency of energy security, citing the war in the Middle East that continued to affect the global energy system. "It has become especially pressing and critical with all of the events that are transpiring in the Middle East and the effects that it has had on the entire energy system of the world," the President said. "We hope that we can continue our work in moving our countries away from fossil fuels and absorb more of the renewables technology that we have been trying to shift to," he added. For his part, Kishida reaffirmed Japan's commitment to advancing the initiative of AZEC, which he proposed in 2022 to promote regional decarbonization and energy cooperation across Southeast Asia and the broader Asian region. He thanked Marcos for participating in the AZEC Plus Online Summit held last April 15 and emphasized the importance of strengthening economic and energy resilience with the Philippines. "We would like to promote cooperation with the Philippines on economic and energy resilience," Kishida said. Kishida, who is in the Philippines from April 30 to May 2 as special envoy of the Prime Minister, will participate in a series of high-level engagements focused on advancing AZEC initiatives and strengthening Philippines-Japan bilateral relations.

- [Marcos vows better jobs, worker protection on Labor Day](#) (2026-05-01 01:11)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. vowed to expand job opportunities and strengthen labor protections, as he led the nation on Labor Day in paying tribute to the contributions of Filipino workers to the development of the country. In his message on Friday, Marcos called the Filipino workforce the "backbone of our Republic" who continued to drive the country forward despite economic challenges and changing industries. "Today, we honor every member of our workforce whose hands carry the weight of our shared future—whether at sunrise, beneath the noonday heat, or in the long hours when the nation sleeps," Marcos said. "Even as technology advances and industries transform, one truth endures: it is the Filipino worker who drives the Philippines forward and keeps the world in motion," he added. For the part of the government, the President said his administration was working to generate jobs and providing more opportunities for success. "Together, let us fulfill this promise by fostering an environment that respects honest labor, safeguards livelihoods, and ensures that progress is accessible to ordinary families," Marcos said. "As we face changing economic pressures, rest assured that this administration stands firm in defending the dignity of every Filipino by creating more and better jobs, boosting worker protection, and broadening pathways for all to succeed," he added.

- [PH, Singapore ink landmark carbon credits deal](#) (2026-05-01 00:59)

MANILA, Philippines – The Philippines and Singapore have formally signed a landmark agreement creating a legal framework for the generation and transfer of carbon credits, the Singapore Embassy in Manila announced Thursday evening. The embassy said project developers could soon leverage this deal to develop high-quality carbon credit projects that were aligned with Article 6 of the Paris Agreement. Carbon credits are units obtained from entities that remove or reduce greenhouse gas emissions. One tradable carbon credit equals one ton of carbon dioxide or the equivalent amount of a different greenhouse gas reduced. The United Nations Climate Change said companies or individuals could purchase and use carbon credits to compensate for their greenhouse gas emissions or to simply support climate action. The Singapore Ministry of Trade and Industry said adjusted carbon credits authorized under the deal could be used to offset up to 5 percent of a company's taxable emissions. Singapore, it said, would then channel 5 percent share of proceeds from authorized carbon credits towards climate adaptation measures in the Philippines. Department of Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Juan Miguel Cuna and Singaporean Minister for Sustainability and the Environment Grace Fu signed the deal during the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Climate Week in Manila on April 30, in a virtual ceremony. Cuna said Manila's entry into this agreement is a "strategic decision," and is grounded on national priorities, development goals, and "commitment to global climate action." Fu said the deal signals the strong partnership between Singapore and the Philippines, and their commitment to develop and implement regional and bilateral initiatives. "This Agreement will deepen collaboration between our two countries, channel climate finance towards impactful projects in the Philippines and unlock new opportunities in carbon markets for businesses and local communities," she said. "Together, Asean can lead the way in building a low-carbon future that delivers tangible benefits across the region," she added. Singaporean Ambassador to the Philippines Constance See added that there was "strong interest" from Singapore companies in the Philippines, and that the embassy looks to work closely with Filipino partners to bring good projects and investment to market. "The Philippines is one of the most mega-biodiverse countries in the world. It is richly endowed with natural capital, and the Philippine government has shown clear leadership and commitment to climate action. The Philippines is exceptionally well-positioned to be a major player in the global carbon market," she said. "It is especially meaningful that this signing comes during the Philippines' Asean Chairship, which underscores the Philippines' leadership on climate action issues and the region's growing focus on practical cooperation in sustainability and resilient growth," she added. Projects facilitated under the deal, the embassy said, would create more jobs in local communities, and drive innovation in the growing carbon market ecosystem. The embassy said the process for authorization of projects and eligible carbon crediting methodologies under the deal would be announced in due course.

- [NLEX pushes back May 4 reopening of Quezon City road project](#) (2026-05-01 00:14)

MANILA, Philippines — North Luzon Expressway Corporation pushed back the May 4, 2026 reopening of a road in Quezon City that would have eased traffic in the area where construction works on the NLEX-C5 project were ongoing. The Quezon City government announced that the Katipunan Kaliwa Street/Lokaria Street from Mindanao Avenue to King Alexander Street would not reopen to the public as scheduled to give way to the curing process that would take about four more days to ensure road integrity. Under the traffic scheme, Class 1 vehicles will be allowed to pass through the affected stretch only under a stop-and-go setup. Class 1 vehicles usually include cars, vans, motorcycles and sport utility vehicles. Motorists passing through the area near Mindanao Avenue and King Alexander Street were advised to take alternate routes and plan their trips ahead. Traffic enforcers will be deployed to help manage the flow of vehicles, while directional signs will be placed to guide motorists. The Northlink Segment 8.2 Section 1A is the first 2-kilometer section of the China-funded NLEX-C5 project serving as an east-west 24/7 truck route to decongest Mindanao Avenue and Quirino Highway. It will add entries and exit at the Quirino Ave. area. Its construction started on Feb. 15, 2025 and was supposed to have been completed on Feb. 14, 2026. The NLEX-C5 North Link Project is part of the Strategic Projects under the 10-point Agenda of the Metro Pacific Tollways Corp. (MPTC) Road to 100B Revenue by 2030.

- [Most Filipinos believe VP Sara has hidden wealth — survey](#) (2026-04-30 16:11)

A NATIONWIDE survey found that a majority of Filipinos believe Vice President Sara Duterte holds billions of pesos in undisclosed bank accounts, with public opinion sharply divided along political lines. The noncommissioned survey, conducted by Tangere from April 29 to 30 with 1,200 respondents, showed that 58 percent of Filipinos believe the allegations, following recent legislative inquiries and reports from the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC). Survey results indicated that belief in the allegations varied significantly depending on political affiliation. Among supporters of the current administration, 82 percent said they believe Duterte possesses hidden wealth, despite her alliance with President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. during the 2022 elections. Similarly, 81 percent of respondents aligned with the Liberal Party or supporters of former vice president Leni Robredo said they consider the allegations credible. Neutral or independent voters also leaned toward believing the claims, with about 67 percent expressing the view that the vice president holds undisclosed funds. In contrast, Duterte's core supporters — who make up about 40 percent of the population in the survey — largely rejected the allegations. Only around one-third of this group said they believe the claims, while the majority described the issue as a politically motivated smear campaign. The findings point to a deeply polarized public, with analysts noting that belief in the allegations extends beyond traditional opposition groups and into independent and administration-leaning voters. “The high level of belief among neutral and administration supporters suggests that recent AMLC disclosures have gained traction beyond the usual political blocs,” the report said. At the same time, the survey indicated a strong base of Duterte supporters who remain unconvinced, reflecting what the report described as an entrenched “defender” bloc that may view the controversy through the lens of the 2028 elections. The survey also measured public awareness and perception of the

AMLC, which has been at the center of the financial disclosures. Results showed that 90 percent of Filipinos are aware of the AMLC and its functions. Among those aware, 51 percent expressed trust in the agency, while 30 percent said they distrust it. Satisfaction levels were similarly moderate, with 52 percent saying they were satisfied with the AMLC's performance, compared to 28 percent who were dissatisfied. The survey used a mobile-based application and employed stratified random sampling with quota-based distribution across regions. Respondents were drawn from across the country, including 12 percent from the National Capital Region, 23 percent from Northern Luzon, 22 percent from Southern Luzon, 20 percent from the Visayas and 23 percent from Mindanao. The margin of error was  $\pm 2.77$  percent at a 95-percent confidence level. Tangere, the firm behind the survey, described the study as noncommissioned and aimed at capturing Filipino sentiment on current national issues.

IMPEACHMENT is one of the most powerful mechanisms in Philippine democracy, designed to hold the country's highest officials accountable for serious offenses while in office. Enshrined in the 1987 Constitution, the process blends legal standards with political judgment, placing key roles in both houses of Congress, the House of Representatives and the Senate. What is impeachment? Impeachment is a constitutional process that allows for the removal of high-ranking public officials. Unlike criminal proceedings, it does not impose prison sentences. Instead, it determines whether an official should be removed from office and barred from future government service. Who can be impeached? The Constitution limits impeachment to a select group of top officials: the president; the vice president; members of the Supreme Court; members of constitutional commissions; and the Ombudsman. These positions are considered critical to governance, which is why they are subject to this extraordinary accountability mechanism. What are the grounds? Officials may be impeached for culpable violation of the Constitution; treason; bribery; graft and corruption; other high crimes; and betrayal of public trust. Among these, "betrayal of public trust" is the broadest and most debated ground, often interpreted based on the political and ethical expectations of public office. How the process unfolds The impeachment process begins in the House of Representatives and ends in the Senate. Any member of the House — or a citizen with a lawmaker's endorsement — may file a complaint. The case is then evaluated by the House Committee on Justice, which determines whether it is sufficient in form and substance. If the complaint passes committee review, it is brought before the full House. A vote of at least one-third of all members is required to approve the articles of impeachment. Once this threshold is met, the official is formally impeached. Senate trial The Senate then convenes as an impeachment court. Senators take on the role of judges, while prosecutors from the House present the case. When the president is on trial, the chief justice presides. Conviction requires a two-thirds vote of all senators. If convicted, the official is removed from office and may be disqualified from holding future public office. However, criminal liability may still be pursued in regular courts. Key limitations The Constitution also sets safeguards: An official cannot face more than one impeachment proceeding within a year. Impeachment is not equivalent to a criminal conviction. Past cases The Philippines has seen

several high-profile impeachment proceedings. President Joseph Estrada faced trial in 2000, which was cut short by mass protests that led to his ouster. Chief Justice Renato Corona was convicted by the Senate in 2012. Chief Justice Maria Lourdes Sereno faced impeachment proceedings in 2018, though she was ultimately removed through a separate legal action. Why it matters Impeachment underscores a central principle of Philippine democracy: no public official is above the Constitution. By giving Congress the power to initiate and decide such cases, the system ensures that accountability remains a political as well as a legal responsibility.

- [Who are the ICC judges in Duterte's trial?](#) (2026-04-30 16:09)

THE HAGUE, the Netherlands — Former president Rodrigo Duterte’s lawyers have filed an appeal in a bid to prevent the Filipino ex-president’s crimes against humanity trial at the International Criminal Court, The Hague-based tribunal said on Thursday. His defense team have appealed against the ICC’s decision last week to confirm the charges against Duterte for crimes allegedly committed during his “war on drugs,” which is believed to have led to the deaths of thousands of people. Prosecutors have charged the 81-year-old former Philippines strongman with three counts of crimes against humanity, accusing him of involvement in at least 76 killings linked to the crackdown. Following a weeklong hearing in February, the pretrial judges concluded there were substantial grounds to believe that Duterte had been behind those murders. According to an ICC statement Thursday, the Philippines ex-president’s lawyers argued that the court had taken an “impermissibly ‘flexible’ approach to the formulation of the charges.” The court had also failed “to articulate a reasoned evidentiary basis for confirming the charges,” his Duterte’s lawyers argued. Should his appeal fail, Duterte will be the first former head of an Asian state to appear before the ICC. The court tries individuals for the world’s most serious crimes, such as war crimes and crimes against humanity. While the ICC has already appointed a three-judge panel for the case, it will likely take several months before the trial begins. Judges The International Criminal Court (ICC) has designated British jurist Joanna Korner as presiding judge of Trial Chamber III, which will hear the case against former president Rodrigo Duterte. In a decision issued on Wednesday, the chamber said Korner will lead the three-judge panel tasked with trying Duterte. The panel also includes Keebong Paek of South Korea and Nicolas Guillou of France. The designation was made after the ICC Presidency referred Duterte’s case to Trial Chamber III on April 24. Korner brings more than five decades of legal experience to the role, including over 45 years focused on criminal law as both a barrister and a judge. Born on July 1, 1951, she was called to the Bar at Inner Temple in 1974 after studying at the Inns of Court School of Law in London. Her legal career spans domestic and international jurisdictions. She was appointed Queen’s Counsel — now King’s Counsel — in 1993, served as a recorder beginning in 1994, and in 2012 became a judge of the Crown Court of England and Wales, where she presided over complex criminal trials involving serious offenses such as fraud and murder. Korner is also known for her work in international criminal justice. She served for eight nonconsecutive years as a senior prosecutor at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, where she handled high-profile cases involving Bosnian Serb political and military leaders accused of atrocities during the Balkan conflicts,

including Mico Stanisić and Stojan Župljanin. She also worked as Senior Legal Adviser to the chief prosecutor of Bosnia and Herzegovina from 2004 to 2005, helping establish the country's War Crimes Section, and has trained judges and legal practitioners from more than 25 countries in international criminal law. Elected to the ICC in December 2020, Korner assumed full-time duties in September 2021 for a nine-year term set to end in March 2030. She previously chaired the chamber that convicted Sudanese militia leader Ali Kushayb, who was sentenced to 20 years in prison for war crimes and crimes against humanity committed in Darfur. She was appointed Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George in 2004 in recognition of her contributions to international law.

Who are the other judges? Having begun his legal career in 1992, Paek served as public prosecutor of the Republic of Korea, and also served as a deputy director and later as a director at the Ministry of Justice. "In these roles, he was responsible for managing ICC-related matters, drafting the implementation bill for Korea's ratification of the Rome Statute and representing the country at ICC Preparatory Commission sessions and the Kampala Review Conference," the ICC's website said. "In addition to his work in Korea, Judge Paek served at the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (HQ and SEAP Regional Office). He provided crucial support to member states in implementing the UN Convention against Transnational Organized Crime, focusing on strengthening law enforcement capacities," the website said. Paek studied law at the Seoul National University, having obtained his Master of Laws from Columbia Law School and a PhD from Hanyang University. "His doctoral dissertation focused on the law of evidence in ICC proceedings, and he authored numerous books and articles on international criminal law," the ICC said. Elected to the ICC on Dec. 6, 2023, Paek joined the tribunal on March 11, 2024 and will serve until March 10, 2033. He is assigned to the Trial Division, and handles Trial Chamber IV, Trial Chamber V, Trial Chamber VI and Trial Chamber X. Meanwhile, before joining the ICC, Guillou served as pre-trial judge at the Kosovo Specialist Chambers for four years and worked as a Chef de Cabinet to the President of the Special Tribunal for Lebanon from 2015 to 2019 and as Liaison Prosecutor at the United States Department of Justice 2012 to 2015. Between 2006 and 2012, Guillou also held several positions in the Ministry of Justice in France as a deputy head of the Commercial Law Section, as adviser to the Minister on Criminal Affairs and as diplomatic adviser to the minister. Having started as an investigative judge, Guillou has a Master's degree in International and European Criminal Law from Sorbonne University and also graduated from the French National School for the Judiciary. He joined the ICC on March 11, 2024, having been elected to the tribunal on Dec. 5, 2023. He currently handles Trial Chamber II, Trial Chamber IV and Pre-Trial Chamber I. Duterte's hearing will be held at the ICC Trial Chamber III, following the confirmation of charges against the former president last week. "Trial Chamber III will be in charge of the conduct of the trial in this case. The chamber will hold status conferences, confer with the parties and participants in order to set the date of the trial and adopt the procedures necessary to facilitate the fair and expeditious conduct of the proceedings," the ICC said.

- [Discaya in hospital for shoulder surgery](#) (2026-04-30 16:08)

PACIFICO “Curlee” Discaya II was taken to a hospital on Thursday for a surgery on his right shoulder, Senate Sergeant-at-Arms Rene Samonte has confirmed. Samonte said the transfer was made on the recommendation of the Senate’s Medical and Dental Bureau, and Senate President Pro Tempore Panfilo Lacson, who chairs the Senate Blue Ribbon Committee, and was approved by Senate President Vicente Sotto III. Discaya, who has been under Senate custody in connection with an ongoing legislative inquiry, was escorted to ensure both his safety and compliance with established procedures for detainees requiring medical attention, according to Senate officials. The Senate leadership has yet to release more details on the operation, but sources said the procedure had been scheduled in advance following a medical evaluation of Discaya’s condition. Authorities said appropriate security measures remain in place during his confinement in the hospital, in line with Senate protocols governing high-profile detainees. No additional information was immediately available about how long the surgery will last or Discaya’s recovery period.

- [DOLE rolls out P260M in livelihood aid nationwide](#) (2026-04-30 16:08)

THE Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) is rolling out more than P261.5 million in livelihood assistance nationwide on Labor Day, targeting 11,257 beneficiaries under its Kabuhayan Program in a major push to strengthen long-term income opportunities. Timed with the country’s 124th Labor Day celebration today, the initiative goes beyond short-term aid, aiming to equip workers with sustainable sources of livelihood that can support families well after the holiday. Labor officials said the funding will be coursed through the DOLE Integrated Livelihood Program (DILP), one of the agency’s flagship interventions designed for informal workers, vulnerable sectors, and community-based groups. DOLE said the program reflects the government’s broader strategy of pairing immediate financial relief with long-term economic resilience, especially for those most affected by unstable or low-income work. Instead of one-time assistance, beneficiaries will receive support that allows them to build or expand small enterprises tailored to local demand and available resources. These livelihood grants come in the form of starter kits or materials for projects such as sari-sari stores, negokarts, farming, livestock raising, fishing ventures and other community-driven businesses. The assistance is flexible and scalable, with individuals eligible for packages worth up to P50,000, while organized groups or associations can receive as much as P3 million depending on their approved proposals. Among the standout success stories is the Hinatuan Seaweed Farmers Fishermen Cooperative, a previous Kabuhayan Program beneficiary and one of the 2025 DOLE Kabuhayan Awards winners. The group transformed its livelihood model from environmentally harmful practices — such as illegal mangrove cutting — into sustainable seaweed farming. “Now, because of seaweed farming, the illegal cutting of mangroves has stopped,” the cooperative shared, noting a major shift in both income and environmental awareness. Today, the cooperative supports 107 community members, providing them with a stable and eco-friendly source of income. DOLE said that what was once an uncertain and destructive livelihood has evolved into a reliable economic activity that benefits both families and the local ecosystem.

- [Go calls for unity amid energy concerns](#) (2026-04-30 16:07)

SEN. Bong Go on Thursday renewed his call for national unity, warning that ongoing challenges such as energy uncertainties and rising living costs could further strain ordinary Filipinos and public services. Go, vice chairman of the Senate Committee on Health, said cooperation across sectors is critical as the country navigates inflationary pressures and the broader impact of global and domestic economic headwinds. “My prayer for today is for everyone to be united. When politics is chaotic, the people are affected. Service is sacrificed,” Go said in Filipino. His remarks came as concerns persist over the stability of energy supply and its ripple effects on household expenses, transport costs and the delivery of essential services. Analysts have noted that fluctuations in energy prices often translate to higher electricity rates and fuel costs, which in turn contribute to inflation. Go emphasized that these pressures disproportionately affect vulnerable sectors, particularly those dependent on government assistance and public health services. He stressed that political divisions could further complicate efforts to respond effectively to these issues. JAVIER JOE ISMAEL By underscoring unity, Go linked governance stability to the continuity of key programs, including health care access, social protection and disaster response initiatives. Go reiterated that public service should remain the central priority of the government, especially during periods of uncertainty. He pointed out that disjointed leadership and political infighting risk disrupting programs designed to assist low-income families. Alongside his policy statements, Go highlighted recent outreach activities conducted by his office and partner agencies. Over the past week, his team extended assistance to fire victims in Cebu City as well as in the municipalities of Jagna and Carmen. Aid was also distributed to affected residents in Pavia.

- [Asean to ratify petroleum security deal – Roque](#) (2026-04-30 16:06)

THE Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) is pushing forward the ratification of a framework agreement on petroleum security, Trade Secretary Cristina Roque said on Thursday. “APSA, or the Asean Petroleum Security Agreement, is being pursued to enable coordinated emergency fuel sharing and collective responses to supply disruption,” she said during an online briefing. Roque said advancing the ratification of the oil-sharing deal will strengthen regional energy resilience and fuel sharing. She said the Philippines will also prioritize the implementation of an Asean-wide power grid to improve energy sharing. She also said that Asean will keep trade open and predictable and avoid trade restrictive measures, including export bans on essential goods during periods of uncertainty. She said the regional bloc will strengthen and accelerate existing free trade agreements, including Asean's free trade agreement with China and South Korea. Asean will strengthen food security and supply chain coordination to ensure more reliable access to food across the region, she added. Member states will also safeguard energy supply for essential services, including health care, hospitals, emergency systems and critical care facilities during times of crisis, Roque said. Asean will intensify support for micro, small and medium enterprises by improving access to financing and liquidity to help protect jobs during economic shocks, she said.

- [Marcos to pursue legal, diplomatic means to bring Co home - Palace](#) (2026-04-30 16:05)

PRESIDENT Ferdinand Marcos Jr. will pursue legal and diplomatic means to bring fugitive former lawmaker Zaldy Co home to the Philippines, Malacañang said Thursday. The statement was issued after Marcos received confirmation from Chargé d' Affaires of Czech Republic Eva Tenzin that Co had indeed been detained by Czech authorities due to invalid travel documents, Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said. "The president reaffirmed that the government will exhaust all legal and diplomatic means to bring back fugitive Zaldy Co back to the Philippines so he can face the graft and malversation cases filed against him here in the Philippines," she added. Castro said Marcos has expressed the government's readiness to fast-track extradition agreements and strengthen law enforcement cooperation mechanisms with concerned countries to expedite Co's return. Marcos on Wednesday summoned Tenzin and French Ambassador to the Philippines Marie Fontanel to seek clarification on Co's case. While he stressed that other countries should not become safe havens for individuals facing charges, the president reaffirmed the Philippines' strong relations with both the Czech Republic and France, anchored on democratic values and respect for the rule of law. Co, who is facing criminal charges as one of the central figures in the public works corruption scandal, is in France seeking asylum on grounds of political persecution.

- [Tulfo warns vs rising exploitation of Filipino job seekers](#) (2026-04-30 16:04)

SEN. Raffy Tulfo on Thursday raised concerns over the growing exploitation of Filipinos seeking work overseas, warning that worsening economic pressures are pushing job seekers into the hands of illegal recruiters. Speaking during a hearing of the Senate Committee on Labor, Employment, and Human Resources Development, Tulfo said job displacement and the sudden return of overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) affected by the Middle East war intensified vulnerabilities among workers. "Many of us are seeking opportunities abroad to have a stable job. But when people are in need, they accept illegal jobs; they are either forced into it, or they easily fall for the job offers of illegal recruiters," Tulfo said in Filipino. He presented several cases involving Filipino workers who were allegedly misled, including women recruited as massage therapists for jobs in Malaysia but who reportedly ended up in exploitative conditions. He also cited instances of applicants enticed by high-paying offers in Japan and Canada only to face abusive or fraudulent arrangements upon arrival. "With the desperation of people today, opportunities have opened up for those who want to abuse Filipino workers' needs and to hire them for illegal jobs," the senator said. Emphasizing the need for stronger deterrence, Tulfo urged a review of accountability mechanisms for illegal recruiters and traffickers. He suggested that current penalties may be insufficient to curb the persistence of such crimes. "It seems lacking," he said, pointing out that illegal recruitment cases continue to surface despite numerous laws and policies already in place.

- [Motions to dismiss Dengvaxia case junked](#) (2026-04-30 16:02)

A QUEZON City trial court judge has rejected the petitions filed by former Health secretary and now Iloilo Rep. Janette Garin and her co-accused to dismiss the Dengvaxia case. In an April 28, 2026 order, a copy of which was obtained by The Manila Times, Judge Michael Ken de Jesus of

Regional Trial Court Branch 102 denied several motions to quash filed by the defense lawyers for lack of merit. “In sum, the attempt to shoehorn ( ‘to force to be included or admitted’ ) the Dengvaxia mass immunization program into the narrow confines of the Ivler doctrine is factually unavailing and legally untenable,” de Jesus said. The defense panel had argued that the 35 cases being handled by de Jesus were no different from the first batch of eight cases which were earlier dismissed by another family court judge, hence, its claim of double jeopardy. The prosecution panel had insisted that the cases were separate and distinct as the over 100 children who died after they were vaccinated with the anti-dengue vaccine had different medical conditions. Illustrating the "glaring factual" difference between a vehicular collision in the Jason Ivler v. Modesto-San Pedro case and "multiple, distinct acts of medical inoculation" in the Dengvaxia case, the judge said Ivler committed a singular act of driving his vehicle recklessly at a specific moment in time. But in the Dengvaxia case, there were "continuous repeated acts" and while the policy of mass vaccination was singular, the proximate acts of negligence, the alleged indiscriminate administration of the vaccine without proper screening, were repeatedly committed with every individual injection, the family court judge said. “The alleged reckless imprudence did not solely materialize in a room or place during the procurement or licensing phase; it materialized upon the actual administration of the vaccine to an unsuspecting child,” de Jesus said. Aware that the rule against double jeopardy was intended as a safeguard to protect an accused from vexatious and repetitive prosecutions, however, he said “the doctrine was never meant to serve as a shield against accountability for separate acts of negligence committed against different victims at different times.” Explaining that a motion to quash is neither a mini-trial nor a proper vehicle to evaluate medical findings, weigh expert opinions or determine the cause of death, de Jesus said that it would be a matter of evidence “that must be rigorously tested during a full-blown trial on the merits.” The vaccine, procured by the Department of Health for P3.5 billion for a nationwide jab campaign in 2015, was not evaluated thoroughly for safety and efficacy, leading to the deaths of many children, according to the findings of several health experts and the Forensics Laboratory Division of the Public Attorney’s Office (PAO). Under the leadership of Persida Rueda-Acosta, PAO provided legal assistance to the parents and relatives belonging to the Samahan ng mga Magulang ang mga Anak ay Biktima ng Dengvaxia, particularly in the civil cases.

- [Barzaga joins Duterte party](#) (2026-04-30 16:02)

CAVITE 4th District Rep. Francisco Barzaga has joined the Partido Demokratiko Pilipino (PDP), the party of former president Rodrigo Duterte. He took the oath on Wednesday alongside other new members of the party at its headquarters in Sta. Mesa, Manila, led by PDP leaders Joy Encabo, Penny Belmonte, Yvette Contacto and JV Frech Marigondon. PDP deputy national spokesman Ferdinand Topacio welcomed Barzaga to the party, calling him a “perfect fit” for the PDP. Barzaga has “shown exceptional and admirable principles of nationalism and the relentless pursuit of justice in the face of overwhelming resistance from the majority in the House which is trying to cover up unprecedented levels of corruption and dysfunctional governance,” Topacio said. Barzaga used to belong to the National Unity Party, which counts

his father, the late Cavite Rep. Elpidio Barzaga, as a key party leader. He was expelled from the party after an ethics complaint was filed against him for “conduct unbecoming of a lawmaker.” On Monday, Deputy Speaker and Iloilo Rep. Janette Garin filed a new ethics complaint against Barzaga, saying he has not changed even after being suspended twice by the House of Representatives. RED MENDOZA

- [Japanese builders tapped for 4PH housing](#) (2026-04-30 16:01)

DEPARTMENT of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) Secretary Jose Ramon Aliling announced Thursday a collaboration with Japanese firms in building housing projects under the expanded Pambansang Pabahay Para sa Pilipino (4PH) program. Aliling said that Kizuna Communities, composed of Japanese developers, was picked to ensure zero corruption in the flagship housing program of the administration of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. The announcement comes following a meeting with the Japanese group earlier this week at DHSUD’s central office in Quezon City. Kizuna Communities vowed efficiency and transparency as they undertake the construction of two socialized housing projects. The head of the 4PH program, Undersecretary Eduardo Robles Jr., pledged to assist the Japanese in the endeavor. “As long as the Expanded 4PH Program is corruption-free, more investors will participate. The high credibility of DHSUD should always be maintained to make the national housing program sustainable,” Aliling said.

- [Bus firm ordered to pay for flyover fire damage](#) (2026-04-30 16:01)

THE Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) has ordered bus company LS8 Tourist Transport Corp. to shoulder the expenses for rehabilitation works at the EDSA-Ortigas Interchange. The order was signed by Public Works Secretary Vince Dizon. The demand stems from an April 24, 2026 incident in which a bus caught fire while traversing the interchange, one of the busiest road links in Metro Manila. The blaze reportedly lasted around an hour, raising concerns over potential structural damage. Initial inspections by DPWH engineers revealed visible deterioration in key sections of the bridge. Among the findings were concrete spalling on the soffit, exposure of reinforcing steel bars and discoloration underneath the structure — signs consistent with high-temperature exposure. Authorities said the damage was concentrated at Span 7 of the interchange, a critical segment that supports heavy daily traffic. Engineers warned that while the bridge remains passable, repairs are necessary to ensure long-term safety and integrity. Based on these findings, DPWH held the bus operator liable, citing provisions under civil law that make companies accountable for damage caused by vehicles under their ownership or control. In its formal demand, the agency directed the company to cover all costs related to repair, rehabilitation and any engineering interventions required to restore the structure. It also required reimbursement for additional expenses that may arise after further structural assessments. The letter emphasized that the demand is “without prejudice” to any administrative, civil or criminal liabilities that may be pursued in connection with the incident. The DPWH underscored the urgency of the matter, calling for the company’s “prompt attention and immediate compliance” to prevent further risks to motorists using the

interchange. The EDSA-Ortigas Interchange is a vital artery connecting key business districts, making any disruption or structural issue a significant concern for traffic flow and public safety. The incident adds to growing scrutiny over road safety and vehicle maintenance standards, particularly for public utility vehicles operating along major highways. LS8 Tourist Transport Corp. has yet to respond to the demand, while DPWH continues to monitor the condition of the bridge pending full rehabilitation. WILLIAM DEPASUPIL

- [Bus operator summoned over fare discounts violation](#) (2026-04-30 16:01)

THE Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) has summoned a bus operator and its driver for allegedly failing to provide mandated fare discounts under the government's service contracting program. In a statement issued Thursday, the LTFRB said the show cause order (SCO) was served on Cemtrans Services Inc. after a complaint surfaced online accusing one of its conductors of not granting required fare reductions and failing to return change to passengers. Under program rules, passenger buses are required to extend a 20-percent discount to regular commuters and up to 40 percent to students, senior citizens, and persons with disabilities. The LTFRB said the conductor involved in the reported incident did not issue tickets, failed to apply the prescribed discount, and did not give the correct change for a trip from Alabang to Ayala. "This is not how the program works and there is no excuse for failure to provide the necessary discount to all passengers," LTFRB Chairman Vigor Mendoza II said. Mendoza warned that the agency would take action against operators and personnel who disregard program guidelines. The SCO directs the bus operator to submit a written explanation on why its franchise should not be suspended or revoked for noncompliance with service contracting rules. The driver and conductor were also ordered to appear at a hearing scheduled on May 11. Failure to attend the hearing or submit a response will be treated as a waiver, which could result in the imposition of a 5,000 peso penalty, the LTFRB said. FRANCO JOSE BAROÑA

- [Workers, party-list group push wealth tax](#) (2026-04-30 16:01)

WORKERS and a party-list group called for a wealth tax that would fund health, calamity aid and certain research initiatives. The groups, who made the push ahead of Labor Day, are also for increasing workers' wages. "The ongoing energy crisis highlights the necessity of a wealth tax. .. Establishing and enforcing a wealth tax would help ensure that workers, regardless of working status, can be afforded the necessary social protections," said Secretary-General Josua Mata of the Sentro ng mga Nagkakaisa at Progresibong Manggagawa in a statement on Thursday. House Bill 4304 was filed last Sept. 3 by Akbayan Representatives Perci Cendaña, Jose Manuel "Chel" Diokno, Dadah Kiram Ismula and Dinagat Islands Rep. Kaka Bag-ao. "Coincidentally, the timing is perfect to push for a wealth tax in our country. Amid [the] crisis, we saw the need for more resources to address and ease the impact of the crisis on our countrymen," Cendaña said in a press conference on Thursday. Oil prices in the country have risen following the war in the Middle East, although price rollbacks have been implemented over three weeks. Last March, Malacañang issued Executive Order 110 declaring a state of national energy emergency. The bill aimed to amend the National Internal Revenue Code to add a section on solidarity contribution

rates. A taxpayer with a net worth of over P300 million must pay solidarity contribution “which shall reflect the total assets, liabilities, net worth of the previous year.” The taxpayer shall pay 25 percent of the amount due on or before Aug. 31, and the remaining 25 percent on or before Nov. 30. The contribution shall exclusively fund expenditures under the Republic Act 11223, or the Universal Health Care Act, including the construction of new hospitals and medical facilities and the improvement of existing ones, the education and training of medical students in public universities and the hiring of additional doctors for public hospitals. The contribution will also be used for the People’s Survival Fund, the Calamity Fund and the Quick Response Fund, to fund research on climate change adaptation, public health innovation and disaster risk reduction, and as financial aid for evacuees displaced during a climate disaster. “We are not saying that the rich are enemies. What we are saying is all Filipinos deserve to prosper. All Filipinos deserve a comfortable life,” Cendana said. He said Marikina 2nd District Rep. Miro Quimbo, chairman of the House Committee on Ways and Means or the House of Representatives’ tax panel, vowed that the committee would tackle the bill when session resumes. The House is on a break and will resume session on May 4. REINA TOLENTINO

- [Senate set to form impeachment court](#) (2026-04-30 16:00)

THE Senate might convene as an impeachment court as early as May 13 if the House of Representatives impeaches Vice President Sara Duterte in a plenary vote on May 11, Senate President Vicente Sotto III said Thursday. The House Committee on Justice on Wednesday found probable cause to impeach Duterte arising from two complaints accusing her of misusing public funds and making a death threat against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. The committee is expected to meet on May 4 and produce its report, the resolution and articles of impeachment. Sotto on Thursday called for a senators’ caucus to discuss preparations amid the possibility that the articles of impeachment may soon be transmitted to the Senate. Present during the caucus were Senate President Pro Tempore Panfilo Lacson, Senate Majority Leader Juan Miguel Zubiri and Senators Pia Cayetano, JV Ejercito, Risa Hontiveros, Lito Lapid, Loren Legarda and Robinhood Padilla. “Let’s say they approve [the articles of impeachment] on May 11, [they will transmit it on] May 12. [The Senate should] discuss it already on May 13 and convene as an impeachment court,” Sotto said in a chance interview. In a separate interview, Lacson said it would be up to Duterte whether she would attend the trial “although the impeachment court may compel her to attend.” The Senate will resume session on May 4 after a monthlong break. “The Senate must be in session to receive [the articles of incorporation],” the senator said. “But as of now, everything is speculative. What we will be doing in caucus is discuss agenda for this month and then possibility of receiving the articles of impeachment,” he said. “Then, we will discuss the possibility of what should be done and the timetable — that is crucial,” said Sotto, who will act as the impeachment court’s presiding officer while the senators will serve as judges. Lacson said that just like Sotto, he was also preparing to act as judge. But he said Sotto has greater responsibility as the presiding officer. “He needs to act on the spot because [there might be a time] he has to rule or overrule the objections of both the defense and prosecution [panels],” Lacson said. Meanwhile, the chairman of the House

Committee on Justice, Batangas Rep. Gerville Luistro, said the House of Representatives is prepared to strengthen its legal team, including the possible engagement of seasoned private litigators, if the impeachment case against the vice president reaches the Senate for trial. In a radio interview, Luistro said a full trial setting calls for a specialized combination of legislative experience and active courtroom expertise to effectively present the case. “If I will be one of the panel of prosecutors, I will really recommend that we engage private prosecutors to help and aid the members of the House who will be joining the panel,” she said. She noted that she and her lawyer-colleagues in the House of Representatives are no longer updated about litigation, whereas the defense team they would face would likely be made up of litigation specialists. Luistro said this makes outside support both practical and, in her view, necessary. She said the rules specify 11 public prosecutors who will be elected in plenary, while leaving the matter of private lawyers open. Luistro defended the proceedings conducted by the House Committee on Justice which has found probable cause to impeach Duterte. She also denied an accusation from Davao City 1st District Rep. Paolo Duterte that lawmakers were being pressured into supporting the impeachment. “I beg to disagree with that. I did not encounter anyone calling me or my chief of staff to support this impeachment process,” Luistro said in Filipino and English in an interview on GMA Network’s “Unang Hirit” on Thursday. “And I wish to add that in my capacity as chairman, we did not stand for either party. We stood for the process,” she said. “During the clarificatory hearing of the Justice Committee, we were impartial, we were independent because we acted as investigators in a proceeding akin to a preliminary investigation. The mandate is very simple: to determine whether or not probable cause exists,” she said. With 53 committee members voting unanimously, the committee last Wednesday declared the existence of probable cause in the two impeachment complaints against Duterte. Luistro said the committee will transmit the documents to the House on May 4 and that “we anticipate that the plenary will be transmitting these documents to all the members of the House.” “So after giving them reasonable time to study the articles of impeachment and all the documents, the plenary should be ready to vote. As to when, it will depend on the plenary,” she said. Copies of the documents would also be sent to Duterte. Luistro said she was “anticipating a heated debate” at the plenary before the House votes on whether to send the impeachment articles to the Senate. No foundation

Also on Thursday, lawyers for the vice president said the evidence presented at the House Committee on Justice is not a foundation for probable cause. The statement came after National Bureau of Investigation Director Melvin Matibag said that Duterte’s threats against President Marcos, first lady Liza Araneta-Marcos and former speaker Martin Romualdez has already been established and that there is a “reasonable certainty of conviction” for cases of grave threat and inciting to sedition. In a statement sent to The Manila Times, Duterte’s counsel, Paul Lawrence Lim, said the presentation “reveals the paucity of the charges” against the vice president. “Evidence is curated, even spliced. Context is ignored. Opinion is substituted for facts. Guesswork is presented as investigation results. These cannot be the foundation for probable cause, much less a prima facie case with reasonable certainty of conviction. Simply repeating a conclusion, no matter how vehemently, does not make it true,” Lim added. He added that the attempt to create a causal link between the vice president and alleged

comments against the president “demands a gigantic leap in logic and abandonment of basic evidentiary principles.”

- [Torre echoes Trillanes claim Quiboloy became Duterte money-laundering front](#) (2026-04-30 15:17)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Philippine National Police chief Nicolas Torre III took to social media on Thursday, April 30, to echo former senator Antonio Trillanes IV’s claim that Apollo Quiboloy was propped up as former president Rodrigo Duterte’s alleged “natural money laundering machine.” Torre, now general manager of the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority, cited Trillanes’ television interview where the former senator claimed that private jets and helicopters bought by Quiboloy actually belonged to Duterte. “So, what we uncovered, the private jets or helicopters bought by Quiboloy, those were his, Duterte’s. Because if you look at it, he used them more often than the true owner. More than Quiboloy,” Trillanes said. Trillanes also claimed that Quiboloy was used to make the alleged transactions harder to question because of his religious organization. “And Quiboloy, they propped him up precisely so he could become his natural money laundering machine. Because you cannot question religion. But then, if you look at Quiboloy’s church, it does not have the capacity to raise that amount of money,” Trillanes said. Torre said he believed Trillanes’ statement. “We do not need a big investigation to see the obvious. If Quiboloy’s followers were really very strong and very many, why was it not seen on the ground?” Torre said. Torre said authorities saw the reality inside the Kingdom of Jesus Christ compound during the 16-day police operation to serve the warrant of arrest against Quiboloy in Davao City. He cited KOJC’s 39th anniversary on September 1, 2024, which he said was attended by the Vice President and known personalities in Davao, but only drew around 2,400 attendees. Torre also claimed that many of those who attended were merely brought in. “The actual estimate of their membership in the Philippines? Far from the image being shown,” Torre said. Torre said that if Quiboloy truly had a wide base of influence and support, large rallies should have continued while authorities were enforcing the warrant of arrest against him. “But there was none. Sometimes, we do not need to believe propaganda. We only need to look at reality,” Torre said. Torre said Quiboloy’s wealth must be explained if it did not come from the size of KOJC’s membership. “If the wealth did not come from the number of members — where did it come from? That is what must be answered,” Torre said.

Palompon Mayor Mary Dominique Onate described the citation as "a proud moment not only for the Municipality of Palompon and the Province of Leyte, but for the entire Philippines". Known for its powdery white sandbars stretching into clear turquoise waters, Kalanggaman Island has long been regarded as one of Eastern Visayas' leading island attractions. The island was recognized for its scenic shoreline, tranquil environment and expansive ocean views, as well as conditions suitable for swimming and day excursions. "What locals and visitors alike have cherished for years: a destination defined by natural beauty, tranquility, and careful preservation," Onate said. She added that the honor reflected the sustained efforts of the local government, community stakeholders and tourism partners to preserve the island's fragile ecosystem. Also included in the 2026 rankings was Entalula Beach, which claimed the top position after ranking second in 2025 and fourth in 2024. The inclusion of two Philippine destinations underscored Philippines' continued standing as a premier source of world-class beach tourism.

- [Manila landfill fire leaves locals gasping](#) (2026-04-30 14:14)

OBANDO, Philippines — Filipino ferry dispatcher Dave Delos Reyes has been handing out N95 masks for nearly three weeks to protect passengers against the smoke that a landfill fire has sent billowing above a stretch of Manila Bay. The fire at Metro Manila's Navotas landfill is largely invisible to the naked eye, combusting as deep as 15 meters (50 feet) below the surface and releasing a toxic brew of methane as well as carbon dioxide. Nearly 500 people who lived on islands near the site have been evacuated to the town center of Obando municipality, about 2.5 kilometers (1.6 miles) away, but it is not nearly far enough to escape the smoke. "Honestly, sometimes the smell is so strong that it can still seep through the N95 masks. It hurts our throat and heads," Delos Reyes told visiting AFP reporters on Thursday. At its peak, smoke from the underground fire was affecting air quality across Metro Manila, where an "acutely unhealthy" reading was recorded in multiple areas, according to a local monitor. Those numbers are finally returning to normal, the Philippine Space Agency's Ernest Macalalad told AFP, the result of around-the-clock efforts to snuff out the fire by covering it with tons of soil, depriving it of oxygen. But in Obando, residents and evacuees alike said the smoke was still impacting their health and livelihoods. AFP journalists who traveled to the landfill site by boat saw billows of thick, gray smoke completely enveloping houses on Salambao -- one of the islands from which people were evacuated. "The smoke from the landfill comes and goes. We can feel it for around 20 minutes, then it will be gone," said Monica Verses, who sells candy and drinks from the open window of her tiny convenience store. "Every time the smoke reaches my store, my chest tightens, and I cough a lot," the 62-year-old said. The US government's disaster agency has

linked emissions from landfill fires to cancer, liver damage, rashes and reproductive disorders. Multiple residents told AFP the smoke from the landfill, which stopped receiving trash last August, only gets thicker at night. 'Not a typical fire' Fires like the one at Navotas pose a different set of challenges from aboveground blazes, said Superintendent Anthony Arroyo, a spokesman for Manila's fire bureau. "It's not a typical fire with surface combustion or a blaze... there's layers of rubbish in a mountainous area, and below that... methane gas," he said. Fires that start below the surface often begin spontaneously, as organic matter decomposes and creates heat, fueled by oxygen that sneaks in through the cracks. Flooding the area with water had not been considered, as it risked compromising the liner that prevents chemicals from leaking into the ground below, Arroyo said. Instead, firefighters and public works employees were covering the site inch by inch with soil dredged from a nearby site. "The soil itself absorbs heat. At the same time, it serves as a smothering method, removing the oxygen from the subsurface fire." While about 50 percent of the affected area has now been covered, work has been slow-going, Arroyo added, with heavy equipment unable to be used in some parts of the landfill due to its sloping walls of refuse. For evacuees like Ramon Adino, 68, who is living in a cramped school classroom with 12 other families, a return to "normal life" is now just a matter of waiting. "I'm slightly better now, but I'm still struggling to breathe normally... It's like I'm always catching my breath," he said, adding he hoped the fire would "be extinguished soon". Food vendor Marissa Gusi, 62, said that while living conditions at the evacuation site were difficult, she planned to prioritize her health. "I'd rather stay here indefinitely than lose my life because of that smoke," she said.

- [‘Toboso probe must yield laws to prevent deaths’](#) (2026-04-30 14:09)

MANILA, Philippines—The National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-Elcac) on Thursday said a planned congressional inquiry into the April 19 clash in Toboso, Negros Occidental should lead to concrete legislation to prevent similar incidents. The statement followed the filing of House Resolution 968 seeking an investigation into the encounter between government forces and members of the New People's Army (NPA). NTF-Elcac Executive Director Ernesto Torres Jr. welcomed the move but said that its value lies in outcomes, not rhetoric. "Legislative inquiries, when conducted in good faith, are an important part of democratic governance," Torres said, adding that lawmakers' efforts to "establish facts, clarify circumstances, and determine whether policy or measures are needed are important exercises of oversight." Torres said the inquiry must be "anchored on evidence, objectivity, and the commitment to truth." He reiterated that the Toboso incident was "an armed encounter between government forces and the NPA's North Negros Front," triggered by civilian information and confirmed by intelligence reports, including the recovery of weapons and the presence of an armed formation. "These are the conditions of an active conflict environment," he said, noting that even the Communist Party of the Philippines admitted that a "tactical defeat" occurred. "You cannot claim a 'tactical defeat' and, in the same breath, insist that those involved were merely unarmed civilians," Torres added. He warned that such contradictions "risk distorting the facts surrounding what was clearly a combat

situation.” “The pursuit of ‘balanced narratives’ should not lead to false equivalence between state forces operating under the Constitution and armed groups that function outside the rule of law,” he said. Torres said that accountability mechanisms exist within government operations, citing the Armed Forces of the Philippines’ rules of engagement, adherence to international humanitarian law, and chain of command. He said the focus of the inquiry should be on prevention, particularly addressing how armed groups recruit individuals, including the youth “Addressing these conditions requires more than hearings. It requires sustained governance, development, and community engagement,” he added. Torres warned against politicizing the issue, saying the loss of life should not be reduced to competing narratives. “In the end, the measure of any inquiry is not how many narratives are presented, but whether it leads to better protection for communities, greater accountability, and a clearer path toward lasting peace,” he said.

- [Graft complaint filed vs DoH undersecretary Baggao](#) (2026-04-30 14:07)

MANILA, Philippines — Concerned health workers filed a complaint on Thursday before the Office of the Ombudsman against Undersecretary Glenn Matthew Baggao of the Department of Health (DoH). The complaint was for alleged violation of: Section 3(e) and (i) of Republic Act (RA) 3019 or the Anti-Graft and Corrupt Practices Act; and Sections 2, 3(i), and 7(a) of RA 6713 or the Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees. It was also filed for alleged: grave misconduct, conduct prejudicial to the best interest of public service, and gross inefficiency. On July 18, 2025, based on the complaint, Baggao was assigned, at the Universal Health Care–Health Services Cluster (UHC-HSC) to oversee several DoH Centers for Health Development, health facilities, and Treatment Rehabilitation Centers. Based on the complaint, he was designated as head of the Health Facilities Enhancement Programs on Feb. 5, 2026. “In 2025 alone, EGB Construction secured five health projects worth P140.99 million, including the Maconacon Super Health Center and Divilacan Super Health Center in Respondent’s immediate area of influence as head of the UHC-HSC” at that time, the complaints said. In the complaint, EGB Construction was linked to Baggao’s brother, Erni Baggao, who was not a respondent in the complaint. In the complaint’s table on the five projects totaling P140.99 million, 2025 was indicated under “Year” for each of these projects. The table did not indicate a full date. The complainants said it “also bears stressing that while Respondent served as Chief of the Cagayan Valley Medical Center, EGB Construction was awarded a Php 28.91 million COVID-19 facility through negotiated procurement”.

- [PNP on full alert for Labor Day protests](#) (2026-04-30 13:57)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippine National Police (PNP) on Thursday (April 30) announced full alert status deploying 106,633 police personnel as part of heightening its security measures for the upcoming Labor Day protests on Friday (May 1). The PNP earlier said it would only be increasing security measures to “heightened alert” in anticipation of protest action but Brig. Gen. Randulf Tuaño, PNP Public Information chief said the police force is now going on “full alert.” “PNP Chief General Jose Melencio Nartatez Jr. decided that all units must cancel their

leaves so that, if we need to deploy them, they’ re there. We’ d be able to deploy more easily,” Tũaño said. Nonetheless, the PNP has yet to monitor a security threat for Labor Day, he said. The full alert level status came into effect at 12:01 a.m. on Thursday, April 30, and will lapse at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, May 2. Tũaño however noted that the full alert level status would only be lifted in Central Visayas at 11:59 p.m. on May 10 for security preparations for the 48th Association of Southeast Asian Nations Summit in Lapu-Lapu City, Cebu. Tũaño earlier said at least three groups applied for permits to rally at the United States Embassy in Manila, University of the Philippines Diliman, Welcome Rotunda and the Department of Social Welfare and Development office in Quezon City. But the PNP is yet to receive confirmation from respective local government units (LGUs) that the groups have been given greenlight. “If they are not granted a permit, we will consider their applications approved after three days,” Tũaño said. According to the PNP spokesman, applications had been filed with respective LGUs last Monday, April 27. If the PNP’ s three-day rule were to be applied, the rally permit applications would be deemed on Labor Day on Friday, May 1, he clarified. Labor and sectoral groups Kilusang Mayo Uno (KMU), All Workers Unit and Bagong Alyansang Makabayan are expected to march to Mendiola on Friday to mark this year’ s Labor Day.

- [Barzaga joins Duterte party](#) (2026-04-30 13:30)

MANILA, Philippines — Cavite 4th District Rep. Francisco “Kiko” Barzaga has been sworn in as a new member of Partido Demokratiko Pilipino–Lakas ng Bayan (PDP-Laban), the party of former president Rodrigo Duterte. Barzaga took his oath on Wednesday at the party’ s headquarters in Sta. Mesa, Manila, alongside other new members. The ceremony was led by PDP officials Joy Encabo, Penny Belmonte, Yvette Contacto, and JV Frech Marigondon. “Congressman Kiko Barzaga is now an official member of PDP-Laban #Duterte2028,” he said in a Facebook post. PDP Deputy National Spokesman Ferdinand Topacio welcomed Barzaga, describing him as a “perfect fit” for the party. “[He has] shown exceptional and admirable principles of nationalism and the relentless pursuit of justice in the face of overwhelming resistance from the majority in the House which is trying to cover up unprecedented levels of corruption and dysfunctional governance,” Topacio said. Barzaga was previously a member of the National Unity Party (NUP), where his father, the late Cavite Rep. Elpidio Barzaga, had been a key figure. He was expelled from the NUP following the filing of an ethics complaint accusing him of “conduct unbecoming of a lawmaker.”

- [ICC orders status conference in Duterte case, sets 2026 trial preparation deadlines](#) (2026-04-30 13:10)

Trial Chamber III of the International Criminal Court (ICC) has scheduled a first status conference on May 27, 2026, in the case of former president Rodrigo Duterte, issuing a detailed order on Thursday that seeks key submissions from parties and participants ahead of trial. Presiding Judge Joanna Korner, together with Judges Keebong Paek and Nicolas Guillou, directed the prosecution, defense, victim representatives, and the Registry to file written submissions by May 15, 2026. These submissions will address a broad range of procedural and

evidentiary matters. The chamber's order primarily aims to determine a trial start date and define the scope of evidence. Prosecutors have been asked to estimate the number of witnesses, the expected hours of in-court testimony, and the anticipated volume of documentary evidence. They must also indicate whether expert witnesses or video-link testimony will be used. The defense is not required to provide similar details at this stage but may opt to do so. Judges also requested updates on whether the prosecution's investigations remain ongoing, as well as the timing and volume of outstanding disclosures required under the Rome Statute. Any issues related to transcription or translation must likewise be addressed. The chamber further directed parties to outline proposed witness protection measures, including redactions, delayed disclosure, or referrals to the court's protection program. The defense has been asked to state whether it intends to present a case under Rules 79 and 80. Meanwhile, all parties are invited to identify motions that must be resolved before trial, propose agenda items for the status conference, and flag any potential sources of delay. The Registry has been instructed to submit separate reports on language use, witness protection, and the status of pending victim participation applications. The status conference will be held at the ICC's headquarters in The Hague.

- [Former broadcast journalist Jay Sonza arrested over alleged false claims on Marcos' health](#) (2026-04-30 12:56)

MANILA, Philippines — The National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) on Thursday arrested former broadcaster and commentator Jay Sonza after a Pasay court issued a warrant over the alleged spread of false information about the health of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.. Sonza's lawyer, Mark Tolentino, confirmed the arrest, which took place in Quezon City. He said the former journalist was now under NBI custody as of posting time. The Pasay City Regional Trial Court issued the arrest warrant earlier in the day against Sonza and Eric Celiz for allegedly disseminating false or prohibited information to the public through the internet or other media platforms, specifically regarding the president's health condition. Sonza, a veteran media figure, had yet to issue a statement.

- [Philippines, US lead 11 international vessels in enhanced maritime drills in West PH Sea for 'Balikatan'](#) (2026-04-30 12:04)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines, United States and other allied forces deployed 11 vessels in complex naval drills as part of the ongoing Multinational Maritime Event (MME). The Japan Self-Defense Force, Australian Defense Force and the Canadian Armed Forces participated in the drills honing skills to detect and intercept threats from the sea and from the air, which can be done through interoperability of various capabilities like radar sensors, command and control systems and air defense platforms — all designed to shoot information for swift decision-making. The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) deployed key maritime assets, including the BRP Miguel Malvar (FFG6), BRP Antonio Luna (FFG15), AW159, and an AW109 helicopter alongside Philippine Coast Guard's BRP Cape San Agustin (MRRV 4408). The US deployed its USS Ashland (LSD-48) and USCGC Midgett (WMSL-757), Japan, its JS Ikazuchi

(DD-107), JS Shimokita (LST-4002), and JS Ise (DDH-152); Australia, its HMAS Toowoomba (FFH-156) and Canada, its HMCS Charlottetown (FFH-339) and MV Asterix. The exercises that started on April 20, 2026 featured a range of coordinated maritime activities, including Communication Checks, Photo Exercise (PHOTOEX), Coordinated Anti-Submarine Exercise (CASEX), Gunnery Exercise (GUNNEX), Air Defense Exercise through Integrated Air and Missile Defense (ADEX IAMD), Deck Landing Qualification (DLQ), Search and Rescue Exercise (SAREX), Maritime Cooperative Activity (MCA), and Replenishment at Sea (RAS), aimed at enhancing interoperability and operational readiness among participating forces. The drills, which will end on this Friday, are part of Exercise Balikatan 41-2026..

- [Palace: House finding probable cause to impeach Duterte based on evidence](#) (2026-04-30 11:27)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Thursday distanced itself from impeachment proceedings against Vice President Sara Duterte, insisting that it was the job of Congress. Palace Press Officer Claire Castro issued the statement after the Committee on Justice at the House of Representatives unanimously declared probable cause in the impeachment complaints filed against Duterte. In a press conference, Castro said that the House panel made its decision based on the evidence presented during the hearings. "That is the job of Congress. If we look at the vote, they were able to see through the hearings that were conducted, and evidence was presented. So their decision is based on what they witnessed," she said. Castro also said that President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s trust in active members of the Armed Forces of the Philippines remained intact after the National Bureau of Investigation revealed that the contracted assassin to kill the chief executive and members of his family may have come from the military.

- [Marcos to pursue legal, diplomatic means to bring Co home, says Palace](#) (2026-04-30 09:46)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. will pursue legal and diplomatic means to bring fugitive former lawmaker Zaldy Co home to the Philippines, Malacañang said Thursday. This, after Marcos received the confirmation from Chargé d' Affaires of Czech Republic Eva Tenzin that Co had indeed been detained by Czech authorities due to invalid travel documents, Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said. "Aside from that, the President also requested additional statements or information from the Czech Republic, but this was not granted because the country is adhering to international law, as well as European and national laws," Castro said during a press conference. "In the end, the President reaffirmed that the government will exhaust all legal and diplomatic means to bring back fugitive Zaldy Co back to the Philippines so he can face the graft and malversation cases filed against him here in the Philippines," she added. Co, who is facing criminal charges as one of the central figures in the public works corruption scandal, is currently in France seeking asylum on the grounds of political persecution.

- [House impeach proceedings defended](#) (2026-04-30 07:52)

MANILA, Philippines — Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro defended the proceedings conducted by the Committee on Justice of the House of Representatives which found probable cause to impeach Vice President Sara Duterte. Davao City 1st District Rep. Paolo Duterte posted on Facebook about an alleged effort to make lawmakers vote for impeachment. Allegedly, their district's budget would be removed if they did not. "In as far as I am concerned, I beg to disagree [with] that. I do not encounter anyone calling me or my chief of staff concerning the support to this impeachment process," Luistro said in Filipino and English in an interview on GMA Network's Unang Hirit on Thursday. "And I wish to add that in my capacity as chairperson, we did not stand for either party. We stood for the process," she said. Luistro is the chairman of the committee. "During the clarificatory hearing of the Justice committee, we were impartial, we were independent because we acted as investigators in a proceeding akin to a preliminary investigation. The mandate is very simple: to determine whether or not probable cause exists," she said.

- [What's next for OPEC after the UAE's withdrawal?](#) (2026-04-30 07:38)

LONDON — The exit of the UAE from OPEC and OPEC+ starting in May has cast doubts over the Saudi-led cartel's future after losing its fourth largest producer and further strains ties between the two Gulf rivals. While the United Arab Emirates is not the first country to leave OPEC, it is by far the biggest oil producer to do so — dealing a massive blow to the group's hegemony and its ability to regulate oil prices and absorb shocks. What was the UAE's role in OPEC? Before Iran's blockade of Hormuz disrupted oil flows, the UAE was OPEC+'s fourth largest producer and accounted for nearly 13 percent of OPEC production. Others, including Qatar and Angola, have already left the group, but the UAE's departure is by far OPEC's most important loss. In February, it pumped 3.6 million barrels per day — making it a key asset for the cartel. Why did the UAE leave? The UAE has long been frustrated with the Saudi-led OPEC's quotas, which sought to cap Emirati production at 3.4 million barrels a day. Abu Dhabi seeks to expand its production capacity to five million barrels a day by 2027. Iran's Hormuz blockade gave the UAE an opportunity to leave OPEC without impacting prices while positioning itself to take market share once the Strait opens, said Neil Quilliam, an energy and geopolitics expert at Chatham House. "The decision to leave was taken a long while ago, so it was just a matter of timing," said Quilliam. The UAE did not want to be constrained by quotas once the Hormuz crisis ends, a source close to the UAE energy ministry told Agence France-Presse. This reflects clashing strategies between the UAE and Saudi Arabia. The UAE's already-diversified economy is better suited to weather lower oil prices, while Saudi Arabia relies heavily upon oil for the government's operating revenue and to fund diversification. The UAE's "optimal strategy for extracting maximum value from the energy transition requires production freedom, carbon premium capture, and geopolitical independence from price politics, none of which OPEC's architecture permits," said Nadim Koteich, a Lebanese-Emirati commentator who previously headed UAE broadcaster Sky News Arabia. The added revenue would allow the UAE to step up its investments in artificial intelligence and other high-tech sectors. What about UAE-Saudi ties? The UAE's decision to exit the Saudi-led cartel puts added strain on Saudi-Emirati ties,

analysts said, which have soured since a public falling out in December over Yemen. The pair is at odds over foreign policy, oil output and the Middle East war. The Emirates have signaled disappointment in traditional Arab allies over the war, including the Cairo-based Arab League but also the Riyadh-headquartered Gulf Cooperation Council. Its rift with Saudi Arabia has extended to divergences over Iran, with the UAE taking a more hawkish stance while Saudi Arabia has backed Pakistan's mediation efforts. UAE Energy Minister Suhail Al Mazrouei has insisted the decision was "not political." But analysts warned it would fuel their rivalry. "No doubt this will further sour ties between Riyadh and Abu Dhabi. It will not only intensify the competition for influence between them in the Red Sea but also in energy markets," Chatham House's Quilliam said. In an essay penned days before the OPEC exit, Tareq Alotaiba, a former UAE official and Harvard fellow, lambasted the "hollowness of Arab solidarity," which he warned could push Abu Dhabi out of OPEC or other Arab-led institutions. A UAE official told AFP that the country was "revising the relevance and utility of its role and contribution" in multilateral organizations but that it was "not considering any withdrawals." What impact on the market? The UAE currently has a production capacity of 4.3 million barrels a day, according to Francis Perrin, an energy expert at the French Institute for International and Strategic Affairs. If it flooded the market with all of this oil after the war ends it could sharply lower prices. With the UAE out of OPEC, Saudi Arabia now holds nearly all of the cartel's spare production capacity and must bear the burden of managing supply and limiting shocks, said Jorge Leon of Rystad Energy. "Saudi Arabia is now left doing more of the heavy lifting on price stability, and the market loses one of the few shock absorbers it had left," he said. Could others follow suit? Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters Russia hoped the UAE's departure does not signal the end of OPEC. Iraq and Kazakhstan have been exceeding OPEC+ production quotas, but said they would not leave the group. If they were to exit, "that would raise alarm bells," Perrin said.

- [Marcos inaugurates P1B irrigation project in Leyte](#) (2026-04-30 07:36)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos on Thursday inaugurated the P1.1 billion irrigation project, a key infrastructure development expected to increase agricultural productivity in Leyte province. The Hibulangan Small Reservoir Irrigation Project (HSRIP), considered one of the region's largest irrigation facilities, is designed to provide a reliable water supply to 1,821 farmers covering 2,750 hectares of agricultural land in the towns of Villaba, Matag-ob, and Kananga. "This is an example of a large-scale project across the Philippines. From having only one harvest per year, I was surprised to find out that they only planted once here, now there will be two, and if we manage the water properly, it might even reach three," Marcos said in his remarks. The irrigation facility was launched initially during the administration of former president Benigno Aquino III in 2013 and has now become fully operational. Implemented by the National Irrigation Administration, the dam has a reservoir capacity of 9.01 million cubic meters and is expected to address the perennial challenge of water scarcity during the dry season. The project was first proposed in 2009 as a climate mitigation measure aimed at supporting farmers who rely heavily on rainfall and are vulnerable to prolonged dry spells.

- [Govt unveils microsite for Middle East crisis response](#) (2026-04-30 07:19)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Budget and Management (DBM) on Thursday unveiled the "Unified Package for Livelihoods, Industry, Food, and Transport" (UPLIFT) microsite, which reflects the government's efforts to cushion the impact of surging oil prices driven by the war in the Middle East. In a press conference in Malacañang, Budget Undersecretary Goddess Hope Libiran said the new "transparency tool" was a fulfillment of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s promise of "a coordinated, transparent and people-centered service for the Filipino people." "This sense of urgency comes from the fact that in any crisis, timing is crucial. People need to see that help is real, ongoing, and reaching them. Even the most extensive government action means little if people cannot understand or access it. So, the UPLIFT microsite solves this gap," Libiran said. "So essentially, this micro site shows that this whole government response starts at the top and that our President is actively engaged, publicly accountable and squarely focused on the Filipino people," she added. When asked why there was a need to launch such a microsite, Libiran said the government wanted the public to have a "single source of truth" regarding its response to the Middle East crisis amid the spread of fake news. "So, to sum it up, the UPLIFT microsite takes everything this administration is doing, to shield Filipinos from the effects of the Middle East crisis, it shows that we are present, we are mobilizing, we are here, united and under the leadership of President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr., we are moving forward together with every Filipino citizen in mind," Libiran said. "So, this platform will continue to grow and improve. But we chose to make it available now, so that Filipinos can already see and understand and access the help meant for them when it matters most," she added. MANILA, Philippines — Majority of Filipinos believe Vice President Sara Duterte holds billions of pesos in undisclosed bank accounts, with public opinion sharply divided along political lines, according to a nationwide survey following recent legislative inquiries and reports from the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC). The non-commissioned survey, conducted by Tangere from April 29 to 30 with 1,200 respondents, showed that 58 percent of Filipinos believe the allegations although these vary significantly depending on the political affiliation. Among supporters of the current administration, 82 percent said they believed Duterte possessed hidden wealth, despite her alliance with President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. during the 2022 elections. Similarly, 81 percent of respondents aligned with the Liberal Party or supporters of former vice president Leni Robredo said they considered the allegations credible. Neutral or independent voters also leaned toward believing the claims, with about 67 percent expressing the view that the vice president holds undisclosed funds. In contrast, Duterte's core supporters—who make up about 40 percent of the population in the survey—largely rejected the allegations. Only around one-third of this group said they believed the claims, while the majority described the issue as a politically motivated smear campaign. The findings point to a

deeply polarized public, with analysts noting that belief in the allegations extends beyond traditional opposition groups and into independent and administration-leaning voters. “The high level of belief among neutral and administration supporters suggests that recent AMLC disclosures have gained traction beyond the usual political blocs,” the report said. At the same time, the survey indicated a strong base of Duterte supporters who remained unconvinced, reflecting what the report described as an entrenched “defender” bloc that may view the controversy through the lens of the 2028 elections. The survey also measured public awareness and perception of the AMLC, which has been at the center of the financial disclosures. Results showed that 90 percent of Filipinos were aware of the AMLC and its functions. Among those aware, 51 percent expressed trust in the agency, while 30 percent said they distrusted it. Satisfaction levels were similarly moderate, with 52 percent saying they were satisfied with the AMLC’s performance, compared to 28 percent who were dissatisfied. The survey used a mobile-based application and employed stratified random sampling with quota-based distribution across regions. Respondents were drawn from across the country, including 12 percent from the National Capital Region, 23 percent from Northern Luzon, 22 percent from Southern Luzon, 20 percent from the Visayas, and 23 percent from Mindanao. The margin of error was  $\pm 2.77$  percent at a 95 percent confidence level. Tangere, the firm behind the survey, described the study as non-commissioned and aimed at capturing Filipino sentiment on current national issues.

- [Dengvaxia trial looms after judge junks motions to dismiss case](#) (2026-04-30 05:33)

MANILA, Philippines — The much-delayed Dengvaxia case will now likely go full blast after a Quezon City court judge turned down the motions filed by former Health secretary and now Iloilo Rep. Janette Garin and other co-accused to dismiss the multiple cases for reason of “double jeopardy,” among others, according to the public prosecutors. In an April 28, 2026 order, a copy of which was obtained by The Manila Times, Judge Michael Ken de Jesus, of Regional Trial Court-Branch 102, denied several motions to quash (or to dismiss the case) filed by the defense lawyers for lack of merit. “In sum, the attempt to shoehorn (‘to force to be included or admitted’) the Dengvaxia mass immunization program into the narrow confines of the Ivler doctrine is factually unavailing and legally untenable,” de Jesus said. The defense panel argued that the 35 cases currently being handled by de Jesus were no different from the first batch of eight cases which were dismissed by another family court judge, hence, its claim of double jeopardy. The prosecution panel had insisted that the cases were separate and distinct from one another as the over 100 children, who all died after they were vaccinated with the banned anti-dengue vaccine, had different medical conditions. Illustrating the “glaring fact” between a vehicular collision in the Jason Ivler vs Modesto-San Pedro case and “multiple, distinct acts of medical inoculate” in the Dengvaxia case, the judge said Ivler committed a singular act of driving his vehicle recklessly at a specific moment in time. But in the Dengvaxia case, there were “continuous repeated acts” and while the policy (mass vaccination) was singular, the proximate acts of negligence, the alleged indiscriminate administration of the vaccine without proper screening, were repeatedly committed with every individual injection, the family court judge

said. “The alleged reckless imprudence did not solely materialize in a room or place during the procurement or licensing phase; it materialized upon the actual administration of the vaccine to an unsuspecting child,” de Jesus pointed out. Aware that the rule against double jeopardy was intended as a safeguard to protect an accused from “vexatious and repetitive prosecutions,” however, he said: “the doctrine was never meant to serve as a shield against accountability for separate acts of negligence committed against different victims at different times.” Explaining that a motion to quash is neither a mini trial nor a proper vehicle to evaluate medical findings, weigh expert opinions or determine the cause of death, the judge said that it would be a matter of evidence “that must be rigorously tested during a full-blown trial on the merits.” The vaccine, procured by the Department of Health for P3.5 billion for a nationwide jab campaign in 2015, was allegedly not evaluated thoroughly for safety and efficacy, leading to the deaths of many children, according to the findings of several health experts and the Forensics Laboratory Division of the Public Attorney’s Office (PAO). Aside from Garin, her other co-accused were top executives of vaccine maker Sanofi Pasteur Inc. and vaccine distributor Zuellig Pharma, and officials of the Research Institute for Tropical Medicine, Philippine Children’s Medical Center, and Food and Drug Administration. Charged with multiple reckless imprudence resulting in homicide, Garin and her co-accused were also facing civil cases before the Quezon City court. The other respondents were Kenneth Hartigan-Go, Vincent Belizario, Gerardo Bayugo, Irma Asuncion, Julius Lecciones, Mario Baquilod, Sonia Gonzales, Lourdes Santiago, Melody Zamudio, Socorro Lupisan, Maria Rosario Capeding, Carlito Realuyo, Conchita Santos, Maria Joyce Ducusin and Rosalind Vianzon, said to be all medical practitioners. Under the stewardship of its chief, Persida Rueda-Acosta, PAO has been providing legal assistance to the parents and relatives belonging to the Samahan ng mga Magulang ang mga Anak ay Biktima ng Dengvaxia (SMABD) particularly in the civil cases.

- [Preparations for BARMM parliamentary election in full swing](#) (2026-04-30 05:24)

MANILA, Philippines — Preparations are in full swing for the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) parliamentary election as national government agencies and partner institutions coordinate security, legal, and administrative measures to ensure orderly and credible polls. This was highlighted during a command conference held on April 28 at Camp Crame in Quezon City where key stakeholders reaffirmed that the electoral exercise was firmly moving forward under a “whole-of-government” approach. Philippine National Police chief Gen. Jose Melencio Nartatez Jr. led discussions with election stakeholders, underscoring coordination among agencies to secure the upcoming polls. The meeting gathered officials from the Commission on Elections (Comelec), Office of the Special Assistant to the President, Armed Forces of the Philippines, Philippine Coast Guard, National Intelligence Coordinating Agency, and civil society election monitors. Special Assistant to the President Anton Lagdameo stressed the importance of holding the first-ever elections in BARMM, highlighting the order of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. to certify the election as urgent. “The first BARMM parliamentary elections will be a historic moment not just for the region but for the whole nation. It is an opportunity for the Bangsamoro to shape their parliament directly and to prove that the

democracy here is strong,” Lagdameo said. Republic Act 12317, signed into law by Marcos, sets the first regular BARMM parliamentary elections on the second Monday of September 2026 and aligns succeeding polls with the national and local elections beginning May 2031. Authorities reiterated their commitment to ensure peaceful and credible elections under heightened coordination efforts, with the PNP emphasizing its operational readiness in line with its campaign for more responsive public service. Despite the momentum in preparations, the electoral process is being shaped by legal and political challenges. A petition has been filed before the Comelec opposing the registration of the United Bangsamoro Justice Party, the political wing of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF). The petition raised allegations of election law violations, including gun ban breaches and alleged foreign funding, and called for the denial of the party’s accreditation as a regional parliamentary political party. UBJP President Al Haj Murad Ebrahim, however, maintained that the party’s participation is essential to the electoral process, citing its historical role in the creation of BARMM. At the same time, separate petitions have been filed before the Supreme Court and Comelec urging the swift resolution of disputes involving BARMM redistricting and party accreditation rules. The petitioners warned that delays could affect voter representation and create confusion ahead of the filing of certificates of candidacy. They also urged the poll body to intensify voter education efforts, stressing the importance of clarifying that the BARMM parliamentary elections will proceed as scheduled on September. The BARMM elections will mark the first parliamentary polls in the region, transitioning governance from the appointed Bangsamoro Transition Authority to a fully elected 80-member parliament. The exercise is widely seen as a key milestone in the implementation of the 2014 peace agreement between the Philippine government and the MILF.

- [Sotto: Senate may convene as impeachment court on May 13](#) (2026-04-30 05:22)

MANILA, Philippines—The Senate might convene as an impeachment court (IC) on May 13 if the House of Representatives (HOR), in a plenary vote, impeaches Vice President Sara on May 11, Senate President Vicente Sotto III said. The House Committee on Justice on Wednesday found probable cause to impeach Duterte. The committee is expected to meet on May 4 and produce its report, the resolution, and articles of impeachment (AI). Sotto on Thursday called for a senators’ caucus to discuss preparations amid the possibility of the HOR transmitting the AI to the Senate. “Let’s say they approve [the AI] on May 11, [they will transmit it on] May 12. [The Senate should] discuss it already on May 13 and convene as impeachment court,” Sotto said in Filipino in a chance interview. The Senate will resume session on May 4 after a monthlong break. “The Senate must be in session to receive [the AI],” the senator said. “But as of now everything is speculative. What we will be doing in caucus is discuss agenda for this month and the possibility of receiving the articles of impeachment,” he said. “Then, we will discuss the possibility of what should be done and the timetable - that is crucial,” said Sotto, who will act as the presiding officer of the impeachment court.

MANILA, Philippines — An all-senators caucus was convened Thursday by Senate President Vicente Sotto III to discuss preparations for the anticipated impeachment trial of Vice President Sara Duterte. Sources said the closed-door meeting focused on the procedural framework the Senate would adopt once the House of Representatives transmits the articles of impeachment against Duterte. Under the 1987 Constitution, the House has the exclusive power to initiate impeachment cases, while the Senate acts as an impeachment court. Senators will serve as judges tasked with determining whether the vice president is guilty of the charges outlined in the complaint.

- [Eastern police strengthen security preparations for Labor Day](#) (2026-04-30 04:21)

MANILA, Philippines — The Eastern Police District (EPD) is ramping up preparations for Labor Day on May 1, 2026 to ensure the safety and security. At least 1,139 personnel will be deployed in the eastern portion of Metro Manila, including major convergence points; about 350 will be deployed to Manila and 501 will be part of the Civil Disturbance Management within the perimeter of EDSA Shrine. BGen. Alden Lagradante, district commander, directed police personnel from Pasig, Mandaluyong, Marikina, and San Juan to maintain their present positions "to heighten public awareness and prevent potential crimes during the celebration."

- [DPWH orders bus firm to pay for EDSA-Ortigas flyover fire damage](#) (2026-04-30 04:10)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) demanded payment from a bus company for repair costs following a fire that damaged a major Metro Manila flyover. In a letter issued by Public Works Secretary Vince Dizon, the agency ordered LS8 Tourist Transport Corporation to shoulder the expenses for rehabilitation works at the EDSA-Ortigas Interchange. The demand stemmed from an April 24, 2026 incident in which a bus caught fire while traversing the interchange, one of the busiest road links in Metro Manila. The blaze reportedly lasted around an hour, raising concerns over potential structural damage. Initial inspections by DPWH engineers revealed visible deterioration in key sections of the bridge. Among the findings were concrete spalling on the soffit, exposure of reinforcing steel bars, and discoloration underneath the structure—signs consistent with high-temperature exposure. Authorities said the damage was concentrated at Span 7 of the interchange, a critical segment that supports heavy daily traffic. Engineers warned that while the bridge remained passable, repairs were necessary to ensure long-term safety and integrity.

- [Marcos convenes national, regional leaders to strengthen cooperation vs crime](#) (2026-04-30 04:03)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. convened national and regional leaders to strengthen coordination in addressing key peace and security priorities. The President led the Joint National Peace and Order Council and Regional Peace and Order Council Meeting for the first semester of 2026 in Malacañang on Thursday. During the meeting, Marcos stressed the importance of stronger cooperation between the national and local governments to curb crime and ensure faster emergency response. "When communities are safe, people can work, build

businesses and come home to their families with peace of mind," the President said in Facebook post. "At the joint National Peace and Order Council Meeting, we strengthened coordination between national and local governments to keep crime down and respond faster in emergencies," he added. Marcos said discussions centered on leveraging technology and enhancing community involvement to help prevent crime. "We discussed strategies, such as expanding the use of technology and engaging communities in deterring crime. We want to ensure that people feel safe, stable and secure," he said.

- [Inflation could hit 6% in April — BSP](#) (2026-04-30 03:35)

MANILA, Philippines — Higher local fuel and electricity costs due to the Middle East conflict, along with a weaker peso, could have pushed inflation to a three-year high in April, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) said on Thursday. Consumer price growth was forecast to have hit 5.6 to 6.4 percent, above the 2.0- to 4.0-percent target and higher than the 4.1 percent recorded in March. Inflation at the top end, if realized, would be the highest since April 2023's 6.6 percent. Data for April will be released by the Philippine Statistics Authority on May 5. "Inflation risks have intensified amid upward price pressures from significantly higher domestic petroleum prices, rising prices of key food items such as rice, fish, and meat, increased electricity charges, and the peso depreciation," the central bank said in the statement. "The anticipated decline in vegetable and fruit prices may help temper inflation, but sources of upside price pressures continue to warrant close monitoring," it added.

- [BI nabs alleged foreign scammers, money launderers in Pampanga crackdown](#) (2026-04-30 02:51)

MANILA, Philippines — Authorities arrested three foreigners in Pampanga for their suspected involvement in online scamming and money laundering, as part of the government's intensified crackdown on transnational crimes. Immigration Commissioner Joel Anthony Viado on Thursday said the suspects, identified as Chinese, were nabbed during a late-night enforcement operation in a residential property at Pulu Amsic subdivision in Angeles City. Agents from the BI's Fugitive Search Unit (FSU), working closely with the National Bureau of Investigation—Organized and Transnational Crimes Division (NBI-OTCD), carried out the raid. Arrested were Zhang Zheng, 42; Ren Yi, 28; and Zhang Shengjun, 31, who were reportedly caught in flagrante while operating computer equipment allegedly used in fraudulent online schemes targeting foreign victims. Investigators said the trio was believed to be part of so-called "breakaway" scam hubs—groups composed of former Philippine Offshore Gaming Operator (POGO) workers who have resumed illegal operations outside regulated facilities. These groups are known to relocate to residential areas to avoid detection, making enforcement more challenging for authorities.

- [Who is ICC Judge Joanna Korner?](#) (2026-04-30 02:46)

MANILA, Philippines — International Criminal Court (ICC) Judge Joanna Korner was selected by the tribunal to preside over the trial of former president Rodrigo Duterte. According to her

profile at the ICC website, Korner practiced criminal law for 45 years in the United Kingdom and from 2012 served as a Crown Court of England and Wales, which tries the most serious and complex criminal cases in Britain. She has also been part of the Queen's Counsel since 1993, and prosecuted and defended in numerous cases in the courts of England and Wales. Korner also served eight years as a senior prosecutor at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia from 1999 to 2004 and from 2009 to 2012. "As a renowned expert, Judge Korner has organized and taught on numerous training programs on international criminal law and advocacy for judges and lawyers from different regions. Between 2004-2005, she was Senior Legal Adviser to the Chief Prosecutor of Bosnia and Herzegovina, during the establishment of a War Crimes Section in the country's State Prosecutor's Office," the ICC's website wrote. She would join the ICC on March 11, 2021, having been elected from List A, which is a roster of qualified lawyers eligible to practice before the ICC, on Dec. 23, 2020. Korner is assigned to the trial division and is serving at Trial Chambers I and V of the ICC.

- [LTFRB summons bus operator over failure to grant mandated fare discounts](#) (2026-04-30 02:31)

MANILA, Philippines — The Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) has summoned a bus operator and its driver for allegedly failing to provide mandated fare discounts under the government's service contracting program. In a statement issued Thursday, the LTFRB said the show cause order (SCO) was served on Cemtrans Services, Inc. after a complaint surfaced online accusing one of its conductors of not granting required fare reductions and failing to return change to passengers. Under program rules, passenger buses are required to extend a 20 percent discount to regular commuters and up to 40 percent to students, senior citizens, and persons with disabilities. The LTFRB said the conductor involved in the reported incident did not issue tickets, failed to apply the prescribed discount, and did not give the correct change for a trip from Alabang to Ayala. "This is not how the program works and there is no excuse for failure to provide the necessary discount to all passengers," LTFRB Chairman Vigor Mendoza II said. Mendoza warned that the agency would take action against operators and personnel who disregard program guidelines. The SCO directed the bus operator to submit a written explanation on why its franchise should not be suspended or revoked for non-compliance with service contracting rules. The driver and conductor were also ordered to appear at a hearing scheduled on May 11, 2026. Failure to attend the hearing or submit a response will be treated as a waiver, which could result in the imposition of a P5,000 penalty, the LTFRB said.

- [DOLE rolls out P260M livelihood aid nationwide for Labor Day](#) (2026-04-30 02:15)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) is rolling out more than P261.5 million in livelihood assistance nationwide this Labor Day, targeting 11,257 beneficiaries under its Kabuhayan Program in a major push to strengthen long-term income opportunities. Timed with the country's 124th Labor Day celebration this Friday, the initiative goes beyond short-term aid, aiming to equip workers with sustainable sources of livelihood that

could support families well after the holiday. Labor officials said the funding would be coursed through the DOLE Integrated Livelihood Program (DILP), one of the agency's flagship interventions designed for informal workers, vulnerable sectors, and community-based groups. DOLE said the program reflected the government's broader strategy of pairing immediate financial relief with long-term economic resilience, especially for those most affected by unstable or low-income work. Instead of one-time assistance, beneficiaries will receive support that would allow them to build or expand small enterprises tailored to local demand and available resources. These livelihood grants come in the form of starter kits or materials for projects such as sari-sari stores, negokarts, farming, livestock raising, fishing ventures, and other community-driven businesses.

- [Evidence for threat, sedition not 'foundation for probable cause,' says Sara's lawyer](#) (2026-04-30 01:21)

MANILA, Philippines — The counsel of Vice President Sara Duterte in the complaint filed by the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) on Thursday said that the evidence presented at the House of Representatives' impeachment hearing on Wednesday was not a foundation for probable cause. The statement comes after NBI Director Melvin Matibag said that Duterte's threats to President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., First Lady Liza Marcos, and former speaker Martin Romualdez has already been established and that there was a "reasonable certainty of conviction" for cases of grave threat and inciting to sedition. In a statement sent to The Manila Times, Duterte's counsel, Paul Lawrence Lim, said the presentation in yesterday's hearing "reveals the paucity of the charges against her." "Evidence is curated, even spliced. Context is ignored. Opinion is substituted for facts. Guesswork is presented as investigation results. These cannot be the foundation for probable cause, much less a prima facie case with reasonable certainty of conviction. Simply repeating a conclusion, no matter how vehemently, does not make it true," Lim added. He added that the attempt to create a causal link between the vice president and alleged comments against the president "demands a gigantic leap in logic and abandonment of basic evidentiary principles." "The non-existent connection to the vice president is posed as a mystery still under investigation with no immediate answer, but strategically implies guilt. This excites judgment without evidence," Lim said. Lim said that Wednesday's proceeding confirmed that it has been a "fishing expedition aimed at giving a semblance of substance to the defective impeachment complaints," echoing the vice president. He added that the issue of the alleged commission of crimes "will be addressed at the proper fora, where evidence is expected to support judgment, and the rule of law is expected to be respected,"

- [UK judge to head ICC trial chamber in Duterte case](#) (2026-04-30 01:08)

MANILA, Philippines — Judge Joanna Korner has been designated presiding judge of Trial Chamber III in the case against former president Rodrigo Duterte at the International Criminal Court (ICC). In a decision issued on Wednesday, the Chamber announced that Korner, a judge from the United Kingdom, will lead the three-judge panel hearing the case. The chamber, which

also includes Judge Keebong Paek of South Korea and Judge Nicolas Guillou of France, elected Korner pursuant to Regulation 13(2) of the court's regulations. Her designation was confirmed following the official referral of the Duterte case to Trial Chamber III by the ICC Presidency on April 24. The decision formalizes the court's judicial leadership for the proceedings against the former Philippine leader.

- [Fire hits residential building in Manila](#) (2026-04-30 00:53)

MANILA, Philippines — Fire broke out from a residential building in Sta. Cruz Manila early Thursday morning, reaching the fourth alarm. According to the Bureau of Fire Protection–National Capital Region (BFP NCR) Manila city, the first alarm was raised at 2:42 a.m. It then reached the second alarm by 2:57 a.m., third alarm by 3:26 a.m., and fourth alarm by 3:53 a.m. Authorities quickly responded to the operation and by 5:06 a.m, the fire was declared “under control.” The cause of the fire has yet to be determined. The incident comes a day after a five-hour blaze hit a residential village in Muninlupa City. Damage and cause have also not been established.

- [Panel finds probable cause to impeach VP](#) (2026-04-29 16:16)

(UPDATE) THE House Committee on Justice on Wednesday declared that it found probable cause to impeach Vice President Sara Duterte, setting the stage for a plenary vote in the House of Representatives with major implications for the 2028 presidential race. During the resumption of its hearing on the impeachment complaints filed against Duterte, the committee voted unanimously that evidence in a pair of complaints alleging Duterte misused public funds in office and made a death threat against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. had successfully established probable cause to pursue impeachment. The two complaints will now be consolidated into one before being sent to the plenary for a vote. The committee is expected to meet on May 4 and produce its report, the resolution and articles of impeachment. Under the Constitution, an impeachment by the House of Representatives triggers a Senate trial, where a guilty verdict would ban former president Rodrigo Duterte's eldest daughter from elected office for life. Mamamayang Liberal Rep. Leila de Lima, one of the complaints' endorsers, said the evidence showed an “alarming pattern of amassing unexplained wealth” as well as threats that struck “at the very heart of our constitutional order.” “There's no question we have enough and valid reason for this process to move forward and impeach the vice president,” de Lima told the committee before the vote. The threat against Marcos stemmed from a late-night press briefing in which Duterte claimed to have hired an assassin to kill the president, his wife and the speaker of the House at the time, should he have her cut down first. She later said her comments had been misinterpreted. On Wednesday, the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) told the committee the vice president's alleged death threat qualified as sedition. Bank records presented by the committee in previous hearings, meanwhile, suggested large discrepancies between the vice president's publicly declared net worth — P88 million as of 2024 — and hundreds of transactions involving P6.7 billion. The vice president declined to appear at any of the hearings, saying she would answer questions if the process reached the

Senate. Duterte's defense team said the House Committee on Justice's finding was "not unexpected." "The finding of probable cause by the House Committee on Justice was not unexpected, given the direction the proceedings had taken," the team said in a statement. "We respectfully maintain that the proceedings before the committee departed from the constitutional design. Instead of confining itself to the verified complaints and their attachments, the process expanded into matters that properly belong to a full trial," the defense team said. Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro, the committee chairman, however said the clarificatory hearing was not a trial and was not aimed at determining the guilt or innocence of the respondent. Under the 1987 Constitution, the committee must submit a report "with the corresponding resolution" to the House of Representatives within 60 session days from referral to it of the impeachment complaint. Then the House must calendar the resolution for consideration within 10 session days from receipt. "A vote of at least one-third of all the members of the House shall be necessary either to affirm a favorable resolution with the articles of impeachment of the committee, or override its contrary resolution. The vote of each member shall be recorded," the provision says. Only the House has the power to initiate impeachment cases and only the Senate can conduct an impeachment trial. The purpose of the committee's hearing on the impeachment complaints was to determine whether there was probable cause to impeach Duterte. On Wednesday, the panel tackled Duterte's kill remark against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. "And just to let you know, we have leads already.... I apologize that we cannot name the names of those individuals that we are following, but we are zeroing [in] on several individuals already who might have been who she talked to," said NBI Director Melvin Matibag. The complaint filed by several people, including priests, alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayed public trust and committed high crimes "in contracting to murder or assassinate" Marcos, first lady Liza Araneta-Marcos, and former speaker and Leyte 1st District Rep. Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. The complaint cited a Nov. 23, 2024 briefing with the media wherein she said, "... may kinausap na ako na tao. Sinabi ko sa kanya kapag pinatay ako, patayin mo si BBM, si Liza Araneta, at si Martin Romualdez (I have spoken to someone. I told him if I am killed, kill BBM (Marcos), Liza Araneta and Martin Romualdez)." Duterte denied that this was an assassination threat. The other complaint, filed by lawyer Nathaniel Cabrera, alleged that she "committed acts that constitute culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayal of public trust and other high crimes, by publicly admitting the contracting of an assassin." Duterte's answer to these charges was that the complainants failed to show "any shred of proof" that a contract to kill ever existed. "Instead, complainants rely on exaggerated conclusions dressed up as fact," the defense team said. Also on Wednesday, the committee, voting 38-6, decided not to open the box that contained the income tax returns (ITRs) of Duterte and her husband, Manases Carpio. The committee had subpoenaed the ITRs for its hearing on the impeachment complaints. In the resumption of the hearing last week, Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) Commissioner Charlito Mendoza cited Article 20 of the National Internal Revenue Code. This provision mandates the BIR commissioner to provide a congressional committee upon request, with information and reports in aid of legislation. The same provision allows the committee to disclose such information only in executive session unless the taxpayer has consented to disclosure in

writing. At the resumption of the hearing on Wednesday, de Lima moved to open the box. “To allow a provision of the tax code to override the constitutional power of impeachment is to invert the hierarchy of laws,” she said. Akbayan Rep. Chel Diokno believed that the committee had the power to open the box but also believed that doing so would be unnecessary. “The question is in relation to the determination of probable cause and if we are talking about probable cause, for me the evidence is already there — that is already enough for us to make a determination even if we do not open that box,” Diokno said in Filipino and English. As in past hearings, Duterte stayed away from Wednesday’s proceedings. Political blackmail? Davao City Rep. Paolo Duterte, meanwhile, described as “political blackmail” a report from Politiko.com that lawmakers are being coerced by House Majority Leader Sandro Marcos to vote for the impeachment of the vice president in exchange for funds for their districts. According to the online report, Marcos was already calling lawmakers for a “head count” ahead of the plenary deliberations for Duterte’s impeachment. The report added that lawmakers are now anticipating the release of projects “for later release” to cover farm-to-market roads, school building projects and even medical assistance for indigent patients. In a statement on his Facebook page, Duterte said Marcos was calling congressmen’s chiefs of staff demanding that they vote for impeachment or “else the entire General Appropriations Act budget for their districts will be removed.” “This means everything, including funds for irrigation, schools, bridges, roads and other necessities, especially for provinces that are already struggling, would be lost. Beyond this, they say even funds intended for social services will not be provided. They want to punish the people just for their desperate attempt to eliminate a political rival. What are you afraid of?” Duterte said. He added that if the lawmakers are being threatened with the removal of their district funds if they do not toe the impeachment line, he said that this is no longer democracy, but political blackmail. “The national budget is not a weapon. It is not a tool for intimidation. It is not used to force elected representatives to bow to the whims of a few. I will repeat: it is the people you are punishing for your own ambitions,” Duterte said. The Manila Times reached out to the majority leader for comment on Duterte’s charge, but was unable to get a response in time for publication. Duterte and Marcos have been engaged in a high-stakes political brawl that erupted within weeks of their 2022 win in the presidential election, when the vice president was denied her favored Cabinet portfolios and instead named education secretary. The vice president, who in February formally announced plans to run for president, was impeached by the House last year only to see the Supreme Court toss the case out over procedural issues. The 2025 impeachment bypassed the committee process entirely when the necessary one-third of House members signed an impeachment complaint and sent it directly to the Senate. The House is currently in recess, meaning any new impeachment vote must wait until they return on May 4. WITH AFP

- [Rice may hit P60 a kilo by September, DA says](#) (2026-04-29 16:14)

RICE prices may reach P60 to P62 per kilo by September, primarily due to rising fertilizer costs and global supply pressures, Agriculture Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. said Wednesday during a hearing of the Protect Ad-Hoc Committee at the Senate. Responding to questions from

senators on whether agricultural prices are expected to rise in the coming months, Tiu Laurel pointed to a sharp increase in fertilizer prices as a key factor that will affect the next harvest season. “Fertilizer prices have jumped from around P1,650 to as much as P3,000. Because of this, rice prices are expected to increase by the next harvest season, which is around September,” Tiu Laurel said. Currently, the average retail price of rice stands at about P50 per kilo, up from P42 before the global disruptions caused by the war in the Middle East and the resulting supply chain issues. Based on Department of Agriculture (DA) projections, this could rise to between P60 and P62 per kilo if traditional farming practices continue and farmers remain dependent on urea-based fertilizers. Despite the projected increase, Tiu Laurel emphasized that President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. has directed the DA to find ways to stabilize and lower rice prices. “One of our priorities is to bring down the average price, while still allowing a range of options — from premium rice to more affordable varieties,” he said. Among the strategies being explored is a rice blending program that mixes imported and locally produced rice at a ratio of 70 percent local, 30 percent imported. The goal is to lower retail prices while supporting local farmers. By blending cheaper imported rice with more expensive local varieties, officials hope to reduce the overall market price without undermining domestic production. Another proposal involves mixing rice with white corn, which is significantly cheaper. The suggested ratio is 50 percent rice and 50 percent white corn. The estimated sustainable farmgate price for rice is P22/kg (wet) and P27/kg (dry). Tiu Laurel said initial trials within the DA have shown promising results. “I’ve been eating it personally for a week. If prepared properly, you can hardly tell the difference,” he said, adding that increasing water content during cooking improves texture and taste. The practice, while traditional in some regions like Cebu, has yet to gain widespread acceptance in Luzon. Officials acknowledged the challenge of balancing consumer affordability with farmer profitability. With rising input costs, farmers need higher farmgate prices to sustain production, which inevitably pushes retail prices upward. “We want both local and imported rice to move hand in hand,” Tiu Laurel said. “The goal is to stabilize prices while ensuring our farmers can still earn.”

- [PH, allies hold live fire coastline defense drill](#) (2026-04-29 16:13)

(UPDATE) THE Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), together with the United States Armed Forces, Australian Defense Force and New Zealand Defense Force, simulated coastline defense against enemy amphibious landings, the military said in a statement on Tuesday. Led by the Philippine Marine Corps’ 3rd Marine Brigade, the activity called Counter-Landing Live Fire Exercise (CLLFX-West) was held at the Apurawan Beach Landing Site in Aborlan, Palawan, as part of Exercise Balikatan 41–2026. “The exercise simulated a maritime threat involving an enemy amphibious landing along the coastline, showcasing combined forces’ capability to detect, disrupt and deny hostile elements from establishing a beachhead,” the AFP said. “The activity demonstrated strong coordination and interoperability among participating forces in a complex littoral environment,” the AFP said. The exercise highlighted a layered, multi-domain defense employing synchronized air, land and indirect fire assets. The Philippine Air Force (PAF) deployed its FA-50 fighter jets for air interdiction while US forces provided High Mobility

Artillery Rocket System (Himars) capabilities. Ground forces executed mid- to close-range engagements using artillery, mortars, light armored vehicles, anti-armor systems, heavy machine guns and infantry weapons, supported by precision strikes and reconnaissance. Simultaneously, a simulated Non-Combatant Evacuation Operation was conducted at Sitio Bubusawin and Sitio Long Point, alongside a community outreach activity in coordination with the local government of Aborlan and Barangay Apurawan, underscoring the AFP's role in both defense and humanitarian operations. Gen. Romeo Brawner Jr., AFP chief of staff, witnessed the live-fire exercise together with Vice Adm. Alan Javier, commander of Western Command. Anti-drone drills The PAF FA50 fighter jets, which were earlier confirmed to be participating in the anti-drone drills in San Antonio, Zambales, were a no-show at the exercise. At the Naval Station Leovigildo Gantioqui, San Antonio, Zambales, the PAF and the United States Marine Corps (USMC) held a four-day Integrated Air and Missile Defense demonstration from April 26 to 29 showcasing the combined capabilities of the two militaries to detect and intercept hostile aerial threats such as drones, helicopters and low-lying fixed wing aircraft. In the exercise, the USMC brought in powerful air defense capabilities such as the Marine Air Defense Integrated System, Vampire Laser System and the Avenger Air Defense System all designed to knock down threats in the airspace. The FA50s participated in the counter-landing live-fire drills held on the beaches of Apurawan, Palawan, on April 27 but were not seen in the Zambales airspace. "Due to the safety protocols, live aircraft will not be used since we are dealing with a live missile that shoots in the air," Maj. Richmond Jan Cayabyab, battery commander of the Philippine Air Force's Surface-to-air Python and Derby (Spyder) air defense system, told reporters covering the anti-drone war games. Col. Xerxes Trinidad, AFP Public Affairs chief, said that in an air defense or air missile defense scenario, safety protocols must be observed.

- [Pag-IBIG loan releases up 9% to P32.92B in Q1](#) (2026-04-29 16:12)

(UPDATE) SOME P32.92 billion in housing loans have been released in the first quarter (Q1) of 2026, which was 9 percent more than last year's P30.22 billion in the same period, the Home Development Mutual Fund, or Pag-IBIG Fund, said on Wednesday. Expanding access to home financing for Filipino workers, Pag-IBIG has financed 20,926 homes from January to March 2026, also higher than the 20,315 homes financed in the first quarter of 2025, CEO Marilene Acosta said. Acosta said that out of the allocated funds, socialized housing loans accounted for P2.95 billion, which financed 3,439 homes, up 68 percent in amount and 92 percent in number of units from the same period last year. It reflects Pag-IBIG Fund's sustained push to serve members from lower-income sectors, Acosta said. She said the agency remains focused on helping members own homes through monthly payments they can afford while keeping the fund strong for future borrowers. "What the Pag-IBIG Housing Loan gives our members is a real chance to own a home through monthly payments that are often lower than rent. Instead of spending on rent, our members are able to make payments toward a home they can call their own," Acosta said. "The amount they save from lower monthly payments can then go to food, education, daily needs, and even to their Pag-IBIG Regular Savings and MP2 Savings. This

matters most for our members from lower-income sectors, which is why we are glad to see more of them benefit through socialized housing,” she added. Housing Secretary Jose Ramon Aliling, who accompanied President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. when the latter visited housing projects financed by Pag-IBIG Fund last week, cited the continuing efforts of the administration to make decent homes more accessible to Filipino families under the expanded Pambansang Pabahay Para sa Pilipino (4PH) program. Aliling noted that the higher home loan releases show the progress being made in carrying out the president’s directive to expand access to homeownership while also helping stimulate economic activity through housing production. “The efforts of the Marcos administration are bearing fruit. More Filipino workers are now gaining access to decent homes, and this is a clear step forward in fulfilling President Marcos’ directive to make homeownership within reach of more families,” Aliling said. “Housing also creates jobs, supports construction and allied industries, and helps drive economic activity. As the expanded 4PH program continues to provide greater affordability, we expect even more opportunities for homeownership to open for our members, especially those from underserved sectors. This is ‘Bagong Pilipinas’ in action,” the housing czar said. Acosta praised the responsible member-borrowers who have been cited for the continued growth of the agency. “We thank them for keeping their accounts updated, because through their discipline, we are able to help more Filipino families own a home,” Acosta said.

- [PhilHealth expands maternity benefits](#) (2026-04-29 16:11)

(UPDATE) PRESIDENT Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Wednesday announced expanded maternity benefits under Philippine Health Insurance Corp. (PhilHealth) starting April 30. In a video message, Marcos said the expanded coverage included higher benefits for normal and cesarean deliveries, prenatal checkups and postnatal care coverage. For normal deliveries, the president said PhilHealth coverage would be raised to P29,000 from P9,750. He said PhilHealth coverage for caesarean deliveries would also be increased from P37,000 to P58,000 up to P62,000. “In many cases, if a mother gives birth in a ward, even in a private hospital, there may be nothing to pay upon discharge,” Marcos said. The president also said prenatal care coverage has been expanded from four to eight checkups, now including vaccines and laboratory tests. He said that postnatal care has also been improved, with three follow-up visits now covered. “Our goal is simple: to ensure that every mother can give birth safely without worrying about where to get money,” Marcos said. “We want no life to be put at risk simply due to lack of money,” he added.

- [Cuneta urges Robredo to reconsider 2028 plans](#) (2026-04-29 16:10)

ACTOR and singer Sharon Cuneta called on former vice president and Naga City Mayor Leni Robredo to reconsider her plan not to run for president in 2028. Cuneta is the wife of Sen. Francis Pangilinan, Robredo’s running mate in the 2022 national polls. “Dearest Ma’am Leni, please reconsider... You are the one who can unite these different parties. You have proven that you can fight for the Philippines,” she wrote on Instagram. Cuneta, known to her fans as “the Megastar,” urged Robredo not only to run for president, but also to pick a “great” vice

presidential candidate. “Please choose a great VP, ideally from where you will garner more support than ever before, and Kiko and I will go all-out for you,” she said. She said Robredo’s supporters, known as the “kakampinks” because of the former vice president’s fondness for the color, are waiting for her decision. Cuneta noted that support for Robredo is strongly gathering more than ever. “We are all storming the heavens with our prayers for you to change your mind and run once more... just one more time, Ma’am, for President,” Cuneta said. Robredo earlier said that she would not run for a higher position in 2028 and instead would be seeking reelection as Naga City mayor.

- [Russian yacht, cruise ships ferry Filipino seafarers out of Gulf](#) (2026-04-29 16:09)

(UPDATE) A RUSSIAN superyacht trapped in the Gulf by the Middle East war carried stranded Filipino seafarers out through the perilous Strait of Hormuz, the government said Tuesday. The Russia-flagged Nord, a 142-meter (466-foot)-long yacht reportedly linked to the Russian billionaire Alexei Mordashov, passed the strait on Saturday, the Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) said in a statement. On board the yacht and a bulk cargo ship that also passed that day "were 36 Filipino seafarers, bringing the total Filipino crew of vessels out of the Strait to close to 1,200," it added. The department's Secretary Hans Leo Cacdac earlier said that about 800 of them had been taken through the strait in cruise ships that escaped the strait with passengers. Maritime trackers indicated that several cruise ships managed to make it through the route on April 18, after Iran briefly announced it was lifting its closure of the strait in the war. Cacdac said 15 other Filipino seafarers were on board two container ships that were later seized by Iranian forces on April 22: the Epaminondas and the Francesca. "We have been assured that all 15 Filipino seafarers are safe, unharmed, and it will be a matter of time for their ships to be cleared," he said.

- [PhilHealth urged to offer free vaccines](#) (2026-04-29 16:08)

A HEALTH expert urged the Philippine Health Insurance Corp. (PhilHealth) to consider offering free vaccinations to its members, stressing that preventive care could help reduce long-term health care costs. Brian Posadas, vice president of the Philippine Foundation for Vaccination, said the state insurer should expand its focus from covering specific vaccines to making immunization more accessible through free vaccination programs. “We sincerely hope PhilHealth would start considering giving free vaccines as well to partners because that is how we can protect the country,” Posadas said in a press briefing. Posadas noted that vaccination rates among adults in the country remain low, partly due to high out-of-pocket costs and limited access, especially in remote areas. Unlike childhood immunizations under the government’s National Immunization Program, adult vaccination lacks comprehensive monitoring and support. Posadas said expanding preventive programs through PhilHealth could help address vaccine hesitancy and improve overall public health outcomes. “Let’s not just look at it as an initial cost. Let’s look at it as prevention for further complications that could cause more harm,” he added. Posadas also highlighted the need for better health data systems, noting that there is no comprehensive data tracking of adult immunization in the country. “The sad reality

is there's no statistical data that really monitors adult vaccination," Posadas said during a press briefing. "Even with pediatric vaccines, coverage is already low — much more so for adults." He attributed this gap to structural challenges, including limited access to vaccines and the absence of systematic reporting mechanisms for adult immunization. In many cases, even health care providers struggle to maintain consistent records. Meanwhile, Dr. Lulu Bravo, executive director of the Philippine Foundation for Vaccination, said that public interest in vaccines tends to rise only during health scares, such as disease outbreaks or high-profile deaths. "The vaccination rates are increasing if there's an alert. And then, it dies very slowly," she said. The health experts urged stronger preventive health care policies by reducing the out-of-pocket expenses of patients to drive up vaccination rates.

- [Government boosts 110,000 Filipino workers with emergency aid](#) (2026-04-29 16:07)

MORE than 110,000 disadvantaged and displaced Filipino workers are set to receive a timely boost on Labor Day as the government rolls out emergency employment assistance through the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE). A total of 111,418 beneficiaries will receive over P797 million in wage payouts as part of nationwide Labor Day activities, providing immediate financial relief to workers and families affected by income disruption. The payout is part of Labor Day activities, which aim to give relief to workers and families grappling with job loss, underemployment and unstable incomes. For many, the assistance comes at a critical time — offering not just short-term work, but a lifeline amid rising living costs and economic uncertainty. The initiative underscores the government's push to bring government aid to vulnerable sectors, especially those hit hardest by recent disruptions. Among the beneficiaries are 538 drivers under the newly launched Tupad Tuloy Pasada Program to support transport workers affected by income losses linked to the energy emergency. The program has already reached hundreds of jeepney drivers, helping them cope with reduced earnings and rising fuel costs, the DOLE said. Beyond cash-for-work, DOLE is also backing the nationwide rollout of Kadiwa ng Pangulo in 47 sites, where affordable food and essential goods are sold directly from producers. The effort aims to ease the burden on both workers and consumers by cutting costs, and improving access to basic commodities, it added. To support these operations, hundreds of Tupad workers will be deployed, generating more than P1 million in additional wages. Also, the Labor department is strengthening interagency efforts, teaming up with the Department of Agriculture to assist 10,000 farmers affected by El Niño. Farmers in regions including the Cordillera Administrative Region, Central Luzon, Calabarzon, Mimaropa, Zamboanga and Caraga will receive emergency jobs and livelihood support. The program not only provides immediate income but also helps rehabilitate irrigation systems and promote climate-resilient farming practices. Tupad remains DOLE's frontline response for vulnerable workers — offering short-term employment lasting 10 to 30 days to help beneficiaries meet urgent needs.

- [QCPD hunts down suspects in deadly QC shooting](#) (2026-04-29 16:06)

(UPDATE) THE Quezon City Police District (QCPD) confirmed on Wednesday that two victims in a Timog Avenue shooting incident died while undergoing treatment, prompting a manhunt for

the motorcycle-riding perpetrators. QCPD director BGen. Glenn Randy Silvio identified the victims as alias Norberto, 51, and alias Ceferino, 75, both city residents. The latter was reportedly a businessman and the former the head of an organization involved with nightclubs and karaoke bars. Silvio said they are conducting a manhunt operation for the two men on a motorcycle who peppered the victims' white Suzuki sedan with bullets Tuesday afternoon at the corner of EDSA and Timog Avenue, Barangay Sacred Heart, in the city. LtCol. Zachary Capellan of QCPD Police Station 10 said investigators found at least 12 bullet holes in the windshield and the car's body during the crime scene investigation. "The QCPD is also coordinating with the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority, as our investigators are now reviewing available CCTV (closed-circuit television) footage," Silvio said. An initial police investigation showed that the victims sustained multiple gunshot wounds in the attack by two motorcycle-riding men wearing helmets and casual clothing; the back rider was the triggerman. A manhunt and a thorough investigation are ongoing to catch the suspects and establish the motive for the crime.

- [Filipino Hajj pilgrims to benefit from 'luggage-free' program](#) (2026-04-29 16:05)

THE National Commission on Muslim Filipinos (NCMF) has announced a major logistical improvement for Filipino pilgrims participating in the 2026 Hajj, introducing a "luggage-free" travel system in coordination with Saudi authorities. In an advisory dated April 27, the NCMF, through its Bureau of Pilgrimage and Endowment (BPE), confirmed that the initiative — officially known as the "Hajj Without Luggage" program — will be implemented in partnership with Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Hajj and Umrah. Under the new system, checked baggage will no longer need to be claimed at the airport upon arrival in Madinah. Instead, luggage will be collected directly from the airport and transported to the pilgrims' designated hotels. Officials say the program will reduce congestion at arrival terminals and allow pilgrims to proceed more quickly to their accommodations, minimizing fatigue after long international travel. "This initiative allows pilgrims to focus more on their spiritual journey rather than logistical concerns," the advisory noted. To ensure proper handling, each pilgrim will be issued two official luggage stickers corresponding to the two allowed checked bags. These stickers will contain essential identification details that Saudi authorities require. Pilgrims are instructed to place the stickers clearly and visibly on their baggage before check-in to avoid delays or misplacement. With luggage arriving separately, the NCMF emphasized the importance of keeping essential items in hand-carry bags. These include passports and visa documents, travel permits and official IDs, cash, wallets and credit cards, prescription medications and a change of clothes and basic toiletries. The Philippines sends thousands of Muslim pilgrims annually to participate in Hajj, one of the five pillars of Islam. The new program reflects broader efforts by Saudi Arabia to modernize pilgrimage logistics and enhance the overall experience for international pilgrims. The NCMF expressed confidence that the initiative will contribute to a smoother, safer and more organized Hajj season for Filipino participants in 2026. SEN. Bong Go led Tuesday the recognition of Filipino para-athletes during the 13th Asean Para Games Official Awarding of Incentives at the Rizal Memorial Sports Complex. The event followed the country's strong performance at the Asean Para Games 2026, held from Jan. 20 to 26 in Thailand. The Philippine delegation secured a total of 134 medals, including 45 gold, 37 silver and 52 bronze." By returning home with 134 medals, you have proven once again that there is no obstacle to a heart that is determined, disciplined and willing to fight for the country," said Go in his keynote speech. "You are not just medal winners — you are an inspiration to the Filipino people." Go, who chairs the Senate Committee on Sports, emphasized the role of athletics in nation-building and youth development, calling for stronger collaboration among stakeholders to further elevate Philippine sports. Go stressed the urgency of passing Senate Bill (SB) 1743, which seeks to amend Republic Act 10699. It aims to upgrade and equalize incentives for para-athletes, aligning their benefits with those received by able-bodied athletes. The measure has already been approved on third reading in the Senate. Go urged the House of Representatives to act swiftly." This has already passed the Senate, so I call on our colleagues in Congress to pass this into law," he said. "The government should recognize and support them equally." The senator said equalizing incentives is a matter of fairness and a recognition of the sacrifices made by para-athletes who bring honor to the country. Go added that the Supreme Court had affirmed its ruling directing the Philippine Amusement and Gaming Corp. and the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office to remit a portion of their revenues to fund the Philippine Sports Commission (PSC). The move is expected to strengthen financial support for national athletes. During the event, Go acknowledged key sports officials, including Michael Barredo, Godofredo Custodio II and PSC Chairman Patrick Gregorio, along with commissioners Olivia "Bong" Coo, Edward Hayco, Matthew Gaston, Walter Torres and Guillermo Iroy. Go is the author and co-sponsor of Republic Act 11470, which established the National Academy of Sports (NAS) in New Clark City. The institution provides a dual-track system combining secondary education with specialized sports training for student-athletes. Go also filed SB 171, or the proposed NAS Regional Expansion Act of 2025, which seeks to establish similar academies across the country.

- [Gatchalian flags fuel aid anomalies](#) (2026-04-29 16:03)

SOCIAL Welfare Secretary Rex Gatchalian claimed that about P2.7 billion could have been misallocated under the guise of financial subsidy for the motorcycle taxi riders. Gatchalian made the allegation during a hearing of the House Committee on Transportation chaired by Quezon City Rep. Franz Pumaren earlier this week. He cited inconsistencies, which he called the presence of "ghost riders" on the beneficiary list. Lawmakers have pressed both the concerned government agencies and transport network companies (TNCs) to comment on the matter. Gatchalian stressed that the absence of a verified beneficiary list prior to payout was unusual. In the previous payouts, the dataset was sourced from external entities, including the Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board, and TNCs. Gatchalian called for a return to enforced manual verification that requires beneficiaries to appear in person and present valid identification before disbursement. To date, the Department of Social Welfare and

Development said that about 20 percent of listed beneficiaries have yet to claim their aid, fueling suspicions that some entries may not correspond to real individuals. Motorcycle rights advocate Jobert Bolaños, in an interview with the members of the Quezon City Press Club on Wednesday, challenged the explanation of mere data discrepancies, telling lawmakers that the scale points to deliberate over-declaration. Bolaños cited one platform that allegedly submitted over 200,000 rider entries despite having a declared cap of only around 15,000 — suggesting the presence of “ghost riders.” He warned that if each questionable entry received P5,000, the potential exposure could reach P1 billion. Even after data cleaning, the number of listed riders still far exceeds platform limits, indicating systemic flaws in data submission and oversight, he pointed out. Pumaren called for a deeper probe to determine accountability.

THE number of Filipinos who said they are poor and hungry remained almost the same in the first quarter of 2026, a survey conducted by OCTA Research showed. In its Tugon ng Masa survey conducted from March 19 to 25, Filipinos who said that they were poor declined slightly to 35 percent, equivalent to 9.2 million families, down 2 percent from the 37 percent or 9.8 million families in the previous quarter. However, OCTA noted that the difference is not “statistically significant” and is within the survey’s margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent, which suggests that overall poverty conditions remained stable. Broken down by regions, self-rated poverty declined in the National Capital Region (NCR) and Mindanao by 12 and 11 points, respectively, at 21 percent and 56 percent, while self-rated poverty increased in Balance Luzon and Visayas by 3 and 4 percentage points at 25 percent and 44 percent. Self-rated poverty remains more pronounced among lower-income households, with 58 percent of Socioeconomic Class E families considering themselves poor. Meanwhile, self-rated food poverty, or the inability of households to secure sufficient and nutritious food on a regular basis, rose slightly to 31 percent, or around 8.1 million families, from 30 percent in the previous quarter, which is also not statistically significant, according to OCTA. Mindanao had the highest incidence of self-rated food poverty at 53 percent, while the NCR is at the lowest at 12 percent, a 41-point regional gap. Self-rated hunger also increased slightly to 17 percent of Filipino families, compared to 16 percent in the previous quarter, but OCTA noted that 82 percent of affected families reported experiencing hunger only once or a few times, suggesting that hunger remained more episodic than chronic. Visayas had the highest self-rated hunger at 26 percent, followed by Mindanao and Balance Luzon. The results, OCTA said, point to a “pattern of shallow but fragile stabilization,” with households appearing marginally less likely to describe themselves as poor, but not materially more food secure. “This suggests that while economic sentiment may have improved modestly, household resilience remained weak and highly exposed to price shocks, particularly in food and transport. The broader pattern is not one of broad-based recovery, but of fragile stabilization,” OCTA said. It said that the findings reflect household conditions prior to the wider inflationary effects of the oil price shock associated with the conflict in the Middle East. “As such, the March 2026 results may be best understood as a pre-shock baseline, before higher transport and food costs began exerting

broader pressure on household welfare and food access,” OCTA said. The survey had 1,200 respondents and has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent.

MANILA, Philippines — The National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) on Wednesday authenticated the video wherein Vice President Sara Duterte made a kill remark against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., First Lady Liza Araneta-Marcos, and former Speaker and Leyte 1st District Rep. Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. During the House Committee on Justice's hearing on the impeachment complaints against Duterte, NBI Agent John Mark Calilung confirmed that the Nov. 23, 2024 video was authenticated under the NBI's Affidavit of Authentication of Digital Evidence which was attached to its Affidavit of Investigation submitted to the committee. "The authentication was an act of ensuring that the video was the same and true recording that happened. We ensured that it was not edited, spliced, or AI-generated", he said. AI stands for artificial intelligence. The verification process that Calilung outlined included coordinating with Meta Platforms to preserve the original uniform resource locator or URL, the livestream screen recording, and hash value computation. "The has value calculation is like the fingerprint of a digital file. If the video gets edited, the hash value will change," he said. When asked to confirm whether the video played during the hearing was from the copy that the NBI authenticated, he said, "Yes, Your Honor. It is part of the authenticated video". The committee later declared there was probable cause to impeach Duterte. The complaint filed by several people including priests alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayed public trust and committed high crimes "in contracting to murder or assassinate" Marcos, First Lady Liza Araneta Marcos, and former speaker and Leyte 1st District Rep. Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. The complaint cited a Nov. 23, 2024 briefing with the media wherein she said, "[...] may kinausap na ako na tao. Sinabi ko sa kanya kapag pinatay ako, patayin mo si BBM, si Liza Araneta, at si Martin Romualdez." Duterte has denied making an assassination threat against Marcos. The other complaint, filed by lawyer Nathaniel Cabrera, alleged that she "committed acts that constitute culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayal of public trust, and other high crimes, by publicly admitting the contracting of an assassin". Duterte's answer to the complaints said the complaints failed to show "any shred of proof" that a contract to kill ever existed. "Instead, complainants rely on exaggerated conclusions dressed up as fact", it read. The complaint filed by priests also alleged that Duterte betrayed public trust over alleged unexplained wealth. This was the complaint filed by priests and others. It also alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution and betrayed public trust in connection with

confidential funds allocated to the Office of the Vice President (OVP) for 2022 and 2023 and confidential funds allocated for 2023 to the Department of Education (DepEd) which she led as secretary before she resigned in 2024 from that post. Cabrera's complaint alleged that she "betrayed the public trust and committed acts of graft and corruption by grossly abusing discretionary authority over confidential funds appropriated to the" OVP and DepEd. "Absent any statement of ultimate facts in any of these Impeachment Complaints, there is nothing for respondent to answer. Respondent thus only admits averments therein insofar as they allege her election, assumption to the Office of the Vice President, appointment as Secretary of Education, and her prior offices as Mayor and Vice Mayor of Davao City", Duterte's answer to the complaints read. "The rest of the allegations, including the annexes and so-called evidence attached to the Impeachment Complaints, are specifically denied for being false, misleading, impertinent, and mere conclusions of fact and law", it read.

- [Defensor seeks Ombudsman's help to show 'missing' whistleblower in public](#) (2026-04-29 13:37)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Anakalusugan party-list congressman Michael "Mike" Defensor on Wednesday sought the help of Ombudsman Jesus Crispin Remulla to locate the whereabouts of ex-Marine Sergeant Orly Guteza, the surprise whistleblower on flood control corruption scandal. Defensor, who introduced Guteza to Sen. Rodante Marcoleta at the height of the Senate flood control inquiry, told the 'Pandosal Forum' at the Kamuning Bakery and Café in Quezon City on Wednesday that he and his family have been worried because they have lost contact with him since late last year. During the same press briefing, Defensor showed the copies of the criminal complaints that the anti-graft office was set to file reportedly next month before the anti-graft court, Sandiganbayan, against ex-House Speaker Martin Romualdez and fugitive – erstwhile Ako Bicol congressman Zaldy Co - for plunder, among others. Praising Remulla for his courage and determination to push through with the filing of cases against Romualdez - President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s first cousin and current Leyte representative – and Co, Defensor said that he was felt vindicated because the affidavits presented by Guteza as well as the former 18 Marine members form huge part of the plunder complaint. "I was really surprised upon reading it (complaint) that was already certified to be true to see their sworn statements, which indicated of their participation in bringing several suitcases loaded with money to Romualdez, form part of the Ombudsman's complaints," said Defensor, also a former environment and natural resources secretary. Technically, Defensor said, Guteza would be already on the Ombudsman's side. "That is why, I am now appealing to Ombudsman Remulla to help us locate him (Guteza) as his family was already worried as he has no longer been communicating with them since the last time or several months ago when he was at the Senate for a supposed hearing that did not take place," Defensor said. Asked about the whereabouts of the former 18 Marines, the former lawmaker - nephew of late senator Miriam Defensor Santiago – said they have been in hiding with their respective family while receiving support and assistance from "our group." Like Guteza, Defensor said he was told by them that they were also ready to come out again if the Ombudsman would ask for more details from

them, specifically on their alleged involvement in delivering suitcases loaded with money to Romualdez. Back to Guteza, Defensor said the Ombudsman, at his disposal and influence, could be able to locate and protect him and his family. “For the longest time, I kept silent but I’m now appealing to him (Remulla) and since his (Guteza) affidavits were already used by the Ombudsman in the complaints to be filed against Romualdez and Co, he must be shown in public to erase our suspicions and fears,” said Defensor, also a former Malacanang chief of staff. At the same press conference, Defensor played a phone conversation between Guteza and his wife, which happened late last year, with which he expressed fear of his life while revealing that he was made to sign another affidavit, apparently by government authorities, to say that he was paid by him (Defensor) and Marcoleta and that he never delivered suitcases of money to Romualdez. Asked about the case of his wife and daughter in connection with the raid conducted by the National Bureau of Investigation at the Bleu Hotel in Pasig City, Defensor maintained his position as per lawyer’s advice not to comment about it since he was not the one that was directly involved. “It was already a legal matter and we let our lawyers do the job but life is really like that especially when you are talking about corruption involving those in the government, which are political matters, so to speak, but it was unfortunate that even personal matters like family are being involved,” he lamented. He, however, did not elaborate.

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippines and Thailand underscored the need to pursue peaceful means in resolving the border dispute between Bangkok and Phnom Penh, Foreign Affairs Secretary Ma. Theresa Lazaro said. Lazaro on Wednesday said she had a “productive meeting” with Thai Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sihasak Phuangketkeow in Brunei. “Together, we are working toward a more peaceful, stable, prosperous and resilient Asean community,” Lazaro wrote on X. The two officials discussed the bilateral border issue between Thailand and Cambodia. Both members of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean), Cambodia and Thailand share a 800-kilometer land border which has been a source of political tensions. Home to about 700 million people, the Asean is composed of Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Timor-Leste, Thailand, and Vietnam. Thailand in July 2025 launched airstrikes against Cambodian military targets along their long-disputed border. Military clashes in multiple areas along the border killed civilians in Thailand. “I emphasized the readiness of the Philippines as Asean chair[man] to offer its good offices to help create a space for constructive dialogue between Thailand and Cambodia,” Lazaro said. In a statement last year, the Department of Foreign Affairs clarified that the Philippines “does not take any position on this dispute but underscores the importance of maintaining open lines of communication and ensuring the de-escalation of the situation.” They also exchanged views on important regional issues, from Myanmar developments to combating transnational crime. “I underscored the Philippines’ commitment to play an active coordinating role in the Asean Observer Team,” Lazaro said.

- [Imee Marcos presses DA to fast-track fuel support for fisherfolk amid rising fuel costs](#) (2026-04-29 13:22)

MANILA, Philippines — Sen. Imee Marcos has urged the Department of Agriculture (DA) to fast-track the rollout of fuel assistance for fisherfolk affected by the oil crisis triggered by the conflict in the Middle East. The senator made the appeal on Wednesday during the resumption of the Proactive Response and Oversight for Timely and Effective Crisis Strategy (PROTECT) Committee hearing on the government's readiness to address a potential fuel crisis. Marcos cited earlier discussions with the DA on a proposed P10-per-liter fuel voucher for agricultural transport workers and fisherfolk. "That discussion has already been running for almost two and a half months. Are we already acting on it?" Marcos asked DA Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr.. "Last time, you said it was up for review. Two and a half months without sufficient income is a heavy burden for our fisherfolk," she added in Filipino. Laurel responded that requests for fuel assistance vary by region and sector, with some areas proposing targeted voucher programs while others are seeking alternative forms of support. He also cited ongoing coordination with other agencies, including discussions on possible price adjustments in the canned sardine industry in Zamboanga, as part of broader efforts to boost fisherfolk income. Laurel said the DA is awaiting the release of around P6 billion from the Department of Budget and Management to fund various agricultural assistance programs, including fuel subsidies. He assured Marcos that the program will proceed once funding is released, with implementation targeted in the coming weeks.

MANILA, Philippines — Sagip Rep. Paolo Henry Marcoleta mistakenly attributed a movie quote to a character portrayed by John Lloyd Cruz during the resumption of the House Committee on Justice hearing on the impeachment complaints against Vice President Sara Duterte. The incident occurred while the panel was discussing whether to open a box containing the income tax returns (ITRs) of Duterte and her husband, Manases Carpio. "I dare the committee to open the box, but with a caveat: make sure you are not violating the law," Marcoleta said in a mix of Filipino and English. "And Popoy said in the movie, 'I deserve an explanation. I deserve an acceptable reason.' Make sure that if you open it, you have an acceptable reason that is in accordance with the law," he added. However, "Popoy" is a character played by Cruz in the film *One More Chance*, while the quote cited by Marcoleta actually comes from the character Marco Villanueva, portrayed by Piolo Pascual, in the film *Starting Over Again*.

I apologize that we cannot name the names of those individuals that we are following but we are zeroing [in] on several individuals already who might have been who she talked to...", Matibag told the House Committee on Justice. MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Wednesday met with French Ambassador to the Philippines Marie Fontanel, and the Czech Chargé d'affaires Eva Tenzin to discuss the situation of fugitive former lawmaker Zaldy Co. In a statement, the Presidential Communications Office (PCO) said that Marcos expressed disappointment at the whole situation with Co and that despite the Philippines' earnest efforts, he remained at large in Europe. The PCO said Marcos requested for further information as to what transpired and why Co was released from custody by the Czech authorities. "Nonetheless, the President is confident of the strength of our bilateral relations with France and the Czech Republic that is grounded on shared values, including respect for the rule of law," the PCO said. "Moving forward, he remains hopeful of future police, legal and judicial cooperation, so that once and for all Zaldy Co is brought back to PH to face justice," it added.

- [Metro Manila air quality returns to pre-landfill fire levels as pollution decreases —PhilSA](#) (2026-04-29 09:05)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippine Space Agency (PhilSA) reported that the air pollution reported across Metro Manila caused by the Navotas Sanitary Landfill fire has since decreased and air quality has returned to its pre-fire levels. In a statement Wednesday, PhilSA said the daily monitoring of its satellite data showed that since the fire broke out, the levels of nitrogen dioxide have decreased and were now comparable to baseline readings recorded before the fire. "Observations are consistent with measurements on the ground by EMB NCR (Environmental Management Bureau - National Capital Region) and Central Luzon that particulate matter or PM over Metro Manila has improved on Tuesday (28 April) and Wednesday (29 April)," the agency said. PhilSA further noted that, based on its satellite image captured on April 26, the burnt area was estimated to be a total of 31.95 hectares. They noted, however, that the number did not account for the actively burning area. PhilSA added that it would continue to monitor the situation to assess response efforts and advised the public to follow updates from health authorities.

- [House panel finds probable cause to impeach Duterte](#) (2026-04-29 08:39)

MANILA, Philippines — The House of Representatives' Committee on Justice declared the existence of probable cause to impeach Vice President Sara Duterte. Fifty-three lawmakers supported the motion to declare that probable cause existed in the two impeachment complaints. The committee will prepare its report, the resolution, and articles of impeachment. The committee will have another hearing on May 4, 2026. Under the 1987 Constitution, the committee must submit a report "with the corresponding resolution" to the House within 60 session days from referral of the impeachment complaint. Under the Constitution, the House must calendar the resolution for consideration within 10 session days from receipt. "A vote of at least one-third of all the Members of the House shall be necessary either to affirm a favorable resolution with the Articles of Impeachment of the Committee, or override its contrary resolution. The vote of each Member shall be recorded", the Constitution read. Under the Constitution, only the House has the power to initiate impeachment cases and only the Senate can conduct an impeachment trial.

- [FA50 fighter jets no show in Balikatan anti-drone drills 'for safety' — Air Force](#) (2026-04-29 08:10)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippine Air Force's (PAF) FA-50 fighter jets which were confirmed to be participating in the anti-drone drills in San Antonio, Zambales were a no-show at the exercise. Held at the Naval Station Leovigildo Gantioqui, San Antonio Zambales, the PAF and the United States Marine Corps (USMC) held a four-day Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) demonstration from April 26-29 showcasing the combined capabilities of the two militaries to detect and intercept hostile aerial threats such as drones, helicopters and low-lying fixed wing aircraft. In the exercise, the USMC brought in powerful air defense capabilities such as the Marine Air Defense Integrated System, Vampire Laser System and the Avenger Air Defense System all designed to knock down threats in the airspace. The FA50s participated in the counter-landing live fire drills held on the beaches of Aporawan, Palawan on April 27 but were not seen in the Zambales airspace. "Due to the safety protocols, live aircraft will not be used since we are dealing with a live missile that shoots in the air," Maj. Richmond Jan Cayabyab, battery commander of the Philippine Air Force's Surface-to-air Python and Derby (Spyder) air defense system told reporters covering the anti-drone wargames. Col. Xerxes Trinidad, AFP Public Affairs chief, further clarified that in an air defense or air missile defense scenario, safety protocols must be observed. "And as you could see, our presentation only [featured] adversarial drones flown over as targets of our weapon system, our missile defense system," Trinidad said. He clarified that it was the planners who could best answer why the FA50s were not used in the exercise but stressed that the whole point of the IAMD is basically ground to air protection courtesy of the shore-based missile systems. The PAF currently operates the FA-50 and A-29 Super Tucano turboprop light attack aircraft. The FA-50s are a supersonic light combat aircraft that serves as its primary fighter providing air defense, interdiction and maritime patrol capabilities.

- [Pag-IBIG Fund home loan releases up 9% to ₱32.92B in Q1 2026](#) (2026-04-29 07:27)

MANILA, Philippines — Some P32.92 billion in housing loans has been released in the first quarter of 2026, nine percent higher from last year's P30.22 billion in the same period, the Home Development Mutual Fund (HDMF) or Pag-IBIG Fund revealed on Wednesday. Actively expanding access to home financing for Filipino workers without let-up, Pag-IBIG has financed 20,926 homes from January to March 2026, also higher than the 20,315 homes financed in the first quarter of 2025, CEO Marilene Acosta said. Acosta said that out of the allocated funds, socialized housing loans accounted for P2.95 billion which financed 3,439 homes, up 68 percent in amount and 92 percent in number of units from the same period last year. She stressed that the agency remained focused on helping members own homes through monthly payments they could afford while keeping it strong for future borrowers. Instead of spending on rent, our members are able to make payments toward a home they can call their own," Acosta said. "The amount they save from lower monthly payments can then go to food, education, daily needs, and even to their Pag-IBIG Regular Savings and MP2 Savings. This matters most for our members from lower-income sectors, which is why we are glad to see more of them benefit through socialized housing," she added. Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) Secretary Jose Ramon Aliling, who accompanied President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. when he visited housing projects financed by Pag-IBIG Fund last week, cited the continuing efforts of the administration to make decent homes more accessible to Filipino families under the expanded 'Pambansang Pabahay para sa Pilipino' (4PH) program. Aliling noted that the higher home loan releases would show the progress being made in carrying out the President's directive to expand access to homeownership while also helping stimulate economic activity through housing production. "The efforts of the Marcos administration are bearing fruit. More Filipino workers are now gaining access to decent homes, and this is a clear step forward in fulfilling President Marcos' directive to make homeownership within reach of more families," Aliling said. "Housing also creates jobs, supports construction and allied industries, and helps drive economic activity. As the expanded 4PH program continues to provide greater affordability, we expect even more opportunities for homeownership to open for our members, especially those from underserved sectors. This is 'Bagong Pilipinas' in action," the housing czar pointed out. Acosta, in a statement emailed to The Manila Times, was all praises for the responsible member-borrowers who have been cited for the continued growth of the agency. "We thank them for keeping their accounts updated, because through their discipline, we are able to help more Filipino families own a home," Acosta said.

MANILA, Philippines — The Ateneo de Manila University led all Philippine universities in the latest Times Higher Education (THE) Asia University Rankings for 2026. Ateneo ranked 501-600th

place, followed by De La Salle University, Mapua University, University of Santo Tomas, and University of the Philippines in the 601-800th place bracket. Mindanao State University-Iligan Institute of Technology (MSU-IIT) was the only regional university to be ranked in the list, scoring at the 801+ bracket. Meanwhile, 42 Filipino universities attained "reporter" status, or those who reported their rankings to THE, a 121 percent increase from the previous year. According to the Commission on Higher Education, the high number of universities reporting their metrics to THE reflects a stronger participation in global benchmarking and more robust institutional data systems. "These rankings affirm that Philippine higher education institutions are steadily gaining ground in the global academic community. More importantly, they highlight the growing commitment of our universities to quality, transparency, and international engagement," CHed Chairman Shirley Agrupis said.

MANILA, Philippines — The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), together with the United States Armed Forces, Australian Defense Force, and New Zealand Defense Force, simulated coastline defenses against enemy amphibious landings. Led by the Philippine Marine Corps' 3rd Marine Brigade, the activity called Counter-Landing Live Fire Exercise (CLLFX-West) was held at the Apurawan Beach Landing Site in Aborlan, Palawan as part of Exercise Balikatan 41-2026. "The exercise simulated a maritime threat involving an enemy amphibious landing along the coastline, showcasing combined forces' capability to detect, disrupt, and deny hostile elements from establishing a beachhead," the AFP said in a statement on Tuesday. "The activity demonstrated strong coordination and interoperability among participating forces in a complex littoral environment," the AFP said, a day after the drills. The exercise highlighted a layered, multi-domain defense employing synchronized air, land, and indirect fire assets. The Philippine Air Force (PAF) deployed its FA-50 fighter jets for air interdiction while US forces provided High Mobility Artillery Rocket System (HIMARS) capabilities. Ground forces executed mid- to close-range engagements using artillery, mortars, light armored vehicles, anti-armor systems, heavy machine guns, and infantry weapons, supported by precision strikes and reconnaissance. Simultaneously, a simulated Non-Combatant Evacuation Operation was conducted in Sitio Bubusawin and Sitio Long Point, alongside a community outreach activity in coordination with the local government of Aborlan and Barangay Apurawan, underscoring the AFP's role in both defense and humanitarian operations. Gen. Romeo S. Brawner Jr, AFP chief of staff, witnessed the live fire exercises, together with Vice Admiral Alan M Javier, head of the Western Command.

- [Marcos announces expansion of PhilHealth maternity benefits](#) (2026-04-29 04:41)

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Wednesday announced expanded maternity benefits under Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) starting April 30, 2026. In a video message, Marcos said the expanded coverage included higher benefits for normal and cesarean deliveries, prenatal check-ups and postnatal care coverage. For normal deliveries, the President said that PhilHealth coverage would be raised to P29,000 from

P9,750. PhilHealth coverage for cesarean deliveries would also be increased from P37,000 to P58,000 up to P62,000, he added.

- [House panel votes against opening boxes containing ITRs of Sara, husband](#) (2026-04-29 04:34)

MANILA, Philippines — Voting 38-6, the justice committee at the House of Representatives decided against opening the boxes that contained the Income Tax Returns (ITRs) of Vice President Sara Duterte and her husband, Manases Carpio. The committee had subpoenaed the ITRs for its hearing on the impeachment complaints against the vice president but decided to leave the boxes unopened until it has determined whether there was probable cause to impeach Duterte. The vice president was a no show again at the resumption of the deliberations on the two impeachment complaints against her at the House of Representatives on Wednesday. Despite this, the Committee on Justice directed its secretariat to call Duterte's name "to extend to her the continuing opportunity to present her evidence, including counter-evidence and clarificatory questions through the Justice members," said Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro, the committee chairman. The committee is conducting the hearing to determine whether there is probable cause to impeach Duterte. The committee was set to tackle her "kill" remarks against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and two others. The complaint filed by several people, including clergy, alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayed public trust and committed high crimes "in contracting to murder or assassinate" the president, first lady Liza Araneta Marcos, and former speaker Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. The complaint cited a Nov. 23, 2024 briefing with the media wherein she said, "[...] may kinausap na ako na tao. Sinabi ko sa kanya kapag pinatay ako, patayin mo si BBM, si Liza Araneta, at si Martin Romualdez (I have spoken to someone. I told him that if I were killed, to kill BBM, Liza Araneta and Martin Romualdez)." BBM is the monicker for Bongbong Marcos. Duterte denied making the threat. The other complaint, filed by lawyer Nathaniel Cabrera, alleged that she "committed acts that constitute culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayal of public trust, and other high crimes, by publicly admitting the contracting of an assassin". Duterte said the complaints failed to show "any shred of proof" that a contract to kill ever existed. "Instead, complainants rely on exaggerated conclusions dressed up as fact," it read. The complaint filed by clergy and several others also alleged that Duterte betrayed public trust over alleged unexplained wealth. It also alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution and betrayed public trust in connection with confidential funds allocated to the Office of the Vice President (OVP) for 2022 and 2023 and confidential funds allocated for 2023 to the Department of Education (DepEd) which she led as secretary before she resigned in 2024 from that post. Cabrera's complaint alleged that she "betrayed the public trust and committed acts of graft and corruption by grossly abusing discretionary authority over confidential funds appropriated to the" OVP and DepEd. "Absent any statement of ultimate facts in any of these Impeachment Complaints, there is nothing for respondent to answer. Respondent thus only admits averments therein insofar as they allege her election, assumption to the Office of the Vice President, appointment as Secretary of Education, and her prior offices as Mayor and Vice

Mayor of Davao City," Duterte countered."The rest of the allegations, including the annexes and so-called evidence attached to the Impeachment Complaints, are specifically denied for being false, misleading, impertinent, and mere conclusions of fact and law," it read.Under the 1987 Constitution, only the House has the power to initiate impeachment cases and only the Senate can conduct an impeachment trial.Luistro has said that what the hearing was not a trial. In a press conference, she said that "this hearing, clarificatory hearing, is intended for the determination of probable cause, not for the purpose of determining the guilt or innocence of the respondent."

- [Police launch manhunt for suspects in Quezon City shooting which left 2 dead](#) (2026-04-29 04:14)

MANILA, Philippines — The Quezon City Police District (QCPD) on Wednesday confirmed that the two victims in a shooting incident the day before died while undergoing treatment as manhunt operations were launched against the motorcycle-riding perpetrators.BGen. Glenn Randy Silvio, QCPD director, identified the victims as alias Norberto, 51; and alias Ceferino, 75, both residents. Ceferino was said to be a known businessman and former head of an organization engaged in nightclubs and karaoke bars.Silvio said they have been conducting manhunt operations against the two assailants who shot at the white Suzuki vehicle with the victims on board on Tuesday afternoon at the corner of EDSA and Timog Avenue, Barangay Sacred Heart.At least 12 bullet holes in the windshield and the car's body were found during an inspection at the crime scene, Lt. Col. Zachary Capellan of the Police Station 10 said. "The QCPD is also coordinating with the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority as our investigators are now reviewing available CCTV (closed-circuit television) footages," Silvio said.Investigation showed that the victims sustained multiple gunshot wounds in the attack.The identities of the killers, their whereabouts and motive have not been established, the police chief said.

- [Vico Sotto taps engineering students, civil society groups to help audit infrastructure projects](#) (2026-04-29 02:14)

MANILA, Philippines — Pasig City Mayor Vico Sotto launched a program tapping engineering students and civil society organizations to help audit local infrastructure projects for quality and transparency.Sotto said on Wednesday that the Citizen Monitoring of Infrastructure Projects would allow students from Rizal Technological University and CSOs to watch over both the city government and contractors handling Pasig projects. "Our CSOs and RTU engineering students will watch over the government and the contractors in the LGU' s projects, exciting right?" he said.Sotto said the program came after Pasig' s reforms lowered contract prices, raising a new challenge of guarding against contractors who submit very low bids but later deliver substandard or incomplete work. "The next challenge, what if contractor-bidders dive, but their plan is actually to do substandard or insufficient work?" Sotto said.Sotto said third-party monitoring would help ensure that infrastructure projects were not only properly priced, but also responsive to public needs and built with the right quality.

- [Fire hits residential area in Muntinlupa, reaches third alarm](#) (2026-04-29 02:08)

MANILA, Philippines — Fire hit a residential area in Muntinlupa City reached third alarm as firefighters continued to battle the blaze on Wednesday morning. Mayor Ruffy Biazon said the blaze at Purok 2 in Barangay Sucat was raised to first alarm at 6:51 a.m., second alarm at 7:21 a.m., and third alarm at 8:05 a.m., according to the Muntinlupa City Department of Disaster Resilience and Management and the Bureau of Fire Protection. Biazon said village and BFP firefighters immediately responded to the fire after it was raised to first alarm. He said he was monitoring the emergency response operations of the concerned units, including the BFP, DRRMO, village officials, and volunteers, through the city's operations center and direct communication. Under the city's protocols, Biazon said the Social Service Department was also preparing assistance for affected residents. Authorities have yet to release details on the number of affected families, damaged houses, or possible injuries as of posting time.

- [Most parts of PH would experience generally fair weather](#) (2026-04-28 23:31)

MANILA, Philippines – The state-run weather agency said on Wednesday that most parts of the archipelago would be experiencing generally fair weather due to the easterlies. Weather forecaster Loredin dela Cruz-Galicia of the Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pagasa) said that any formation of a low-pressure area inside or outside the country's area of responsibility would be unlikely over the next two to three days. "The country would again be experiencing hot and humid weather throughout the day due to the prevailing easterly winds," the Pagasa forecaster said. However, the same weather system would likely bring partly cloudy to overcast skies with isolated rain showers or thunderstorms over Metro Manila and the rest of the country, especially in late afternoon or evening, Pagasa said. On the heat index forecast, Pagasa said Metro Manila would likely experience 39 degrees Celsius on Wednesday, which falls under the extreme caution category, and the highest could be recorded over Sangley Point, Cavite, at 43 degrees Celsius, which falls under the danger category. It has been reminding the public to limit outdoor activities, particularly when the sun's heat is at its peak, and stay hydrated.

- [Pasig shuts Bleu Hotel tied to former Rep. Defensor kin after trafficking raid](#) (2026-04-28 20:29)

MANILA, Philippines — The Pasig City government ordered the immediate closure of Bleu Hotel Pasig, an establishment allegedly linked to the wife and daughter of former Anakalugusan party-list Rep. Mike Defensor, after a National Bureau of Investigation raid over alleged human trafficking and prostitution. The city government confirmed the legitimacy of the closure order to The Manila Times on Tuesday evening, April 28. "Yes, this is legitimate," the Office of the City Administrator said. The order, dated April 27, was issued against Zerrin Dev't Corporation/Bleu Hotel Pasig, located at Cliffpoint Square in the Ortigas Home Depot Complex along J. Vargas Avenue in Ugong. The document said the April 21 NBI raid inside the premises resulted in the discovery of "serious illegal activities" involving human trafficking and the facilitation of prostitution. It said the alleged activities violated the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act and pertinent provisions of the Revised Penal Code. The city said the continuation of such

unlawful activities inside the establishment constituted a grave violation of the conditions of its business permit and registration with the Business Permit and Licensing Department. "Pending the resolution of the complaint by the Office of the City Prosecutor-Pasig and in the interest of public welfare and safety, this establishment, Zerrin Dev' t Corp./Bleu Hotel Pasig, is hereby ordered closed," the order read. The closure order took effect immediately. Bleu Hotel drew public attention after the NBI raid, which led to complaints over alleged violations of the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act and the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act. Julie Defensor, wife of the former lawmaker, earlier denied the allegations and said her family had no connection to the targeted establishment or its operations.

- [DFA: Co's regular and diplomatic passports had been canceled since December 2025](#) (2026-04-28 17:00)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) said it cancelled one regular and one diplomatic passport of former representative Elizaldy Co by virtue of a court order in December 2025. "This was immediately reported to Interpol (International Criminal Police Organization)," the DFA said in a statement on Tuesday. It issued the clarification as some quarters wondered about Co's ability to travel within Europe despite the reported cancellation of his passport. "With regard to his other regular passport which expired in September 2022 and which may have been used by Mr. Co to cross to Germany from the Czech Republic, this need not be cancelled since its expiration rendered it unusable for international travel," the DFA said. The Department of Justice (DOJ) confirmed that Co is no longer under the custody of Czech authorities after he was held for immigration violations. Acting DOJ Secretary Frederick Vida said the former Ako Bicol partylist representative was released after being accosted last April 16 and is now free somewhere in Europe. Vida said Co is believed to remain within the Schengen area, but Czech authorities declined to provide details on his whereabouts, citing data privacy rules and the bloc's open-border policies. Sen. Panfilo Lacson earlier said the government can tap a 2003 anti-corruption convention of the United Nations (UN) to locate and arrest Co. He said the UN Convention Against Corruption (UNCAC), which the Philippine Senate ratified in 2006, is a legally binding treaty that provides a framework for international cooperation against corruption. "One option the Philippine government may explore is to tap the UNCAC, where we are a signatory. Imagine, 192 countries signed the convention," Lacson said in Filipino and English. "If we tap the resources of 191 other countries, you can imagine how our efforts to locate and arrest Co will be easier," he said in a radio interview last year. The UNCAC's Article 38 mandates cooperation between state parties in investigating and prosecuting criminal offenses. He said the Ombudsman, Department of Justice and the DFA can study this option in seeking the help of other signatories to the convention. Lacson said this will complement the Philippines' request to the Interpol to issue a red notice against Co, whose passport had already been canceled by the DFA.

- [ICC picks judges for Duterte's trial](#) (2026-04-28 16:17)

(UPDATE) THE Presidency of the International Criminal Court (ICC) has constituted Trial Chamber III and referred the case of former president Rodrigo Duterte to it for trial, following the confirmation of charges issued on April 23. In a decision released Tuesday, the ICC Presidency said it acted pursuant to Article 61(11) of the Rome Statute and Rule 130 of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence, which require it to establish a trial chamber once charges have been confirmed and to transmit both the confirmation decision and the full record of proceedings to that chamber. The move came after Pre-Trial Chamber I confirmed charges against Duterte and committed him to trial on the specific counts detailed in its ruling. The Presidency said the complete case record, including the decision confirming the charges, had been transmitted by the ICC Registry in accordance with procedural rules governing the transition from pre-trial to trial stage. The Presidency said it took into account the court's current and anticipated workload, the need for efficient case management, judicial availability, prior involvement of judges in cases, and the experience and expertise of each member of the bench. The newly constituted Trial Chamber III is composed of Judges Joanna Korner, Keebong Paek, and Nicolas Guillou. Judge Korner is a British jurist with extensive experience in international criminal law and prosecution. Before joining the ICC, she served as a prosecutor at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY), handling cases involving war crimes and crimes against humanity. She also held senior prosecutorial roles in the United Kingdom, where she worked on complex criminal cases. At the ICC, she is known for her trial advocacy and judicial experience in international proceedings. Judge Keebong, on the other hand, is a South Korean judge with experience in domestic judiciary service and international legal frameworks. His work has involved criminal adjudication and cross-border legal cooperation, with a focus on evidentiary standards and comparative criminal procedure. At the ICC, he contributes to both pre-trial and trial functions of the Court. Judge Guillou is a French jurist who previously served in the French judiciary, with experience in criminal law, judicial administration, and international legal cooperation. At the ICC, he has handled complex proceedings requiring detailed review of extensive evidentiary records and procedural issues. While the case has been moved to the Trial Chamber, an exact start date has not yet been announced by the ICC judges. Under the Rome Statute, Duterte's presence at the trial is mandatory. While he waived his right to appear during the pre-trial and jurisdiction hearings, he will be required to be in the courtroom once the trial begins. The trial focuses on killings carried out between November 2011 and March 2019, covering his time as mayor of Davao City and his presidency. The prosecution has focused on 78 victims across 49 incidents, though they have said this is a non-exhaustive list and more evidence may be introduced during the trial. Duterte's legal team may continue filing various procedural appeals, but these are no longer capable of stopping the case from moving to the full trial stage.

- [Zaldy Co seeking asylum in France](#) (2026-04-28 16:15)

(UPDATE) FUGITIVE and former congressman Zaldy Co is now seeking political asylum in France on the grounds of “political persecution,” Malacañang said Tuesday. Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said Justice Secretary Fredderick Vida, who is currently in Prague, had reported to

President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. that Co was no longer under the custody of the Czech Republic. “Based on their high-level engagements with officials of the Czech Republic and representatives of the European Union, it is clear that the steps being taken are anchored in respect for existing EU laws and those of their respective member states,” Castro said during a press conference. “Such matters require a thorough diplomatic process and coordination at the highest level, and this is exactly what we have been doing since it was determined that he was being held by Czech authorities in connection with the use of invalid documentation. At present, it has been confirmed that Zaldy Co is no longer in the custody of the Czech authorities,” she added. Citing a “highly reliable” information from the Department of Foreign Affairs, Castro said that Co has a pending petition for political asylum in France. “He is now under the jurisdiction of French authorities,” Castro said. “All missions in Europe have been instructed to obtain further official confirmation,” she added. Castro said Co was claiming that he was being politically persecuted, which she denied. The Palace official also said the President was “disappointed” when he learned that Co was no longer in Prague. “He said... we should have brought Zaldy Co home soon,” she said. But Castro maintained the government did what it could to bring Co back to the country. She said the president has summoned the French ambassador to the Philippines and Czech charges d’affaires to a meeting in Malacañang on Wednesday, to discuss what the Philippines could have done and could still do to bring Co back to Manila. “We will work with foreign governments through every legal channel available under international laws to bring Zaldy Co home and face the graft and malversation cases filed against him,” she said. “We will do all of this following the law and the diplomatic process,” Castro added. Co, who has been declared a fugitive and ordered arrested by the Sandiganbayan, was accosted by Czech authorities on April 16 for violating immigration laws. Co, who chaired the House appropriations committee during Marcos’ first term, was charged by the Ombudsman in November 2025 with graft and nonbailable malversation over a multimillion-peso flood control project in Oriental Mindoro. He has been a fugitive since July 2025, when he left the Philippines purportedly for medical treatment in the United States. In a briefing from Prague that lasted nearly an hour, Vida said Co’s release was confirmed during a high-level meeting with officials from the Czech Ministry of Justice, Interior, and Foreign Affairs. “I have to share difficult news. Czech authorities have informed us that Mr. Co is no longer in their custody,” Vida said. Vida said Czech authorities clarified that Co had previously been under their jurisdiction, but had already exited custody by the time Philippine officials arrived in Prague. According to Vida, Czech officials pointed to the absence of an Interpol Red Notice as a critical factor behind Co’s release. The Philippine government had filed an application for a Red Notice in November 2025, but Interpol has not yet issued it. “A Red Notice would enable any member country to detain and return him through extradition or deportation. Without that, there are limitations,” Vida said. Under Interpol rules, a Red Notice is not an arrest warrant but a request for law enforcement worldwide to locate and provisionally detain a subject pending extradition, subject to national law. With no active notice, Philippine officials said Co is now believed to be moving freely within the Schengen Area, where internal borders between member states are largely unregulated. Intelligence assessments suggest Co may have traveled by land after leaving Czech custody, potentially crossing into

Germany, Austria, Poland, or Slovakia. Authorities also said they had information on a vehicle and its driver allegedly linked to Co's movements, but withheld further details, citing an ongoing operation. Vida stressed that Czech authorities declined to provide key details on Co's release, including the length of his custody, the exact circumstances of his exit, and his mode of travel, citing Schengen regulations and data privacy restrictions. Vida also revealed that Co was found carrying an expired Philippine passport that had lapsed in September 2022 when he was accosted by Czech authorities. He clarified that while Co's valid Philippine passport had already been canceled and reported to international law enforcement agencies, the fugitive was still in possession of an older expired document. Philippine officials acknowledged that enforcement within the Schengen Zone remains difficult in the absence of a Red Notice and a formal police cooperation agreement with Czech authorities. Vida said Czech officials indicated that the lack of a bilateral police cooperation framework between Manila and Prague limited real-time intelligence sharing. This prompted discussions on accelerating agreements on extradition, mutual legal assistance, and transfer of sentenced persons. Vida also acknowledged that the president's earlier announcement regarding Co's apprehension in the Czech Republic had been premature. "At that point, the fact available was that he was within Czech Republic and under their jurisdiction," Vida said, adding that Philippine officials believed Co remained in Czech custody until shortly before the Prague meeting. He said the government had relied initially on intelligence "listening posts" and operational sources, with formal confirmation from Czech authorities only provided during the recent dialogue. Despite the setback, Philippine authorities said efforts to secure a Red Notice are ongoing. Vida said additional documentation had been submitted to Interpol to strengthen the request, including case files from the Office of the Ombudsman, Commission on Audit, and Sandiganbayan proceedings. The Philippine Center on Transnational Crime (PCTC), acting as the country's Interpol National Central Bureau, said the revised submission was structured to meet Interpol requirements, including the principle of reciprocity, which requires that alleged offenses are punishable in both jurisdictions. "We gathered all official records and explained the cases he is facing, aligning them with anti-corruption laws recognized in Europe," said PCTC executive director Maj. Gen. Romeo Prestoza. Prestoza said the updated filing was based on previous successful Interpol applications to ensure compliance with procedural standards. Vida, however, clarified that the additional submission should not be interpreted as Interpol identifying deficiencies in the initial request. Vida also disclosed broader institutional gaps exposed by the case, including limited manpower, legal resources, and coordination capacity within the Philippine Center on Transnational Crime and its function as Interpol National Central Bureau. He said these issues would be included in a comprehensive report to the president, along with proposals to strengthen international law enforcement coordination. He is also expected to recommend faster negotiation of bilateral agreements with European counterparts. Co is facing charges of corruption and malversation before the Sandiganbayan, filed by the Office of the Ombudsman in November 2025. The case stemmed from an alleged P289-million ghost flood control project in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro. Also implicated in the case are officials of the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) Region 4B and executives of Sunwest Construction and Development Corp., based on case records submitted to the anti-graft court. Vida said Philippine

authorities remain confident that Co will eventually be located and held accountable, although he acknowledged the difficulty of tracking a fugitive in a region without internal border controls and without a Red Notice in place. “This is not an easy task,” he said. He said he will submit a full report to the President upon returning to Manila and coordinate next steps with the Department of the Interior and Local Government, the Philippine National Police, and international counterparts. “There are many factors involved,” Vida said. “But we will pursue accountability through every legal channel available.”

Transparent Navotas City Rep. Toby Tiangco, meanwhile, urged the government to be more transparent on why Co was set free by Czech authorities. “If there is no full information [by the government] or the information is sparse, people will speculate. They will be affected by different fake news because there is no detailed official announcement,” Tiangco said. Tiangco was the first lawmaker to expose the involvement of Co’s construction firm, Sunwest, in flood control projects that were either nonexistent or substandard. While he said that he appreciates the visit of Vida in Prague, Tiangco said that Filipino officials in Prague should have been more upfront on the situation of Co to prevent misinformation from happening. Other lawmakers said it was frustrating to learn that Co is again at large. “The administration officials should stop setting deadlines on when they will be able to catch big fish in this biggest corruption scandal in our history. Prove it and they should do immediately!” Mamamayang Liberal Rep. Leila de Lima said.

- [Dela Rosa considers giving up pay during his absence](#) (2026-04-28 16:14)

THE camp of Sen. Ronald dela Rosa, who has been absent from the Senate since November 2025, is reviewing a suggestion from the Senate ethics panel advising him to temporarily suspend his salary and allowances until he can physically attend sessions. The suggestion was raised during a recent meeting of the Senate Ethics Committee, chaired by JV Ejercito. Ejercito said representatives of dela Rosa informed the panel that the senator is considering the proposal. Dela Rosa has been absent from the Senate for more than five months, after unconfirmed reports said the International Criminal Court (ICC) issued a warrant for his arrest for his role in the Duterte administration’s bloody war on drugs, when he was still chief of the Philippine National Police. The Ethics Committee earlier proposed that dela Rosa refrain from receiving compensation while he is unable to report in person to the Senate. The move is seen as a possible interim measure while ethical concerns raised against him are being reviewed. Ejercito said the senator’s camp has acknowledged the recommendation and is currently deliberating on the matter. A separate meeting is also being held within dela Rosa’s camp to discuss the implications. Sources said if dela Rosa agrees to suspend his salary and allowances, it could influence the outcome of the ethics complaints filed against him, potentially leading to their dismissal. The complaints are currently under preliminary evaluation by the committee. During Tuesday’s session, the Senate Ethics Committee examined multiple complaints to determine whether they met the required form and substance. Ejercito said more than half of the complainants failed to respond to initial communications from the panel. As a result, those complaints will be returned to the complainants, effectively halting their progress unless refiled or completed. The committee is expected to proceed based on dela Rosa’s final

stance regarding the recommendation. His decision could shape both the direction of the ethics proceedings and the broader handling of similar cases in the future. No timeline has been given for when dela Rosa will announce his decision.

- [Senate ready to hold impeachment trial](#) (2026-04-28 16:13)

THE Senate is ready and financially able to conduct an impeachment trial against Vice President Sara Duterte if the House of Representatives transmits the articles of impeachment to the chamber, Sen. Panfilo Lacson said Tuesday. The statement came as Navotas Rep. Toby Tiangco said the House Justice Committee should justify in plenary that its upcoming committee report on the impeachment of Duterte would translate to the articles of impeachment that would be transmitted to the Senate for trial. "There's at least P27 million under the 2025 GAA (General Appropriations Act), of which around P500,000 was spent when last year's articles of impeachment against VP Duterte was transmitted to the Senate," Lacson said in a text message. "Since the fund is good for two years under 'continuing appropriations,' the Senate is ready to conduct the trial," the Senate president pro tempore said. Senate President Vicente Sotto III earlier said he will act "forthwith" if the House transmits the impeachment complaint against Duterte to the Senate. The senator said he has been reviewing the rules of court and the Senate rules on impeachment so that he would be ready for any eventuality. The Senate serves as the impeachment court to try and decide on any complaint to unseat the president and vice president and other impeachable officers of the land. The Constitution states that "trial by the Senate shall forthwith proceed" once an impeachment case is elevated to the upper house. "I will act on it with dispatch. Definitely forthwith. I know what the meaning of forthwith is," Sotto said in recent a press briefing. Former Senate president Francis Escudero came under fire for slow walking the impeachment case filed against the vice president in 2025. "As soon as the Senate receives it, I will inform the Senate and refer it to the Committee on Rules," he said. The Senate adjourned on March 21 for the Holy Week break. It will resume sessions on May 4. "We have to convene as an impeachment court. So, technically, we may convene by May 4. That's just two weeks away. So, we may be able to do that," Sotto said. The Senate chief recently hosted a dinner with some fellow senators to discuss the ongoing impeachment proceedings against Duterte before the House Committee on Justice. He implored fellow senator-judges "to be impartial in and out of the court" as some of them are allied with Duterte. "In the discharge of duties, a judge shall not only be impartial but must also appear to be impartial," Sotto said. He also advised fellow senators to brush up on the rules of court, which covers the official set of procedural rules that govern how Duterte's case would be filed, heard, and decided. "That was one of the intentions and reasons why I hosted a dinner with some senators to join us. I told them about it, just in case the matter reaches us. It's better that we're prepared," he said. "We can't be fumbling, because there may be issues the presiding officer will raise to the body, or objections from members that we should know how to properly address," Sotto said. "It is part of the work of the Senate. It is part of the job order. In fact, even the Senate legal team is empowered to prepare with or without an impeachment, so we should be ready. We must always be prepared." "We are simply preparing just in case. Since the possibility is already

there, it is part of the Senate's responsibility. We are empowered to do so, and the relevant offices within the Senate are likewise authorized to prepare," he added. "We are merely getting ready to ensure we are not caught off guard or forced into a rush should the House of Representatives transmit the articles of impeachment. If no such articles are sent, then that is well and good, and we will return our focus to legislation," Sotto said. Also on Tuesday, Navotas Rep. Toby Tiangco said the House Justice Committee should justify in plenary that its upcoming committee report on the impeachment of Duterte would translate to the articles of impeachment that would be transmitted to the Senate for trial. Tiangco's comments come as the panel is set to deliberate the impeachment cases' sufficiency for probable cause on Wednesday, the last day of the hearings, after hearing Duterte's threats against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., first lady Liza Marcos, and former speaker Martin Romualdez. In an interview on The Manila Times Newsroom on Tuesday, Tiangco said the evidence presented during the hearings was "not enough" to make a judgment because they have not explained how these could either be a culpable violation of the Constitution or betrayal of public trust, two of the grounds for impeaching public officials. "They should explain in the committee report that what [Duterte] did is equivalent to culpable violation of the constitution or betrayal of public trust," Tiangco said. He added that the Committee should be able to justify the report why its cases should fall under these two grounds. "Even if there is wrongdoing, assuming there is wrongdoing, if it does not fit either culpable violation of the Constitution or betrayal of public trust, it should not be considered as a impeachable offense," Tiangco said. Meanwhile, Akbayan Rep. Perci Cendaña said the House Committee on Justice's hearing on the two impeachment complaints against the vice president were exempted from the Bank Secrecy Law. In a statement on Facebook, Cendaña said the members of the committee and Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC) did not break any law. "It is clearer than day that impeachment hearings are exceptions to the coverage of the Bank Secrecy Law and Anti-Money Laundering Act," Cendaña said. Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro, the committee chairman, said in a DZBB interview that the panel did not violate a law in disclosing findings of AMLC, after Duterte's husband, Manases Carpio, filed a complaint on Monday at the Quezon City Prosecutor's Office against several people including Luistro, Cendaña, Mamamayang Liberal Rep. Leila de Lima, Akbayan Rep. Chel Diokno, and AMLC Executive Director Ronel Buenaventura over the disclosure. "We remember that under the Bank Secrecy Law, it was expressly provided that impeachment cases should be an exception in the confidentiality in the Bank Secrecy Law. And applying the totality, it should be applied as well when it comes to AMLC," Luistro said in the radio interview. She said in the same interview that the AMLC did not report on the bank accounts but "covered transactions and suspicious transactions." She also said that "in our way to be conservative, in our way to be cautious, we opted not to subpoena the bank, including the bank records. Instead, we opted to subpoena the AMLC with its report of covered and suspicious transactions." The committee is determining whether there is probable cause to impeach Duterte. De Lima said in Filipino in a post on X that "I am not afraid to face any case, especially that we... are not violating any law." Meanwhile, Diokno said that anyone can file a complaint and that he respected that right, adding that he would "answer the allegations in the proper forum." "At the same time, I have to emphasize that the House Committee on Justice is merely fulfilling its duty," he said. "Attorney Carpio is married

to the vice president and under our laws, their properties are communal in nature. So, there should be every reason to look into the properties of both spouses. At the same time, we need to see, based on what was alleged in the complaint, what really is the basis for those claims of unexplained wealth," he said. "It was clear that what the AMLC disclosed were covered and suspicious transactions. No specific accounts were disclosed," Diokno added. One of the two impeachment complaints alleged that Duterte betrayed public trust over alleged unexplained wealth. This was the complaint filed by priests and others. It also alleged that she committed culpable violation of the Constitution and betrayed public trust in connection with confidential funds allocated to the Office of the Vice President (OVP) for 2022 and 2023 and confidential funds allocated for 2023 to the Department of Education (DepEd) which she led as secretary before she resigned in 2024 from that post. The other complaint, filed by lawyer Nathaniel Cabrera, alleged that she "betrayed the public trust and committed acts of graft and corruption by grossly abusing discretionary authority over confidential funds appropriated to the OVP and DepEd." Duterte's response to these complaints was simply that they must be dismissed. She has refused to attend the House hearings, and has tried to stop them by petitioning the Supreme Court.

- [Ejercito convenes Ethics Committee](#) (2026-04-28 16:12)

(UPDATE) SEN. JV Ejercito said the Senate Committee on Ethics and Privileges, which he leads, on Tuesday tackled the first of eight pending complaints against fellow senators. The senator on Tuesday convened the ethics panel to process pending complaints on a first-in, first-out basis (FIFO) following the constitution of its members and the effectivity of its rules. At least six senators were facing complaints on various grounds, including Ronald dela Rosa, Francis Escudero, Risa Hontiveros, and Ejercito himself. Ejercito declined to indicate the respondent of the complaint that was first discussed. He said two senators were facing more than one complaint. "We will follow the process. No complaint will be prioritized," Ejercito said in Filipino, citing the FIFO rule. The committee opened its first formal meeting to begin acting on pending complaints and distributed copies of "Docket No. 1," which met filing requirements. Ejercito said the panel will convene again on May 4 to "discuss formally [the first complaint] and hopefully dispose of Docket No. 1." He said some of the complaints "are not in compliance" with the panel rules. "We shall be returning them. But Docket [No.] 1 was found to be in form and substance. We will furnish the copy to the respondent." Ejercito said the panel also took up preliminary matters, including rules on inhibition to ensure impartial deliberations. He said any member facing a complaint will not take part in discussions on the case. Ejercito said he would inhibit when his own case is taken up by the committee. A replacement from the same bloc will be designated to maintain quorum and continuity in the proceedings. A civil society group led by former Finance undersecretary Cielo Magno filed a complaint against dela Rosa for his continued absence from official duties for more than three months. Ejercito was facing an ethics complaint for his alleged failure to act immediately on the case filed against Escudero, who had been accused of accepting campaign funds from a contractor. Hontiveros has been accused of "witness tampering" in relation to her

investigation on the alleged sexual and labor abuses of some members of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ by its founder, Apollo Quiboloy.

- [PAO logs 100% score in performance review](#) (2026-04-28 16:11)

THE Public Attorney's Office (PAO) has emerged as the only attached agency of the Department of Justice (DOJ) to achieve a perfect score in the 2025 Annual Agency Performance Review (AAPR) of the Department of Budget and Management (DBM). "It is a must that up until the last centavo is accounted for," PAO chief Persida Rueda-Acosta said. Rueda-Acosta said the outstanding rating was not just the success of PAO but also the victory of all, especially the indigents and underprivileged members of society. "For this is an implication that PAO is a well-performing government agency, both in the physical and financial performances, that banks on transparency and accountability," she added. Overall, the DOJ obtained a score of 4.15 or very satisfactory, taking into consideration its financial and physical performance and timeliness and quality of the report submissions, according to the DBM. Based on DBM documents, copies of which were obtained by The Manila Times, the DOJ for fiscal year 2025 registered obligation and disbursement budget utilization rates of 85.59 percent and 86.69 percent, respectively. "The PAO consistently achieved 100-percent utilization across all parameters," Acting Budget Secretary Rolando Toledo said in a communication addressed to Acting Justice Secretary Frederick Vida. In 2024, PAO was also declared top achiever for obtaining a perfect score of 5 for the same financial and physical performance review. The DBM likewise cited PAO for its nearly perfect rating on alternative dispute resolutions and public attorneys' perfect attendance in court hearings. The AAPR report tracks how agencies use their allocated funds as it presents the results of the enhanced review, assessment, and evaluation of the annual performance of national government agencies, other executive offices, constitutional commissions, as well as state universities and colleges. An autonomous government agency under Republic Act 9406 (PAO Law), PAO remains attached to the DOJ only for policy and program coordination, meaning, it has no direct control over the former, especially on its day-to-day operations.

SEN. Bong Go expressed confidence that the Supreme Court will uphold the law and the welfare of Filipinos as it continues its oral arguments on the legality of unprogrammed appropriations in the national budget. The high court is currently hearing consolidated petitions questioning provisions in the 2024, 2025, and 2026 General Appropriations Acts, focusing on the use of standby or unprogrammed funds. Oral arguments have so far been conducted on April 7 and April 21. "We have great respect for the Supreme Court, for the wisdom of our justices, and for their careful deliberation on this issue," Go said. "We have full confidence that they will look at this not only in accordance with the law but also in accordance with the welfare of the Filipino people." While the issues under review are largely constitutional and technical, Go emphasized their real-world implications, particularly for Filipinos struggling with healthcare expenses such as hospitalization, maintenance medicines, and dialysis. "While discussing the

technical and constitutional issues, I hope it remains clear to all of us that there are Filipinos who rely on every fund released by the government for their medical and daily needs,” he said. The senator stressed that safeguarding public funds is essential to ensuring that government resources are directed toward critical services, especially in the health sector. The proceedings follow a December 2025 ruling by the high court ordering the return of P60 billion in funds transferred from Philippine Health Insurance Corp. to the National Treasury and permanently prohibiting the transfer of an additional P29.9 billion balance. Go reiterated his long-standing position that health-related funds must be used exclusively for healthcare services. “I have long said that health funds should go to health. When it comes to lives, treatment, and medical services, every penny counts,” he said. “Many of our countrymen are already very poor, so it is very important to protect the funds for them.” The senator expressed hope that the Court’s continuing review will strengthen public confidence in the government’s handling of funds and reinforce constitutional accountability. “We believe in the integrity of our Supreme Court. We hope that in their careful and fair handling of this matter, law, justice, and above all, the interests of the Filipino people will prevail,” he added.

- [‘Sara impeachment bid supported by records’](#) (2026-04-28 16:09)

FORMER Integrated Bar of the Philippines president Domingo Cayosa said Vice President Sara Duterte’s camp must answer for the billions of pesos in bank transactions flagged in the impeachment proceedings, saying the official records placed before the House of Representatives could no longer be dismissed as mere politics. Cayosa issued the statement following House Committee on Justice hearings where the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC) reported covered and suspicious transactions involving Duterte and her husband, lawyer Manases Carpio. “We can’t just ignore the official report of the AMLC because it’s not someone who just said it’s mere politics. It’s a government agency,” Cayosa said during an interview on PTV-4’s “Ulat ng Bayan.” On Wednesday’s hearing, the AMLC reported that bank transactions totaling P6.7 billion — classified as covered and suspicious — were recorded under the names of Duterte and her husband. The AMLC also confirmed that at least 18 bank transactions linked to Duterte and her family members — as cited in the affidavit of former senator Antonio Trillanes IV — matched its entries of covered and suspicious transaction reports. Duterte’s camp questioned the way her bank transactions were presented, claiming that the figure appeared “bloated” because it was an aggregation of transactions spanning years. However, Cayosa said that line of defense missed the point. “It is up to them to explain because it seems like they don’t question that it went through their bank accounts,” he said. Cayosa said the inquiry has crossed an important evidentiary threshold because it now rests on documentary records from government agencies rather than on witness statements alone. “It’s not just personalities speaking; it’s not just hearsay. There are receipts. There are official reports. You can’t say it’s not true,” he said. A separate point of contention raised in the proceedings is the vice president’s Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Net Worth (SALN), particularly the reclassification of cash and deposits — itemized in earlier filings — under the general category “others.” Cayosa said the change runs contrary to the

implementing rules of the SALN law. “That’s why it defeats the purpose of the SALN law. So that’s a violation of the SALN law. Plus, people’s perception when you give the cash to others, it seems like you’re hiding the cash from others,” he said. Cayosa also dismissed the filing of criminal complaints against the AMLC and the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas over the release of financial records. “I think the criminal case against the AMLC or the Central Bank is weak or unfounded because it is clear that the AMLC has been tasked and has a duty under the law itself to record suspicious transactions,” he said. He added that Congress has constitutional subpoena powers, and government records properly summoned by a competent authority do not automatically expose officials to criminal liability. Cayosa also questioned the vice president’s claim that she was unaware of Commission on Audit notices of disallowance received by her office. “It’s unusual and irregular that the vice president’s office has already received it, but the sitting vice president doesn’t know about it,” he said. “It’s already been leaked to the public and the media already knows everything, but she doesn’t know about it yet.” Cayosa acknowledged that Duterte may choose to reserve her defense for an eventual Senate impeachment trial rather than engage with House subpoenas. But he said the strategy was exacting a political cost. “Unfortunately for her, because she didn’t respond properly to the subpoena, to the House investigation, she’s at odds with public perception,” Cayosa said. “And all of this has come out,” he said, adding that the importance of the case lies in what is at stake for public accountability. “This impeachment case is very important because the focus of the allegations is graft and corruption. Theft or embezzlement is not proper use of public money,” Cayosa said. Duterte has denied any wrongdoing. Her camp has maintained that the AMLC figures were presented in a misleading manner and should not be taken as proof of guilt. Mans Carpio on Monday filed a complaint against members of the House Committee on Justice, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas governor, and the executive director of the AMLC over the disclosure of his and his wife’s bank records. Bicol Saro party-list Rep. Terry Ridon said the move effectively confirmed the P6.77 billion in transactions at the heart of the impeachment case. By contesting only the legality of the disclosure and not the figures themselves, Carpio has locked the vice president’s defense into the AMLC numbers, Ridon said during a radio interview on Monday. Ridon said the vice president’s defense faces a second, separate problem: her SALN from 2019 to 2024 contained no entries for cash on hand or cash in bank. Both are items the SALN law requires to be declared individually. Her lawyers have argued that the cash was lumped under “others,” but Ridon called the explanation untenable. He pointed to a sharp break in the records. From 2007 to 2018, the vice president’s SALNs carried separate cash line items. From 2019 onward, those entries disappeared. “So what changed from 2019 onwards that supposedly lumped these ‘others’?” Ridon said. The lawmaker also pressed on the gap between the scale of the bank transactions and the couple’s declared finances. The vice president’s declared net worth as of 2024 is P88 million. Her cumulative income, net of taxes, is roughly P73 million. “By any sense of imagination, it doesn’t seem like it would really add up — P88 million in net worth, P73 million in income net of taxes — on a sheer scale of P6.77 billion transaction volume over the course of 20 years,” Ridon said. The House Committee on Justice is expected to vote on probable cause on Wednesday, April 29. A favorable vote moves the articles of impeachment to the plenary, where one-third of the

318-member chamber — 106 votes — must approve transmittal to the Senate.

- [Stagger power rate increases, ERC urged](#) (2026-04-28 16:08)

SEN. Sherwin Gatchalian on Tuesday urged the Energy Regulatory Commission (ERC) to mitigate the impact of rising electricity rates by staggering increases, warning that consumers could face another round of “bill shock” in the coming months. Gatchalian issued the appeal following recent rate adjustments by Meralco, which he said were largely driven by foreign exchange fluctuations. The senator cautioned that the spike in electricity bills does not yet reflect the full impact of global energy market pressures, particularly those linked to the oil crisis. He said anticipated increases in the prices of coal, liquefied natural gas (LNG), and other fuel sources are likely to further drive up power generation costs. “The oil crisis has not yet been factored into the current rates. Once these higher fuel costs take effect, we can expect further increases in electricity bills,” Gatchalian said. The senator emphasized that the ERC has the authority to implement staggered or deferred adjustments to prevent sudden spikes in consumer bills. He cited the agency’s actions during the Covid-19 pandemic, when rate increases were distributed over time to cushion the financial burden on households. “We should not allow this to become a disaster for consumers. There are mechanisms to gradually ease the impact,” he said. Gatchalian defended the so-called lifeline rate, which provides discounted electricity to low-income households. He noted that the subsidy has been in place since the enactment of the Electric Power Industry Reform Act (Epira) in 2001, and remains minimal at around one centavo per kilowatt-hour. The senator said the primary driver of rising electricity costs is not the subsidy but the increase in generation charges, which have climbed to about 75 centavos per kWh. With geopolitical tensions affecting oil and gas supply chains, Gatchalian warned that without proactive regulatory intervention, consumers could face sustained increases in power costs. He reiterated the need for timely action from regulators to balance the financial viability of power providers with the protection of consumers, especially global economic uncertainties.

- [Marcos vows stronger support for Filipino inventors](#) (2026-04-28 16:07)

(UPDATE) PRESIDENT Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Tuesday vowed to strengthen technical and financial support for Filipino inventors and innovators, reaffirming his commitment to advancing innovation in the country. Speaking at the 2026 National Invention Contest and Exhibits Awarding Ceremony in Malacañang, Marcos underscored the crucial role of innovation in driving growth and improvement in the lives of Filipinos, stressing that promising ideas should not only be developed but also reach the market to benefit the public. “As president, I do not accept that there should be an uncertain future for our inventors. They have world-changing ideas, and we must watch them. We cannot watch them wither on the vine due to lack of institutional support,” Marcos said. “And this is why I have given instructions to the Department of Science and Technology and all other relevant government agencies to strengthen financial and technical support for our inventors,” he added. Through DOST-Technology Application and Promotion Institute (DOST-TAPI) programs and services, Marcos said that Filipino innovators now have better access to research and development

grants, intellectual property protection, technology development, financing, commercialization, and pathways to global exposure. He said these programs aimed to ensure that their innovations would “move forward to create a real and lasting impact.” The NICE Awards is organized by the DOST-TAPI and is anchored on Republic Act (RA) 7459, or the Inventors and Invention Incentives Act, which promotes Filipino innovation. For this year’s NICE competition, the president said 28 finalists advanced from 764 entries nationwide. Winning inventions and innovations include a compact neutron radiation measuring device and an affordable herbal cream for treating viral skin conditions under the Tuklas Award for outstanding inventions; a multi-grain precision seeder with a fertilizer applicator under the Banghay Award for industrial design; and an on-site African swine fever detection system under the Likha Award for creative research. Another winning innovation was an AI-powered optical chick-counting device under the Sibol Award for outstanding student creative research. “These are precisely the kinds of innovations that we seek, ones that offer solutions to real-world challenges and improve the lives of our fellow Filipinos,” the president said. “Please rest assured, your government will always stand with you, ready to support you on your journey,” he added. Under RA 7459, the government provides incentives, technical support, and market linkage to Filipino inventors to help bring their products from concept to commercialization. The inventors and innovators behind the winning entries will also receive monetary prizes and accolades for their work. The president also called on Filipinos to continue fostering creativity and innovation, as their inventions can contribute to national development and change lives. “To every Filipino, let us all continue dreaming and follow their example. Continue dreaming and never stop creating,” he said.

- [Dizon, team inspect smoldering landfill](#) (2026-04-28 16:06)

(UPDATE) PUBLIC Works Secretary Vince Dizon returned to the Navotas Sanitary Landfill on Tuesday, leading a high-level inspection team amid rising concerns over toxic emissions and persistent underground fires at the dumpsite. Dizon was joined by Japanese Ambassador to the Philippines Kazuyo Endo, Environment Secretary Juan Miguel Cuna, Navotas City Mayor John Rey Tiangco, and a team of technical experts from Japan’s disaster response units, signaling a stronger international collaboration to address the fire at the Navotas Landfill. The visit marks a critical follow-up effort by the government to assess the condition of the landfill, where smoldering methane pockets have continued to produce hazardous smoke, affecting not only Navotas but nearby cities as well. Authorities said the presence of Japanese experts is expected to fast-track technical solutions, particularly in controlling deep-seated fires that are difficult to extinguish using conventional methods. Dizon emphasized the urgency of the situation, noting that the deployed heavy equipment and mitigation measures in previous days must now be evaluated for effectiveness, while identifying additional interventions to contain the blaze. Residents in surrounding communities have been grappling with deteriorating air quality, prompting health concerns, especially among vulnerable groups such as children and the elderly. The DPWH, in coordination with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), is now working closely with international specialists to apply science-based approaches

in suppressing the landfill fire. Japanese disaster response experts, known for their advanced technologies and experience in complex environmental emergencies, are expected to recommend strategies that go beyond surface-level firefighting. These may include oxygen suppression techniques, soil layering, and gas venting systems aimed at neutralizing methane buildup, which is one of the key drivers of the prolonged fire. President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. had earlier ordered all concerned agencies to exhaust every possible measure to resolve the crisis, including tapping foreign expertise to ensure a faster and more effective response. The directive underscores the administration's priority to safeguard public health and prevent further environmental damage caused by the toxic emissions. Local officials, meanwhile, expressed optimism that the intensified collaboration would lead to a breakthrough, as the landfill continues to pose both an environmental and public safety threat. With the combined efforts of national agencies, local government units, and international partners, authorities are now racing against time to fully extinguish the fire and restore safe air quality in affected communities.

- [Zamora hits back at JV Ejercito over San Juan hospital](#) (2026-04-28 16:05)

SAN JUAN CITY Mayor Francis Zamora defended his administration's handling of the San Juan Medical Center, saying the city's only public hospital remained at Level 1 status under the past leadership despite 18 years in office. Zamora made the statement in an interview after Sen. JV Ejercito raised concerns over the condition of the San Juan Medical Center and questioned whether the hospital had been neglected. Ejercito previously said he was saddened by what he described as the current state of the San Juan Medical Center, saying he had received complaints from residents. Zamora said the hospital's budget stood at P61 million in 2001, when Ejercito became mayor, and rose to P110 million in 2010, when Ejercito finished his term. He said the budget already reached P315 million when he assumed office in 2019, and had since increased every year to P644 million in 2026. "From here alone, in how we appropriate the budget for the hospital, we can see that we give importance to San Juan Medical Center because it is our only public hospital," Zamora said. He turned the criticism back on past administrations, saying the Ejercito-led leadership had 18 years to improve the hospital but left it at Level 1 status. "They sat for 18 years, and yet, they did not move away from Level 1 status. Now, we have been here for only seven years. In the first few years of our seven years, we raised that to Level 2 status, and we are pushing to complete the upgrade to Level 3 status," Zamora said. Level 1 status limited the types of procedures and services that the hospital could provide, while Level 3 would allow the hospital to expand its medical capability once it meets requirements for equipment, facilities and manpower. He said his target was to complete the hospital upgrade by June 30, 2028. "I have two years and two months to ensure that we will really be able to upgrade the San Juan Medical Center. When I say upgrade, the medical equipment, the facilities, the manpower complement, and even the culture of the employees should be complete," Zamora said. Zamora said his administration inherited medical equipment that had been fully paid for but remained in boxes and crates because the areas where they were supposed to be installed had not been completed. He said he had sought help

from President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and Health Secretary Ted Herbosa to address the hospital's remaining needs in equipment and facilities. "Of course, I acknowledge there are still many things that need to be fixed. And that is where we are focused now," Zamora said.

- [PHLPost vows improved employee welfare](#) (2026-04-28 16:04)

THE leadership of the Philippine Postal Corp. (PHLPost) said it is stepping up efforts to improve employee welfare while addressing long-standing concerns over allowances, incentives and career advancement ahead of Labor Day. In an interview with The Manila Times, Postmaster General Maximo Sta. Maria and PHLPost Chairman Kristjan Vicente Gargantiel said the agency has begun rolling out immediate and long-term measures to support its workforce, from frontline letter carriers to office personnel. Sta. Maria said employee welfare goes beyond formal programs, stressing the need to recognize the daily efforts of postal workers who ensure mail and parcel delivery nationwide. "As we mark Labor Day, our commitment is clear: we stand with our employees and will continue to improve their welfare," he said. Among the initiatives cited were health seminars on critical illnesses, free medical check-ups, and the institutionalization of sports activities aimed at promoting wellness and team engagement. Also, the agency is preparing for the rainy season by distributing raincoats and boots to letter carriers, acknowledging the risks faced by "karteros" delivering mail in hazardous weather conditions. At the same time, area-wide training sessions have been conducted, including a recent program in Northwest Luzon, to enhance customer service and clarify personnel policies such as leave benefits. PHLPost officials said employees have primarily raised concerns involving gasoline allowances, the Collective Negotiation Agreement (CNA) incentive, and promotions. On the gasoline allowance, Sta. Maria acknowledged earlier implementation issues but said these have already been resolved. "We know some of our letter carriers even use their own motorcycles just to complete deliveries. This is not just about an allowance — it is recognition of their daily sacrifice," he said, adding that the release of the allowance has already been carried out. On the CNA incentive, management said it supports granting the benefit but noted that government guidelines require certain conditions to be met. Gargantiel said some requirements have already been complied with, while others remain under evaluation, with ongoing discussions between management and union representatives aimed at reaching a "fair and sustainable solution." Addressing concerns over promotions, the officials said appointments are based on qualifications, not personal connections. They cited the regularization of 83 Contract of Service workers in November last year, which opened up positions and enabled personnel movement across various levels, particularly in operational roles. However, management acknowledged that perceptions of fairness remain an issue and said it is open to reviewing concerns to ensure transparency. Sta. Maria admitted that communication gaps within the organization have contributed to persistent concerns. "There is progress, but if employees do not feel it or are not aware of it, then it is not enough," he said, noting that efforts are underway to improve the clarity and consistency of internal communications. The PHLPost leadership said its approach centers on listening to employees and acting on their concerns, emphasizing that improved workforce support would translate to better public

service. “We hear you. We are acting. And we will continue working through these concerns together,” Sta. Maria said in a message to employees.

- [P249.83M worth of shabu from Mexico seized in Pasay](#) (2026-04-28 16:03)

THE Bureau of Customs (BOC) seized a shipment of LED spotlights from Mexico, containing suspected shabu, during an inspection at a Pasay City warehouse on Tuesday. Port of NAIA District Collector Yasmin Mapa said the cargo was flagged after X-ray scans revealed suspicious images inconsistent with the declared goods. The shipment was immediately marked for a full physical examination. Mapa said that on April 17, 2026, a joint inspection was conducted by the Customs Anti-Illegal Drug Task Force and the Enforcement and Security Service. Following an alert from a K9 unit, the authorities uncovered concealed narcotics within the cargo. The Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency confirmed the shipment contained 36,740 grams of methamphetamine hydrochloride, with an estimated street value of P249,832,000. “The BOC will keep pushing forward in stopping illegal shipments at our borders. We are committed to making sure that these dangerous drugs never reach our communities,” said Commissioner Ariel Nepomuceno. He added that the successful operation reflects the bureau's strengthened risk assessment and coordination efforts with partner agencies.

THE Presidential Task Force on Media Security (PTFOMS) vowed to uphold gender-responsive media protection, particularly of female journalists in the country. Undersecretary Jose Torres Jr., PTFOMS executive director, issued the statement as he acknowledged women journalists for being fact-checkers, detail-oriented and nurturers. “Women are indispensable to the practice of journalism and to the life of our democracy. Women journalists are not only reporters of events. They are witnesses to history, voices for the marginalized, and guardians of truth in times when facts are often challenged and misinformation spreads with alarming speed,” Torres said during the “Empowering Women Journalists” workshop held last April 23 and 24 at the Bayview Park Hotel in Manila. “The presence of women in media is essential because it ensures that the stories of our people are told with depth, balance and humanity. Your voices bring to the national conversation issues that might otherwise remain unheard, the struggles of families, the realities in communities, the concerns of women and children, and the lived experiences of those on the margins of society,” he added. Noting how gender-based safety is becoming more crucial for women journalists as violence is becoming prevalent both in local and global settings, Torres pointed out the need to further empower women in the industry to uphold a safe space in discharging their duties on the field or in the newsroom. Many women journalists continue to face threats that go beyond the usual risks of the profession. These include gender-based harassment, intimidation, online abuse, workplace discrimination, and in some cases, direct threats to personal safety. These challenges “are unacceptable in any democratic society that values press freedom and human rights.” “The PTFOMS firmly upholds that the right of every journalist to work freely and safely is a fundamental pillar of democracy. More importantly, for women journalists, this protection must also be responsive to

the specific vulnerabilities and pressures you face. Your welfare, your dignity, your safety, and your right to pursue your profession without fear are matters of national importance,” Torres said. He said that the government “remains committed to upholding press freedom and ensuring that government institutions work together to protect members of the media.” “We seek to strengthen systems of protection, access to support mechanisms, and channels for immediate response to threats and acts of harassment,” Torres added. - [Unicef cites gaps in PH immunization program](#) (2026-04-28 16:01)

THE United Nations Children’s Fund (Unicef) called for improved routine immunization in the Philippines during the observance of World Immunization Week. Results of the National Demographic Health Survey, it said, showed that achieving the global target of 95-percent immunization coverage is feasible. Unicef said data from Region 1 (Ilocos) is proof but added that targeted efforts are still needed in remote and underserved areas. The 95 percent is a global target that aims to reach herd immunity against highly contagious diseases, most notably measles. “Vaccines have protected generation after generation. But the next generation depends on whether we reach every child today, especially those who remain unvaccinated. We must close the gaps that leave children unprotected by ensuring reliable vaccine supply and quality services and by building trust and demand in communities so that families choose protection for their children,” said Kyungsun Kim, Unicef representative in the Philippines, on Tuesday. Unicef noted disparities in immunization coverage across income groups, with basic antigen coverage highest among the richest households at 88 percent and lowest among the poorest at 66 percent. It said this underscores the need to focus on targeted efforts to ensure that vaccines reach underserved communities. “Sustaining national gains will require closing persistent equity gaps across place and income. Parents may not have enough money to get their children to the health clinics for their vaccination.” This year’s World Immunization Week theme, “For every generation, vaccines work,” underscores the need to sustain progress in protecting Filipino families from vaccine-preventable diseases, Unicef said. “Vaccines are among the most effective public health interventions, having saved an estimated 154 million lives over the past 50 years. Since 1976, the Philippines’ National Immunization Program has made substantial progress in policy and governance, disease elimination, and vaccination coverage,” it added.

- [DOST, UP launches new smart city hub for LGUs](#) (2026-04-28 14:02)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Science and Technology - Philippine Council for Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD) together with the University of the Philippines Training Center for Applied Geodesy and Photogrammetry (UP TCAGP) has launched a new system to improve governance and public services in the country. Called the Smart Metro or the Modern Geospatial and Collaborative Solutions for the Development of Smart Regions, the system aims to address issues on disasters and emergency responses, traffic, mobility, land use, flooding, health and environmental concerns, and economic planning. The system was launched during an event held in Iloilo City last April 17. The system has four platforms; Connect, which is used for citizens to report issues directly through mobile phones; Command, which is used for local government units to receive reports, track issues, and monitor responses; Collab, which is used for sharing tasks and announcements within LGUs, and Codex, a data and mapping platform that supports better city planning and data-based decision making. The system was developed by the UP TCAGP in partnership with the Metro Iloilo–Guimaras Economic Development Council (MIGEDC), and DOST Region VI. DOST-PCIEERD funded the project amounting to P28 Million. According to Science and Technology Secretary Renato Solidum, the DOST is now creating a support mechanism to "catapult and accelerate smart city initiatives in the Philippines," "To govern such a nation has always required not only vision, but the ability to see clearly across these distances, and to act with a shared understanding. Today, we are given new ways of doing exactly that," Solidum added. Dr. Czar Jakiri Sarmiento, project lead of Smart Metro, said that the new system is not just a technology project but a governance ecosystem built through consultation, collaboration, and actual local government needs.

MANILA, Philippines — Navotas City Rep. Toby Tiangco urged the government to be more transparent on why former Ako Bicol Rep. Zaldy Co was set free by Czech authorities amid the ongoing flood control scandal. It comes after Justice Secretary Frederick Vida said that Co has already left the custody of the Czech republic after he was apprehended for using an expired passport last week. Speaking at The Manila Times' Newsroom program, Tiangco said that the government should explain the basis of Co's release if there are indeed regulations in the Schengen area. "If there is no full information [by the government] or the information is sparse, people will speculate. They will be affected by different fake news because there is no detailed official announcement," Tiangco said. Tiangco was the first lawmaker to expose the involvement of Co's construction firm, Sunwest, to the millions of flood control projects that were either ghost or substandard. While he said that he appreciates the visit of Vida in Prague, Tiangco said that Filipino officials in Prague should have been more upfront on the situation of Co to prevent misinformation from happening.

MANILA. Philippines - Navotas Rep. Toby Tiangco believes that the House Justice Committee should justify in plenary that its upcoming committee report on the impeachment of Vice President Sara Duterte would translate to the articles of impeachment that would be transmitted to the Senate for trial. Tiangco's comments come as the panel is set to deliberate the impeachment cases' sufficiency for probable cause on Wednesday, the last day of the hearings, after hearing Duterte's threats against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., First Lady Liza Marcos, and former Speaker Martin Romualdez. In his interview on The Manila Times Newsroom on Tuesday, Tiangco said that the evidence that were presented during the hearings were "not enough" to make a judgment because they have not explained how these evidence could either be a culpable violation of the constitution or betrayal of public trust, two of the grounds for impeaching public officials. "They should explain in the committee report that what [Duterte] did is equivalent to culpable violation of the constitution or betrayal of public trust." Tiangco said. He added that the Committee should be able to justify the report why should its cases should fall under these two grounds. "Even if there is wrongdoing, assuming there is wrongdoing, if it is not fit for either culpable violation of the constitution or betrayal of public trust, it should not be considered as a impeachable offense," Tiangco said.

- [Marcos admin seeks to institutionalize UPLIFT](#) (2026-04-28 13:34)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Tuesday threw its support behind the move to institutionalize the Unified Package for Livelihoods, Industry, Food, and Transport (UPLIFT) Committee. The move was discussed during the weekly meeting of the body, chaired by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., where initiatives meant to cushion the effects of the hostilities in the Middle East were the focus of the discussions. “Regarding the UPLIFT meeting, the plan to make it a law was discussed. The proposal to make the UPLIFT Bill will be passed,” Presidential Communications Office (PCO) Undersecretary Claire Castro said in Filipino in a press briefing. The proposed measure seeks to remove the two-year ban on the inclusion in the proposed budget of items declared as savings and provide a list of programs, activities and projects that can be funded from the allocated budgets. It likewise aims to give the government the ability to use the unreleased appropriations and unobligated allotment from 2025 and 2026 as stated in the General Appropriations Act (GAA) for the said Fiscal Years (FY). The UPLIFT Committee was created through Executive Order (EO) 110 for a whole-of-government response to the national energy emergency triggered by the war in the Middle East and to stabilize food and fuel prices. It protects against high global oil prices by supporting drivers and farmers, ensuring supply, and implementing welfare programs.

- [Co released from Czech custody due to lack of Interpol red notice — DOJ](#) (2026-04-28 13:27)

Resigned Ako Bicol party-list representative Zaldy Co has been released by Czech authorities due to the absence of an Interpol red notice, Philippine officials said—a development that allows him to move freely within Europe’s Schengen area. Justice Secretary Frederick Vida said Czech officials confirmed during a high-level meeting in Prague that Co had been under their jurisdiction but was no longer in custody at the time of the Philippine delegation’s visit. “He was within Czech jurisdiction and under their custody, but is no longer there,” Vida said in a press briefing from Prague. Vida said the key factor behind Co’s release was the absence of a red notice from Interpol, which the Philippine government applied for in November 2025 but has yet to be issued. “A red notice would enable any member country to detain and return him through extradition or deportation,” Vida said. “Without that, there are limitations.” With no active red notice, Co is believed to be moving within the Schengen Area, where internal borders are largely open and movement between countries is less strictly monitored. Philippine officials said Czech authorities declined to provide details on the circumstances of Co’s release—including how long he had been held, how he exited custody, or his method of travel—citing Schengen regulations and data privacy restrictions. “What we can confirm is that he is within the Schengen area,” Vida said. “That is the workable intelligence that we have.” Authorities said intelligence suggests Co may have traveled overland to neighboring countries such as Germany, Austria, Poland, or Slovakia, possibly using a vehicle identified by investigators. However, details about the vehicle and its driver were withheld due to an ongoing operation. Vida said Co was previously found carrying an expired passport dated September 2022 when he was accosted by Czech authorities, while his valid Philippine passport had already been canceled and reported to international agencies. Despite this, officials acknowledged that

enforcement across Schengen borders remains difficult without a red notice, which serves as the primary international alert mechanism for coordinated arrests. Under Interpol procedures, a red notice is not an arrest warrant but a request for law enforcement worldwide to locate and provisionally detain a subject pending extradition, subject to national laws. Philippine authorities said the application for Co's red notice remains under review, with additional documentation submitted to strengthen the case file, including records from the Department of Justice, Office of the Ombudsman, Commission on Audit, and Sandiganbayan involving graft and corruption charges. Philippine Center on Transnational Crime executive director Major General Romeo Prestoza said the revised submission was structured to meet Interpol requirements, including the principle of reciprocity, which requires that the alleged offenses are punishable in both jurisdictions. "We gathered all official records and explained the cases he is facing, aligning them with anti-corruption laws recognized in Europe," Prestoza said during the same press briefing. He said the updated submission was based on a review of previously successful Interpol applications as part of efforts to strengthen the legal basis for issuing the red notice. Vida said the additional documentation should not be interpreted as Interpol having formally flagged deficiencies in the initial request. "Wala namang nagsabing kulang," he said. Still, he acknowledged that the absence of a red notice had effectively weakened enforcement options at a critical time when Co was still within Czech jurisdiction. The justice secretary also said Czech authorities indicated that the lack of a police cooperation agreement between Manila and Prague further limited information-sharing, prompting discussions on fast-tracking agreements on extradition, mutual legal assistance, and the transfer of sentenced persons. Both countries, he said, reaffirmed commitments under the United Nations Convention Against Corruption, which provides a framework for international cooperation in corruption-related cases. Vida said Philippine embassies and law enforcement "listening posts" across Europe have been activated, but there have been no confirmed sightings of Co in other Schengen states as of the briefing. He added that it remains unclear whether Co sought political asylum or whether his interaction with Czech authorities was limited to an immigration-related stop prior to his release. "We don't know the exact nature," Vida said. Despite the setback, Vida said Philippine authorities remain confident of eventually locating Co but acknowledged the difficulty of tracking a fugitive without a red notice in a region with largely open internal borders. "This is not an easy task," he said. Vida said he will submit a full report to the President upon returning to Manila and coordinate next steps with law enforcement agencies, including efforts to strengthen international agreements and improve Interpol coordination. Asked about timelines, he declined to provide a specific estimate for Co's return to the Philippines. "Maraming factors involved," Vida said. "But we will pursue accountability through every legal channel available."

- [36 Pinoys onboard two vessels safe](#) (2026-04-28 13:15)

The Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) on Tuesday reported that 36 Filipino seafarers aboard two vessels safely exited the Strait of Hormuz on April 25 after being stranded in the Persian Gulf amid the ongoing conflict in the Middle East. In a statement, the DMW said the

seafarers were on board the Omicron Nikos and Nord, which are Liberian- and Russian-flagged vessels, respectively. Their safe passage brings the total number of Filipino crew members who have left the area to nearly 1,200. “The DMW continues to closely monitor vessel movements in the region and maintain coordination with manning agencies and shipowners to ensure the safety and welfare of Filipino seafarers. The Department also keeps communication lines open with the affected seafarers and their families,” the agency said.

- [Tax audit ordered vs Duterte, husband, 9 firms linked to couple](#) (2026-04-28 12:05)

MANILA, Philippines — The Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) has ordered a tax audit of Vice President Sara Duterte, her spouse Manases R. Carpio, and nine business entities linked to the couple. In a statement on Tuesday, the BIR said it had directed the issuance of Letters of Authority (LOAs) that would allow revenue officers to examine a taxpayer’s books of accounts and other financial records as part of a formal audit investigation. The Bureau said the move followed a “careful determination” that probable cause exists to warrant a full audit to ensure that correct taxes are collected. “The end objective of this lawful exercise is to collect the correct taxes due to the government. This will be a rules-based approach in determining the truth,” BIR Commissioner Charlito Martin Mendoza said. “Rights will be accorded to the audited entities. This will be fully compliant with all Run After Tax Evaders (RATE) protocols, the primary enforcement program of the Bureau for tax evasion and tax fraud,” he added.

- [Trump shooting scare renews 'staged' conspiracy theory](#) (2026-04-28 11:57)

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A flood of misinformation exploded online after US President Donald Trump escaped a weekend shooting scare, fueling renewed — and unfounded — claims that he has staged assassination attempts to boost his political fortunes. Trump and his top administration officials were evacuated Saturday from a media gala in Washington after gunfire erupted outside the ballroom, marking the third assassination attempt targeting the Republican in two years. AFP’s fact-checkers identified a series of social media posts from anti-Trump accounts circulating an unsubstantiated theory that the White House staged the shooting to distract attention from unfavorable news, including the unpopular US-Israeli war with Iran. Posts advancing the claim garnered 80 million views on Elon Musk’s platform X alone within two days of the shooting, according to the disinformation watchdog NewsGuard. Many of the same accounts previously claimed that two assassination attempts on Trump in 2024 — in Pennsylvania and Florida — were also staged. The narrative largely emanated from a left-wing conspiracy movement that researchers call “BlueAnon,” a play on the right-wing QAnon cult. “Many of the anti-Trump accounts baselessly claiming that the WHCD (White House Correspondents’ Dinner) shooting was staged made identical claims after the 2024 assassination attempts,” NewsGuard’s Sofia Rubinson told AFP. “Some viral posts we’ve seen explicitly cite those earlier incidents as ‘evidence’ that staging shootings is part of Trump’s playbook — to generate sympathy and distract from unfavorable coverage.” “Cult of hatred” Fast-developing breaking news events such as shootings often trigger a frantic search for new information on social media, frequently allowing falsehoods to spread and intensifying

online confusion. There is no evidence that the Trump administration orchestrated Saturday's attack. The White House on Monday blamed what it called a "left-wing cult of hatred" for the shooting and a 31-year-old suspect, Cole Allen, faces a potential life sentence if convicted of attempting to kill Trump. Following Saturday's shooting, state media in US adversaries — Russia and Iran — amplified further conspiracy theories, including claims that the attacker had ties to the Israeli military, according to the London-based Institute for Strategic Dialogue. In recent weeks, a growing number of MAGA influencers — shorthand for Trump's "Make America Great Again" slogan — have also promoted the conspiracy theory that the Republican had staged the 2024 assassination attempt at a Pennsylvania campaign rally. The trend underscores how Americans on both sides of the political divide are prone to outlandish conspiracy theories, as many turn to partisan influencers for information amid mistrust of mainstream media, researchers say. "The staged assassination conspiracy theory has advocates on the left, particularly among liberal content creators. It's also starting to take off on the right as they lose faith in Trump," Mike Rothschild, a researcher who studies conspiracy theories, told AFP. "The theory casts him (Trump) as a master manipulator," he said. "And it uses as 'evidence' either misconceptions, other viral videos, or things that people have just made up." The theory has gained traction as Trump faces backlash from Americans across the political spectrum — including segments of his MAGA supporters — over the war with Iran, which has driven up oil prices and raised concerns about American casualties. The military campaign has laid bare divisions within Trump's political base, with even longtime conservative supporters — such as former Fox News host Tucker Carlson — condemning the Republican's departure from his non-interventionist policy. The conspiracy theory continues to spread largely unchecked online, as many tech platforms have scaled back content moderation efforts that were once used to curb disinformation. Influencers are often incentivized to amplify sensational rumors, which can attract followers and increase earnings on revenue-sharing platforms like X. "The more irresistible the claim the better in terms of the business of political commentary. The actual politics of a party is now secondary to the monetization of the political brand," Walter Scheirer of the University of Notre Dame told AFP. "In the long run, this likely does weaken Trump's base."

- [Expulsion of Rep. Barzaga pushed](#) (2026-04-28 11:49)

MANILA, Philippines — Cavite 4th District Rep. Francisco Barzaga should be expelled from the House of Representatives, a lawmaker said on Tuesday. "With the numerous complaints already pending, yes, because nothing is changing," said Deputy Speaker and Iloilo 1st District Rep. Janette Garin in an interview with reporters when asked whether Barzaga should be expelled. She said she was leaving the decision to the House Committee on Ethics and Privileges. She said she could not vote in the proceedings because she filed two complaints against him. Barzaga has been suspended pending an ongoing investigation. She said that "historically, in Congress, if you were already suspended and then you have another suspension, and in his case the second suspension had a very strong warning that if he repeats it..., it will proceed to a higher penalty." In the same interview, Garin said Barzaga he told her, "'Mommy, kasi'--because many of the congs call me that--'Mommy, kasi ang pusa palaaway so kung hindi ako mang-aaway ng

mang-aaway, hindi ako posa...' (Mommy, because cats are quarrelsome so if I don't fight and fight, I am not a cat...)", she said. "You know, sometimes, people, we look at it as funny. But you are representing... constituents who are being deprived of their representation simply because you are looking at your position as a game. So this cannot be", she said. Garin said further on in the interview that "even under suspension, wala (nothing), parang (it's like), his point is, that's his nature as a cat. But he's not a cat. He's a member of Congress, duly elected, who should demonstrate what is expected commensurate to his position."

- [2 men critically wounded in Quezon City shooting](#) (2026-04-28 10:58)

MANILA, Philippines — Two men were critically wounded in a shooting incident in Quezon City, police said. Initial report showed that a riding-in-tandem blocked a white car at the corner of Timog Avenue and Edsa and fired repeatedly at the vehicle. Its two occupants, whose identities were not yet divulged, were immediately rushed to the nearby East Avenue Medical Center. Witnesses told police that the assailants fled toward the Edsa-Cubao area. Quezon City police told The Manila Times that it would come out with a statement regarding the incident.

- [US, PH showcase anti-drone capability in military drills](#) (2026-04-28 10:17)

NAVAL STATION LEOVIGILDO GANTIOQUI, Zambales — The United States Marines Corps (USMC) and the Philippine Air Force (PAF) on Tuesday conducted joint drills showing precise capability in intercepting drones and other aerial targets as part of the Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IADM) over the waters of San Antonio for this year's Exercise Balikatan. The main objective of the drills is to enhance interoperability amongst participating countries particularly the US and the Philippines. It also aims to increase the PAF's capability to patrol and defend Philippine airspace. During the exercise, three scenarios were played out, each featuring three different drones: the quadcopter, outlaw and banshee. The USMC showcased firepower with its Maritime Air Defense Integrated System (Madis), Vampire Laser System and the Avenger Air Defense System. The PAF meanwhile supported through system integration while Japanese forces observed the activity. The Madis is a short-range, surface-to-air defense system designed to detect and destroy low-altitude threats such as unmanned aerial systems (drones), helicopters and fixed-wing aircrafts. The short-range missile-mounted Avenger provided protection to ground troops against cruise missiles, unmanned aerial vehicles, low-flying fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters while the Vampire laser system also detects, engages and destroys small drones. "The scenario started with a detection of unknown tracks through our early detection sensor, like the radars we have behind. Then the tracks will be reviewed and correlated through our tactical air control element," Maj. Richmond Cayabyab, battery commander of the PAF's Spyder Air Defense. "Once we detect it's hostile, then it will be distributed to our Spider defense system then [weapons such as] our MADIS, Vampire [and] Avengers and these weapon systems will shoot down the threat," Cayabyab added. The first two drones were hit by the Madis' .30 caliber machine guns while the bigger Banshee was destroyed by its .50 caliber stringer missile.

- [House panel to tackle Sara's' kill' contract on Marcos](#) (2026-04-28 09:56)

MANILA, Philippines — The House of Representatives will tackle allegations that Vice President Sara Duterte had threatened to kill President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. when it resumes hearing the impeachment complaints against her on Wednesday. The hearing by the justice committee is expected to be the last before it determines whether there is probable cause to impeach Duterte. One of the two complaints alleged that Duterte committed culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayed public trust and committed high crimes "in contracting to murder or assassinate" Marcos Jr., First Lady Liza Araneta Marcos, and Leyte 1st District Rep. and former speaker Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. The complaint cited a Nov. 23, 2024 briefing with the media wherein she said, "[...] may kinausap na ako na tao. Sinabi ko sa kanya kapag pinatay ako, patayin mo si BBM, si Liza Araneta, at si Martin Romualdez I spoke to someone. I told him that if I am murdered, he should kill BBM, Liza Araneta and Martin Romualdez)." BBM is Bongbong Marcos. Duterte has denied making an assassination threat against Marcos. The other complaint alleged that she "committed acts that constitute culpable violation of the Constitution, betrayal of public trust, and other high crimes, by publicly admitting the contracting of an assassin." Duterte said the complaints failed to show "any shred of proof" that a contract to kill ever existed. "Instead, complainants rely on exaggerated conclusions dressed up as fact," it read.

- [ICC forms trial chamber for Duterte case](#) (2026-04-28 09:35)

MANILA, Philippines — The Presidency of the International Criminal Court (ICC) formed a trial chamber that would take on the case of former president Rodrigo Duterte, according to a decision released on April 24, 2026 but made public only on Tuesday. The move follows Pre-Trial Chamber I's confirmation of charges against Duterte on April 23. Under the latest decision, Trial Chamber III has been reconstituted and will be composed of Judge Joanna Korner, Judge Keebong Paek, and Judge Nicolas Guillou. The ICC Presidency noted that the chamber had previously been dissolved but was reactivated as part of measures to balance judicial workload, expedite proceedings, and improve overall court management. The Presidency acted pursuant to Article 61(11) of the Rome Statute, which requires the constitution of a trial chamber once charges have been confirmed. Rule 130 of the ICC's Rules of Procedure and Evidence further mandates the referral of the case and transmission of the confirmation decision and complete case record to the assigned chamber. In constituting the chamber, the Presidency cited several considerations, including statutory requirements, workload distribution across the court, the need to expedite proceedings, prior judicial involvement in related matters, and the judges' respective experience and expertise.

- [Road closures set for Labor Day activities in Manila](#) (2026-04-28 09:06)

MANILA, Philippines — The Manila Police District (MPD) announced Tuesday that several roads in the city would be closed starting 9 p.m. on April 30, 2026, following the announcement that Labor Day activities will be held on May 1. In a Facebook post, the MPD said the affected roads included stretches of C.M. Recto Avenue from N. Reyes Street to Mendiola, as well as Legarda Street from Figueras Street to San Rafael Street. Road closures will also be implemented near

Liwasang Bonifacio, particularly along Magallanes Drive from Jones Bridge to McArthur Bridge. Meanwhile, Ayala Bridge and the eastbound lane of Ayala Boulevard from San Marcelino Street to Romualdez Street will also be closed. The MPD urged motorists to take alternate routes to avoid inconvenience during the scheduled road closures.

- [House bill seeks to increase yearly paid leave to 10 days](#) (2026-04-28 08:00)

MANILA, Philippines — House Bill 6602 seeks to increase the minimum mandated yearly paid leave under the Labor Code to 10 days. "The 5-day paid leave mandated under the present law is no longer suitable for today's working conditions," Parañaque 2nd District Rep. Brian Yamsuan, a member of the House Committee on Labor and Employment, said in a statement on Tuesday. Based on the statement, the minimum five-day yearly Service Incentive Leave (SIL) mandated by the Labor Code took effect over 50 years ago. "While many large corporations already offer more than five days of SIL in the form of vacation and sick leaves, workers in companies without strong collective bargaining agreements have been left behind, making do with only the mandatory 5-day leave to rest or attend to personal concerns," Yamsuan was quoted in the statement. Under the bill, employees who have rendered at least a year of service would be entitled to the 10-day paid leave.

- [Police major detained amid alleged Negros e-sabong links](#) (2026-04-28 07:56)

MANILA, Philippines — A police major has been placed under restrictive custody amid alleged links to operations of illegal online cockfighting (e-sabong), as well as other illegal activities in Negros Island, the Philippine National Police (PNP) said Tuesday. "The officer has since been relieved from his post and placed under restrictive custody as part of an expanding probe into the alleged gambling network," the PNP said in a statement. The PNP however did not reveal the identity of the police official in question who was also relieved from his post, Gen. Jose Melencio Nartatez Jr., PNP chief, said. Nartatez also ordered the Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (CIDG) in coordination with the Integrity Monitoring and Enforcement Group to conduct an intense case build-up and investigation to uncover all uniformed personnel involved in such activities. "This kind of police officer symbolizes termites that threaten to destroy what we all built for the PNP, Nartatez said. "We will not allow that to happen by exhausting all necessary measures to identify them and hold them accountable," he said. Nartatez vowed to personally monitor the progress of the investigation to ensure that appropriate criminal and administrative charges would be filed while observing due process. "There are only a few of them in the PNP. Let us all work together to identify them and remove them from our organization to protect our badge and what we established so far in winning the hearts and minds of our kababayan," he said.

- [Palace: Zaldy Co seeking political asylum in France](#) (2026-04-28 07:44)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Ako Bicol Party-list representative Zaldy Co is now seeking political asylum in France, Malacañang said Tuesday. During a press conference, Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said that Co was no longer in the Czech Republic and currently has a

pending petition for political asylum in France. "He has been requested to be transferred to and is now under jurisdiction of French authorities," Castro said. She said President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. would meet with Philippine ambassadors in Czech Republic and France to tackle Co's status.

- [NBI backs Pasig closure order vs hotel linked to trafficking probe](#) (2026-04-28 07:35)

MANILA, Philippines. — The National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) on Tuesday expressed support for the closure order issued by the Pasig City government against Bleu Hotel, saying the move stemmed from serious allegations of human trafficking and prostitution uncovered during investigation. In a statement, the NBI said the shutdown was “not rooted in speculation or politics,” but in alleged offenses that carry “grave legal and moral consequences.” The hotel was among the establishments implicated in an earlier NBI-led entrapment and rescue operation in Ortigas, Pasig City, which resulted in the rescue of 54 women and the arrest of several individuals linked to a suspected trafficking network operating inside a nightclub–hotel setup. Authorities said the operation uncovered an alleged system where customers were entertained inside a nightclub before being brought to hotel rooms where sexual services were reportedly facilitated. Despite the closure order, the NBI stressed that the case has not been closed. “All parties are entitled to the full protection of the law, including the opportunity to answer the charges, present evidence, and undergo proper judicial proceedings before any final determination of liability is made,” the bureau said. The agency described human trafficking as among the most serious crimes under Philippine law, noting that it exploits vulnerable individuals and turns them into commodities for profit. It added that establishments found to have been used as venues for such activities must be held accountable under existing laws. The NBI also said liability may extend beyond day-to-day operators, noting that owners, incorporators, and individuals with legal or beneficial control over establishments may be held accountable if their businesses are used in trafficking operations. The bureau said the Pasig City government’s closure order reflects the state’s firm stance against exploitation and reinforces that business permits and corporate structures do not shield individuals from possible liability.

- [Filipinos abroad urged to respect national anthem after viral US party video](#) (2026-04-28 06:26)

MANILA, Philippines — The National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NHCP) on Tuesday called on overseas Filipinos to respect the national anthem following a viral video online where the national anthem was sung at a party in the United States. The incident, which reportedly took place in December 2025, involved partygoers who were seen singing the Philippine National Anthem “in a rowdy and noisy manner” during what appeared to be an outdoor rave under a marquee. In a statement, the NHCP said it was constrained from taking legal action as Philippine laws could not be enforced abroad. Instead, they called on overseas Filipinos to uphold Republic Act 8491, which mandates respect and proper conduct when performing the country’s national symbols, including the anthem.

- [NBI defends Pasig raid, says more charges to be filed against perpetrators](#) (2026-04-28 06:02)

MANILA, Philippines — The National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) on Tuesday stood by its operation against a business establishment that was suspected of trafficking women, saying the raid that led to the rescue of dozens of victims was carried out in full compliance with legal procedures and said that more charges would be filed in the coming days. In a statement, the NBI said its actions against the Chicago Family KTV and Bleu Hotel in Ortigas, Pasig City, were guided by the evidentiary standards required under the justice system and conducted in close coordination among government agencies. The clarification came after the bureau, through its Special Task Group, mounted an entrapment and rescue operation on April 21, 2026 targeting a suspected trafficking-in-persons network. The operation, conducted alongside the Department of Justice–Inter-Agency Council Against Trafficking and other partner agencies, resulted in the rescue of 54 women and the arrest of 15 individuals, including managers, facilitators, and customers. Investigators said the establishments allegedly employed a “line-up” system where customers selected women inside the nightclub before proceeding to hotel rooms where sexual services were consummated. Transactions were estimated to range from P10,000 to P20,000, with proceeds allegedly shared among those involved in the operation. Authorities said those arrested are facing charges for violations of Republic Act 9208, or the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act, as amended, and Republic Act 9165, or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002. Recovered during the raid were marked money, suspected illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia, and documents linked to the alleged activities. The NBI said individuals found at the premises who initially appeared to have no involvement in the alleged crimes were released after proper identification and processing, citing constitutional protections against warrantless detention without probable cause. It added that its focus, consistent with Department of Justice Department Circular 20, was to build cases against operators and traffickers while ensuring the protection of victims. “The Chicago case is far from closed,” the NBI said, noting that additional charges would be filed against other individuals and entities in coordination with the DOJ anti-trafficking council. The bureau said it was exercising caution to ensure that cases filed in court would meet the “standard of certainty of conviction” and withstand legal scrutiny, avoiding dismissals that could prejudice victims. Corporate records obtained during the investigation showed that the registered owners of the establishments included the wife and son of former congressman Mike Defensor. Defensor’s wife Juie denied her involvement in trafficking in a statement over the weekend. The NBI stressed, however, that the information forms part of an ongoing probe and does not in itself establish criminal liability, adding that all parties are presumed innocent unless proven guilty in court. The rescued women have been turned over to social welfare authorities for care and assistance. The NBI reiterated its commitment to transparency, saying the outcome of its investigation would speak for itself as it moves to dismantle trafficking networks and hold those responsible accountable.

- [Impeach complaint hearings exempted from Bank Secrecy Law, says House lawmaker](#) (2026-04-28 04:30)

MANILA, Philippines — The ongoing hearings by the House of Representatives on the impeachment complaints against Vice President Sara Duterte are exempted from the Bank Secrecy Law, a lawmaker said on Tuesday. "It is clearer than day that impeachment hearings are exceptions to the coverage of the Bank Secrecy Law and Anti-Money Laundering Act," Akbayan Rep. Perci Cendaña said in a statement. Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro, chairman of the justice committee that is presiding over the hearings, said on radio that the panel did not violate the law in disclosing findings of the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC), after Duterte's husband, Manases Carpio, filed a complaint on Monday at the Quezon City Prosecutor's Office against several people, including Luistro, Cendaña, Mamamayang Liberal Rep. Leila de Lima, and Akbayan Rep. Jose Manuel "Chel" Diokno over the disclosure. The committee is determining whether there is probable cause to impeach Duterte. De Lima said in Filipino in a post on X, "I am not afraid to face any case, especially that we... are not violating any law." Akbayan Rep. Chel Diokno said in Filipino and English in a statement that anyone could file a complaint and that he respected that right, adding that he would "answer the allegations in the proper forum." He then said, "At the same time, I have to emphasize that the House Committee on Justice is merely fulfilling its duty."

- [PH can hit 95% immunization goal, but gaps remain—Unicef](#) (2026-04-28 04:15)

MANILA, Philippines — The United Nations Children's Fund (Unicef) Philippines called on the need to strengthen routine immunization systems and address challenges in vaccine supply and demand as part of the observance of World Immunization Week. In a statement Tuesday, Unicef Philippines cited the National Demographic Health Survey, noting that achieving the 95 percent immunization coverage is feasible—pointing to Region I (Ilocos) as its proof—but emphasized that targeted efforts are still needed in remote and underserved areas. "Vaccines have protected generation after generation. But the next generation depends on whether we reach every child today, especially those who remain unvaccinated. We must close the gaps that leave children unprotected by ensuring reliable vaccine supply and quality services and by building trust and demand in communities so that families choose protection for their children," said Kyungsun Kim, Unicef representative in the Philippines.

- [Former Duterte spokesman Roque rejects BIR's tax evasion complaint against him](#) (2026-04-28 03:44)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Malacañang spokesman Harry Roque late on Monday denied the tax evasion complaint filed by the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) against himself, his wife Mylah, and his legal counsel, Percival Ortega. In a statement on his Facebook page, the former Palace official said the complaint alleged that Roque, his wife, and lawyer acquired tax deficiencies totaling P3.35 million. "These filings form part of a continuing pattern of actions which we believe are politically motivated and intended to harass and pressure individuals associated with, or perceived to be supportive of, the Duterte administration. We view these developments with serious concern as they raise fundamental issues regarding fairness, equal protection, and the impartial administration of justice," he wrote. "There has been no

issuance of shares whatsoever pursuant to any alleged increase in authorized capital stock. Absent actual issuance or subscription of shares, there is no taxable event that could give rise to liability under Philippine tax law,” he added. Roque said the allegations were “premised on a misunderstanding of basic corporate and tax principles.”

- [Dizon returns to Navotas landfill with Japanese experts as govt ramps up response to toxic blaze](#) (2026-04-28 03:34)

MANILA, Philippines — Public Works Secretary Vince Dizon returned to the Navotas Sanitary Landfill on Tuesday, leading a high-level inspection team amid escalating concerns over toxic emissions and persistent underground fires at the dumpsite. Dizon was joined by Japanese Ambassador to the Philippines Kazuyo Endo, Environment Secretary Juan Miguel Cuna, Navotas City Mayor John Rey Tiangco, and a team of technical experts from Japan’s disaster response units—signaling a stronger international collaboration to address the fire at the Navotas Landfill. The visit marks a critical follow-up effort by the government to assess the current condition of the landfill, where smoldering methane pockets have continued to produce hazardous smoke affecting not only Navotas but nearby cities as well. Authorities said the presence of Japanese experts was expected to fast-track technical solutions, particularly in controlling deep-seated fires that are difficult to extinguish using conventional methods. Dizon emphasized the urgency of the situation, noting that heavy equipment and mitigation measures deployed in previous days must now be evaluated for effectiveness, while identifying additional interventions to finally contain the blaze.

- [Phivolcs pushes geologic hazard communication drive for Bicol residents](#) (2026-04-28 02:29)

MANILA, Philippines — The Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology (Phivolcs) is set to conduct a communication campaign aimed at enhancing the capacity of public information officers and media practitioners in reporting science-based information on geologic hazards. Phivolcs Director Teresito Bacolcol in a Viber interview with The Manila Times on Tuesday said the information drive, which would focus on volcanic eruptions, earthquakes and tsunamis, would be held on April 29, 2026 in Naga City, Camarines Sur. Bacolcol said the activity sought to boost the capability of media practitioners and public information officers based in Bicol (Region 5) to effectively communicate science-based information on geologic hazards. According to the state seismology bureau, Region 5 is home to active volcanoes, specifically Mayon in Albay province which is currently under Alert Level 3; and Bulusan in Sorsogon, under Alert Level 1. These volcanoes pose recurring threats from ashfall, lava flows, and pyroclastic density currents, Phivolcs said. The region is also traversed by active faults capable of generating strong earthquakes that may result in ground shaking, liquefaction, earthquake-induced landslides, casualties, and damage to properties, it said. In addition, coastal areas remain vulnerable to tsunamis triggered by the movement of the Philippine Trench, Phivolcs added. “Given these situations, a clear and locally relevant hazard communication is essential. Misinterpretation or misreporting of geohazard information can lead to confusion or

unnecessary panic among the public,” the Phivolcs chief said. He said Phivolcs and its mother agency – Department of Science and Technology (DOST) under the stewardship of former Phivolcs Director and now Secretary Renato Solidum Jr. – acknowledged the crucial role of information officers and media practitioners as key partners in the dissemination of accurate, reliable, and timely information before, during, and after significant geohazard events. Solidum, in separate interview, cited the importance of the information campaign as it promoted responsible science communication, enhances public education and supports informed decision-making of the concerned local government units. “It also contributes to efforts for disaster risk reduction in vulnerable communities across the Bicol Region,” the DOST chief said. Bacolcol said the “Phivolcs InfoPress” was organized in collaboration with DOST’s regional offices, Philippine Information Agency and Office of Civil Defense.

- [Slippery Zaldy eludes PH authorities again, no longer in Czech custody](#) (2026-04-28 01:52)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Ako Bicol party-list representative Zaldy Co is no longer under the custody of Czech authorities, the Department of Justice (DOJ) confirmed, complicating efforts by the Philippine government to bring him home to face corruption charges. Acting Justice Secretary Frederick Vida disclosed the development following a meeting with Czech officials, saying authorities informed him that Co had been released. “I have to share difficult news. Czech authorities have informed us that Mr. Zaldy Co is no longer in their custody,” Vida said during a briefing. Vida said Co was believed to be staying within the Schengen area, but Czech authorities declined to provide details on his whereabouts, citing data privacy rules and the bloc’s open-border policies. “They’re citing Schengen rules and data privacy provisions,” he said. The justice chief added that Czech officials also pointed to the absence of a formal police cooperation agreement between the Philippines and the Czech Republic, although discussions to establish one are ongoing. Vida expressed frustration over the development after nearly an hour of talks with his counterparts. “I am disappointed by the lack of knowledge. They expressed that they understand the gravity of the case and the Filipino public. I am confused about the legal parameters from which this is coming,” he said. President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. announced on April 16 that Co had been arrested in Prague for allegedly entering the Czech Republic without proper documentation. Co is facing charges of corruption and malversation before the Sandiganbayan, filed by the Office of the Ombudsman in November 2025. The case stemmed from an alleged P289-million ghost flood control project in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro, which also implicates officials from the Department of Public Works and Highways Region 4B and executives of Sunwest Construction and Development Corp. Philippine authorities said efforts were ongoing to locate Co and secure his return to face trial.

- [Public Attorney's Office gets perfect score anew for 100% budget use](#) (2026-04-28 01:39)

MANILA, Philippines — The Public Attorney’s Office (PAO) under the stewardship of its chief, Persida Rueda-Acosta, has emerged as the only attached agency of the Department of Justice (DOJ) that achieved a perfect score based on the 2025 Annual Agency Performance Review

(AAPR) of the Department of Budget and Management (DBM). Overall, the DOJ obtained a score of 4.15 or very satisfactory, taking into consideration its financial and physical performance and timeliness and quality of the report submissions, according to DBM. Based on DBM documents, copies of which were obtained by The Manila Times, the justice department for fiscal year 2025 registered obligation and disbursement budget utilization rates of 85.59 percent and 86.69 percent, respectively. “The PAO consistently achieved 100 percent utilization across all parameters,” acting DBM Secretary Rolando Toledo said in a communication addressed to acting DOJ Secretary Frederick Vida. In 2024, PAO was also declared DBM’s top achiever for obtaining a perfect score of 5 for the same financial and physical performance review. Describing PAO in its AAPR report as ‘outstanding’ in its financial performance, the DBM said it (PAO) has ensured that set goals were carried out within the allocated timeframe and budget. On physical performance, the DBM likewise cited PAO for its almost 100 percent rating on alternative dispute resolutions and public attorneys’ perfect attendance in court hearings, among others. PAO has consistently met and exceeded its performance targets for these indicators, according to the same DBM report. Elated by DBM’s “remarkable rating,” Rueda-Acosta said this would result “in a more effective, organized, and streamlined approach in rendering service to the Filipino people.” The chief public attorney reminds her co-officials, lawyers, and staff on the importance of integrity in the agency’s expenditures as these funds were from the taxes of the hard-working ‘Juan dela Cruz.’ “It is a must that up until the last centavo is accounted for,” Rueda-Acosta said. Rueda-Acosta said the outstanding rating was not just the success of PAO but also the victory of all especially the indigents and underprivileged members of society. “For this is an implication that PAO is a well-performing government agency, both in the physical and financial performances, that banks on transparency and accountability,” she added. The AAPR report tracks how agencies use their allocated funds as it presents the results of the enhanced review, assessment, and evaluation of the annual performance of national government agencies, other executive offices, constitutional commissions as well as state universities and colleges. An autonomous government agency under Republic Act 9406 (PAO Law), PAO remains attached to the DOJ only for policy and program coordination, meaning, it has no direct control over the former, especially on its day-to-day operations.

- [Hot, humid easterly winds prevail over most parts of PH](#) (2026-04-27 22:27)

The easterlies would continue to be a dominant weather system, affecting most parts of the archipelago at least until the weekend, the national weather agency said on Tuesday. Weather specialist Chenel Domiguez of the Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pagasa) said in a 5 a.m. briefing that it has not monitored any low-pressure area forming inside or outside the country’s area of responsibility in the coming days. Dominguez said the easterly winds would bring not only warm, humid weather but also cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms over Lanao del Norte, Lanao del Sur, Maguindanao del Norte, Maguindanao del Sur, Zamboanga del Sur, and Misamis Occidental. “Even flash floods or landslides due to moderate to at times heavy rains would be

possible in these areas,” the Pagasa forecaster warned. The same weather system would bring partly cloudy skies with isolated rain showers or thunderstorms to Metro Manila and the rest of the country. “Generally, it would be another hot and humid day in the country, and it would be even hotter from late morning until mid-afternoon, so stay hydrated,” Dominguez said. A heat index of 42 degrees Celsius could be felt over Metro Manila on Tuesday, and the highest could be recorded over Sangley Point, Cavite, both falling under danger category, under which heat cramps and exhaustion are likely, the state-run weather bureau said.

- [VP's husband sue lawmakers, BSP, AMLC](#) (2026-04-27 16:17)

THE husband of Vice President Sara Duterte, Manases Carpio, filed criminal complaints Monday before the Quezon City Prosecutor's Office against four lawmakers, the central bank governor and the head of the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC), accusing them of violating the Bank Secrecy Law by divulging their bank transactions during a congressional hearing. Named respondents in his complaint were Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas Governor Eli Remolona Jr., AMLC Executive Director Ronel Buenaventura, and Reps. Gerville Reyes Luistro, Percival Cendaña, Jose Manuel “Chel” Diokno and Leila de Lima and several unnamed others. Carpio's lawyer, Peter Paul Danao, said the respondents would be facing charges of violating Republic Act 9160 (Anti-Money Laundering Act), RA 1405 (Bank Secrecy Law), and RA 10173 (Data Privacy Act). Carpio, who did not deny that he and the vice president had P6.7 billion in bank transactions over a 20-year period, turned down interviews with the media. Reacting to the filing of charges, the central bank said the “BSP and the Anti-Money Laundering Council continue to perform their mandates in accordance with law, guided by independence, professionalism, and due process” and said it would issue an appropriate response before the proper forum upon receipt of the complaint. Luistro, chairman of the House Committee on Justice, said the case filed against lawmakers was “one of the options” by the defense “to suppress the disclosure of this information.” “As far as the committee is concerned, we maintain the position that we did not violate any law,” Luistro said. Carpio's lawyer said his client strongly objects to the “conspiratorial act of disclosing and divulging to the general public the purported reports of banks to the AMLC concerning their account deposits, withdrawal, bank balances and related records without prior notice nor prior written consent.” During last week's House Committee on Justice hearing on the impeachment complaint against the vice president, the AMLC revealed that it had received reports of “suspicious” and “covered” bank transactions amounting to P6.77 billion linked to Duterte and Carpio during a period of nearly 20 years. Carpio in the same complaint said that it was indisputable that the AMLC reports involving his and his wife's banking transactions were sensitive information that should not be disclosed to anyone. “Neither I nor my wife were previously notified, let alone have consented, to this public disclosure of our confidential bank transactions. Yet, respondents openly divulged these banking transaction reports in a public hearing before the House Committee on Justice,” he said. Carpio maintained that the respondents have “criminally and feloniously” disclosed and unraveled the alleged transaction reports without his consent and despite his objection. In pushing through with the complaint, Danao said they believed that those involved, specifically

the respondents, should be criminally penalized for divulging in public the couple's bank transactions without their full consent. "The prohibition is absolute. There is no exception. In fact, even the media are not allowed to divulge any bank transaction reports," Danao said. "That's the same law that was passed and enacted by the members of the House of Representatives themselves," he added. The BSP emphasized its adherence to due process and the rule of law, saying the central bank will respond once it receives a formal copy of the case. "The governor has yet to receive a copy of the complaint and will respond appropriately upon receipt, before the proper forum," the central bank said. In an interview on radio DZMM, Luistro said their actions do not violate the Anti-Money Laundering Act, stressing that what they sought during the hearing were not bank records, but covered and suspicious transactions under the AMLA. She said the totality of all laws pertaining to transactions and bank records must be considered during an impeachment investigation. "This is an accountability mechanism and therefore the exception provided in the Bank Secrecy Law must be interpreted in such a way that it should cover any other confidentiality in other existing laws. Otherwise, no impeachment would continue on the ground of unexplained wealth," Luistro said. Other lawmakers named in the complaint urged Duterte to face the final impeachment hearing on April 29. "My advice to the camp of VP Sara, instead of wasting paper and time in filing cases, they should just face the Committee on Justice hearing on April 29," Akbayan Rep. Percival Cendana said. Malacañang on Monday said it respects the move of Carpio to file complaints and that it would be up to the court to decide whether or not they will hold. "Anyone has the right to file a lawsuit. The only question is, if it will prosper. So, the Palace and the president are no longer in control of what the court's decision will be," Presidential Communications Office Undersecretary Claire Castro said in Filipino in a briefing. - [Duterte still leads poll but margin narrowing](#) (2026-04-27 16:16)

IF presidential elections were held today, Vice President Sara Duterte would win in a head-to-head battle with Naga City Mayor Leni Robredo, OCTA Research said Monday. In its Tugon ng Masa survey conducted March 19-25, 2026, Duterte had a voter preference score of 46 percent as opposed to Robredo, who had 35 percent. Some 19 percent were undecided. OCTA noted, however, that while Duterte retains a clear advantage in a direct head-to-head scenario, the margin separating the two candidates is no longer as wide as in previous survey periods. "This suggests that while VP Duterte remains ahead, the race appears more competitive in Q1 2026 than in earlier quarters," the pollster said. It also noted the 19 percent who remain undecided was a "substantial segment" of the electorate and thus, remains movable. "This suggests that while the broad structure of the race is already visible, the current margin remains contestable and still open to movement as candidate positioning, alliances, campaign visibility, and national conditions evolve," OCTA said. OCTA said that Duterte's lead was due to strong regional concentration than national dominance, highlighting her supermajority lead in Mindanao at 88 percent and majority in Visayas at 53 percent. The pollster suggests that Duterte's national advantage is reinforced by a strong southern and central

regional base, giving her a strong national floor and a clear advantage in a direct two-candidate contest. Robredo, meanwhile, is strong in the National Capital Region at 52 percent and Balance Luzon at 47 percent, suggesting a geographically distinct support coalition centered in urban and northern areas. Duterte also led in Socioeconomic class E voters with 56 percent preference, followed by Classes ABC at 46 percent and Class D at 44 percent. Robredo, meanwhile, has 39 percent preference for Class ABC and 36 percent for Class D. In earlier OCTA survey with 26 names, Duterte led with 33 percent, followed by Robredo at 21 percent, then followed by Manila Mayor Francisco “Isko Moreno” Domagoso, and Sens. Raffy Tulfo and Bam Aquino. The survey had 1,200 respondents and has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent nationwide.

- [US extends window to buy Russian crude](#) (2026-04-27 16:15)

THE Department of Energy (DOE) announced that the US has issued a new waiver that will allow countries to procure oil from Russia, a move that will benefit the Philippines. “There is a new waiver, effective from April 17 until May 16, which was issued by the US. Also to clarify, the waiver applies to the Philippines as well,” DOE Undersecretary Alessandro Sales said in a media briefing. The United States Department of the Treasury recently renewed a waiver allowing countries to buy sanctioned Russian oil at sea loaded on vessels from April 17 through May 16. This replaces a 30-day waiver that expired on April 11 and excludes transactions involving Iran, Cuba and North Korea. The DOE also announced that all four diesel shipments secured under the government’s Emergency Energy Security Program have arrived, delivering a total of 178,331,781 liters of diesel to help strengthen the country’s buffer amid continued volatility in the global oil market caused by the war in the Middle East. The DOE said that the first shipment, consisting of 142,531.23 barrels or 22,660,613 liters of diesel from Japan, arrived in Batangas on March 26, 2026. The second shipment, consisting of 329,650 barrels or 52,410,065 liters, arrived in Subic. This was followed by the third shipment, consisting of 319,576 barrels or 50,808,430 liters, also delivered to Subic, and the fourth shipment, consisting of 329,918 barrels or 52,452,673 liters, which arrived in Davao City. The department noted that timely fuel arrivals are critical not only to maintaining inventory levels, but also to supporting the uninterrupted operation of key sectors such as transport, logistics, power generation, agriculture, and industry. “The arrival of all four diesel shipments shows that the government is acting with urgency to protect the country’s fuel supply. As the Middle East conflict continues, our priority is to ensure that the Philippines remains prepared, adequately supplied, and able to respond swiftly to developments that may affect fuel availability and market stability,” Energy Secretary Sharon Garin said. “We assure the public that we will continue to work closely with concerned government entities and industry stakeholders to monitor inventory, facilitate the timely distribution of fuel, and prevent supply bottlenecks that may disrupt essential economic activity,” she added. Also on Monday, the DOE said diesel and kerosene prices will go down, while gasoline prices will increase slightly on Tuesday, April 28, as the market reacted to recent developments in the Middle East. According to the agency, and based on the advisory bulletins of Shell, Seaoil, Jetti Petroleum, and Unioil, diesel prices are estimated to go down by at least

P12.94 per liter, while gasoline prices are expected to go up by P0.53 per liter. The cost of kerosene is also expected to drop by at least P15.71 per liter. Last week, diesel prices dropped by around P24.94 per liter, gasoline by P3.41 per liter, while kerosene prices went down by about P2 per liter.

- [Pag-IBIG Fund, DHSUD hold 2 housing fairs](#) (2026-04-27 16:14)

THE Home Mutual Development Fund (HDMF) or Pag-IBIG Fund in partnership with its mother agency — the Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) — announced a series of housing fairs in Southern Luzon and Visayas, aimed at bringing more housing options closer to Filipino workers and their families. Pag-IBIG CEO Marilene Acosta said the first of the twin events in Southern Luzon took place at the Jose Rizal Coliseum in Calamba City, Laguna and on April 28, the second housing fair. In the Visayas, it has been set for April 30 and May 1 at the IEC Convention Center Cebu. More than 20,000 housing units from partner developers and the agency's acquired properties for sale were expected to be showcased during the series of events, the Pag-IBIG chief said. Housing Secretary Jose Ramon Aliling, who chairs HDMF's board of trustees, said both the housing department and Pag-IBIG continue to heed the call of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. to make decent and affordable housing more accessible to Filipino families through the expanded "Pambansang Pabahay Para sa Pilipino" (4PH) program. "By continuing these housing fairs in South Luzon and the Visayas, Pag-IBIG Fund is bringing together leading private developers, Pag-IBIG Fund's affordable financing programs, and government assistance in one accessible venue, so that more workers can move from simply hoping for a home to actually taking concrete steps toward owning one," Aliling said. The series of housing fairs follow the earlier Central Luzon leg and forms part of the broader regional rollout of housing fairs aimed at making the path to homeownership easier and more accessible, according to HDMF. Acosta said that Pag-IBIG's housing loans enable low-income and other qualified members, including overseas Filipino workers (OFWs), to access decent housing at monthly amortizations that are often lower than prevailing rental costs. She said that the housing fairs make these homeownership opportunities more accessible by bringing housing options and the agency's financing assistance together in one venue. "Through Pag-IBIG Fund's affordable housing loan programs, many families may now find that what they would otherwise spend on rent can already be used to start paying for a home they will eventually own," Acosta said. "This allows members not only to realize possible savings on monthly housing costs, but also to build long-term household stability, equity, and a more secure future. Through these housing fairs, we are making that opportunity more tangible by bringing housing options and financing guidance together in one venue, where members can compare choices and take clearer steps toward homeownership," she said. Aliling said the lowest monthly amortization offered in the fairs is in support to the poverty reduction effort of the Marcos administration by enabling families to shift from renting to homeownership. As a result, he said this would allow them to invest in long-term stability and redirect resources toward other essential needs such as education, health, and livelihood. The socialized housing units under 4PH that are being offered to the prospective homebuyers

include the Pasinaya Heights in Laguna, where a unit priced at P1.404 million may be purchased at a monthly amortization of as low as P2,257.91 in the first year, and Asenso Yuhum Residences in Bacolod, where a 24-square-meter condominium unit priced at P1.059 million may be acquired at a monthly amortization of as low as P1,703.08 in the first year. “These affordable monthly payments are made possible through Pag-IBIG Fund’s Housing Loan Program under the Expanded 4PH, which offers a subsidized 3 percent interest rate for the first five years of the loan term, with the possibility of extension for another five years for eligible borrowers,” Acosta said. At the same time, the HDMF is still offering the Early Bird Promo, under which the first 30,000 qualified borrowers may enjoy the same 3 percent interest rate for the first 10 years of their loan, further easing the path to homeownership, she said. Aliling was joined by Acosta during the Calamba housing fair, underscoring the strong partnership to advance more inclusive housing programs, the DHSUD said.

- [Dy to Asean women lawmakers: Push for change](#) (2026-04-27 16:13)

SPEAKER Faustino Dy III called on women parliamentarians in Southeast Asia to push for “deeper, system-level change” and move from representation to real power in governance. In his speech at the 5th Meeting of the Coordinating Committee of Women Parliamentarians of the Asean Inter-Parliamentary Assembly (AIPA) which was held virtually, Dy said parliamentarians must move beyond “gender-responsiveness toward true transformation — reshaping systems, dismantling barriers, and ensuring women have real decision-making power.”

“Transformation must go beyond representation. It must create real opportunity — for women to lead, to build enterprises, and for marginalized voices to be heard. Inclusion is measured not by presence, but by impact,” Dy said. He linked women’s leadership to stronger institutions and lasting peace in the Southeast Asian region. “Peace is not just the absence of conflict — it is trust in institutions and in the future. When women lead, peace becomes more durable,” Dy said. He highlighted the Philippines’ National Action Plan on Women, Peace, and Security as part of efforts to promote inclusive and responsive governance. “At the core of all this is people-centered governance — laws grounded in real needs, budgets that reflect everyday realities, and institutions that are open and accountable,” Dy said. In her speech, Deputy Speaker Rachel Arenas underscored the need for sustained leadership and cooperation among women lawmakers in the region. “Though we gather today through extraordinary circumstances, our presence here sends an extraordinary message: that even in uncertain times, leadership does not pause; cooperation does not weaken; and the work of building a better future must continue,” Arenas said. She stressed that the global energy crisis, driven in part by tensions in the Middle East, is a test of the region’s collective resolve. “Yet even as challenges test our systems, they also reveal our character. Today, by choosing dialogue over delay and action over hesitation, we prove that Asean’s spirit remains strong,” Arenas said. In the session, House Committee on Women and Gender Equality chairman and Laguna Rep. Ann Matibag, who was appointed as the chairman of WAIPA, called on the region’s lawmakers to strive for deeper institutional reforms to build gender-transformative, inclusive, and future-ready parliaments. “A future-ready parliament is

one that is inclusive, adaptive, and responsive — able to anticipate change, enhance oversight, and ensure that legislation and public resources respond effectively to emerging risks and inequalities,” Matibag said. The event gathered women lawmakers from across the region to advance cooperation on political participation, economic leadership, and inclusive governance.

- [Scrap fuel taxes, raise wages, groups urge Marcos](#) (2026-04-27 16:12)

A MAJOR labor organization renewed its demand to President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. for the immediate suspension of excise taxes and value-added tax (VAT) on fuel, and an increase in wages, saying that soaring prices and stagnant pay are squeezing workers dry. The Federation of Free Workers (FFW) on Monday said that while it welcomes the president’s limited suspension of excise taxes on kerosene and LPG, the move barely scratches the surface. The FFW said the high cost of fuel continues to drive up transportation fares, food costs, and basic goods, while wages remain stuck. “If you have the power, use it. Don’t use the law as a display while prices are skyrocketing and workers’ belts are tightening,” said Ma. Victoria Bellosillo of the FFW Women’s Network. Bellosillo said the oil crisis must not become a government cash cow. “Taxes contribute to order. But it’s a different story when the government makes money during a crisis. When VAT increases due to expensive oil, it’s like a receipt for the people’s suffering,” she said. “As crude oil prices rise, the collection increases. The suffering of workers should not be turned into a piggy bank,” she said. FFW urged the President to use his powers under Republic Act 12316 to expand excise tax relief and press Congress to suspend or cut VAT on petroleum products. At the same time, it called for tighter price controls and stronger action against profiteering. “Tax relief and price control must go hand in hand. Otherwise, the profiteers will just take back the comfort they were given. It’s like being given an umbrella with a hole — there’s still a price to pay,” FFW said. Together with major labor coalitions, FFW is pushing for a legislated P200 daily wage hike nationwide. In Calabarzon, FFW unions are preparing a petition for a P1,200 per day regional minimum wage.

- [More benefits for those with eye problems sought](#) (2026-04-27 16:11)

SEN. Bong Go pressed for expanded benefits for people with eye problems. Go made the appeal on Saturday during the 76th National Convention of the Optometrists Association of the Philippines. He urged the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) to expand patient benefits that would include visual care support such as reading glasses and prescription eyewear. Go earlier called for expanded benefit packages, higher case rates, improved outpatient and emergency coverage, and the removal of policies that limit access to benefits. He said public health funds must be felt directly by patients through lower out-of-pocket expenses, wider coverage, and better support in hospitals. “I highly commend your organization for continuously striving to elevate the standards of eye care in our country,” Go said in a video message. “Sight is one of our most vital senses, and your profession plays a crucial role in ensuring that Filipinos can see the world clearly, allowing them to lead productive and meaningful lives,” he said. Go said optometrists form part of the wider healthcare workforce that helps protect the health and well-being of Filipinos, particularly through preventive,

specialized, and community-based care. “As vice chairman of the Senate Committee on Health, my advocacy has always been centered on protecting the health and well-being of every Filipino,” he said. The OAP gathering carried the theme “Optometry and the Future of Care: The Hybrid Model of Practice,” to discuss developments in eye care and the evolving practice of optometry. Go expressed hope that the group’s national convention would serve as a venue for knowledge sharing, professional collaboration, and continued improvement in the delivery of eye care services.

- [EU hopeful sea code would bring regional peace, stability](#) (2026-04-27 16:10)

EUROPEAN Union Ambassador to Manila Massimo Santoro said the EU is hopeful that the Code of Conduct (COC) in the South China Sea being finalized this year would be “legally binding” to ensure peace and stability in the region. The Philippines, as chairman of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) in 2026, has expressed commitment to finalizing this year the COC between Asean and China, which has dragged on for 17 years due to some contentious issues. The Asean is composed of Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Timor-Leste, Thailand, and Vietnam. “Sometimes somebody asks me, why is the European Union so interested in the South China Sea?” Santoro said in an interview with a select group of reporters over the weekend. “Well, if I move it to the trade dimension, almost 40 percent of the trade that goes to Europe passes from the South China Sea,” Santoro pointed out. The envoy expressed confidence that “any side to this negotiation is interested in a code of conduct which is functional for its purpose.” “From our side, we also hope a legally binding one. This is what the European Union likes,” Santoro added. “Clearly, we are supportive of a code of conduct. This is a good tool for all parties adhering to it, for ensuring stability, for ensuring predictability, for ensuring that no unilateral action occurs, for ensuring full respect of rights, the legitimate rights of each party,” he said. “I think that if the code of conduct becomes a good, solid product, fully consistent with Unclos (United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea), in my view, its potential goes well beyond the only parties to it,” the envoy added. Santoro also said that “any negotiation which is multilateral depends on the willingness, on the participation, and on the genuine approach of all sides involved.” “I think that it is not a surprise the Philippines is making so far an excellent job in this negotiation. I’m completely confident that the Philippines is an excellent actor for such negotiations,” he said. Foreign Affairs Secretary Ma. Theresa Lazaro earlier said the COC in the South China Sea, once finalized, would benefit both the Asean and China.

- [Seafarers tired and worried after being stranded in Persian Gulf for weeks](#) (2026-04-27 16:09)

NEW DELHI — For about eight weeks, Indian Capt. Rahul Dhar and his crew have been stranded on their tanker in the Persian Gulf, sometimes watching drones and missiles explode as the Strait of Hormuz remained effectively shut while the Iran war dragged on. The crew’s morale, he said, is holding as they carry on with their routines, but the strain is beginning to show. A shaky ceasefire between the US and Iran has brought “a careful sense of hope” for the crew,

but there is still no clear end to the war. “Day to day, we try to keep things normal with open conversations and small team activities that help lift everyone’s spirits.” The crew sighted drones and missile interceptions several times, both near the ship and along the horizon during their watches. “Those moments were difficult and created real tension for the crew,” Dhar told The Associated Press. “None of us expected the warlike situation,” he said, noting that reliable internet has helped them stay in touch with families. “Those calls and messages really keep us grounded and give us strength.” About 20,000 seafarers are stranded in the Gulf. Around 20,000 seafarers on hundreds of vessels, including oil and gas tankers and cargo ships, have been stuck in the Gulf, unable to cross the Strait of Hormuz. Normally about a fifth of the world’s oil and liquefied natural gas transits the waterway. Roughly 80 vessels passed through the strait in the week of April 13–19, according to the maritime data firm Lloyd’s List Intelligence, compared to approximately 130 or more transits per day before the war. Dozens of ships have come under attack since the war started, and the UN says at least 10 seafarers were killed. Even as US President Donald Trump last week extended the ceasefire indefinitely, the US kept the blockade of Iranian ports. In response, Iran fired on ships in the strait and seized two. “Seafarers are the backbone of global trade, yet we are often the most affected by regional geopolitical conflicts,” said Capt. Arun Kumar Rajendran, who also has been stranded with his tanker crew for around eight weeks. Some ‘watched blasts from decks’ Manoj Kumar Yadav of the Forward Seamen’s Union of India said thousands of Indian sailors were aboard the stranded vessels, enduring days of fear and isolation as ships lay anchored near Iranian ports such as Bandar Abbas and Khorramshahr. Explosions sometimes occurred just a few hundred meters (yards) away. “They were watching blasts from their decks,” he said, adding that his union has been fielding daily distress calls from crews and their families. “Many of them were on board a ship for the first time, and you can imagine what mental state they have gone through.” Yadav said many sailors reported acute shortages of food and drinking water, with some vessels forced to ration supplies. Communication with families in India was sporadic due to internet disruptions and signal jamming. When contact was possible, sailors often paid high roaming charges for just a few minutes of conversation, he said. Sailors’ families are growing increasingly anxious, demanding the safe return of their loved ones. Mohamed Arrachedi, the International Transport Workers’ Federation’s network coordinator for the Middle East, said earlier this month it had received hundreds of requests for assistance, including for food, from seafarers. Drones and uncertainty Stranded off Oman for more than a month, Reza Muhammad Saleh, an Indonesian chief officer aboard a Greek-owned cargo ship, said a drone exploded near the port shortly after they arrived March 3. At least two more incidents followed, forcing repeated evacuations of the crew to bunkers, he said. No one was harmed. “The biggest problem is the uncertainty. We don’t know when Hormuz will be open again,” Saleh told the AP. The vessel with 24 crew members from Indonesia, Arab countries, India and Ethiopia typically transports iron ore across Gulf states, transiting Hormuz once or twice a month. It now requires written clearance from Iran. “No company wants to take the risk without it,” he said. Though experienced in conflict zones, the crew has been rattled by missile strikes and GPS disruptions that forced it to use manual navigation, he said. “Sometimes we think it’s safe, then suddenly it’s not. Today we’re safe. Tomorrow,

nobody knows," he said. Fleet Management Limited usually communicates multiple times a day with dozens of stranded ships that are staffed by more than 400 seafarers, its CEO Capt. Rajalingam Subramaniam said. Stock checks are regularly maintained for food supply, and pickups have been arranged to ensure availability by moving vessels to the nearest points where they can pick up fresh and dry provisions, he said. Some crew changes were still happening, but in limited numbers. "Who wants to go on the ship?" Subramaniam said.

"The inbound crew has the right to refuse and we respect (that)." Most of the stranded mariners have been in the Gulf since the war began. "(For) mariners who did not sign up to be in warlike area, they also (need) to be respected so that they do not become the unintended collateral," he said. Among the vessels attempting to cross the Strait of Hormuz during the ceasefire, several were fired upon and others turned back. Vessels managed by Fleet Management did not attempt to cross, Subramaniam said. Germany's largest shipping company, Hapag-Lloyd, has had around 150 sailors stranded near the strait, on six vessels. "These are difficult days and weeks," Hapag Lloyd spokesman Nils Haupt told the AP earlier this month. He said Hapag-Lloyd was in contact with the captains and crews at least once a day. "We've been able to rotate some of them (crew) in the meantime, but you can easily imagine that after such a long time, monotony naturally sets in on board," he said. Shortages of global seafarers to worsen. The International Maritime Organization, the UN's shipping agency, and others have called for a safe corridor for commercial vessels in the strait. Most ships are still unable to pass through, even though Iran had said the strait was open to vessels it perceived as non-hostile and demanded to collect tolls for passage. Iran was said to have placed mines in the waterway, and Trump said last week that the US was clearing Iranian mines and would "shoot and kill" boats laying mines in the area. Under heightened risks of mines and attacks on ships, "there is no safe transit anywhere in the Strait of Hormuz," said IMO Secretary-General Arsenio Dominguez.

- [Marcos leads teachers' oath-taking in Capiz](#) (2026-04-27 16:08)

PRESIDENT Ferdinand Marcos Jr. on Monday led the oath-taking of more than 8,500 newly promoted teachers and school heads from Western Visayas, marking the largest gathering so far under the Expanded Career Progression (ECP) System. First lady Liza Araneta-Marcos joined the president during the ceremony at Villareal Stadium in Roxas City, Capiz. Similar inductions were previously held in Cebu, Davao, and Eastern Visayas. In his speech, Marcos assured educators of continued government support, emphasizing efforts to improve career growth, welfare and working conditions. "Rest assured that the government will not stop in ensuring you are being taken care of, given equal opportunity for growth and recognized," he said. The president said the ECP system addresses the long-standing issue of limited promotion opportunities for teachers by providing clearer career pathways, whether in classroom instruction or school leadership. From August 2025 to date, a total of 79,230 teachers and school heads nationwide have benefited from promotions under the system. Marcos reiterated that his administration is working to ensure that no teacher retires at entry-level rank. He also cited reforms aimed at improving working conditions, including reducing administrative workload,

creating more than 61,000 teaching positions, and providing a P10,000 teaching allowance for School Year 2025–2026.

- [‘Pets, farm animals must be included in disaster plan’](#) (2026-04-27 16:07)

AS the government begins its annual budget planning cycle, the Animal Kingdom Foundation (AKF) is calling for an urgent overhaul of national laws to ensure that the country’s animal population will not be left behind during catastrophes. Interviewed in the Alerto Siete-Tres-Ocho program at Radyo Pilipinas, AKF Project Director Heidi Marquez-Caguioa said they are leading a legislative push to amend the Animal Welfare Act and the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) Act. The proposed amendments aim to institutionalize animal protection mechanisms, mandating that the welfare of livestock, pets and working animals be integrated into all phases of disaster response. The cost of neglect Caguioa pointed to the 2020 Taal Volcano eruption as a grim case study in logistical failure. During the crisis, thousands of animals — including horses vital to the local tourism industry — were abandoned in the danger zone because evacuation protocols lacked provisions for animals. "The Taal disaster exposed a massive gap in our emergency framework," Caguioa said. "We saw farm animals and working horses left to fend for themselves, not due to lack of compassion, but due to a complete lack of policy-driven rescue infrastructure." The AKF proposal seeks to institutionalize animal welfare by requiring the mandatory inclusion of LGU agriculturists and veterinarians in local DRRM councils. By granting these professionals regular membership, AKF said that local governments can ensure dedicated funds and resources specifically for animal rescue, establishment of pre-identified evacuation zones for companion animals (pets) and farm animals (livestock) ahead of the rainy season and policy shifts from reactive response to systematic, prepared rescue operations. Beyond legislative changes, Caguioa identified a persistent administrative problem: the abrupt turnover of government personnel. AKF research showed that training local government employees in animal handling is often rendered futile by the nature of their employment. When skilled workers leave their posts due to the expiration of Job Order or Contract of Service agreements, or when coterminous appointments end, the institutional knowledge is lost. "Every time a trained worker leaves without a transfer of knowledge, our capability-building efforts are set back to zero," Caguioa explained. "We are effectively wasting time and public funds by training people who are structurally discouraged from staying in their positions long-term." With the rainy season approaching, the AKF urged lawmakers to expedite these amendments. The foundation maintained that if the country intends to build a truly resilient society, the protection of animals must shift from being an "afterthought" of non-government organizations to a mandatory government function. "We have to consider these measures now," Caguioa added. "Disasters do not discriminate between humans and animals, and our policies should reflect that reality."

- [Hold departure order issued against Escudero](#) (2026-04-27 16:06)

(UPDATE) The Sandiganbayan's sixth division issued on Monday a precautionary hold departure order against Sen. Francis Escudero and businessman and alleged bagman Maynard Ngu,

preventing them from leaving the country. The issuance of the order followed a closed-door hearing on Monday after the Office of the Ombudsman filed the application on Saturday. Under the order, the Commissioner of the Bureau of Immigration was directed to include Escudero and Ngu in its Hold Departure Order list. Both Escudero and Ngu were implicated in the flood control scandal, where they are expected to be charged with plunder offenses. On Thursday, the same order was issued against former Speaker Martin Romualdez who was also linked in anomalous flood control projects.

- [Vintage bombs found during NAIA excavation](#) (2026-04-27 16:05)

TWENTY rusting vintage bombs were discovered on Sunday during excavations at the Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) Juliet Extension Taxiway. The PNP Aviation Security Group (Avsegroup) Explosive Ordnance Disposal team was called to the excavation site after a backhoe unearthed the bombs. The team recovered 10 50-pound and 18 25-pound inert General Purpose bombs. Last April 22, old military ordnance was also dug up at the same site. The bombs were brought to Avsegroup headquarters in Pasay City for safekeeping and proper disposal. The Juliet Extension is a part of the NAIA modernization project carried out by the Manila International Airport Authority (MIAA) and the New NAIA Infra Corp. (NNIC). The phase involves expanding and concreting the taxiway to improve airfield capacity and efficiency. Located in front of Terminal 2, the extension runs parallel to Runway 13/31 and Taxiways November and Delta. Designed to reach the Terminal 4 apron, the project aims to ease congestion at Terminal 3. Once completed, Taxiway Juliet will serve as a diversion route for aircraft during the upcoming reconstruction of Taxiway Delta, the primary taxiway for Terminal 3.

- [Manila's air quality 'very unhealthy' again](#) (2026-04-27 16:04)

THE air quality in the city of Manila has returned to “very unhealthy” levels after being “fair” for several days as the fire in the sanitary landfill in Navotas City continues to burn after nearly three weeks. On a Facebook post Monday, the Manila City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Department (MCDRRMD) reported that at 12 a.m., its air quality sensors at four locations recorded “very unhealthy” readings, particularly those near the Puregold Tayuman area. The department said prevailing winds may be carrying smoke from the abandoned landfill fire toward the city, and warned residents — particularly the vulnerable sectors such as children, senior citizens, and those with asthma — to avoid going outdoors unless necessary. In an interview with The Manila Times, Dr. Lester Tan, Department of Health-Metro Manila Center for Health Development (DOH-MMCHD) regional director, urged the public to continue wearing masks as protection from the polluted air. Tan said a wet cloth can also be used as an alternative to a surgical mask. He advised people with asthma or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease to limit their outdoor activities because the poor air quality can worsen their condition. Manila's Department of Environment and Public Services later reported that air quality levels had improved to “good.” Residents of Pasay City were also advised to wear face masks outdoors to protect themselves as the air quality in the city worsened. Pasay Mayor Emi Calixto-Rubiano said Monday the smoke from the landfill may carry

harmful chemicals and particulate matter that could affect public health. Exposure to the toxic smoke could trigger breathing difficulty, eye irritation, coughing, throat irritation, headache and dizziness. Residents were told to stay indoors as much as possible, keep doors and windows closed, and avoid strenuous outdoor activities. The city government also urged residents to drink plenty of water and seek medical attention if they experience severe breathing difficulties. On Tuesday, Public Works and Highways Secretary Vince Dizon will return to the landfill to assess operations to extinguish methane pockets that continue to emit hazardous fumes. Dizon said on Monday he will be accompanied by Navotas Mayor John Rey Tiangco. They will evaluate if the heavy equipment deployed last week, such as excavators, has been effective in smothering the fire and containing gas emissions. Initial efforts focused on creating access routes and applying soil cover to cut off oxygen feeding the underground flames. The DPWH is also coordinating with international disaster response specialists, including members of the Japan Disaster Relief team, who have been tapped for their technical expertise in handling similar incidents. Government responders, including personnel from the Bureau of Fire Protection, local disaster risk reduction offices, and environmental agencies, remain on-site to sustain round-the-clock operations. Dizon said that efforts were focused not only on extinguishing the fire but also on minimizing further environmental damage and safeguarding public health amid air quality concerns. He said access to the landfill remains a logistical problem since it requires a 15- to 20-minute boat ride from the BFP Incident Command Post to the site; Tuesday's inspection "is expected to provide clearer direction on the next phase of response efforts," Dizon said. What changed the pace of operations was the completion of a new access road linking the mainland directly to the landfill, with Dizon describing the access road as "a game changer." He admitted that the situation remains critical, with toxic smoke continuing to billow from the landfill and drift across Metro Manila and nearby provinces, including Bulacan and Bataan. Dizon said the prolonged fire, fueled by layers of compacted waste, has created deep underground hotspots that are difficult to reach and extinguish.

- [Remulla chides Makati youth representatives](#) (2026-04-27 16:03)

INTERIOR and Local Government Secretary Jonvic Remulla on Monday castigated two Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) chairmen in Makati City who were suspended after being found guilty of misconduct, saying corruption had reached even the youth sector in affluent communities. Speaking in Trece Martires City, Remulla identified the officials as Natalia Georgianna Tupaz of Barangay Dasmariñas and Cecilia Louise Yabut of Barangay Magallanes. Both were sanctioned by the Makati Sangguniang Panlungsod through separate resolutions. "Corruption has reached the SK, even in the wealthiest barangay. We do not spare anyone — whether from small or rich communities," Remulla said. He delivered a sharp rebuke to the officials, saying, "Shame on you. You are already well-off, yet you still choose to steal." Tupaz was meted a six-month suspension under a March 23, 2026 resolution after she allegedly demanded a 20 percent kickback from a supplier for a Halloween project. Investigators said the arrangement was corroborated through Viber messages and a phone call. She also faced accusations of submitting an SK resolution with a falsified signature of the SK

secretary. Tupaz tendered her resignation on March 8, pending acceptance. Yabut was suspended for three months under an April 6 resolution after allegedly submitting documents with forged signatures, including that of an SK kagawad who was reportedly abroad at the time. While she admitted the documents were not personally signed, she claimed prior consent had been given. Remulla said Tupaz could face charges before the Office of the Ombudsman, including direct bribery, violation of Republic Act 3019 or the Anti-Graft and Corrupt Practices Act, and falsification of public documents. He added that Yabut and her SK treasurer could also be charged with falsification in connection with a purchase request. Remulla raised broader concerns about the structure of the SK, suggesting its possible abolition as part of constitutional reforms. “If there will be constitutional change, I will recommend the abolition of the SK. We are seeing a culture where corruption starts at a young age,” he said. Remulla pointed to high attrition rates among SK officials, noting that many leave their posts within the first year due to marriage, employment, or schooling, prompting barangay to appoint officers-in-charge. “It may be better for the barangay council to designate who will handle youth affairs instead of holding elections,” he said.

- [Health groups file complaints vs ZYN, IQOS Philippines over alleged Vape Law violations](#) (2026-04-27 14:49)

MANILA, Philippines—Health advocates have filed complaints against nicotine pouch brand ZYN and heated tobacco product (HTP) company IQOS Philippines for allegedly violating the Vape Law, or Republic Act No. 11900, which regulates the promotion, distribution, and registration of vaporized nicotine and tobacco products. In a joint statement Sunday, the Philippine Smoke-Free Movement, the Child Rights Network, the Philippine Legislators’ Committee on Population and Development Foundation, Inc., Action on Smoking and Health Philippines, Imagine Law, Parents Against Vape, Youth Against Vape, and HealthJustice urged the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) to take immediate action against the companies for allegedly engaging in illegal sponsorships and promotional activities. This comes after the brands were said to promote their products during the Sinulog Festival in Cebu City back in January. The groups noted that such sponsorships violate Section 14(a) of Republic Act No. 11900, which prohibits tobacco and nicotine brands from sponsoring cultural events. They added that these activities “exploit an environment that is both child-centered and culturally significant.” “These violations involving ZYN and IQOS are not isolated incidents—they reflect a recurring pattern of noncompliance by the tobacco industry. These brands continue to insert themselves in cultural, artistic, and entertainment spaces, positioning their products as part of a

desirable lifestyle. Worse, one of these brands has been reported to be promoting and distributing a product that has no registration or certification under the law. Immediate regulatory action from the DTI is needed to put an end to these dirty industry tactics and to reaffirm the government's mandate to protect the health of its people," said Rizza Duro, national coordinator of the Philippine Smoke-Free Movement.

- [Nothing premature with Marcos' earlier statement on Zaldy Co, Palace insists](#)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Monday insisted there was nothing premature or false about the earlier announcement made by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. regarding the apprehension of former Ako Bicol party-list representative Zaldy Co in the Czech Republic. In a press conference, Presidential Communications Office (PCO) Undersecretary Claire Castro defended Marcos and maintained there was nothing irregular about his pronouncement. "What did the President announce? He announced that Co was held in custody, that's correct. He said Co was in custody at the Czech Republic, that's correct also. He also said that we are coordinating with the Czech Republic, that's right. So, what's premature with that? There's nothing premature with that," Castro said in Filipino. The Department of Justice (DOJ) last week clarified that Co, technically, was not arrested by Czech authorities although his movements were restrained because of immigration violations. Castro reiterated that Marcos did not commit misinformation as the word "arrest" did not come from the chief executive. "First of all, if you notice, on April 16, the president first posted that, "Zaldy Co has been caught." When we say that Zaldy Co has been caught, it doesn't necessarily mean that it was an arrest. The word "caught" is very general. So, when he was caught, we can say that he was stopped—stopped or prevented from acting, and the President was not wrong in what he reported on April 16," she said. "April 17, he posted again. He said here, "Our coordination with the Czech authorities continues. The latest information confirms that Zaldy Co was stopped at the German border after entering from the Czech Republic. He was denied entry and returned to Czech authorities where he remains in custody." It's not wrong. The word "arrest" did not come from the president himself," she added. DOJ Secretary Frederick Vida last week flew to Prague to gather more information regarding Co's apprehension and to coordinate how Co, who is facing graft and malversation charges in connection to the flood control scandal, would be brought back to the Philippines.

- [Luistro stresses House justice panel "did not violate law" amid Carpio complaint](#)

MANILA, Philippines - House Justice Committee chairman and Batangas 2nd District Rep. Gerville Luistro said that they acknowledge the filing of criminal complaints against her, several lawmakers and officials of the Anti-Money Laundering Council by the husband of Vice President Sara Duterte. lawyer Manases Carpio, on Monday. Carpio filed violations of Republic Act 9160 (Anti-Money Laundering Act), RA 1405 (Bank Secrecy Law), and RA 10173 (Data Privacy Act) for "disclosing and divulging to the general public the purported reports of banks to the AMLC

concerning their account deposits, withdrawal, bank balances and related records without prior notice nor prior written consent.” It comes after an AMLC report was released at the House Justice Panel's hearing last April 22 that showed more than P6 billion in transactions recorded by both Duterte and Carpio, which according to some lawmakers were considered as "smoking gun" evidence in the impeachment case. In an interview over radio dzBB on Monday, Luistro believes that the case filed against them is "one of the options" made by the defense "to suppress the disclosure of this information," "This one is a criminal complaint.... we acknowledge that this is one of their options. As far as the committee is concerned, we maintain the position that we did not violate any law," Luistro added.

- [5 inmates die, 4 PNP personnel injured in mobile car crash](#) (2026-04-27 14:24)

MANILA, Philippines — Five persons under police custody (PUPCs) from the Quezon City Police District (QCPD) died while four personnel of the Philippine National Police (PNP) were injured after a police mobile they were riding crashed into a wall in Quezon City on Friday. The six PUPCs were being escorted by the four Philippine National Police (PNP) personnel escorting them aboard a police mobile that traversed Payatas Road en route to the Quezon City Jail when it crashed, PLtCol. Josef Geoffrey Lyndon Lim, chief District Traffic Enforcement Unit of the Quezon City Police District (QCPD) told reporters on Monday. According to Lim, the driver “lost control” that led to the mobile unit hitting a wall resulting in the instantaneous deaths of the five PUPCs. All of the individuals on board were brought to Rosario Maclang General Hospital, where five of the PUPCs were declared dead shortly after by the attending physician. The remaining PUPC was in a stable condition, Lim said, while the four police officers were also receiving treatment for injuries.

- [Destab plot against Marcos nothing new, says Palace](#) (2026-04-27 14:07)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Monday said reports that disgruntled former military officials plotting to oust President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. is nothing new and has tasked concerned agencies to probe the alleged “power grab”. Presidential Communications Office (PCO) Undersecretary Claire Castro issued the statement in reaction to the disclosure made by Senator Panfilo “Ping” Lacson over the weekend that there are several “retired officials” supposedly recruiting military personnel to roll out plans to overthrow Marcos and Vice President Sara Duterte over the controversies they are respective involved in. “That has been news for a long time, they have been wanting to destabilize our president for a long time, that is not new,” Castro said in Filipino in a briefing. The Palace Press Officer further stated that Lacson, being a seasoned investigator, would not make unsubstantiated claims and would always come with “receipts” and urged the security cluster to look into the matter. Lacson, a former top policeman, said that while it is highly unlikely that the retired officers’ plan would be a success, “definitely there is an attempt” to remove the two highest elected officials from office. “First of all, it has to be proven because Senator Lacson, when he speaks, he has receipts. So, once again, to our investigating bodies, you don't need to be ordered. Just do the investigation.

- [Pag-IBIG Fund, DHSUD hold housing fairs in Southern Luzon, Visayas to expand access to homeownership](#) (2026-04-27 13:50)

MANILA, Philippines — The Home Development Mutual Fund (Pag-IBIG Fund), in partnership with its mother agency, the Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development, announced on Monday a series of housing fairs in Southern Luzon and the Visayas aimed at bringing more housing options closer to Filipino workers and their families. Pag-IBIG chief executive officer Marilene C. Acosta said the first of two events in Southern Luzon was held at the Jose Rizal Coliseum, while the second leg is scheduled on April 28. In the Visayas, the housing fair will take place on April 30 and May 1 at the IEC Convention Center Cebu. More than 20,000 housing units from partner developers, along with Pag-IBIG's acquired assets for sale, are expected to be showcased during the events, Acosta said. DHSUD Secretary Jose Ramon Aliling, who chairs the Pag-IBIG Fund Board of Trustees, said the initiative supports the directive of Ferdinand Marcos Jr. to make decent and affordable housing more accessible through the expanded Pambansang Pabahay para sa mga Pilipino Program. "By continuing these housing fairs in South Luzon and the Visayas, Pag-IBIG Fund is bringing together leading private developers, affordable financing programs, and government assistance in one accessible venue, allowing more workers to move from simply hoping for a home to taking concrete steps toward owning one," Aliling said. The events follow an earlier Central Luzon leg and form part of a broader regional rollout aimed at making homeownership more accessible. In a statement, Acosta said Pag-IBIG's housing loan programs enable low-income members and other qualified borrowers, including overseas Filipino workers, to access homes with monthly amortizations often lower than prevailing rental costs. She added that the housing fairs make these opportunities more accessible by consolidating housing options and financing assistance in a single venue. "Through Pag-IBIG Fund's affordable housing loan programs, many families may find that what they would otherwise spend on rent can already go toward paying for a home they will eventually own," Acosta said. She noted that this setup allows members to potentially reduce monthly housing costs while building long-term financial stability and equity. Aliling emphasized that the low monthly amortization rates offered during the fairs support the administration's poverty reduction efforts by enabling families to transition from renting to homeownership, freeing up resources for other essential needs such as education, health, and livelihood. Among the socialized housing units under the 4PH program are projects such as Pasinaya Heights, where units priced at P1.404 million may be purchased with monthly amortizations starting at P2,257.91 in the first year, and Asenso Yuhum Residences, offering 24-square-meter condominium units priced at P1.059 million with initial monthly payments as low as P1,703.08. "These affordable payments are made possible through Pag-IBIG Fund's Housing Loan Program under the Expanded 4PH, which offers a subsidized 3 percent interest rate for the first five years of the loan term, with a possible extension for another five years for eligible borrowers," Acosta said. She added that Pag-IBIG is also offering its Early Bird Promo, allowing the first 30,000 qualified borrowers to avail of the same 3 percent interest rate for the first 10 years of their loan. Aliling and Acosta attended the Calamba housing fair, underscoring the strong partnership between DHSUD and Pag-IBIG in advancing inclusive housing

programs. “The housing fair reflects the administration’s whole-of-society approach—integrating housing development, financing access, and stakeholder collaboration—to ensure that no Filipino family is left behind,” Aliling said.

- [PNP backs CIDG Tondo e-sabong bust amid alleged anomalies](#) (2026-04-27 13:33)

MANILA, Philippines —The Philippine National Police (PNP) on Monday expressed support for the Criminal Investigation and Detection Group’s (CIDG) bust on an alleged online cockfighting (e-sabong) operation at the Coliseo de Manila in Tondo last March amid allegations of anomalies. “This is a legal operation and abides by the proper processes,” PNP spokesperson Brig. Gen. Randolph Tuaño said in Filipino in a briefing with reporters in Camp Crame. “If there are any misgivings about the said operation, the Philippine National Police is ready to accept all complaints, and we will answer them at the proper forum,” he added. On March 24, The CIDG conducted an entrapment operation against an alleged e-sabong operation, resulting in the arrest of 28 supposed operators along with 136 bettors. Coliseo de Manila lawyer Carl Jon Mucho filed an administrative complaint before the National Police Commission (Napolcom) against CIDG National Capital Region chief Col. John Guiagui and nine other police officers two weeks ago. The complaint urges Napolcom to hold the cops involved accountable after P40,000 in cash and 22 gamefowl allegedly went missing after the operation. Mucho showed a video showing a supposed CIDG operative taking cash during the entrapment operation. “This was not the operative taking money but taking evidence. His ticket shows that he had entered the e-sabong operation. This was what we call the bet ticket that he recovered since he was an operative,” Tuaño explained in Filipino. “When he got the bet ticket, he gave a signal to his colleagues that the act had been consummated. This is what we call the prearranged signal to start their operation,” he added

MANILA, Philippines — Addressing the energy crisis and alleviating the lives of Filipinos are the top priorities of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and not the forging of alliances for the 2028 national elections, Malacañang said on Monday. In a Palace briefing, Presidential Communications Office (PCO) Undersecretary Claire Castro said it is still too early to talk about politics and reiterated that the president’s focus is finding solutions to the problems the country is facing, particularly the effects of the hostilities in the Middle East. Marcos, she said, has not yet thought of any name to endorse as his successor. “Right now, for the president, it is too early to talk about who will run for president in the next election,” Castro said in Filipino. “The president is focused on working. The President is focused on addressing the effects of the ongoing conflict in the Middle East so that the supply of petroleum products to our country continue. The President is not focused on politics right now. Work first,” she added. Marcos is bent on providing support for those badly affected by the war between the United States and Iran which triggered the prices of petroleum products and other commodities to increase astronomically, the official further noted.

- [Lacson to present flood control progress report in privilege speech](#) (2026-04-27 13:05)

MANILA, Philippines — Sen. Panfilo Lacson said he opted to present, through a privilege speech, the results of the Senate investigation into the flood control fund mess to pave the way for the resumption of public hearings on the scandal. The Senate president pro tempore said he is set to deliver the chairman's progress report on the alleged flood control anomaly in a privilege speech when the Senate resumes session on May 4. Lacson, chairman of the Senate Blue Ribbon Committee, said the partial committee report has yet to secure the required nine signatures for filing and sponsorship in plenary. Only six of the panel's 17 regular members have signed the report: Bam Aquino, Risa Hontiveros, Francis Pangilinan, and Erwin Tulfo, along with Senate President Vicente Sotto III and Lacson, both serving as ex-officio members. "I will present it via a privilege speech entitled 'The Chairman's FCP Progress Report.' Other committee members do not seem keen on signing the partial report. If I present it through a privilege speech, I would not need to consult them," Lacson said. He added that once delivered in plenary, the chairman's progress report — which includes the contents of the partial report — may be shared with the Department of Justice and the Office of the Ombudsman. "I'll be able to share the report and recommendations with the Ombudsman since it would become a public record after I present it as a privilege speech," he said in a statement Monday. "It would be a waste if the evidence in the progress report could not be used because it did not get enough signatures," Lacson added. Meanwhile, Lacson corrected Rodante Marcoleta over his calls to invite former House Speaker Ferdinand Martin Romualdez to the panel's hearings on the flood control controversy. He said the committee had already invited Romualdez twice, following the time-honored tradition of inter-parliamentary courtesy between the Senate and the House of Representatives — but Romualdez did not attend. "Ever since the Philippine Congress adopted a bicameral system, there has been inter-parliamentary courtesy between the two chambers," Lacson said. He explained that invitations to House members are coursed through the Office of the Speaker in line with this tradition. "That's why inter-parliamentary courtesy is considered a time-honored practice," he added. Lacson was responding to Marcoleta's earlier radio interview urging the panel to invite Romualdez, claiming the latter is "ready to talk" about the flood control controversy.

- [Govt ready for El Niño — Palace](#) (2026-04-27 11:36)

MANILA, Philippines — Malacañang on Monday gave assurances that government agencies are already implementing measures to mitigate the potential impact of El Niño, which could bring below-normal rainfall and dry spells in several parts of the country. Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said preparations are underway, particularly in the agriculture and irrigation sectors, as the government anticipates possible water shortages in vulnerable farming areas. "We are experiencing El Niño, it is nothing new, so the DA is ready with concrete measures to address it," Castro said during a press briefing. She cited ongoing coordination with key agencies, including the DA, which has directed field offices to monitor high-risk agricultural areas and strengthen localized interventions based on historical El Niño data. Castro also said the National Irrigation Administration has been tasked to identify irrigation systems and farming areas that may be affected by reduced water supply, including major facilities such as Magat Dam and the

Upper Pampanga River Integrated Irrigation Systems. Support agencies such as the Philippine Rice Research Institute and the Bureau of Soils and Water Management are also conducting mapping of rain-fed and irrigated farmlands to guide mitigation efforts. The Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration earlier said there is a 92 percent chance of a moderate to strong El Niño event developing, with some climate models warning of a possible “super” El Niño that could significantly reduce rainfall and strain water resources.

- [Hold departure order issued against Escudero, alleged bagman](#) (2026-04-27 11:17)

MANILA, Philippines — The Sandiganbayan's sixth division issued on Monday a precautionary hold departure order against Sen. Francis Escudero and businessman and alleged bagman Maynard Ngu, preventing them from leaving the country. The issuance of the order followed a closed-door hearing on Monday after the Office of the Ombudsman filed the application on Saturday. Under the order, the Commissioner of the Bureau of Immigration was directed to include Escudero and Ngu in its Hold Departure Order list. Both Escudero and Ngu were implicated in the flood control scandal, where they are expected to be charged with plunder offenses. On Thursday, the same order was issued against former Speaker Martin Romualdez who was also linked in anomalous flood control projects.

- [Tillis says he's ready to move ahead with confirming Warsh as Trump's pick as Fed chair](#) (2026-04-27 07:42)

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Republican senator who had effectively blocked confirmation of President Donald Trump's pick to lead the Federal Reserve said Sunday he was dropping his opposition after the Department of Justice ended its investigation of the current central bank chair. The announcement by Sen. Thom Tillis of North Carolina removes a big hurdle to Trump's effort to install Kevin Warsh, a former high-ranking Fed official, in the job in place of Jerome Powell, long under White House pressure to lower interest rates. Tillis' opposition was enough to stall the nomination in the GOP-controlled Senate Banking Committee as Powell neared the scheduled end of his term on May 15. “I am prepared to move on with the confirmation of Mr. Warsh. I think he's going to be a great Fed chair,” Tillis told NBC's “Meet the Press,” two days after the U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia said her office's investigation of the Fed's multibillion-dollar building renovations was over. Powell's brief congressional testimony last summer about that work was also under review. The Fed's internal watchdog is scrutinizing a project, now at \$2.5 billion after earlier estimates had put it at \$1.9 billion, that the Republican president has criticized for cost overruns. Powell had asked in July for the inspector general's review. “I believe that there will not be any wrongdoing. Maybe we find a little stupid here in terms of somebody responsible for the project making a decision they shouldn't? Maybe. But it doesn't rise to a criminal prosecution. That was my problem to begin with because I feel like there were prosecutors in D.C. that thought this was going to be a lever to have Mr. Powell leave early,” he said. Tillis, who infuriated Trump in June for opposing his big tax and spending cuts bill over Medicaid reductions and then announced he would not seek reelection in 2026, added that

he had received assurances from the Justice Department that “the case is completely and fully settled ... and that the only way an investigation would be opened would be a criminal referral from one of the most respect inspector generals.” Important week for Fed leadershipThe committee on Saturday said it planned to vote Wednesday on Warsh's nomination. The ranking Democrat, Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren, responded with a statement that “no Republican claiming to care about Fed independence should support moving forward the nomination of Kevin Warsh, who proved in his nomination hearing to be nothing more than President Trump’ s sock puppet.” Also Wednesday, Fed policymakers will meet and are expected to keep their key interest rate unchanged for the third straight meeting, shrugging off Trump's demands for a cut. At a news conference, Powell could indicate whether he will remain on the Fed's board of governors after his term as chair ends, an unusual but not completely unprecedented step that would deny Trump the opportunity to fill another seat on the seven-member board. Powell's term as a governor lasts until January 2028.At a hearing last week, Warsh told senators he never promised the White House that he would cut interest rates and pledged to be “an independent actor” if confirmed as chair. Hours before that, Trump had been asked in a CNBC interview whether he would be disappointed if Warsh did not immediately cut rates. “I would,” the president said.Without the constraints of a political campaign, Tillis has spoken out forcefully about Powell, decrying the inquiry by U.S. Attorney Jeanine Pirro, a longtime Trump ally, as a “vindictive prosecution” and suggested it threatened the Fed’ s longtime independence from day-to-day politics. Tillis told NBC that he had gotten assurances from the Justice Department that he needed “to feel like they were not using DOJ as a weapon to threaten the independence of the Fed. So this will allow Mr. Warsh to move on with his confirmation.” On Saturday, Trump was asked by reporters whether there was now smooth sailing for Warsh with the end of the Justice Department's investigation. “I imagine it's smooth,” Trump said, adding that his nominee “is going to be fantastic.” The president said he still wanted to find out “how can a building of that size cost ... whatever it’ s going to be.” Trump visited the Fed building in July and, in front of television cameras, said the renovations would run \$3.1 billion. Powell, standing next to him, said after looking at a paper presented to him by Trump, that the president's latest price tag was incorrect.Justice Department pursues Trump adversariesThe investigation was among several undertaken by the Justice Department into Trump’ s perceived adversaries. For months it had failed to gain traction as prosecutors struggled to articulate a basis to suspect criminal conduct. Other efforts by the department to prosecute Trump’ s adversaries, including New York state Attorney General Letitia James, a Democrat, and former FBI Director James Comey, have also been unsuccessful.Last month, a federal judge quashed Justice Department subpoenas issued to the Fed in the investigation, describing their purpose as “to harass and pressure Powell to resign” and open the path for a new chair. A prosecutor handling the Powell case had acknowledged at a closed-door court hearing that the government had not found any evidence of a crime.Pirro said Friday on X that she “will not hesitate to restart a criminal investigation should the facts warrant doing so.” The acting attorney general, Todd Blanche, told NBC on Sunday that “there is no doubt that we will investigate” if the inspector general finds evidence of criminal conduct.Warsh is a financier and former member of the Fed’ s board of governors. Trump

nominated him in January.

- [Coco Gauff overcomes vomiting on court to beat Sorana Cirstea in Madrid](#) (2026-04-27 07:33)

MADRID, Spain — Coco Gauff has advanced to the fourth round of the Madrid Open despite falling ill and vomiting on court. Gauff, a finalist in Madrid last year, rallied to beat Sorana Cirstea 4-6, 7-5, 6-1 on Sunday. The American threw up on court in the middle of the second set. "When I actually threw up on the court, that was like a little bit embarrassing," Gauff said. "Then after that first game and the second, I was like that took everything out of me." On Saturday, fourth-ranked Iga Swiatek withdrew due to an unspecified illness while playing her round-of-32 match against American Ann Li. Gauff said she was determined to carry on her match. "I'm someone who doesn't like to pull out. I don't like to do that unless I really feel like I have no other options," Gauff said. "So the plan was to always just try to finish, even if it ended up with me just playing just to get through it." She recovered from a break down three times before winning the set 7-5. The third-ranked Gauff said she doesn't know how she "got through that," and said she almost threw up in the middle of a point. "I felt fine all this morning. I felt a little weird last night, but I was OK. Woke up this morning, felt fine. And mid-first set, I was feeling like I was going to throw up. And then I did," she said. "They gave me some pills and that definitely helped. After that, once I felt the feeling of throwing up, then I just felt nauseous and tired. I just didn't want to throw up in the middle of the point, which I almost did at one point." Gauff will next meet No. 13 seed Linda Noskova.

- [Fitzpatrick brothers capture PGA Tour's Zurich Classic pairs crown](#) (2026-04-27 07:21)

LOS ANGELES, United States — Brothers Matt and Alex Fitzpatrick surrendered a four-stroke lead but combined to birdie the final hole in a dramatic victory at the PGA Tour's Zurich Classic pairs event on Sunday. The English duo posted a one-under 71 in the final-round alternate shot format in New Orleans, with world number three Matt bagging his second PGA Tour title in as many weeks after winning the RBC Heritage. Alex, a DP World Tour regular, earned PGA Tour playing status through 2028, including an exemption to play in the upcoming PGA Championship, the second men's major of the year. Alex Fitzpatrick, 27, made the winning putt after Matt fired a bunker shot within two feet of the cup as they finished 31-under par for the tournament. "I'm still shaking," Alex Fitzpatrick said "It was crazy." The duo of Alex Smalley and Hayden Springer and the Norwegian team of Kristoffer Reitan and Kris Ventura shared second place, both teams on 30-under. Reitan and Ventura had seized a share of the lead with an eagle at the 18th, where Reitan's shot into the green left Ventura a seven-foot putt. Smalley and Springer were tied for the lead until a bogey at 17 but birdied 18. The Fitzpatricks had begun the day with a four-stroke advantage and were three-under through their first 11 holes. A double bogey on the 12th and a bogey at 14 saw their lead evaporate. "I felt like we played great for the first 11 holes," Matt Fitzpatrick said. "We were really, really, really steady, really solid and didn't really put a foot wrong." "Just the one hole on 12, you've made that, and you quickly are sort of scrambling a little bit." "From then on I felt like I struggled with my game, and I didn't play well.

Alex played fantastic. He really sort of managed to keep us in it."

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Energy (DOE) on Monday said that diesel and kerosene prices will go down on Tuesday, April 28, but the cost of gasoline will increase. The agency said that diesel prices will be lowered by at least P12.94 per liter, while kerosene prices will drop by at least P15.71 per liter. Gasoline prices will increase by up to P0.53 per liter. Last week, diesel prices declined by P24.94 per liter, gasoline by P3.41 per liter, and kerosene by P2 per liter.

- [VP Sara' s husband files criminal complaint over disclosed bank transactions](#) (2026-04-27 04:35)

MANILA, Philippines — Manases “Mans” Carpio, the husband of Vice President Sara Duterte, filed on Monday criminal complaints before the Quezon City Prosecutor’ s Office against four lawmakers, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) governor and head of the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC) over the disclosure of the couple’ s “sensitive” bank transactions during a committee hearing at the House of Representatives. Carpio was accompanied by his counsel, Peter Paul Danao, when he submitted his complaint-affidavit. He refused to be interviewed by reporters. Named respondents in his complaint were BSP Governor Eli Remolona Jr., AMLC Executive Director Ronel Buenaventura, and Representatives Gerville Reyes Luistro, Percival Cendaña, Jose Manuel “Chel” Diokno and Leila de Lima. Danao said the respondents were charged with violation of Republic Act 9160 (Anti-Money Laundering Act), RA 1405 (Bank Secrecy Law), and RA 10173 (Data Privacy Act). He said that Carpio strongly objected to the “conspiratorial act of disclosing and divulging to the general public the purported reports of banks to the AMLC concerning their account deposits, withdrawal, bank balances and related records without prior notice nor prior written consent.” During last week’s hearing of the House Committee on Justice on the impeachment complaint against the vice president, the AMLC revealed that it received reports of “suspicious” and “covered” bank transactions amounting to P6.77 billion linked to Duterte and Carpio during a period of nearly 20 years. Carpio said in the complaint that the AMLC reports involving his and his wife’ s banking transactions were sensitive information that should not be disclosed to anyone. “Yet, respondents openly divulged these banking transaction reports in a public hearing before the House Committee on Justice,” he said. Carpio maintained that the respondents “criminally and feloniously” disclosed and unraveled the alleged transaction reports without his consent and despite his objection. Danao said they believed that those involved would be criminally penalized for divulging in public the couple’ s bank transactions without their full consent. “The prohibition is absolute. There is no exception. In fact, even the media are not allowed to divulge any bank transaction reports,” he said. “That’ s the same law that was passed and enacted by the members of the House of Representatives themselves.”

MANILA, Philippines —The Department of Health (DOH) urged parents to have their children vaccinated against preventable diseases as it marked World Immunization Week.The DOH' s Metro Manila Center for Health Development (MMCHD) launched on Monday an immunization drive targeting 240 individuals, covering measles, polio, pertussis, pneumonia, human papillomavirus for grade 4 female students, and tetanus-diphtheria shots for pregnant women.MMCHD Regional Director Lester Tan told The Manila Times that only about 80 percent of children in Metro Manila were fully immunized last year, still below the World Health Organization' s target of 95 percent coverage.The vaccination initiative will run until 3 p.m. on Monday at the Makabagong San Juan Theater.

- [Pasay residents urged to use masks as Navotas landfill smoke reaches city](#) (2026-04-27 03:28)

MANILA, Philippines — Pasay City Mayor Emi Calixto-Rubiano urged residents to wear face masks outdoors after smoke from the Navotas landfill fire affected air quality in the city, raising health concerns for children, the elderly, pregnant women and people with heart or lung conditions.Calixto-Rubiano on Monday warned that the smoke may carry harmful chemicals and particulates that could affect public health.Residents were urged to stay indoors as much as possible, keep doors and windows closed, and avoid strenuous outdoor activities while the poor air quality persists.The city government also urged residents to drink plenty of water and seek medical attention if they experience severe breathing difficulties.The Pasay City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office said it was monitoring the situation and coordinating with concerned agencies.

- [Tornadoes in northern Texas leave at least 2 dead and destroy multiple homes](#) (2026-04-27 02:55)

RUNAWAY BAY, Texas — A tornado-producing thunderstorm left at least two people dead in northern Texas and displaced at least 20 families, with many homes sustaining major damage, authorities said Sunday.At least one person was killed and numerous homes were damaged Saturday night in the town of Runaway Bay, said Wise County Judge J.D. Clark, who serves as the county's chief executive. Emergency responders worked to clear debris to reach damaged homes and provide medical care where needed, Clark said."Access has been difficult due to blocked roadways and downed utilities, but crews have continued pushing forward to reach those in need," Clark said.The storm also hit Springtown, where Parker County Assistant Fire Chief David Pruitt said in an email that a second person died south of the city limits. There was " significant damage" in the area, Pruitt said."One of the most significant ongoing challenges is the widespread power outage affecting many residents," he wrote.National Weather Service teams confirmed that an EF-2 tornado with peak winds of 135 mph (217 kph) touched down in the Runaway Bay area. An EF-1 tornado with peak winds of 105 mph (169 kph) was confirmed in the Springtown area, the weather service said.The slow-moving supercell traveled through the area around 10 p.m. Saturday, said meteorologist Patricia Sanchez with the Fort Worth weather service office.It moved southeast from around Wichita Falls, near the Oklahoma border, passing

just west of Fort Worth. Runaway Bay is about 45 miles (72 kilometers) northwest of Fort Worth on Lake Bridgeport. Springtown is about 30 miles (48 kilometers) northwest of Fort Worth. Weather service radar picked up a "potentially large and extremely dangerous" tornado near Azle at 10:14 p.m. Saturday. That's about another 10 miles (16 kilometers) southeast of Springtown.

- [Iran's top diplomat briefly returns to Pakistan but Trump says the sides can talk by phone \(2026-04-27 02:31\)](#)

ISLAMABAD — Iran's foreign minister briefly visited Islamabad again on Sunday as Pakistan's political and military leadership scrambled to reignite ceasefire negotiations between Tehran and Washington, but U.S. President Donald Trump said they could talk by phone instead. Abbas Araghchi had left Pakistan's capital late the previous day, creating confusion around an expected second round of talks there, but he returned before continuing on to Moscow on Sunday, Iranian state media said. He had been in Oman, which previously mediated talks and is on the other side of the strategic Strait of Hormuz. The White House last week said it would dispatch envoys Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner to Islamabad to follow up on historic face-to-face talks earlier this month. But shortly after Araghchi's departure Saturday, Trump said he had called off the mission because of a lack of progress with Iran. "If they want, we can talk but we're not sending people," Trump told Fox News on Sunday. He said earlier on social media: "All they have to do is call!!!" Indirect talks between the two sides were ongoing, two Pakistani officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media. Trump last week indefinitely extended the ceasefire the U.S. and Iran agreed to on April 7 that has largely halted the fighting that began with joint U.S.-Israeli strikes on Feb. 28. But a permanent settlement remains elusive in the war that has killed thousands of people and shaken the global economy. Strait of Hormuz at center of Iran's discussions in Oman A standoff remained on in the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow mouth of the Persian Gulf through which a fifth of all traded oil and natural gas passes, as Iran has restricted movement through it and the U.S. enforces a blockade of Iranian ports. Iran wants to persuade Oman to support a mechanism to collect tolls from vessels passing through the strait according to a regional official who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the matter. Oman's response wasn't immediately clear. The official, who is involved in mediation efforts, also said Iran insists on ending the U.S. blockade before a new round of talks and that Pakistan-led mediators are trying to bridge significant gaps between the countries. Araghchi also spoke by phone with counterparts in Qatar and Saudi Arabia on Sunday. Even before Saturday's developments, Iran's Foreign Ministry said any talks would be indirect and Pakistani officials would act as go-betweens, reflecting Tehran's wariness after rounds of indirect talks last year and earlier this year ended with Iran being attacked by the U.S. and Israel. Trump said Iran has offered a 'much better' proposal. The economic fallout is growing two months into the war as global shipments of oil, liquefied natural gas, fertilizer and other supplies are disrupted by the near-closure of the strategic strait. Both sides have continued to make military threats. Iran's joint military command Saturday warned that "if the U.S. continues its aggressive military

actions, including naval blockades, banditry, and piracy" it will face a "strong response." Trump last week ordered the military to "shoot and kill" small boats that could be placing mines in the waterway. Trump told journalists on Saturday, before a security incident at the White House Correspondents' Dinner, that within 10 minutes of him canceling Witkoff and Kushner's trip to Islamabad, Iran sent a "much better" proposal. He did not elaborate but stressed that one of his conditions is that Iran "will not have a nuclear weapon." The status of Iran's enriched uranium has long been at the center of tensions. Tehran has 440 kilograms (970 pounds) of uranium enriched to 60% purity, a short, technical step from weapons-grade levels, according to the U.N. nuclear watchdog agency. Syed Mohammad Ali, an independent political analyst in Pakistan, said the delay in the talks must not be seen as a setback and that indirect talks were progressing. He said tensions between Washington and Tehran cannot be eased overnight and the negotiation process requires patience. "But the good thing is that the ceasefire is holding, and both sides have a desire to end the conflict in a way that does not backfire at home," Ali said. A growing toll even as fragile ceasefires hold Since the war began, at least 3,375 people have been killed in Iran and at least 2,509 people in Lebanon, where the Israel-Hezbollah fighting resumed two days after the Iran war started. Also, 23 people have been killed in Israel and more than a dozen in Gulf Arab states. Fifteen Israeli soldiers in Lebanon, 13 U.S. service members in the region and six U.N. peacekeepers in southern Lebanon have been killed. Another ceasefire — between Israel and the Iranian-backed Lebanese militant Hezbollah group — has been extended by three weeks. Hezbollah has not participated in the Washington-brokered diplomacy. Oil prices rise again as Pakistan talks fail to materialize Oil prices rose when the market opened Sunday as traders absorbed the news of the stalled ceasefire talks. West Texas Intermediate, the U.S.-produced light, sweet crude, was selling for \$96.50 a barrel Sunday, up 2% since the market closed on Friday. The price was 44% higher than before the start of the Iran war, when oil was selling for about \$67 a barrel. Brent crude, the international standard, was trading at \$107.75 per barrel Sunday, up about 3% since Friday and 48% since the war began, when oil was selling for \$72 a barrel. Oil prices have risen steadily since the war began and tankers full of crude became stranded in the Persian Gulf, unable to safely transit through the Strait of Hormuz.

- [Head to head: Duterte leads Robredo in OCTA survey](#) (2026-04-27 02:18)

MANILA, Philippines — If the presidential election was held today and the contenders were Vice President Sara Duterte and former vice president and Naga City Mayor Leni Robredo, the former would win, a survey conducted by OCTA Research showed. In its Tugon ng Masa survey held from March 19-25, 2026, OCTA Research said Duterte got 46 percent voter preference while Robredo had 35 percent. At least 19 percent of those surveyed were undecided. OCTA said that the pre-election voter preference survey highlighted Duterte's strength in Mindanao at 88 percent and in Visayas at 53 percent. Duterte also led in socioeconomic class E. Robredo, meanwhile, was strong in the National Capital Region at 52 percent and Balanced Luzon at 47 percent. OCTA said that the head to head results showed a "narrower and competitive margin than what was observed in previous quarters." "Compared with earlier survey rounds, the

current head-to-head spread suggests a closer and more competitive preference landscape entering 2026," it added. It also said that while Duterte retains a clear advantage in a direct head-to-head scenario, the margin separating the two candidates is no longer as wide as in previous survey periods. "This suggests that while VP Duterte remains ahead, the race appears more competitive in Q1 2026 than in earlier quarters," the pollster said. The survey had 1,200 respondents and a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent.

- [King Charles state visit to US to go on as planned after shooting](#) (2026-04-27 02:05)

LONDON, United Kingdom — The state visit by Britain's King Charles III to the US would take place as planned, Buckingham Palace said on Sunday, following a shooting at a Washington media gala. The incident late Saturday at the annual dinner of the White House Correspondents' Association came less than 48 hours before Charles and Queen Camilla begin a four-day state visit to the United States. The palace said that Charles was "greatly relieved" that Trump, his wife Melania and other guests were unharmed and later on Sunday said the trip would go on as planned. "The King and Queen are most grateful to all those who have worked at pace to ensure this remains the case and are looking forward to the Visit getting underway tomorrow," it said. Earlier, senior UK minister Darren Jones told British broadcasters during a round of interviews that security teams in Britain and the US were "working closely to ensure the security arrangements are put appropriately in place" for the state visit. It is understood the king and queen reached out privately to the Trumps to express their sympathies with those impacted Saturday night, and to share their gratitude to the security services who prevented further injury. Trump has said one law enforcement officer was shot at close range but appeared not to be critically injured. During the four-day state visit -- organised to honour the historic relationship between Britain and the US as America marks 250 years of independence -- Charles and Camilla will visit Washington and New York. Charles will become the first British monarch to address Congress since his mother, the late queen Elizabeth II, in 1991, while the royal couple will have tea with Trump and Melania and attend a state dinner. Tensions It comes as transatlantic tensions over the Iran war and the Epstein scandal's long shadow threaten to intrude on the landmark visit. Trump has repeatedly lambasted British Prime Minister Keir Starmer over his war opposition, as well as his government's immigration and energy policies. The pair spoke by phone Sunday, when Starmer "extended his best wishes... following the shocking scenes at last night's White House Correspondents Dinner", Downing Street said. "He expressed his relief that the President and First Lady were safe and wished a speedy recovery to the officer injured," it added. They also discussed "the urgent need to get shipping moving again in the Strait of Hormuz, given the severe consequences for the global economy and cost of living for people in the UK and globally," Starmer's office noted.

MANILA, Philippines — Most parts of the country will have sunny weather in the next 24 hours, the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration said on Monday. Weather specialist Aldczar Aurelio said the easterlies will bring warm and humid

weather in the next two to three days. Aurelio said the easterly winds would also result in cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms in Sorsogon, Northern Samar, Eastern Samar, Southern Leyte, Dinagat Islands, and Surigao del Norte. Metro Manila will have a heat index of up to 41 degrees Celsius, which is under extreme caution category, while the highest could be recorded in Dumangas, Iloilo at 45 degrees Celsius, which falls under the danger level.

- [Colombia road bombing death toll rises to 20](#) (2026-04-27 01:20)

BOGOTÁ, Colombia — The death toll in a weekend highway bombing in Colombia rose to 20, with another 36 people injured, the local department's governor said Sunday on X. The attack -- which local and national officials are blaming on armed groups -- comes one month before the country holds presidential elections on May 31. Cauca Department Governor Octavio Guzman described the bombing as the area's "most brutal and ruthless attack against the civilian population in decades," adding that it left a crater 200 cubic meters in size. Fifteen women and five men, all adults, were killed, he said. Of the injured, three people remain in intensive care. Five children were also injured but "are out of danger." The massive blast left buses and vans mangled on the Pan-American Highway in the restive southwestern region of Colombia. Several cars were flipped over by the force of the explosion. Military chief Hugo Lopez told a news conference on Saturday that the bomb had exploded after assailants stopped traffic by blocking the road with a bus and another vehicle. "It is a terrorist attack against the civilian population," Lopez said. The attack comes just over one month ahead of national elections, in which voters will pick a successor to leftist President Gustavo Petro. "Those who carried out this attack... are terrorists, fascists and drug traffickers," Petro said on X. "I want our very best soldiers to confront them." Petro blamed the bombing on Ivan Mordisco, the South American country's most-wanted criminal, whom the president has compared to late cocaine kingpin Pablo Escobar. The violence came after a bomb attack Friday on a military base in Cali, Colombia's third-largest city, injured two people and set off a string of attacks in the Valle del Cauca and Cauca departments. According to Lopez, 26 attacks have been recorded in the two departments over the past two days. Authorities have boosted military and police presence in the areas, Defense Minister Pedro Sanchez said Saturday. Colombia has a history of armed groups -- which finance their operations through drug trafficking, illegal mining and extortion -- attempting to influence elections through violence. FARC remnants who rejected a 2016 peace deal with the government have been actively trying to disrupt stalled peace talks with Petro. Security is one of the central issues of the presidential election. Political violence was brought into sharp focus last June, when young conservative presidential frontrunner Miguel Uribe Turbay was shot in broad daylight while campaigning in the capital Bogota. He died two months later. Leftist Senator Ivan Cepeda, an architect of Petro's controversial policy of negotiating with armed groups, is ahead in polls. He is trailed by right-wing candidates Abelardo de la Espriella and Paloma Valencia, both of whom have pledged to take a hard line against rebel groups. All three have reported receiving death threats and are campaigning under heavy security.

- [Iran minister heads to Russia as talks remain stalled](#) (2026-04-27 01:05)

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — Iran's foreign minister headed to Russia on Sunday as peace efforts between Tehran and Washington hung in the balance, following a flurry of regional diplomacy and the collapse of planned talks in Pakistan. Abbas Araghchi visited Oman between trips to Pakistani capital Islamabad and is expected to meet President Vladimir Putin on Monday, according to the Iranian ambassador. On Saturday, US President Donald Trump scrapped a planned trip to Islamabad by his envoys Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner. In a sign that efforts were ongoing, the Fars news agency said Iran had sent "written messages" to the Americans via mediator Pakistan outlining red lines, including nuclear issues and the Strait of Hormuz. Fars said the messages were not part of formal negotiations, however. A ceasefire in the US-Israeli war with Iran has so far held, but its economic shockwaves continued to reverberate globally. Iran has sealed off the strait, cutting flows of oil, gas and fertiliser and sending prices soaring, raising fears of food insecurity in developing countries. Hopes for a second round of talks in Pakistan had centred on a planned visit by Witkoff and Kushner, but Trump cancelled the trip, dismissing it as "sitting around talking about nothing". On Sunday, Trump told Fox News that if Iran wanted the talks, "they can come to us, or they can call us." Trump faces domestic pressure as fuel prices rise following Iran's closure of Hormuz, with midterm elections due in November. Polls show the war is unpopular among Americans. Safe transit Asked whether cancelling signalled renewed fighting, Trump said: "No, it doesn't mean that." On Saturday, Araghchi met Pakistan's military chief Asim Munir, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar, before travelling to Oman and returning to Islamabad. He later left for Russia for talks with senior officials, his ministry said. Russian and Iranian state media confirmed Araghchi's talks with Putin, citing officials from their respective governments. Iran's official IRNA news agency quoted Iran's envoy to Moscow, Kazem Jalali, saying they would meet in St Petersburg, Russia's second city. Araghchi himself posted on X that the talks in Oman had focused on ensuring safe transit through Hormuz, "to benefit of all dear neighbors and the world." "Our neighbors are our priority," he added. Pressure to end the war has intensified as the Strait of Hormuz remains closed. Iran's Revolutionary Guards said they had no intention of lifting their blockade, which has roiled energy markets. "Controlling the Strait of Hormuz and maintaining the shadow of its deterrent effects over America and the White House's supporters in the region is the definitive strategy of Islamic Iran," the Guards said on their official Telegram channel. The United States has imposed a blockade of Iranian ports in retaliation. In a statement carried by state media, Iran's military warned that continued US "blockading, banditry and piracy" would draw a response. Israel strikes Lebanon Israel and Hezbollah traded blame over violations of the fragile ceasefire in Lebanon, with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu saying the military was "vigorously" targeting the Iran-backed militia as both sides claimed new attacks. Hezbollah drew Lebanon into the Middle East war on March 2 by firing rockets at Israel to avenge the death of Iran's supreme leader Ali Khamenei, with Israel responding with strikes and a ground invasion. But claims that both sides have breached a 10-day ceasefire agreed earlier this month have continued. Netanyahu told Sunday's weekly cabinet meeting that Hezbollah's actions were "dismantling the ceasefire" while Hezbollah said it would respond to Israeli violations and its "continued occupation". Lebanon's health ministry said Israeli strikes on the country's south on Sunday killed 14 people, including two women and two children, and

wounded 37. The state-run National News Agency reported that Israeli warplanes had struck after evacuation warnings in Kfar Tibnit. An Israeli strike on Zawtar al-Sharqiyah, another of the flagged villages, destroyed a mosque and another religious building, the news agency said. Israel, which reported a soldier killed in combat in south Lebanon, says it can act against "planned, imminent or ongoing attacks". "This means freedom of action not only to respond to attacks...but also to pre-empt immediate threats and even emerging threats," Netanyahu said.

- [6.2 quake on Hokkaido island latest to shake Japan](#) (2026-04-27 00:32)

TOKYO, Japan — A strong earthquake rattled Japan's northern island of Hokkaido early Monday, US and Japanese meteorological agencies reported, the latest in a series of powerful tremors to hit the island nation. The 6.2-magnitude quake struck at 5:23 am (2123 GMT Sunday) in Hokkaido's southern region, at a depth of 83 kilometres (52 miles), the Japanese Meteorological Agency reported, revising its preliminary estimate of magnitude 6.1. No tsunami alert was issued, JMA said, and the US Geological Survey predicted that damage to property and threat to life was minimal, given the limited population in the region some 200 kilometres east of Sapporo. But "in areas that experienced strong shaking, the danger of falling rocks and landslides has increased," a JMA official told reporters. JMA also warned that risks of experiencing more quakes of a similar strength in the area in the coming week are high. Hours earlier, a magnitude 5.0 earthquake occurred in the sea a few hundred kilometres south of Hokkaido. The temblors come less than a week after the JMA warned of an increased risk of a megaquake -- 8.0 magnitude or stronger -- after last Monday's 7.7 earthquake off northern Iwate prefecture. Six people were reported injured as a result of that quake, which shook large buildings in Tokyo, hundreds of kilometres from the epicentre. In addition, 80-centimetre (31-inch) tsunami waves lashed a port in Iwate, while small waves also hit elsewhere in northern Japan. Afterward, the JMA said "the likelihood of a new, huge earthquake occurring is relatively higher than during normal times". Japan is one of the world's most seismically active countries, sitting on top of four major tectonic plates along the western edge of the Pacific "Ring of Fire". The archipelago, home to around 125 million people, typically experiences around 1,500 jolts every year and accounts for about 18 percent of the world's earthquakes. Japan is haunted by the memory of a massive 9.0 magnitude undersea quake in 2011, which triggered a tsunami that killed or left missing around 18,500 people and caused a devastating meltdown at the Fukushima nuclear plant.

- [2 Americans die in Negros clash](#) (2026-04-26 16:13)

THE National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-Elcac) has expressed serious concern over reports that two Americans were among 19 people killed in clashes between government troops and the New People's Army (NPA) in Toboso, Negros Occidental, on April 19. In a statement, Undersecretary Ernesto Torres Jr., the NTF-Elcac executive director, identified the US nationals as Lyle Prijoles and Kai Dana-Rene Sorem. The Manila Times has been trying to confirm the authenticity of the report from the Negros provincial police. The US Embassy in Manila did not immediately respond to a request for comment. The American

fatalities highlight “the increasing involvement of individuals from outside the Philippines in local armed hostilities,” Torres said. Prijoles’ personal social media accounts indicate his affiliation with Anakbayan-USA since 2012, where he is believed to have served in various capacities, prior to his presence in the Philippines, Torres said. The Americans were among the 19 New People’s Army (NPA) combatants whose identities have been established and whose remains have been turned over to their families, he said. Torres sees a “disturbing convergence on foreign nationals in a live combat setting where the risks are immediate and the consequences irreversible.” “We encourage Filipino communities abroad to exercise caution in engagements that may extend beyond lawful advocacy and into areas that carry significant personal risk,” he said. The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) has denied claims that civilians were among the fatalities in the Toboso incident. Earlier reports said a student leader and a local journalist died in the clash. Col. Louie Dema-ala, Philippine Army spokesman, questioned the presence of the youth leaders in the encounter site. Gen. Romeo Brawner, AFP chief, said the University of the Philippines student leader had a belt full of ammunition and was shooting at government troops. The Commission on Human Rights (CHR) on Sunday said over a hundred families were displaced by the fighting in Toboso. CHR Chairman Richard Palpal-latoc asked concerned authorities to provide humanitarian assistance to the families. The commission expressed grave concern over the incident where student leader Alyssa Alano and community journalist RJ Nichole Ledesma were killed. Palpal-latoc said the agency is investigating the incident. “Information from local human rights advocates prompted coordination with civil society organizations, local authorities, and security forces, including working with the families for the retrieval of the remains,” he said. Citing inconsistencies over the identities of those killed, the CHR said that while the military maintains that all the casualties were members of an armed group, other organizations claim that Alano and Ledesma were civilians engaged in community work. “Either of the claims requires thorough, independent verification. Determination of status, circumstances of engagement, and proportionality must be based on verifiable facts and due process,” said Palpal-latoc. Mamamayang Liberal Rep. Leila de Lima called for a congressional probe on the Toboso incident. “Beyond the question of whether the military operation was legitimate, there are serious allegations of violations that led to the deaths of 19 individuals, and we must investigate what truly transpired to find clarity and the truth,” de Lima, a former justice secretary and former CHR chairman, said in a statement. “We will file a resolution at the House to immediately investigate and answer our many questions about this incident,” she said in Filipino. Because of the high number of casualties, the operations carried out by the Philippine Army’s 79th Infantry Battalion in Toboso “warrant an urgent investigation,” de Lima said. Military officials said the clash erupted as army troops responded to information provided by villagers about the presence of suspected rebels and that a rebel commander with a bounty of P1 million on his head was killed. A soldier was wounded in the fighting. Troops seized 24 firearms at the scene of the clashes, and an unspecified number of fleeing guerrillas were captured, the task force said. At its peak decades ago, the insurgent force had an estimated 25,000 fighters, who waged one of Asia’s longest-running communist rebellions. Battle defeats, factional divisions and surrenders, however, have reduced the number of rebels to

below 900, according to security officials. Peace talks brokered by Norway collapsed under the previous president, Rodrigo Duterte, after both sides accused the other of continuing deadly attacks despite the negotiations. With REINA TOLENTINO and THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

- [Mans Carpio to file criminal complaint over disclosed bank transactions](#) (2026-04-26 16:11)

MANASES “Mans” Carpio, the husband of Vice President Sara Duterte, is expected to file on Monday, April 27, a criminal complaint before the Quezon City Prosecutor’s Office against four lawmakers, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) governor and head of the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC) over the couple’s “sensitive” bank transactions divulged during a House committee hearing. Carpio said there is “prima facie” evidence to charge BSP Governor Eli Remolona Jr., AMLC Executive Director Ronel Buenaventura, and Representatives Gerville Reyes Luistro, Percival Cendaña, Jose Manuel “Chel” Diokno and Leila de Lima, and several unnamed respondents. Carpio’s lawyer, Peter Paul Danao, said the respondents would be facing charges in violation of Republic Act 9160 (Anti-Money Laundering Act), RA 1405 (Bank Secrecy Law), and RA 10173 (Data Privacy Act). “It is indisputable that the AMLC reports involving my and my wife VP Sara’s banking transactions are sensitive information that cannot be disclosed to anyone,” Carpio said. “Yet, respondents openly divulged these banking transaction reports in a public hearing before the House Committee on Justice,” he said. He maintained that he and his wife did not consent to any public disclosure of the “absolutely confidential AMLC reports, much less the alleged bank transactions” cited by the respondents. Carpio said the respondents have “criminally and feloniously” disclosed and unraveled the alleged transaction reports without his consent and despite his objection. The public disclosure of alleged bank transaction reports of his and his wife from 2006 to 2025 was “for pure propaganda purposes,” Carpio said. Danao said his client strongly objects to the “conspiratorial act of disclosing and divulging to the general public the purported reports of banks to the AMLC concerning their account deposits, withdrawal, bank balances and related records without prior notice nor prior written consent.” “The prohibition is absolute. There is no exception. In fact, even the media are not authorized to divulge bank transaction reports,” the lawyer said.

- [Marcos vows unhampered services amid crisis](#) (2026-04-26 16:10)

PRESIDENT Ferdinand Marcos Jr. reassured Filipinos of the government’s round-the-clock work despite the challenges the country is experiencing because of the war in the Middle East. In his latest vlog, Marcos reiterated his administration’s commitment to continuously provide social services meant to alleviate the lives of Filipinos. “You know, even though our energy crisis is severe, the government’s work cannot stop there. The construction of streets and roads continues; the caring for the sick and students continues; the eradication of crime cannot stop, nor can the support for our athletes, culture, art, and tourism,” he said. “We will not allow the services provided by the government to be paralyzed, regardless of the problems that lie ahead,” he said. One initiative the government is focused on is shelter. The president said that through the Pambansang Pabahay para Pilipino Program, or 4PH, the housing gap would

be narrowed and more Filipinos would have homes they could truly call their own. One of the latest 4PH sites Marcos inspected is the township project in Palayan City, Nueva Ecija. Covering 23 hectares, the Palayan township is a vertical housing community that blends residential buildings with open spaces and shared facilities. Once completed, it will provide housing for 22,596 beneficiaries. Units are priced at about P1.3 million for 29 sqm, with no down payment and an affordable monthly amortization ranging from P3,500 to P4,000 — making homeownership attainable even for minimum wage earners. “For those who still lack housing, we will find a way to provide housing for everyone who needs it,” Marcos said.

ABOUT 5,776 public schools nationwide will enjoy satellite-based internet connectivity following the partnership of Data Lake Inc. and We Are IT Philippines Inc. The project integrates nationwide deployment capability with end-to-end connectivity management — from system design and installation to monitoring and support, ensuring consistent, scalable and accountable delivery across all sites. Data Lake, the first and largest authorized Starlink partner in the country, said the initiative followed a rigorous government procurement process, which adheres to national standards for transparency and accountability in public infrastructure initiatives. - [Imee Marcos seeks BSKE postponement to 2027](#) (2026-04-26 16:08)

SEN. Imee Marcos filed Senate Bill (SB) 2067 seeking to move the November 2026 Barangay and Sangguniang Kabataan Elections (BSKE) to October 2027 amid the oil crisis caused by the Middle East war. The senator on Sunday warned that soaring travel costs could bar Filipinos from going to the poll centers. She said that the BSKE is “vital to grassroots democracy,” but the current economic conditions could threaten voter turnout. “The oil crisis has triggered significant increases in transportation fares, creating a serious risk of disenfranchisement, especially for voters registered outside their residence and marginalized sectors already struggling with the cost of living,” Marcos said. She said that a postponement would give voters “more time to transfer their registrations, allowing them to update records and avoid expensive travel come election day.” She also cited the “fiscal strain” of the polls as the P16 billion budget of the Commission on Elections for the BSKE “excludes additional funding” required for support from the Philippine National Police, Department of Education, and local government units. “These funds may be better directed toward urgent needs such as economic relief, basic services, and crisis response,” Marcos said. The delay would ensure continuity in local leadership, allowing barangay (village) officials to remain focused on community concerns amid ongoing economic challenges. The senator raised concern that the election will “fall exactly on All Souls’ Day, when travel demand spikes and fares and fuel prices are expected to rise, adding financial strain on families going to the provinces.” “All Souls’ Day is important for Filipinos to pay their respects to the dead, but because of increasing travel expenses, it may discourage others to go home, let alone to vote,” Marcos said.

- [CSC tightens gambling ban for govt workers](#) (2026-04-26 16:06)

THE Civil Service Commission (CSC) has issued a new rule that totally bans government officials and personnel from engaging in all forms of gambling. CSC Chairman Marilyn Barua-Yap said on Sunday the agency approved a resolution or the Policy on the Prohibition of Gambling among Government Officials and Employees. It covers all officials and employees of the national government, local government units, autonomous regional governments, state and local

universities and colleges, and government-owned or -controlled corporations with original charters. “Involvement in gambling may expose public servants to financial vulnerability and conflicts of interest, which can undermine impartiality and erode public trust,” Barua-Yap said. Under the new measure, gambling refers to any game played for money or value in which the outcome depends wholly or chiefly on chance, or the use of any mechanical device or contrivance to determine by chance the winner or loser of money. The prohibited acts include entering, staying in, or participating in gambling activities in casinos, gambling houses, or similar establishments — whether land-based or sea-based — within or outside the Philippines, even if such establishments are licensed. Engaging in online or electronic gambling, including online casinos, e-bingo, e-sabong, and internet-based betting using any device, was totally banned. The promotion or facilitation of these activities is also prohibited. The CSC said participating in any other gambling activity — whether traditional, informal, private, social, cultural, or newly emerging — is forbidden, and organizing or facilitating such activities is also disallowed. Activities conducted exclusively for charitable, civic, or public welfare purposes — as well as games not prohibited by law — remain allowed, as long as “participation does not create any appearance of impropriety or conflict of interest,” Barua-Yap said. Violations may be reported by officials, employees, clients, or the public through the CSC Contact Center ng Bayan or other complaint referral systems. Anonymous reports will be processed in accordance with existing rules. A violator gets a reprimand for the first offense, suspension for the second offense, and dismissal from the service would be slapped for the third offense. Barua-Yap said the policy is anchored on the Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees (Republic Act 6713), the Administrative Code of 1987 (Executive Order 292), relevant jurisprudence, and prior directives prohibiting casino entry and related gambling activities.

- [Abandoned parcels at NAIA yield P6.8M illegal drugs](#) (2026-04-26 16:05)

CUSTOMS authorities dealt a major blow to cross-border drug trafficking syndicates after intercepting P6.8 million worth of illegal drugs inside abandoned inbound parcels at the Central Mail Exchange Center (CMEC) at the Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA). Customs Commissioner Ariel Nepomuceno said over the weekend that the operation exposed another attempt by international drug syndicates to exploit the country's mail system. Customs officers uncovered 4,231 grams of dried leaves suspected to be Kush marijuana, with an estimated street value of P6.34 million, along with 325 pink tablets believed to be 'ecstasy' or MDMA worth about P487,500. The drugs were cleverly concealed in parcels falsely declared as everyday items such as “Mama Cake Durian,” “Dog Food,” and “Science Dino-Bot” — a tactic commonly used to evade detection. The shipments originated from Thailand, the United States, and the Netherlands, and were bound for recipients in various parts of Luzon and Mindanao. Despite being abandoned by their consignees, the packages did not escape scrutiny. Authorities flagged the shipments through profiling and inspection, ultimately uncovering the concealed contraband. The interdiction was carried out by the NAIA Inter-Agency Drug Interdiction Task Group, in close coordination with the Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA), highlighting the growing synergy among agencies in combating drug smuggling. All confiscated substances

have been turned over to the PDEA Laboratory Service for confirmatory testing and proper disposition, while legal proceedings are underway against those behind the shipments. Violators face charges under Section 4, Article II of Republic Act 9165, or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002. BOC-NAIA District Collector Yasmin Obillos-Mapa said that the bureau remains relentless in tightening border controls, particularly in high-risk entry points such as international mail facilities. Officials stressed that even abandoned parcels are not beyond the reach of authorities, and attempts to smuggle illegal drugs — no matter how disguised — will be uncovered. With smuggling tactics becoming increasingly sophisticated, the Bureau of Customs vowed to enhance intelligence, inspection, and inter-agency coordination to safeguard the public and keep dangerous drugs off Philippine shores.

- [Expert cites obstacles in drawing of SCS code](#) (2026-04-26 16:05)

A FILIPINO political scientist and security analyst said efforts to finalize a Code of Conduct (COC) in the South China Sea continued to face significant hurdles, despite intensified negotiations led by the Philippines during its Asean chairmanship. Speaking at a forum organized by Manila-based think tank Asian Center for Peace and Security Studies Inc. (ACPSSI) over the weekend, Rommel Banlaoi said negotiators had been holding almost monthly meetings across the region — including in Cebu, Singapore and Bangkok — in a bid to produce a draft COC for possible approval during the Asean leaders summit later this year. “They are discussing heavily the legal character of the COC — whether it is binding or non-binding — the geographic scope, the activities to be covered, and most importantly, the dispute settlement mechanism,” Banlaoi said. Despite the accelerated pace, he said he was “not very optimistic anymore about the conclusion of the COC because I see real obstacles,” among them competing national interests among Asean member states. Banlaoi said that as this year’s Asean chairman, the Philippines had been trying to broker a consensus among countries with “colliding national interests,” while working with fellow Asean members Singapore and Malaysia under the troika mechanism to push negotiations forward. Even if an agreement were reached, he said it might fall short of expectations. “If there will be any conclusion at all, it may be a middle ground,” Banlaoi said. But even a “soft” or less binding arrangement could still be an important step toward maintaining peace in the disputed waterway. He noted that while there was mutual interest among claimant states, particularly the Philippines and China, to pursue cooperation, legal and political constraints remained substantial. Under Philippine law, Banlaoi said, there was no explicit framework for “joint development,” only for joint ventures structured through contracts that could imply recognition of Philippine sovereignty — a condition Beijing has been reluctant to accept. “The devil is always in the details,” he said. Banlaoi said domestic political pressures in both countries, along with the influence of external powers, could further complicate the quest for an agreement. “At the end of the day, the success of any agreement will boil down to domestic politics,” he said. “Remove domestic political factors and external pressures, and the Philippines and China can develop natural gas and oil. But the reality on the ground is different.” He said Manila needs to take decisive steps to manage both internal opposition and external geopolitical pressures if it hoped to push negotiations forward. The

Philippines has been aiming for a draft COC within its Asean chairmanship. ACPSSI President Herman Tiu Laurel blamed obstacles to the negotiations in part to policy positions taken by then foreign secretary Teodoro Locsin Jr. Laurel said Locsin had insisted on a non-negotiable condition that any COC must involve third-party powers such as the United States. Laurel said Locsin's view was not shared by the majority of Asean members and China, which prefer limiting the involvement of external actors. Tiu Laurel said recent shifts toward a more independent foreign policy, reinforced by a "white paper" issued by retired Philippine ambassadors calling for "balanced diplomacy" and non-alignment, could accelerate the pace of negotiations.

- [Retired officers planning to grab power – Lacson](#) (2026-04-26 16:05)

(UPDATE) SOME "retired officers" are planning to grab power amid the controversies involving President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and Vice President Sara Duterte, Sen. Panfilo Lacson said on Sunday. Former representative Zaldy Co had linked Marcos to the flood control fund scandal, while Duterte is facing impeachment proceedings for alleged unexplained wealth. The senator said he received information that the unidentified retired officers are recruiting supporters within the Armed Forces of the Philippines for a possible military-backed "people power revolution." "There is definitely an attempt but this is outside the AFP. Those behind this could only recruit a few, if at all, from inside the AFP," Lacson said in a radio interview. "My contacts in the Philippine National Police (PNP) say there is no indication this 'movement' will snowball. But definitely there is an attempt, mostly by retired officers," he said in Filipino and English. Lacson served in the uniformed services from 1971 to 2001, in both the AFP and PNP. He served as PNP chief from 1999 to 2001. However, the Senate president pro tempore believes that the planned takeover would not succeed because the AFP is a professional organization. "So long as the AFP is professional, and I would like to believe it is, there is no compelling reason to have a military junta or another People Power revolution," he said. Last year, Lacson rejected the idea of a military-backed "reset" or junta amid public outrage over corruption issues. Lacson in November 2025 confirmed that some retired military officers had approached him to be part of a "transition council" to change the government, but he declined. In rejecting unconstitutional changes of leadership, he pointed out that under the 1987 Constitution, the succession of leadership ends with the House speaker. Lacson said this was why he filed last year his "Designated Survivor" bill that extends the line of succession to include the most senior Senate and House member. The hit Netflix series "Designated Survivor" followed the story of a low-level US Cabinet official who becomes President of the United States after a catastrophic bombing during the State of the Union address kills everyone ahead of him in the line of succession.

- [Over 115K jobs up for grabs on Labor Day fairs](#) (2026-04-26 16:04)

MORE than 115,000 job opportunities await Filipino employment seekers as the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) rolls out nationwide job fairs for the Labor Day celebration on May 1, 2026, one of the largest coordinated hiring events in recent years. The initiative will bring

together job seekers and employers under one roof, in several venues nationwide. As of April 23, DOLE has identified at least 88 job fair venues nationwide, most of them strategically located in major malls and accessible public spaces to ensure convenience, high foot traffic, and wider reach. Labor officials said the number of job vacancies currently stands at 115,358, offered by 1,280 participating local employers. These figures are still expected to rise as more companies confirm their participation in the days leading up to Labor Day. Opportunities span a wide range of industries, reflecting both traditional and emerging labor demands. Among the sectors with the highest number of openings are wholesale and retail trade, manufacturing, construction, business process outsourcing (BPO), and accommodation and food services. In retail, companies are urgently hiring stock clerks and sales associates to meet growing consumer demand. The manufacturing sector is seeking production operators and factory workers, while the construction industry continues to require skilled workers, such as carpenters, foremen, and steelmen, in ongoing infrastructure projects. The BPO sector remains a major employer, with thousands of openings for customer service representatives, while the hospitality industry is ramping up hiring for service crew, line cooks, and baristas as tourism and dining activities rebound. DOLE underscored that the nationwide job fairs support the administration of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. in addressing unemployment and poverty by accelerating job matching and reintegrating workers into productive sectors of the economy. Job seekers are encouraged to seize the opportunity being offered at the one-day hiring processes in several sites, with some employers expected to conduct on-the-spot interviews and even issue immediate job offers to qualified candidates. To streamline the application process, job seekers are advised to come prepared with multiple copies of their resumes, valid identification cards, and other necessary documents. In the National Capital Region alone, several major venues will host job fairs on May 1, including SMX Convention Center, Robinsons Manila, Ayala Malls Circuit Makati, and the Quezon City MICE Center, among others, with additional schedules extending into May in select locations. Similar large-scale job fair activities will take place in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao, covering key cities and provinces — from Baguio and Laoag to Cebu, Davao, and General Santos — ensuring that opportunities are accessible even outside Metro Manila. Some regions have also scheduled extended or follow-up job fairs beyond May 1, signaling sustained efforts to connect job seekers with employers beyond the Labor Day celebration. The 124th Labor Day carries the theme “Disenteng Trabaho para sa Lahat: Iisang Hangarin, Bagong Pilipinas Sama-samang Mararating,” reinforcing the government’s push for inclusive growth and quality employment for all Filipinos. With thousands of vacancies waiting to be filled, DOLE is urging the public to seize the opportunity, emphasizing that the nationwide job fairs are not just a celebration — but a concrete pathway to employment and economic recovery.

- [Recruitment of Filipinos for overseas wars alarms BI](#) (2026-04-26 16:03)

THE Bureau of Immigration (BI) has raised the alarm over a trend of recruiting Filipino men online to work as soldiers abroad under deceptive and high-risk schemes. The Immigration Protection and Border Enforcement Section (I-Probes) issued the warning following a series of

interceptions at the country's major airports in recent weeks as authorities intensify efforts to curb human trafficking and illegal recruitment to protect Filipinos from exploitation overseas. In a report to Immigration Commissioner Joel Anthony Viado, the I-Probes said that on March 31, a 52-year-old Filipino was stopped at NAIA Terminal 3 after attempting to leave the country disguised as a tourist. Immigration officers grew suspicious after spotting inconsistencies in his statements during primary inspection. The victim was referred to the I-Probes, where he eventually admitted the real purpose of his trip: he had been recruited to serve in a foreign military. The victim, an army reservist, said recruiters contacted him through Facebook and instructed him to pose as a tourist to avoid detection. He was lured by a lucrative offer — a monthly salary of \$2,500 and a hefty \$25,000 signing bonus. Just a day later, two more men, aged 38 and 39, were intercepted at Clark International Airport before boarding a flight to Bangkok. Initially claiming they were on vacation, the pair later confessed they had also been recruited online to work as soldiers abroad. They were promised \$1,500 in monthly pay and a \$30,000 joining bonus. Recruiters contacted them through a Facebook group and continued communication via WhatsApp, directing them to travel to Thailand and await further instructions. On April 5, two more victims, aged 49 and 50, were stopped at NAIA Terminal 3 while attempting to depart via Ethiopia on a similar arrangement. On April 12, another 51-year-old man was intercepted at NAIA Terminal 1 after attempting to leave for China, also under the guise of tourist travel but ultimately bound for military work abroad. Authorities said these cases point to a coordinated and dangerous recruitment network exploiting social media platforms to lure Filipinos into potentially life-threatening roles in undisclosed locations. Extreme danger Viado warned that such schemes place victims in extreme danger, with little to no protection or legal safeguards. “Our officers remain vigilant in detecting these schemes at our borders. These interceptions likely saved lives,” Viado said, stressing that the promises of high pay and bonuses are often used to mask the real risks involved. He described the trend as “deeply alarming,” noting that recruiters deliberately obscure key details about the job, including the exact location, nature of duties, and legal status of employment. The BI urged the public to exercise extreme caution when encountering overseas job offers — especially those involving “security” or “military” roles that lack proper documentation or are arranged informally through social media. All intercepted individuals will be turned over to the Inter-Agency Council Against Trafficking for assistance, while authorities are working to track down and prosecute those behind the recruitment network.

- [Marina extends expiry of documents for seafarers](#) (2026-04-26 16:02)

THE Maritime Industry Authority (Marina) has issued a 90-day extension for the expired or expiring credentials of Filipino seafarers currently unable to disembark due to the security crisis in the Middle East. The measure applies to Seafarer's Record Books (SRBs), Seafarer's Identification and Record Books (SIRBs), and Seafarer's Identity Documents (SIDs). The extension is automatic for documents expiring on or before June 30, 2026, removing the need for individual applications. Marina moved to ease the burden on seafarers who continue to serve at sea under difficult and uncertain conditions, ensuring that documentary requirements

do not add pressure to those already delayed onboard due to circumstances beyond their control. Shipping companies, ship owners, and Licensed Manning Agencies (LMAs) must report all covered cases to Marina through [mds@marina.gov.ph](mailto:mds@marina.gov.ph). Meanwhile, authorized company representatives or vessel masters must sign all submissions and follow the prescribed format under Annex 1 of Marina Advisory 2026-21. Marina Administrator Sonia Malaluan emphasized the urgency and human focus of the agency's response. "Our seafarers are trapped in a situation they did not choose, far from their families and unsure of when they can finally come home. We act not just as a regulator, but as a government that stands with them in their most difficult moments," Malaluan said. "This extension gives them breathing space and assures them that Marina is with them every step of the way," she added. Marina reaffirmed its commitment to protect Filipino seafarers deployed worldwide and to respond swiftly to crises that affect their safety, welfare, and dignity at sea.

- [Thai police arrest Indonesian wanted for \\$10M cyberfraud](#) (2026-04-26 15:07)

BANGKOK, THAILAND — Police in Thailand have arrested an Indonesian who allegedly defrauded Americans of about \$10 million, Thai authorities said Sunday, adding that they will extradite him to the United States. The 33-year-old Indonesian man was arrested on Friday at a luxury resort in the coastal town of Phuket after a tip-off from the US Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Suriya Pongsombat of the national immigration police told AFP. The FBI had informed Thai authorities that the suspect left Dubai and travelled to the Southeast Asian nation on Wednesday, according to Suriya. After his arrest, the man was sent to an immigration detention centre in the capital Bangkok and was awaiting extradition to the United States, he said. "The FBI said he was wanted for committing fraud against Americans of about \$10 million," he added. The FBI did not immediately respond to an AFP request for comment on Sunday. Another Thai immigration police officer told local media that the suspect allegedly hired models to lure targets into phony investment schemes over video calls, dating apps and social media, and he managed the scams from the United Arab Emirates. Southeast Asia has emerged as a hotspot for cyberscam operations in recent years, with organised criminal groups using casinos, hotels and fortified compounds in the region as bases to carry out sophisticated online cons. Cyberscammers have defrauded victims around the world of tens of billions of dollars annually, often through fake cryptocurrency investments and phony romantic relationships. But fraudsters and their associates are also believed to have expanded outside the region. According to a 2025 report from the UN Office on Drugs and Crime, foreign workers in the UAE have been "lured into scam work in Southeast Asia", suggesting "Dubai is becoming a global hub for recruitment and trafficking linked to the cyber-enabled fraud industry". The UAE, the report adds, "have been targeted as a base for individuals involved in the laundering of funds acquired through illicit online activity, many of whom have purchased property in Dubai".

- [Gauff overcomes stomach bug to beat Cirstea in Madrid](#) (2026-04-26 14:46)

MADRID, SPAIN — Coco Gauff became the latest victim of the stomach virus that has been sweeping through the draw at the Madrid Open but the ailing American still found a way to beat

Sorana Cirstea 4-6, 7-5, 6-1 on Sunday and reach the round of 16. Several players have been struggling with illness in the Spanish capital this week, including Iga Swiatek, who was forced to retire from her match against Ann Li on Saturday, and Marin Cilic, who had to withdraw ahead of his second-round meeting with Joao Fonseca on Friday. Liudmila Samsonova also pulled out of the tournament on Sunday citing illness ahead of her third-round match with Linda Noskova. Gauff vomited in a bin on the court during her clash with Cirstea, and asked for a medical timeout during the latter stages of the match before she completed the win in two hours and 21 minutes. "Yeah, I don't know, honestly (how I got through that)," said Gauff, who will face Noskova in the last 16. "I was just trying to finish the match and one point turned into another. I think I got what everybody else is having here in Madrid, unfortunately. So, I'm just going to try to push through for tomorrow." A runner-up to Aryna Sabalenka in the Spanish capital 12 months ago, Gauff has 3,300 points to defend on clay from Madrid through to her Roland Garros title defence in early June. "I pulled out in Indian Wells. I'm not someone who likes to pull out, so I didn't want to pull out again today. So, I'm glad that I was able to get through it," added the two-time Grand Slam champion. "I did start to feel better, not feeling like I had to throw up. They gave me some pills, so that definitely helped." "But I was really tired... The first part was literally just trying to keep whatever I ate down. Once they gave me something to help with that, then I was just nauseous and tired. But I can deal with that."

- [Israel PM says Hezbollah 'dismantling' ceasefire with Lebanon](#) (2026-04-26 14:41)

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Sunday said Hezbollah's actions were threatening the ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon, as he pledged to "vigorously" target the Iran-backed group. "It must be understood that Hezbollah's violations are, in practice, dismantling the ceasefire," Netanyahu said during a weekly cabinet meeting. Under the terms of the truce, which was recently extended, Israel reserves the right to respond to "planned, imminent or ongoing attacks" and has been striking targets in south Lebanon almost every day. "We are acting vigorously in accordance with arrangements agreed with the United States and, incidentally, also with Lebanon," Netanyahu said. "This means freedom of action not only to respond to attacks, which is obvious, but also to pre-empt immediate threats and even emerging threats." Shortly after Netanyahu's remarks, the Israeli military said it had intercepted three drones before they could enter Israeli territory. Earlier on Sunday, the Israeli military issued evacuation orders for residents of seven villages in south Lebanon ahead of planned strikes targeting Hezbollah positions. Lebanon's National News Agency reported multiple strikes on villages in the south on Sunday, particularly in the village of Zawtar al-Sharqiyah where "an Israeli enemy drone hit a motorcycle". The agency also reported shelling on several border villages since early Sunday. Lebanon's health ministry said seven people were killed on Saturday in Israeli strikes, revising upwards an earlier toll of six. US President Donald Trump had on Thursday announced that a 10-day ceasefire which began on April 17 had been extended for three weeks. Tehran-backed Hezbollah drew Lebanon into the Middle East war on March 2 by firing rockets at Israel to avenge the death of Iran's supreme leader Ali Khamenei in US-Israeli strikes. Israel responded with airstrikes and a ground invasion in southern Lebanon.

- [Gunman planned to target top Trump officials — attorney general](#) (2026-04-26 14:36)

WASHINGTON, UNITED STATES — Investigators on Sunday said the gunman who tried to storm a gala dinner attended by US President Donald Trump planned to target top government officials, as scrutiny grew over the event's security. Trump, who was rushed out of the hotel ballroom in Washington by Secret Service agents, posted surveillance camera footage of the gunman attempting to sprint past a security checkpoint as guards drew their weapons. After an exchange of gunfire, the suspect was detained at the scene and was being questioned Sunday before he is due to appear in court on Monday. "He's not actively cooperating. I expect that he will be formally charged tomorrow morning in federal court in Washington," acting US Attorney General Todd Blanche told CBS's "Face The Nation." "We do believe, based upon just a very preliminary start to understanding what happened, that he was targeting members of the administration." Blanche added no further motive was known for the attack, confirming the suspect -- who was armed with a shotgun, handgun and knives -- was staying at the Washington Hilton hotel where the black-tie dinner was held on Saturday evening. "We believe that he traveled by train from Los Angeles to Chicago, and then from Chicago to Washington," Blanche said. "It appears he purchased these firearms in the past couple years." Attendees dove under tables in chaotic scenes as Secret Service agents swarmed into the glitzy White House Correspondents' Association dinner, held annually in the US capital. Crowded into the ballroom were Trump, First Lady Melania Trump, Vice President JD Vance, several cabinet members and top lawmakers, and hundreds of guests in black tie.

- [Inside the world's largest art heist when over \\$500M of paintings were stolen from a Boston museum](#) (2026-04-26 14:21)

BOSTON, AP — For decades, the 1990 theft of 13 artworks from the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum — now valued at more than \$500 million — has remained unsolved. It remains the largest art theft in history — far surpassing more recent museum thefts, including a daylight heist at the Louvre that involved far fewer works and was resolved more quickly. In 2013, the FBI said it knew who was responsible for the Boston museum heist but declined to name them, fueling speculation that persists today. A former FBI agent who led the investigation for more than two decades is now offering the first detailed account of how investigators reached that conclusion — and publicly identifying the men he believes were involved. In a new book, Geoff Kelly traces how the artworks moved through criminal networks, where violence took the lives of key suspects and witnesses, and challenges long-circulating theories by revisiting key details. The irony at the center is that Gardner's intention was for the museum to remain frozen in time, stipulating in her will that nothing in the Venetian palazzo-inspired building would be changed after her death. Gardner, who lived in the museum and died there in 1924, intended for the paintings, sculptures and architectural fragments to remain exactly as she had arranged. The empty gilded frames of the missing paintings still hang in the museum today — silent witnesses to what was taken.

- [Iran's foreign minister returns to Pakistan as Islamabad races to save negotiations with US](#)

ISLAMABAD,AP — Iran 's foreign minister arrived in Islamabad again on Sunday as Pakistan's political and military leadership scrambled to reignite ceasefire talks between Tehran and Washington.Abbas Araghchi had left Pakistan' s capital late Saturday, creating confusion around an expected second round of talks, but he returned to Islamabad before continuing on to Moscow, Iranian state media said. He had been in Oman, which previously mediated talks and is located on the other side of the strategic Strait of Hormuz.Two Pakistani officials, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss the efforts, did not say when the Americans might return to the region to follow up on historic face-to-face talks earlier this month.The White House on Friday said it would dispatch envoys Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner to Islamabad for a second round of talks. But shortly after Araghchi's departure was reported, President Donald Trump said he had called off the mission because of a lack of progress with Iran. “They can call us anytime they want,” he said.Trump last week indefinitely extended the ceasefire that U.S. and Iran agreed to on April 7 that has largely halted the fighting that began with joint U.S.-Israeli strikes on Feb. 28. But a permanent settlement remains elusive in the war that has killed thousands of people and shaken the global economy.

BERLIN,GERMANY — For people living with disabilities, barriers to tourism can range from the obvious — such as an out-of-service elevator — to the unseen, like an outing that's too long or a setting that's too loud.As the baby boom generation ages, the travel industry is increasingly catering to older adults with the time and money to sightsee internationally and who sometimes need additional assistance. Truly inclusive accessibility, though, accommodates a much greater range of tourists, from individuals with physical disabilities to people with autism or dementia.To better serve visitors with visible or invisible disabilities, museums and other cultural institutions worldwide have added specialized guides and barrier-free tours, some made possible by advances in technology.These include sign-language tours for people who are deaf or hard of hearing, touch-based events for guests with blindness or low vision, and programs designed for people on the autism spectrum. Tourism agencies dedicated to serving disabled travelers have sprung up, too.Offering barrier-free tours shows people with disabilities they are welcome in cultural spaces, said Ashley Grady, an accessibility program specialist at the Office of Visitor Accessibility of Washington's Smithsonian Institution.The services are a way of saying, “we’ ve thought of you,” Grady said. “We want you to come to our museums. We want you to see yourselves reflected in our staff and our collections. And we want to make these programs as accessible as possible for you, your family, your loved ones, your friends.” Still, gaps remain. Ivor Ambrose, managing director of the nonprofit European Network for Accessible Tourism, said there's a continuing lack of awareness around the different levels of accessibility that travelers need."This is actually a really big market and an opportunity, which is still not fulfilled by the operators in all these different areas of tourism,"

he said. Here is advice from several experts about how to take advantage of barrier-free options for yourself or someone else.

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLORIDA — The Sombrero galaxy and its glowing halo of stars have never looked this good. The U.S. National Science Foundation's NOIRLab released the latest photo of the popular hat-shaped galaxy on Friday. A telescope in Chile observed it four years ago, but the color imaging was not completed until this week. Located approximately 30 million light-years away, this spiral galaxy — formally known as Messier 104 — is one of the largest in the constellation Virgo cluster. It's an estimated 50,000 light-years across. A light year is about 6 trillion miles. Captured in incredible detail, the galaxy's stellar halo appears to be triple the size of the sombrero itself. A dark energy camera on the telescope also caught a stream of stars pouring out of the galaxy's southern edge. Scientists believe the stars in this stream, as well as the halo, were ripped from other galaxies in a long-ago collision. Astronomers discovered the galaxy back in the 1700s.

- [Badminton eyes 'next generation' with new scoring system](#) (2026-04-26 13:32)

KUALA LUMPUR, MALAYSIA — Badminton chiefs say they have "strengthened the sport" for the future after the governing body voted to change the scoring system in a major move. Currently matches are the best of three games with the winner of each game being the first to 21 points. From January 2027 it will be the first to 15 points. Badminton World Federation president Khunying Patama Leeswadtrakul called it an important milestone. "We are building a sport that speaks to the next generation, while continuing to invest in the long term future of our players," Leeswadtrakul said. "The 3×15 scoring system is intended to deliver more exciting and competitive badminton, improved scheduling, more consistent match durations and potential benefits for player welfare and recovery." By bringing high pressure moments earlier and creating tighter scores and more dramatic finishes, the format aims to keep fans engaged from the first rally to the last. "Leeswadtrakul acknowledged that traditionalists would be concerned by the move. "This decision does not change the fundamental nature of badminton," she said in remarks released on Saturday. "The skill, the tactics, the physical and mental demands, and the drama of the sport will remain."

- [Japan inflation cools demand for vending machine drinks](#) (2026-04-26 13:20)

TOKYO, JAPAN — From post offices and parks to stations and even the summit of Mount Fuji, Japan's vending machines are ubiquitous. But with the rapid pace of inflation cooling demand for their drinks, operators are being forced to rethink the business. Last month beverage giant DyDo Group Holdings announced it would remove about 20,000 vending machines -- around seven percent of their stock nationwide -- by January 2027, in order to "reconstruct a profitable network". Pokka Sapporo Food & Beverage, based in Nagoya, also said in March it would sell its 40,000-machine operation to Osaka-based Lifedrink Co. "The strength of the vending machine

business has been to sell at list prices," a spokeswoman for Pokka Sapporo told AFP. But "a rise in list prices is pushing more people to look to shops that sell drinks at a discount", she said. Tetsuharu Kawaguchi, 31, who works for a food delivery company, said cost was the leading factor in his decision to ditch vending machines -- which stock a host of Japan's favourite thirst-quenchers from iced tea to canned coffee. From a machine, even "water... ends up being around 130 yen (80 cents). If you go to a convenience store, you can sometimes get it a bit cheaper, and places like drugstores often sell it for quite a low price", he explained. While Japan was long haunted by deflation, it has more recently faced a surge in living costs. Kazuhiro Miyashita of Inryo Soken, a research institute focused on the beverage industry, told AFP that increased costs for fuel and staff to keep machines stocked were eating into profits. "If they can curb prices through cost-cutting, they may be able to hold their own against convenience stores." Takayuki Ishizaki of Nomura Research Institute said that growing environmental awareness was also playing a part in the troubling situation for operators. It "has led some people to stop buying drinks outside and instead bring their own bottles (to refill)", he said. Despite the decline, vending machines -- where ramen noodles, cut fruit, kimchi and crepes are also on offer -- are unlikely to disappear anytime soon. "Ultimately the overwhelming convenience of being able to find one just by walking a short distance practically anywhere (in Japan) is something that can't really be replaced," Ishizaki said. "The move now is toward being more strategic and selective in terms of placement." Taisuke Oguro, 27, a hairdresser in Tokyo, is holding out for their survival. "In places where there aren't any convenience stores, I do think it's actually pretty handy to have one," he said.

- [Revilla camp confident: No evidence presented vs former senator](#) (2026-04-26 12:26)

MANILA, Philippines — The camp of former senator Ramon Revilla Jr. believes that no evidence was presented to link the former lawmaker to the alleged ghost project in Pandi, Bulacan following days of hearings conducted by the Sandiganbayan. The prosecution presented its last witness in the bail hearing in the malversation through falsification case filed against Revilla and other people last Friday, April 24. "We will not preempt what the court's assessment will be but we are very confident in our position," Reody Anthony Balisi, one of Revilla's lawyers, said in an interview with reporters. "From the time that this fiasco happened to the time that he was charged, to the time that he surrendered, to the time that we started the bail hearing, and now, culmination, last day of the bail hearing, what have we been saying ever since? There is no evidence that can link [former] senator Bong Revilla," Balisi said. The Office of the Ombudsman filed the case before the Sandiganbayan in Jan. 2026. Revilla's co-accused include Brice Hernandez, Juanito Mendoza, Arjay Domasig, Emelita Juat, Christina Mae Pineda, and Jaypee Mendoza. All of them, except Mendoza, sought bail. The bail hearing started on Apr. 6. The National Institute for Transparency and Accountability (NITA) cited weaknesses in the case presented by the prosecution. "There is clear overreliance on one witness, and that is Bernardo. All other testimonies trace back to him," NITA Executive Director Carlos Ayala said in a statement. Ayala was referring to state witness Roberto Bernardo, former undersecretary of the Department of Public Works and Highways, who took the witness stand last Friday. "Despite

allegations involving hundreds of millions, there is a lack of documentary link—no bank records, no receipts, no direct financial trail connecting Revilla to the supposed transactions," Ayala said. "What we saw in court was largely hearsay and derivative testimony—accounts based on what was told to them, not on personal knowledge." "Instead of directly implicating Revilla, the witnesses presented highlighted the gaps in the narrative," he said. The Sandiganbayan is expected to hand down its ruling in the coming weeks. The court will determine if Revilla will remain in detention or be released on bail.

MANILA, Philippines — Rear Admiral Roy Vincent Trinidad will remain the spokesman of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) for the West Philippine Sea (WPS), after he retires from military service, the Philippine Navy said on Saturday. "While Rear Admiral Trinidad formally retires from active military service, he will continue to serve as WPS' mouthpiece as a naval reservist, in recognition of the value of his continued voice, and as a demonstration of his sustained service and credibility in communicating the Armed Forces' position on maritime issues," the Navy said in a statement. Trinidad was honored during his retirement ceremony on Thursday in Taguig City, led by Philippine Navy Flag Officer in Command Vice Adm. Jose Ma. Ambrosio Ezpeleta. "By underscoring what is right and what is true, he has contributed to bolstering public faith in our actions, as well as fortifying our country's diplomatic messaging on the global stage," Ezpeleta said. Trinidad is a member of the Philippine Military Academy "Sambisig" Class of 1991.

- [Group of retired officers planning to grab power — Lacson](#) (2026-04-26 09:22)

MANILA, Philippines — Some "retired officers" are planning to grab power amid the controversies involving President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and Vice President Sara Duterte, Sen. Panfilo Lacson said on Sunday. Former representative Zaldy Co had linked Marcos to the flood control fund scandal while Duterte is facing impeachment proceedings for alleged unexplained wealth. The senator said he received information that the unidentified retired officers are recruiting supporters within the Armed Forces of the Philippines for a possible military-backed "people power revolution." "There is definitely an attempt but this is outside the AFP. Those behind this could only recruit a few, if at all, from inside the AFP," Lacson said in a radio interview. "My contacts in the Philippine National Police (PNP) say there is no indication this 'movement' will snowball. But definitely there is an attempt, mostly by retired officers," he said in Filipino and English. Lacson served in the uniformed service from 1971 to 2001, in both the AFP and PNP. He served as PNP chief from 1999 to 2001. The Senate president pro tempore believes that the planned takeover would not succeed because the AFP is a professional organization. "So long as the AFP is professional and I would like to believe it is, there is no compelling reason to have a military junta or another People Power revolution," he said.

- [Two Americans among 19 killed in Negros Occidental clashes](#) (2026-04-26 07:35)

MANILA, Philippines — Two Americans were among 19 people killed in clashes between government troops and members of the New People’s Army (NPA) in Toboso, Negros Occidental on April 19, 2026. In a statement, the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-Elcac) identified the two as Lyle Prijoles and Kai Dana-Rene Sorem. “The two were among the 19 NPA combatants whose identities have now been established and whose remains have been turned over to their respective families,” NTF-Elcac said. The agency said it sees a “disturbing convergence on foreign nationals in a live combat setting where the risks are immediate and the consequences irreversible.” It warned Americans of Filipino descent in the US to be wary of being lured by left-wing activist groups into joining or supporting Filipino insurgents in the Philippines.

- [Bernardo’s P1B restitution offer seen weakening case vs Revilla in bail hearings](#)

MANILA, Philippines — The P1 billion restitution offer made by former Public Works undersecretary Roberto Bernardo has emerged as a pivotal issue in the bail hearings of former senator Ramon Revilla Jr., with the defense arguing that the move undercuts the prosecution’s claim that evidence of guilt is strong. At the latest hearing before the Sandiganbayan Third Division, Associate Justice Ronald Moreno raised questions about Bernardo’s offer to return the amount to the government as part of his bid to qualify as a state witness. Lawyers for Revilla contended that the scale of the proposed restitution suggests Bernardo was not a minor participant but a central figure in the alleged irregularities involving flood control projects. They argued that the ability to return such a large sum points to direct access to, or control over, project funds. Defense counsel Reedy Anthony Balisi pressed the issue during cross-examination, directly asking Bernardo if he was the “mastermind” behind the scheme, citing his alleged deep involvement and proximity to the funds. “You cannot return such a large amount unless you are right at the center of the movement of the money,” Balisi said during the hearing. Presiding Justice Karl Miranda also addressed the issue in open court, noting public sentiment surrounding the case and asking Bernardo to respond directly to questions about his alleged role. “You answer the question of Atty. Balisi: are you really the mastermind?” Miranda said. The prosecution presented Bernardo as its principal witness in an effort to demonstrate that the evidence against Revilla is strong — a legal threshold required to deny bail. The defense argued that Bernardo’s testimony should be treated with caution, describing it as uncorroborated and motivated by his desire to avoid prosecution. They maintained that his offer to return ₱1 billion indicates a strong personal incentive to cooperate with the government. Other prosecution witnesses, according to the defense, failed to directly link Revilla to the alleged misuse of funds. A Public Works director assigned in the National Capital Region testified on project processing and implementation but did not implicate Revilla. Instead, the testimony outlined internal coordination within the department, where Bernardo allegedly held influence. Another witness, Engineer Paul Cortez, detailed documentation and procedures related to project listings but did not identify any instruction, transaction, or meeting involving Revilla. The defense said these accounts show that while witnesses described how the system

operated, none established direct participation by Revilla. They argued that the testimonies pointed to Bernardo's central role across various stages of the projects. The prosecution also presented Bernardo's driver and staff aide to support claims of alleged deliveries to Revilla. Under cross-examination, the defense said the two witnesses merely echoed Bernardo's statements and did not provide independent confirmation. Revilla's legal team maintained that the case relies heavily on a single witness whose credibility is in question, backed by testimonies that do not independently establish the former senator's involvement. They added that Bernardo's restitution offer not only signals the extent of his alleged participation but also raises doubts about the reliability of his statements. The Sandiganbayan has yet to rule on Revilla's bail petition, with the court expected to determine whether the prosecution's evidence meets the constitutional standard required to keep the accused in detention.

- [Riders push urgent motorcycle taxi law, seek stronger livelihood protection](#) (2026-04-26 03:07)

MANILA, Philippines — Motorcycle taxi riders urged the government to prioritize livelihood protection in regulating the industry and called for the immediate passage of a motorcycle taxi law. In a statement, Motorcycle Taxi Community Philippines Chairman Romeo Maglunsod said any policy governing the sector must ensure that riders can earn sustainably while maintaining dignity in their work. The group welcomed the government's P5,000 fuel subsidy, describing it as a meaningful relief as rising fuel prices continue to cut into riders' earnings. "We are grateful for the assistance extended by the government to riders during the fuel crisis. For many riders, almost half of their daily income is already spent on fuel, and the P5,000 assistance is a big help," Maglunsod said. However, he stressed that financial aid is only a temporary solution, adding that long-term protection should come from stable and humane livelihood policies. "At this time of crisis, no rider's family should go hungry or suffer because of the lack of humane and stable livelihood," he said. The group said the passage of a motorcycle taxi bill has become

urgent, noting that the government's pilot program has been in place for nearly a decade. Maglunsod said the proposed law should recognize motorcycle taxis as part of the gig economy and uphold the rights of gig workers, including flexibility and independence. "What riders want is to remain the boss of their own livelihood," he said, citing the need for riders to freely choose platforms, access incentives, and manage their working hours. The group also proposed that franchises or accreditation be granted directly to individual riders, similar to transport network vehicle service drivers, instead of being held by platforms. Under such an arrangement, riders would have greater control over their operations, while platforms would serve mainly as tools to connect them with passengers and provide support services, Maglunsod said. "The rider should hold the power to decide how to earn a living. Platforms should be instruments that support riders, not structures that limit their freedom," he added. The group also pointed to the public service role of motorcycle taxi riders, saying they help commuters reach workplaces, schools, hospitals, and other essential destinations. "Our call is clear: protect rider livelihoods, protect our freedom as gig workers, and pass the motorcycle taxi bill in a way that is fair, just, and humane," Maglunsod said.

In a statement issued Sunday, LTFRB Chairman Vigor Mendoza II said 5,440 taxi drivers received P5,000 each on April 25, amounting to P27.2 million in assistance. The payout was extended until 9 p.m. to

accommodate all qualified beneficiaries present at designated sites. The previous day's rollout covered around 2,000 drivers, with roughly P10 million released. Mendoza said that fuel subsidies for other public utility vehicle (PUV) sectors have also been distributed, partly through checks issued to transport service entities in various regions to facilitate payouts to their members. He credited coordination among government personnel and stakeholders for the smooth rollout of the program. Beyond the one-time P5,000 assistance, the LFRB said it is working with the Department of Energy and Land Bank of the Philippines on the implementation of a P10-per-liter fuel discount scheme for PUV operators nationwide.

- [Shots fired, Trump evacuated unhurt from press dinner in Washington](#) (2026-04-26 02:26)

WASHINGTON, United States — Shots were fired as US President Donald Trump attended a media gala in Washington on Saturday night, with the gunman detained at a screening area just outside the hotel ballroom where hundreds of guests had gathered. Trump was rushed off the stage and security teams swarmed past groups of invitees at the black-tie White House Correspondents' Dinner, as people dived under tables in chaotic scenes. "Secret Service and Law Enforcement did a fantastic job. They acted quickly and bravely. The shooter has been apprehended," Trump said on social media. He said he would shortly hold a press conference at the White House. "Law Enforcement has requested that we leave the premises," he added. "The First Lady, plus the Vice President, and all Cabinet members, are in perfect condition." He said he planned to re-schedule the event within a month despite the security scare. The Secret Service confirmed that one suspect was in custody, adding the shooting incident took place near the main security screening area. Tactical teams with guns drawn took position on the stage where Trump had been sitting during dinner before he was evacuated. Police swarmed the Washington Hilton Hotel, and helicopters hovered overhead. Glitzy annual gala The incident erupted after the welcoming speech and during dinner, before Trump was due to speak. Trump administration officials appeared to have been evacuated first and uncertainty remained as to what exactly happened. A cabinet official, Mehmet Oz, said "shots fired upstairs" as he was rushed out by security. Trump was the target of an assassination attempt during a rally in Butler, Pennsylvania in 2024. A gunman fired several shots, killing a rally goer and lightly wounding the president in the ear. A few months later, another man was arrested after a Secret Service agent saw the barrel of a rifle poking from the bushes on the perimeter of the West Palm Beach golf course where Trump was playing a round. The Washington Hilton where Saturday's gala was taking place was the site where Republican President Ronald Reagan was shot by a would-be assassin in 1981. Organizers told guests that the White House Correspondents' Dinner would continue despite the incident, before announcing it had been postponed. Trump was attending the event for the first time while in office. The White House Correspondents' Association (WHCA) invited Trump this year despite his repeated attacks on the media. Unlike all other presidents from the past 100 years, Trump had never attended while in office. The "Nerd Prom" as attendees dub it brings together hundreds of Washington journalists and media executives to raise funds for scholarships and awards. The event often has a comedian joking about the president, who traditionally gets his own back with some jokes, though no comedian was

booked this year.

LONDON — The challenge for King Charles III when he embarks on next week's state visit to the U.S. is, as always, to live up to his mother's example. The late Queen Elizabeth II wowed Congress in 1991 with a speech that celebrated the shared democratic traditions of Britain and the United States, quoted Abraham Lincoln, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Ralph Waldo Emerson, and highlighted the deep bonds between the two nations. Those themes will also be at the top of Charles' agenda as he celebrates America's 250th birthday and seeks to calm tensions surrounding Prime Minister Keir Starmer's refusal to support U.S. President Donald Trump's war against Iran, said Douglas Brinkley, a presidential historian at Rice University in Texas. "We've got to always make the distinction that there's a difference between the government of the U.K. and the kings and queens of Great Britain, who are really always coming to try to put (on) a good face," Brinkley told The Associated Press. "Politics come and go, prime ministers, presidents, come and go, but there's something deeper about the special relationship between the United States and the U.K." Charles and Queen Camilla will begin their four-day trip on Monday, when they will have tea with the president and first lady Melania Trump, then tour the White House beehive in a nod to the king's focus on conservation. The formal arrival ceremony will take place on Tuesday, with a 21-gun salute, brass bands playing the national anthems of both countries and a contingent of U.S. service members passing in review. The ceremonies will be followed by a meeting between Trump and Charles. Behind the scenes But beneath the pomp and pageantry will be a carefully choreographed diplomatic event staged, like all royal visits, at the request of the British government. Starmer resisted pressure to cancel it after Trump belittled the British military's sacrifices in Afghanistan and criticized him personally for failing to back the U.S. in Iran. Despite those tensions, Trump has continued to speak warmly about Charles. "History has shown that President Trump really tries to be impressive whenever he's dealing with British royalty," Brinkley said. "And I'm sure it'll be the same this time around." Ever since 1939, when King George VI became the first British monarch to set foot on the soil of the country's former colony, there's been a special sort of excitement whenever the royals come to the United States. Take that first visit, which took place as World War II loomed over Europe. The royals toured the east coast and attended a "picnic" at Roosevelt's private home in Hyde Park, New York. "King tries hot dog and asks for more," declared the New York Times. But the big moment was when the royals traveled to Mount Vernon to lay a wreath at the tomb of George Washington, America's first president. It showed respect at a time of isolationism. "People could see the handwriting on the wall and know that it was going to be important for the United States and Britain to stay strong for fighting against Hitler," said Barbara Perry, a presidential scholar at the University of Virginia's Miller Center. But bonding over sausages had broader benefits, helping the royals build links to the general public as well as its leadership. After war broke out in September 1939, Queen Elizabeth, the wife of George VI and mother of the future Elizabeth II, wrote to first lady Eleanor Roosevelt to say how

moved she'd been by letters from Americans who enclosed small sums for British forces. "Sometimes, during the last terrible months, we have felt rather lonely in our fight against evil things, but I can honestly say that our hearts have been lightened by the knowledge that friends in America understand what we are fighting for," she wrote. The queen's connection Queen Elizabeth II built on those relationships, making four state visits to the U.S. during her 70-year reign. She helped President Gerald R. Ford celebrate America's bicentennial in 1976 and met with President George W. Bush in 2007 as British and American forces fought in Iraq and Afghanistan. Smoothing turbulent waters and reminding both sides about their common bonds were what those trips were all about. Charles' visit will be no different. It includes a commemoration of the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, a ceremony honoring fallen service members and an event to be attended by Queen Camilla to mark the 100th anniversary of Winnie the Pooh stories by British author A.A. Milne. Awkward events will be avoided. The royals won't meet with Jeffrey Epstein's victims, despite calls for the king to address his brother's links to the convicted sex offender. Nor are there plans for Charles to meet with his son Prince Harry, who has been a critic of the monarchy since giving up royal duties and moving to California. Those issues aren't the priority, said Robert Hardman, author of "Elizabeth II: In Private. In Public. The Inside Story." "He's going because 250 years ago the Founding Fathers of the USA kicked out his great-times-five grandfather, and he's going to say, 'No hard feelings, it's been a great divorce, we've had a lovely 250 years and let's reflect on the high points,'" Hardman said. "I mean, there are going to be some very, very large elephants in the room during that visit ... but, you know, there are plenty of other things for the king to focus on." History, not politics Charles' speech to a joint session of Congress offers the chance to deliver the message that long-term friendship is more important than transient disputes. He is also likely to offer a bit of humor, as his mother did when she faced lawmakers in 1991. Wearing soft peach amid a sea of gray suits, the diminutive monarch began her remarks with a joke about an earlier blunder at the White House when her lectern was so tall it obscured the audience's view of her. "I do hope you can see me today from where you are," she deadpanned. The chamber erupted in laughter. A standing ovation followed. Then she launched into a speech about democratic values, the rule of law and the Atlantic Alliance. But Charles will have to offer his own take on those ideas, Brinkley said. "The theme of the speech is going to be American exceptionalism, American history, the importance of U.S.-British alliance, and some memories from the past," he said. "But also about the love affair the two countries share with each other, even though it goes over rocky rapids from time to time."

- [Easterlies, frontal system to bring rain, cloudy skies — Pagasa \(2026-04-26 01:40\)](#)

MANILA, Philippines — The easterlies and a frontal system will prevail in the next 24 hours, bringing cloudy skies and scattered rains, the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pagasa) said on Sunday. The easterly winds which pass through the Pacific Ocean will affect Caraga, Eastern Samar, and Southern Leyte where cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms are likely, weather specialist Veronica Torres said. The easterlies will also affect Metro Manila and the rest of the country where partly cloudy

to overcast skies with isolated rain showers or thunderstorms are likely. Meanwhile, Torres said Batanes will have scattered rains and isolated thunderstorms due to the frontal system within the day. “Flash floods or landslides due to moderate to at times heavy rains would be possible,” she said in a 5 a.m. forecast. A frontal system is defined as a “transition-boundary separating two air masses of contrasting properties (temperature and humidity).” “Simply put, fronts form when one kind of air mass enters an area occupied by another kind of air mass,” Pagasa chief Nathaniel Servando explained. Pagasa said Metro Manila would likely have a heat index of 41 degrees Celsius on Sunday, which falls under extreme caution category, while the highest could be in Negros Occidental at 44 degrees Celsius.

At the peak of the crackdown, carloads of masked immigration officers were a common sight in the streets of Minneapolis, while thousands of people were being arrested every week in Texas, Florida and California. “Turn and burn,” top Border Patrol commander Gregory Bovino called the strategy, with relentless displays of force and teams of agents descending on restaurant kitchens, bus stops and Home Depot parking lots. In December, arrests by Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents peaked at nearly 40,000 nationwide and were nearly as high the next month, according to data provided to UC Berkeley's Deportation Data Project and analyzed by The Associated Press. In late January, the killings in Minneapolis of two American citizens by immigration officers and growing concerns over the government's heavy-handed tactics led to a shake-up of top immigration officials. In the weeks that followed, ICE arrests across the country dropped on average by nearly 12%. Polling has found the general public felt the immigration enforcement operation in Minnesota went too far, a factor that may have contributed to the abrupt firing of Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem in early March. The numbers don't follow the same pattern everywhere. Bovino, who swaggered through raid scenes in tactical gear and was the public face of the Trump administration crackdown, was pushed aside following the killings in Minneapolis of Renee Good and Alex Pretti. Border czar Tom Homan was then sent to the Twin Cities to chart a new course for immigration enforcement, and he announced the drawdown of immigration agents in the state on Feb. 4. An AP analysis of ICE arrest records show the department averaged 7,369 weekly arrests nationwide in the five weeks after Homan's drawdown announcement, the most recent period for which data is available, down from 8,347 per week in the previous five weeks. Those arrest numbers were still higher on average than during much of the first year of President Donald Trump's second term, and were dramatically higher than during the Biden administration. The numbers were not, however, uniform across the country. ICE arrests rose significantly in Kentucky, Indiana, North Carolina and Florida during those five weeks, in some cases hitting their highest weekly count since the start of Trump's second term. In Kentucky alone, weekly arrests more than doubled, reaching 86 by early March. Those increases were offset by steep drops in a handful of large states, including Minnesota and Texas. Many arrested were not Trump's 'worst of the worst' The Trump administration insists it is targeting the most vicious criminals living illegally in the U.S., and the

president has referred to them as "the worst of the worst." In some cases the description is accurate, but the reality is complicated. Many of the toughest criminals taken into ICE custody were already in prison, but many others who were arrested have no criminal history. Nationally, some 46% of the people ICE arrested in the five weeks before Feb. 4 had no criminal charges or convictions, dropping to 41% in the five weeks that followed. Yet that's still above the 35% weekly average for the time since Trump returned to office. And in a number of states, even after Feb. 4, the share of noncriminals being arrested went up, not down. Has there been a change in approach? Across the country, thousands of federal court filings offer an imperfect window into how the Trump administration's deportation tactics remain in high gear, even if activity has waned. Like the 21-year-old Honduran man with no criminal record who has filed a petition for release after being arrested Feb. 22 in a suburban San Diego traffic stop. The father of three U.S. citizen children — ages 5, 3 and 10 months — had been under ICE surveillance, the petition says, before officers in tactical gear pulled him over. Or the 33-year-old Venezuelan woman, a well-known South Texas doctor who worked in a region designated as medically underserved, who was arrested earlier this month with her five-year-old daughter, a U.S. citizen, on her way to her husband's asylum hearing. She was arrested, officials said, for overstaying her visa. Aaron Reichlin-Melnick, a senior fellow with the research and advocacy group the American Immigration Council, says he sees signs of change in lower arrest and detention numbers but warns it's too early to know if those shifts are permanent. "The Trump administration says: 'We're not slowing down,' 'Nothing has changed,'" in immigration enforcement, he said. "But it's very clear that they have pulled back from some of the tactics of Operation Metro Surge," the crackdown that swept Minneapolis.

- [An explosive device kills 13 and injures 38 on a bus in southwestern Colombia as violence persists](#) (2026-04-26 01:14)

BOGOTÁ, Colombia — An explosive device killed 13 people traveling on a bus in southwestern Colombia on Saturday, an attack the country's army chief described as a "terrorist act" that also left at least 38 injured as violence linked to drug trafficking in the region escalates. Octavio Guzmán, the governor of the region of Cauca, said on X that the device was set off while the bus was traveling along the Panamerican Highway in the municipality of Cajibío. Five children were among the injured, Cauca Health Secretary Carolina Camargo told Noticias Caracol, a TV news program. Gen. Hugo López, commander of Colombia's Armed Forces, told a news conference that it was a "terrorist act" and blamed the network of a man known as "Iván Mordisco" — one of Colombia's most wanted figures — and the Jaime Martínez faction. Both are dissidents of the now-defunct Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia that operate in the region. Neither Iván Mordisco nor the Jaime Martínez faction abide by the peace agreement signed with the state in 2016. Colombian President Gustavo Petro condemned the attack on X. "Those who carried out the attack and killed seven civilians — and wounded 17 others — in Cajibío — many of them Indigenous people — are terrorists, fascists, and drug traffickers," he wrote. The attack is the latest in a spate of explosions that have attempted to target public infrastructure. At least 26 incidents have taken place in the past two days in southwestern Colombia, which López said has

only affected civilians. They included a shooting at a police station in the rural area of Jamundi, and an attack on a Civil Aviation radar facility in El Tambo, where authorities took down three explosives-laden drones earlier on Saturday. No one was hurt. On Friday, two vehicles rigged with explosives were detonated near military units in Cali and Palmira, causing material damage. The escalation of violence in that region — a territory contested by illegal armed groups linked to drug trafficking — prompted the mobilization of high-ranking officials on Saturday. Led by Defense Minister Pedro Sánchez, the delegation that includes regional governors and local authorities, was meeting in Palmira when the deadly explosion occurred. "These criminals seek to instill fear, but we will respond with firmness," Sánchez said on X. Meanwhile, Francisca Toro, governor of Valle del Cauca, has called upon the national government to provide "immediate support." In a message on X, Toro called for a reinforcement of public security forces, enhanced intelligence operations and "decisive actions" against crime in the face of a "terrorist-level escalation." According to authorities, Cauca and Valle del Cauca serve as a critical hub for illicit activities of illegal armed groups vying for control over sea and river access routes leading to the port of Buenaventura — a key transit point used to traffic drugs to Central America and Europe. The government has also offered a reward of more than 1 million dollars for information leading to the capture of "Marlon," who is identified as the leader of the region's dissident group. On Friday, local authorities offered more than \$14,000 for information leading to the identification and location of those behind the attacks in Cali and Palmira.

Donald Trump's attendance at Saturday's annual White House Correspondents' Association dinner in Washington for his first time as president is putting his administration's often-contentious relationship with the press on full public display. Trump arrived Saturday night to an event where the leaders of a nation at war mingled with celebrities, journalists and even a puppet — Triumph the Insult Comic Dog — in a dinner that typically generates debate about whether the relationship between journalists and their sources should include socializing together and putting aside sometimes adversarial relationships. Trump was being watched closely at the event held by the organization of reporters who cover him and his administration. Past presidents who have attended have generally spoken about the importance of free speech and the First Amendment, adding in some light roasts about individual journalists. The Republican president did not attend during his first term or the first year of his second. He came as a guest in 2011, sitting in the audience as President Barack Obama, a Democrat, made some jokes about the New York real estate developer. Trump also attended as a private citizen in 2015. Trump entered the subterranean banquet hall of the Washington Hilton to the strains of "Hail to the Chief" and greeted prominent journalists on the dais, also pausing to laud White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt with a cheerful pointing of his finger. Past dinners have also featured comedians who poke at presidents. This year, the group opted to hire mentalist Oz Pearlman as the featured entertainment. Trump's appearance is rekindling a longer running

debate about the dinner and events like it — in particular, whether it is poor form for journalists to be seen socializing with the people they cover. The New York Times, for example, stopped attending the dinner more than a decade ago for that reason. "What was once (a fairly long time ago) a well-intended night of fundraising and camaraderie among professional adversaries is now simply a bad look," wrote Kelly McBride, ethics expert at the Poynter Institute, a journalism think tank. A contentious relationship between berating individual reporters, fighting organizations like the Times, The Wall Street Journal and The Associated Press in court and restricting press access to the Pentagon, the administration's animus toward journalists has been a fixture of Trump's second term. On the eve of the dinner, nearly 500 retired journalists signed a petition calling on the association "to forcefully demonstrate opposition to President Trump's efforts to trample freedom of the press." The WHCA president, CBS News reporter Weijia Jiang, said the organization was fighting for all different forms of the press that have a line in to the American people. "I don't think people realize how closely we are working with the White House," she said on CSPAN before the dinner convened. "The relationship is important. It can be complicated. It can be intense. But it is robust." Welcoming guests, Jiang alluded to the contentious relationship in thanking Leavitt "for everything your team does to work with us every day, whether you like it or not." Veteran reporter Manu Raju of CNN, as he entered the Washington Hilton for the dinner, said it was not his role to express his opinion on Trump's relationship with the press. "I'm not an activist," he said. "My job is not to protest." A few dozen protesters stood across the hotel in the runup to the event. One was dressed in a prison uniform, wearing a Pete Hegseth mask and red gloves. Another carried a sign saying "Journalism is dead." Many reporters who attend consider it a valuable opportunity to get story ideas and establish personal connections with those in government, one that may pay dividends with returned telephone calls in the future. Some news organizations invite sources as guests; journalists often invite sources as guests at the dinner. It will be noticed Saturday whether administration officials who have also expressed hostility to the press will attend, and with whom they will be sitting. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent said he was invited by the New York Post; Interior Secretary Doug Burgum and Secretary of State Marco Rubio were NBC guests. The Associated Press invited a former Trump official that it sued last year. Taylor Budowich, a former White House deputy chief of staff who crafted communications policy, was a named defendant last year when the AP sued the administration after it reduced its access to the president because the news outlet did not follow Trump's lead in renaming the Gulf of Mexico. "We maintain professional relationships with people across the political spectrum because we are nonpartisan by design — focused on reporting the facts in the public's interest," AP spokesman Patrick Maks said. The White House correspondents will also hand out awards for exemplary reporting. That includes some stories that displeased Trump, such as one from the Journal about a birthday message Trump once sent to convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein. The story led to a presidential lawsuit.

- [Julie Defensor denies human trafficking rap](#) (2026-04-25 16:14)

THE wife of former lawmaker Mike Defensor denied allegations she was involved in the recent National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) raid on a Pasay City establishment engaged in human trafficking. In a statement late on Friday, Julie Defensor called the accusations against her and her daughter baseless and malicious. “I am issuing this statement to categorically and forcefully deny the baseless, malicious allegations directed at me, my daughter, and our associated businesses,” Mrs. Defensor said. “Let me be absolutely clear regarding the recent NBI operation: we have absolutely no connection to the targeted establishment or its operations. Any attempt to link our family to the abhorrent acts allegedly committed there is a deliberate, dangerous, and desperate lie,” she added. Mrs. Defensor described the motive of the NBI operations as part of a smear campaign, saying that 1,000 employees’ lives are at stake because of a “political attack.” “This is a fabricated pretext designed to artificially manufacture a case, with the chilling goal of filing unwarranted, unbailable charges against me and my daughter,” she said. “This is part of a relentless pattern of harassment, and the collateral damage is devastating. Because of these political attacks, approximately 1,000 hardworking employees across various companies have abruptly lost their jobs — simply due to a perceived association with my husband, Mike. These are 1,000 families stripped of their livelihoods in the middle of a crisis. It is unconscionable that innocent workers are being sacrificed as pawns in someone else’s political vendetta,” Mrs. Defensor added. She also told NBI director Melvin Matibag that if he has any problem with her husband, he should take it up with him. “I address this to attorney Matibag: if you have a political or personal grievance with Mike, have the courage to resolve it with him directly. Stop using me, our daughter, and hundreds of innocent, displaced workers as collateral damage in a dispute that has nothing to do with us,” Mrs. Defensor said. “As a mother, my priority will always be the protection of my family. We will not be bullied, silenced, or intimidated by these cowardly tactics. We will exercise the full extent of the law to clear our names, expose this harassment, and hold those responsible accountable,” she added. In a statement on Friday, the NBI said they rescued 54 women in an “entrapment and rescue operation” against a suspected “trafficking-in-persons network operating” in the Chicago Nightclub and Bleu Hotel in Ortigas, Pasig City, allegedly owned by Mrs. Defensor. Defensor defended his wife and daughter in an interview with radio DZMM and said it had something to do with his involvement in the 18 Marines, who served as bagmen for fellow former lawmaker Zaldy Co. “Don’t touch my family... of course, for me, I know that they have a case against me, but people are also being affected,” he said. The former lawmaker said his family gave up ownership of the hotel in 2019. “We gave up the operations of this hotel in 2019. I think there’s a document saying we still own this place, but technically, the corporation of the hotel operating under my name is no more,” Defensor said in Filipino. “It still exists but the operations ceased in 2019, but some financial documents need to be fixed, so it hasn’t closed,” he added. Defensor said the karaoke bar where the NBI operation took place is not owned by them.

- [ICC prosecutors seek to remove defense redactions](#) (2026-04-25 16:13)

PROSECUTORS at the International Criminal Court (ICC) have asked judges to order the public release of a redacted defense filing in the case against former president Rodrigo Duterte, arguing that confidentiality claims are unjustified and could undermine witness confidence. In a submission dated April 24 before Pre-Trial Chamber I, the Office of the Prosecutor sought the reclassification of a defense response that had been partially withheld from public view. The chamber is composed of Judges Iulia Antoanella Motoc, Reine Adelaide Sophie Alapini-Gansou, and Maria del Socorro Flores Liera. Prosecutors said the redactions conceal a key clarification by Duterte's legal team that six individuals — Salvador Medialdea, Salvador Panelo, Martin Delgra, Silvestre Bello, Alfredo Lim, and Cesar Dulay — are not members of the defense team in the ICC case. According to the filing, the defense had earlier "affirmed, confirmed, assured and guaranteed" that the six lawyers were not part of Duterte's ICC counsel. However, this statement was later removed in the public version of the response. The prosecution argued that the defense's justification — to protect the lawyers' "dignity" — does not outweigh the court's principle of transparency. "It is unclear how confirming to the public that these lawyers do not work for the Defense team would negatively impact their dignity," prosecutors said, adding that court proceedings should generally remain public. The Office of the Prosecutor, led by Deputy Prosecutor Mame Mandiaye Niang, also said keeping the information confidential could create confusion among potential witnesses and victims. Prosecutors said earlier statements and actions by defense counsel had created the impression that the six lawyers were part of Duterte's legal team, prompting a formal request for clarification in March. They warned that leaving the issue unresolved in public records could have a "chilling effect" on ongoing investigations, particularly if witnesses fear that individuals linked to Duterte might have access to sensitive case information. The prosecution added that some of the six lawyers had held senior government positions during Duterte's presidency, a period covered by the ICC investigation into alleged crimes. Efforts to resolve the issue privately failed after the defense declined to seek reclassification, maintaining that the redactions were appropriate to avoid possible embarrassment to the individuals involved. Prosecutors, however, questioned that reasoning and said the defense had not explained its apparent change in position after previously agreeing to make certain information public.

- [Dangerous heat index levels seen in 14 areas](#) (2026-04-25 16:12)

FOURTEEN areas in the country will experience sweltering temperatures due to a danger-level heat index, the weather bureau said Saturday. Heat index is what the temperature feels like to the human body when relative humidity combines with air. A peak heat index of 45 degrees Celsius is forecast in Dumangas, Iloilo and Butuan City, Agusan del Norte, according to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pagasa). The following areas will also see danger-level heat indices: San Ildefonso, Bulacan – 43 C Sangle Point, Cavite – 42 C Aborlan, Palawan – 44 C Roxas City, Capiz – 42 C Mamburao, Capiz – 42 C Iloilo City, Iloilo – 43 C La Granja, La Carlota, Negros Occidental – 44 C Catbalogan, Western Samar – 43 C VSU Baybay, Leyte – 42 C Borongan, Eastern Samar – 44 C Guiuan, Eastern Samar – 42 C Cotabato City, Maguindanao del Norte – 43 C Heat cramps and heat exhaustion are likely under

a danger-level heat index of 42 C to 51 C. Meanwhile, the heat index may reach 41 C in Aparri, Cagayan; San Jose, Occidental Mindoro; Puerto Princesa City and Cuyo in Palawan; Legazpi City, Albay; Catarman, Northern Samar; Tacloban City, Leyte; Dipolog, Zamboanga del Norte; Zamboanga City, Zamboanga del Sur; and Davao City, Davao del Sur. A heat index of 40 C is forecast over Dagupan City, Pangasinan; Tuguegarao City, Cagayan; ISU Echague, Isabela; Baler and Casiguran in Aurora; CLSU Muñoz, Nueva Ecija; TAU Camiling, Tarlac; Ambulong, Tanauan, Batangas; Romblon, Romblon; Daet, Camarines Norte; Siquijor, Siquijor; Mactan, Cebu; Maasin, Southern Leyte; Surigao City, Surigao del Norte; and Hinatuan, Surigao del Sur. Meanwhile, cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms are expected over Batanes due to the frontal system. The rest of the country will experience partly cloudy to cloudy skies with isolated rain showers or thunderstorms due to the easterlies and localized thunderstorms. Light to moderate winds and slight to moderate seas will prevail across the archipelago. The Department of Health (DOH) warned the public against heat-related illnesses as the heat index across the country continues to rise. With many areas experiencing heat index levels exceeding 40 degrees Celsius, DOH spokesman Albert Domingo told The Manila Times on Saturday that it is important for the public to avoid outdoor activities between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. and to stay hydrated. “The DOH warns against heat-related illnesses ranging from heat cramps and heat exhaustion to life-threatening heat stroke. Heat stroke is a medical emergency occurring when body temperatures exceed 40 C, potentially leading to seizures, coma, or altered mental status,” Domingo said. He added that while everyone can be affected, individuals with comorbidities like hypertension or diabetes are more susceptible to heat-related illnesses. “Prevention centers on staying hydrated with 8-10 glasses of water daily (for those not undergoing dialysis) while avoiding dehydrating drinks like coffee, soda, or alcohol,” Domingo added. The agency also said that certain medications and alcohol may increase the risk of heat-related illnesses by accelerating dehydration. “When outdoors, shield yourself from direct sunlight by wearing light, breathable clothing and using umbrellas, caps, or fans,” Domingo said. The weather bureau raised an El Niño alert on Tuesday, which may bring “drier-than-usual” conditions, further exacerbating the heat levels.

- [Panel found probable cause to impeach Sara, lawyer says](#) (2026-04-25 16:11)

LAWYER Lorna Kapunan said she believes that the House of Representatives Committee on Justice has seen and heard enough — from the discrepancies in Vice President Sara Duterte’s declared net worth to the flagged bank transactions — to find probable cause to impeach her. “The House Committee on Justice has already met its target to prove probable cause, that a crime was committed, that a violation of law was committed, and that the vice president is probably guilty thereof. But it’s not guilt beyond reasonable doubt,” she said in Filipino and English in a radio interview on Friday. The veteran litigator also warned the public not to be swayed by the vice president’s press releases, her defense team, or online trolls seeking to discredit the nondisclosure findings in Duterte’s statements of assets, liabilities and net worth (SALNs) and the Anti-Money Laundering Council’s (AMLC) report. “No spin can change what is already on official record,” she said. “With all the evidence, follow the numbers. Don’t

believe the press releases, trolls, and statements outside the Committee on Justice. Believe in the numbers. Let the numbers speak for themselves,” she said. Kapunan noted that the evidence shown are official records of government agencies: the Office of the Ombudsman for the SALNs; the AMLC reporting on suspicious and covered transactions; and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) for the companies of the Vice president and her husband, Manases Carpio. The records, she said, raise legitimate questions that cannot be ignored. “So, these are records, they don’t lie. When speaking of litigation, there is already the presence of hard evidence, documentary from official sources. This is not opinion, this is not hearsay. These are documents,” Kapunan said. During the April 22 hearing, committee members uncovered a more than elevenfold jump in Duterte’s net worth, from P7.2 million in 2007 to P88.4 million in 2024. Despite the dramatic surge, it also found that she had failed to report her cash on hand and bank deposits under personal assets in her SALNs from 2019 to 2024. Meanwhile, the AMLC reported to the justice panel that more than 600 transactions worth P6.7 billion from Duterte and her husband’s bank accounts had been flagged as covered or suspicious from 2006 to 2025. The AMLC also confirmed that 19 of the bank transaction entries presented by former senator Antonio Trillanes IV matched its own records on the same dates and amounts, including the P22 million Duterte had allegedly received from Samuel Uy, a purported drug lord and close business associate of the Duterte family. Kapunan, meanwhile, noted that the Committee on Justice has given the Vice President ample opportunity to address the allegations and defend herself, but instead, the defense team filed a non-answer and Duterte continues to shun the hearings. She emphasized that Duterte cannot hide behind jurisdictional arguments to avoid attending the hearings, pointing out that the Constitution itself grants the House the authority to initiate impeachment proceedings. Moreover, she noted, the hearings are clarificatory rather than evidentiary, meaning the Committee on Justice is simply examining the facts cited in the impeachment complaints and giving the respondent the opportunity to be heard before ruling on probable cause. Duterte’s defense team also cannot claim to be “surprised” at the evidence and testimonies being examined, she said, given that “all hearings are being televised and subpoenas publicly issued.” The Committee on Justice is set to hold its final hearing on April 29, where the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) will present its findings on the alleged death threats Duterte made against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., first lady Liza Araneta-Marcos, and former House speaker Martin Romualdez. The panel will then vote on whether probable cause exists for each allegation in the impeachment complaints. Due process. Meanwhile, Sen. Robinhood Padilla emphasized that any impeachment proceedings against Duterte must strictly adhere to due process, warning against attempts to expedite or bypass constitutional procedures. Interviewed on a TV news program, Padilla, a Duterte ally, said the process should not skip mandated steps, particularly the requirement for deliberation in the House of Representatives before advancing to the Senate for trial. “The process cannot be skipped. It must go through due process. The Supreme Court of the Philippines has repeatedly underscored its importance,” Padilla said. “If we skip it, we risk wasting the people’s time and money.” Padilla also raised broader concerns about the relevance of impeachment proceedings amid pressing national issues, suggesting that economic concerns, such as wages, should take precedence. “Is impeachment really the solution to the country’s

problems?” he asked. “Why don’ t we talk about people’ s wages, like the minimum wage? That is the real problem of the people.”

- [Bonoan denies alleged box deliveries](#) (2026-04-25 16:10)

FORMER Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) secretary Manuel Bonoan denied the alleged delivery of 55 boxes allegedly meant for him. In a statement on Friday, Bonoan said Garcia “made uncorroborated statements against me regarding the alleged deliveries.” Bonoan described the testimony as false. “I categorically and vehemently deny and have no knowledge whatsoever regarding these vague and unfounded allegations. In the first place, let it be of record that I am not involved in any manner as regards the subject case of the former senator Revilla Jr.,” Bonoan said. Bonoan said “in the absence of specific details surrounding his accusations or corroborating evidence to support his allegations, Garcia’ s statements are mere hearsay.” On Thursday, Vergel Niño Garcia testified before the Sandiganbayan Third Division that he was a former driver of state witness and former DPWH undersecretary Roberto Bernardo. Garcia testified that there was a delivery of the following to Bonoan: 15 sealed boxes allegedly taken by a then-driver of Bonoan in November 2024; 20 boxes in 2025; and 20 boxes allegedly taken by the said then-driver of Bonoan in Quezon City. Garcia, who also testified on the alleged delivery of boxes allegedly meant for several other people, was testifying before the court as a prosecution witness in the bail hearing in the malversation through falsification case filed against former senator Bong Revilla and other people. The Office of the Ombudsman filed the case before the Sandiganbayan in January 2026 in connection with the alleged ghost project in Pandi, Bulacan. Bonoan is not an accused. Garcia, who did not see the contents of the alleged boxes, testified that he learned about the alleged contents only during an investigation of the flood control mess. On Thursday afternoon, the prosecution presented Francisco Dela Fuente Jr. as witness. “Our reaction? Is it believable? To us, no,” Reody Anthony Balisi, Revilla’ s lawyer, said in Filipino and English in an interview on Thursday. “If you will notice and if you listened carefully, they did not attach proof in their sworn statements,” Balisi said. Revilla’ s camp has said that Revilla had no hand in the project in Pandi, whether it was a ghost project or not. Balisi said in the interview on Thursday that for the defense, the two testimonies were not relevant. “If you will notice, in all that they (witnesses) said, and this was not denied by the prosecution, NCR projects were what was being discussed..... That was clear. So we just wanted to point out, why are we still talking about this here?” he said. Balisi said that the defense’ s position has always been that “there is no evidence linking him (Revilla) to this project.” The other accused were Brice Hernandez, Juanito Mendoza, Arjay Domasig, Emelita Juat, Christina Mae Pineda, and Jaypee Mendoza. The accused, except Jaypee Mendoza, seek bail. Revilla refused to enter a plea during his arraignment in February but the Sandiganbayan Third Division entered a not guilty plea for him. Juanito Mendoza, Hernandez, Jaypee Mendoza, Domasig, Juat, and Pineda pleaded not guilty to the charge.

- [Taxi drivers get P10M fuel subsidy](#) (2026-04-25 16:09)

THE Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) announced the release of P10 million in fuel subsidies to taxi drivers on the first day of a two-day payout. In a statement, LTFRB Chairman Vigor Mendoza II said approximately 2,000 taxi drivers received P5,000 each after claiming their subsidy at designated distribution points, including the central offices of the LTFRB and the Land Transportation Office (LTO). The subsidy forms part of the national government's broader assistance program for the public transport sector, with nearly P98 million initially allocated for taxi drivers nationwide. With the additional P10 million disbursed on Friday, total funds released for the sector have exceeded P108 million so far, the agency said. Mendoza, however, cautioned drivers against attempting to claim the subsidy more than once after 10 individuals were flagged for alleged double claims during the first day of distribution. "We are sending this warning that once any taxi driver is caught, we will request the LTO to revoke his driver's license," Mendoza said. Despite the incident, the LTFRB maintained that the overall distribution process remained orderly and efficient. The LTFRB said it has intensified monitoring measures to allow for real-time intervention in case of issues during the payout. Mendoza also assured that the agency would continue the distribution process until all intended beneficiaries have received their assistance, in line with the directive of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. The fuel subsidy program aims to cushion the impact of rising fuel costs on public utility drivers and operators resulting from the war in the Middle East.

- [PLHIV at higher risk of tuberculosis](#) (2026-04-25 16:08)

THE Department of Health (DOH) warned that people living with human immunodeficiency virus (PLHIV) are more susceptible to developing tuberculosis (TB) due to a weakened immune system. "HIV is a disease that attacks the immune system, particularly the CD4 T-cells," the agency said in a Facebook post on Friday. CD4 T-cells are a type of white blood cell that serve as the immune system's managers, helping defend against bacteria. The DOH said that when the CD4 T-cells run out, the body's defense against various diseases is weakened. "This is where opportunistic infections such as tuberculosis enter. Many of us may have TB bacteria sleeping inside the body because it is usually controlled by a strong immune system. But because HIV weakens the immune system, TB wakes up and becomes an active disease," it added. The agency noted that this could lead to chronic diseases such as blood clotting, body collapse and possible death. The DOH urged PLHIV to avail themselves of medications against TB, as well as the importance of promoting safe sex through the use of condoms, lubricants and pre-exposure prophylaxis, which is said to be 99-percent effective against HIV. "For persons living with HIV, the key is to take an antiretroviral therapy, or ART, for HIV, along with TPT (tuberculosis preventive treatment) for TB; it is effective in stopping the spread of the same disease and can reduce the risk of other complications," it said. DOH spokesman Albert Domingo said in an interview that while taking TB medication can be challenging, the treatment can be completed in only four to nine months. "Let's not be afraid of the next pandemic. The next variant of Covid is not scary; TB is scary. It does not have to choose the rich or the poor; everyone can have TB because it is airborne," Domingo said.

- [Senate panel pushes stricter standards, national framework for local colleges](#) (2026-04-25 16:07)

MANILA, Philippines — The Senate Committee on Higher and Technical-Vocational Education has called for sweeping reforms to strengthen oversight and improve the quality of local universities and colleges (LUCs), amid concerns over uneven standards and rapid sector growth. Chaired by Senator Loren Legarda, the hearing, held on Wednesday, April 23, highlighted long-standing governance gaps affecting LUCs, which are established and funded by local government units (LGUs). Lawmakers and education officials emphasized the need for a unified national framework to ensure accountability and quality across institutions. Data presented by the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM 2) showed that LUCs are now the fastest-growing segment of the higher education system. Enrollment in baccalaureate programs rose by 44 percent—from around 343,000 in 2021 to approximately 493,000 in 2023—reflecting increasing reliance on locally run institutions for tertiary education access. Despite this growth, oversight remains inconsistent. Of the 152 LUCs listed by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), only 107 have been granted Institutional Recognition for Academic Year 2024–2025, raising concerns about compliance with minimum standards. EDCOM 2 Commissioner Sherwin Gatchalian warned that a significant portion of LUCs may be operating below required quality benchmarks. “About 34 percent of LUCs do not have institutional recognition. That means there are issues with quality and compliance with CHED requirements, and in effect, these institutions cannot access free higher education,” Gatchalian said. Structural challenges persist. Beyond regulatory gaps, officials pointed to systemic constraints affecting LUC performance, particularly disparities in faculty compensation. According to EDCOM 2 Executive Director Karol Mark Yee, salaries in LUCs are tied to the income classification of their respective LGUs, limiting the ability of poorer areas to attract qualified educators. “In some cases, instructors in LUCs receive only about 65 percent of the salary of their counterparts in state universities and colleges,” Yee said, describing a cycle where limited resources hinder faculty recruitment and, ultimately, education quality. The commission also underscored the lack of a clear legal framework governing LUCs. While their establishment is generally anchored on the Local Government Code of 1991 and Batas Pambansa Blg. 232, these policies are seen as outdated and insufficient to address current challenges. Compliance with CHED standards has historically been weak, Yee noted, with many LUCs only seeking recognition after the enactment of the Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act, which tied government subsidies to quality assurance. Push for nationwide standards. CHED Chairperson Shirley Agrupis backed proposals to introduce stricter, standards-based pathways for LUC development, emphasizing that public support should be contingent on demonstrated capacity and compliance. Legarda said the proposed measure would establish mandatory national guidelines covering the creation, operation, and quality assurance of LUCs, including minimum requirements that LGUs must meet before setting up institutions. “We need to ensure that from the outset, LUCs meet quality standards. Over a third of publicly funded institutions operate without meeting minimum requirements, and that is a problem we must address,” she said.

- [OFWs warned against fraudulent contracts](#) (2026-04-25 16:06)

THE Philippine Embassy in Cairo issued an advisory to overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) to validate employment contracts before accepting jobs abroad. “Ensuring your contract is properly reviewed and authenticated protects your rights and welfare as a worker,” the advisory read. It said that employment contracts must be thoroughly reviewed and officially authenticated to ensure legitimacy and compliance with both Philippine and host country laws. This process, the embassy stressed, verifies essential details such as salary, job responsibilities, working hours and benefits, and confirms that these terms are recognized by authorities in both countries. It added that authentication helps prevent illegal recruitment, contract substitution and unsafe working conditions — common risks faced by migrant workers. Such a measure also plays a vital role in combating human trafficking and labor exploitation. The Philippine Embassy has established several critical guidelines for Filipinos seeking employment in Egypt to ensure their protection and legal standing. Primarily, individuals are advised never to sign or accept any contract that is unclear or not fully understood. It is essential to verify the legitimacy of all recruiters and to report any suspicious job offers immediately to the proper authorities. Once in the country, workers must remain vigilant against contract substitution or unauthorized changes to their terms of employment. Furthermore, employees should not agree to any transfers involving their employer, job position or workplace without obtaining proper authorization and a newly authenticated contract. Finally, it is vital to ensure that the actual job role and workplace address consistently align with the specific terms outlined in the original employment agreement. The advisory aligns with the efforts of the Department of Migrant Workers to strengthen protections for OFWs through stricter documentation and monitoring requirements. For verification or assistance, OFWs may contact the Philippine Embassy or Consulate in Egypt through official communication channels.

- [Go calls for stronger fire preparedness](#) (2026-04-25 16:04)

SEN. Bong Go on Thursday underscored the importance of fire preparedness and accessible emergency support systems as he visited families affected by a recent blaze in Barangay Bagong Ilog, Pasig City. He inspected the fire-hit area and met with displaced residents alongside Vice Mayor Richard Vincent Jude “Dodot” Jaworski and local officials, including councilors and barangay leaders. The visit aimed to assess damage, deliver assistance and ensure that the immediate needs of affected families were being addressed. Immediate response A total of 152 families displaced by the fire received relief packages during the distribution held at Bagong Ilog Elementary School Pavilion. Assistance included food packs, water, clothing, vitamins, recreational items and financial aid intended to help families begin recovery. Go encouraged victims to remain resilient, emphasizing community solidarity. “Don’t thank me. I should be the one to thank you because you allowed me to help,” he said, urging Filipinos to support one another during crises. Push for fire preparedness The senator reiterated calls for stricter adherence to fire safety measures, particularly those issued by the Bureau of Fire Protection. He warned against illegal electrical connections and unsafe cooking practices, which are among the leading causes of residential fires in densely populated communities. Go is the principal author

and co-sponsor of Republic Act (RA) 11589, a law mandating a 10-year modernization program for the fire service. The measure includes provisions for upgraded equipment, expanded manpower, enhanced training and intensified fire prevention campaigns in coordination with local government units. Long-term solutions Highlighting the need for sustainable disaster-response infrastructure, Go pushed for the construction of permanent evacuation centers. He cited RA 12076, which requires every city and municipality to establish disaster-resilient evacuation facilities. According to the senator, such centers are essential to ensure that displaced families — especially children — have access to safe, clean and comfortable temporary shelter, reducing the risk of illness while awaiting resettlement. “Preparedness means investing in permanent, well-equipped facilities rather than relying on improvised shelters,” Go said, recalling discussions with local officials on prioritizing such infrastructure. Go also linked disaster preparedness to health care access, highlighting the role of Malasakit Centers in assisting victims with medical expenses. He authored and sponsored RA 11463, which institutionalized these one-stop service centers nationwide. Operated in coordination with the Department of Health, Malasakit Centers help indigent patients reduce hospital bills and access government assistance. As of the latest data, 167 centers are operational nationwide, including one at Rizal Medical Center in Pasig. Amid broader national and global challenges, Go called for unity and vigilance, urging Filipinos to remain focused on public welfare and the fight against corruption. “The whole world is in turmoil... When the world is in turmoil, our people are affected,” he said. “Let’s not forget to fight for our countrymen.”

THE St. Luke’s Medical Center (SLMC) has partnered with Germany-based International Centers for Precision Oncology (ICPO) Foundation to launch a global pilot program on theranostics, positioning the Philippines as a potential model for future precision oncology initiatives worldwide. In a statement on Friday, SLMC highlighted the crucial role that theranostics, or targeted therapeutics and diagnostics for cancer treatment, will play in advancing cancer care for its patients. “Theranostics exemplifies the promise of personalized medicine by integrating molecular imaging with targeted therapy. It allows us not only to see disease with remarkable clarity but also to deliver treatment with precision and purpose,” said Dr. Anthony Perez, St. Luke’s-Global City SVP and medical director. SLMC is the first and only ICPO Clinical Theranostics Center of Excellence in the Philippines, which was granted on May 15, 2025. In its recent hosting of the “Theranostics Day: Awareness and Exchange about New Precision Cancer Care,” the SLMC highlighted how theranostics is reshaping modern medicine, which is moving beyond the typical “one-size-fits-all” approach. “It is a true precision medicine approach where treatment is tailored specifically to the patient,” said Dr. Eduardo Erasto Ongkeko, head of the St. Luke’s-Global City Department of Nuclear Medicine and Theranostics. Meanwhile, Akbayan Party-list Rep. Chel Diokno hopes for accessible precision treatment for Filipino patients. “What is most important to me regarding this event is the equality in terms of access to affordable health care,” said Diokno.

- [Wife being forced out of residence by a cheating husband](#) (2026-04-25 16:01)

Dear PAO,I am in a difficult situation and I need legal advice. I recently discovered that my husband has a mistress. He is trying to force me out of our condominium unit. My question is simple: What should I do? Should I just leave and let him live there with his mistress? Or can I require them to leave because I am the legal wife? The problem is that the condo is registered solely in his name. He never transferred the title to include my name.I need to know my rights. I feel like I should not be the one to leave, but I am not sure whether I have the power to evict them. Please give me a clear answer. Can I go back to the condo and stay there? If I do that, can he call the police against me?Mitsuha YamanoDear Ms. Yamano,Republic Act (RA) 9262, or the Anti-Violence Against Women and Their Children Act of 2004, provides remedies for women victims of domestic violence, the purpose of which “prevents further acts of violence against the victim, safeguards them from harm, minimizes disruptions in their life and helps regain control over their life.” (Ruiz vs. AAA GR 231619, 15 Nov. 2021; Ponente: Senior Associate Justice Marvic M.V.F. Leonen) Section 8 of RA 9262 provides that a woman may apply for a protection order, which not only covers prevention of a respondent from threatening to commit or committing, personally or through another, acts of violence, but also to direct the respondent to do or desist from doing certain acts: “SECTION 8. Protection Orders. — A protection order is an order issued under this Act for the purpose of preventing further acts of violence against a woman or her child specified in Section 5 of this Act and granting other necessary relief. The relief granted under a protection order should serve the purpose of safeguarding the victim from further harm, minimizing any disruption in the victim’ s daily life, and facilitating the opportunity and ability of the victim to independently regain control over her life. The provisions of the protection order shall be enforced by law enforcement agencies. The protection orders that may be issued under this Act are the barangay protection order, temporary protection order and permanent protection order. The protection orders that may be issued under this Act shall include any, some or all of the following reliefs: xxx “d. Directing the respondent to stay away from petitioner and designated family or household member at a distance specified by the court, and to stay away from the residence, school, place of employment, or any specified place frequented by the petitioner and any designated family or household member; xxx” In your case, the infidelity of your partner, not to mention the threat to unhouse you from your home may be considered a form of domestic violence, which is covered by the law’ s definition of psychological violence, if done with intent to cause mental or emotional anguish, public ridicule or humiliation to you, as his wife. (XXX264870 vs. People, GR 264870, 21 April 2025; Ponente: Senior Associate Justice Marvic M.V.F. Leonen).This means that you are not helpless. The law gives you a specific remedy: a protection order. Once you apply for one — either through the barangay or the PNP Women’ s and Children’ s Desk — the court or barangay can direct your husband to stay away from the condo and allow you to stay there, even if the title is in his name alone. You do not need to wait until you are on the street; the protection order is designed to prevent further harm and disruption to your life.You may go to the barangay hall or the nearest police station. Tell them you are a legal wife being unlawfully ejected from the conjugal dwelling, which causes psychological abuse or violence to

- [Hold departure order against Escudero sought](#) (2026-04-25 16:00)

THE Office of the Ombudsman is seeking a precautionary hold departure order (PHDO) from the Sandiganbayan against Sen. Francis Escudero and his alleged bagman, Maynard Ngu. The Ombudsman's application was raffled off to the anti-graft court's Sixth Division. While it was not clear yet what exactly the application stemmed from, Ombudsman Jesus Crispin Remulla said in a press conference earlier this month that they have been “seriously preparing a case of plunder against” Escudero, who is a former Senate president, and Leyte 1st District Rep. and former speaker Martin Romualdez. What was being prepared at that time was in connection with the budget process. Remulla said the “element of conspiracy” was “involved in the preparation of the complaint.” Last year, former Public Works undersecretary Roberto Bernardo had alleged that Ngu was Escudero's bagman. The senator denied the allegations.

- [Court orders freeze on Romualdez assets](#) (2026-04-25 16:00)

(UPDATE) THE Court of Appeals has ordered a 20-day freeze on a P1.665-billion Forbes Park estate and dozens of bank accounts connected to former House speaker Martin Romualdez and businessman Jose Raulito Enoy Paras, as authorities pursue a widening investigation into alleged corruption involving public infrastructure funds. In a resolution dated April 22, the appellate court said there was sufficient basis to believe the assets may be linked to unlawful activity, including potential violations of Republic Act 9160, or the Anti-Money Laundering Act. The freeze order prevents any movement, transfer, or withdrawal of the identified properties and funds while proceedings continue. The order covers a 3,196-square-meter residential property on Tamarind Road in South Forbes Park, Makati, which was purchased in 2023 by Golden Pheasant Holdings Corp., a company wholly owned by Paras. The estate was previously owned by shipping executive Doris Magsaysay-Ho. Also included are 35 bank accounts reportedly associated with Romualdez, some jointly held with family members, as well as 38 accounts linked to Paras. The businessman is also connected to corporate holdings that include cash deposits and seven condominium units in Bonifacio Global City. The Court of Appeals directed that a summary hearing be conducted within 20 days to determine whether the freeze order should be extended or lifted. The petition originated from the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC) following a complaint filed by the Office of the Ombudsman. The complaint alleges plunder, graft, and bribery tied to a supposed P56-billion kickback scheme involving flood control projects. The freeze application cited testimonies from Senate Blue Ribbon

Committee hearings, where witnesses claimed that cash-filled suitcases were delivered to residences allegedly linked to Romualdez and former lawmaker Zaldy Co, who has been in hiding in several European countries. Other statements pointed to alleged intermediaries who facilitated the movement of funds connected to public works contracts. In a press briefing on April 21, Ombudsman Jesus Crispin Remulla said the Office of the Ombudsman endorsed a complaint to the AMLC and that his office was waiting for the council to seek a freeze order on Romualdez. On April 22, 2026, the Sandiganbayan Seventh Division issued a precautionary hold departure order (HDO) against Romualdez. The application was anchored on the complaint-affidavit filed by the Ombudsman's Special Panel of Investigators before the Office of the Ombudsman's Preliminary Investigation, Administrative Adjudication and Monitoring Office against Romualdez and others for plunder. The Office of the Ombudsman said the complaints involved "the alleged kickback scheme tied to flood control projects, purportedly masterminded by the respondent, with the total amount of such kickbacks reaching" P56 billion. Mentioned in the application were Co's statements in video recordings as well as Orly Guteza's testimony. Romualdez has denied any wrongdoing. "I have never authorized, instructed, or allowed anyone to engage in any conduct that would betray the people or taint my name," he said. He has reiterated that he never received any alleged kickback in any infrastructure project. In a video message issued on April 21, Romualdez said that he would defend himself fully and not let himself be turned into the scapegoat in connection with the flood control mess. "And to those who think they can throw me under the bus to save themselves, this is what I have to say to you: I am ready to defend my name," he said.

- [Tourist bus fire forces Ortigas flyover closure](#) (2026-04-25 13:24)

THE EDSA-Ortigas Flyover southbound lane was temporarily closed to vehicles on Saturday, April 25, after a tourist bus caught fire in the area the night before. The Metropolitan Manila Development Authority said the closure remained in effect as of 10 a.m., advising motorists to take alternate routes while authorities continued post-incident clearing and safety measures. The fire was first reported at around 6:10 p.m. on Friday, April 24, along the EDSA-Ortigas southbound lane, occupying two lanes and causing heavy traffic in the area. In an interview, Senior Fire Officer 4 Alvic Alabastro of the Mandaluyong Bureau of Fire Protection said the driver was alone when the incident happened. "Upon interview with the driver, he was alone. When he was going up the flyover, he suddenly felt that something seemed wrong with the movement of his bus, like something slammed the brakes, then the tire suddenly caught fire and burst. The tire exploded," Alabastro said. "We are investigating the possible cause of the

bus explosion. But according to the driver, allegedly, it suddenly seemed like something stopped the movement of his bus,” he added. The Department of Transportation earlier said MRT 3 operations resumed at 6:50 p.m. on Friday after slight delays caused by the fire, with trains running at reduced speeds between Ortigas and Santolan stations due to smoke from the burning bus. On Saturday, the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) announced that the southbound lane of the flyover was opened to motorists following a thorough inspection and assessment. “Based on the assessment conducted by PDD (Planning and Design Department) Structural Engineer and District Representatives, the southbound lane of the Ortigas flyover has been cleared and is now passable to traffic,” it added. President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. has ordered the agency to conduct a safety check to ensure the lane is safe after the Friday fire incident. Meanwhile, the DPWH-NCR said the EDSA–Ortigas Interchange will undergo a more detailed inspection on Saturday to determine the extent of the damage and assess its structural integrity. “For the Ortigas Flyover Interchange, it is recommended to restrict access to light vehicles only,” it said. “Further testing is also advised to support a more detailed structural analysis, as exposed rebars and areas of spalling were observed in sections affected by the fire incident.”

- [DMW: 36 OFWs return home from Middle East, over 5K since March](#) (2026-04-25 10:16)

MANILA, Philippines — Amid the ongoing war in the Middle East, the Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) on Saturday said that 36 overseas Filipino workers and two dependents arrived in two separate flights from Dubai, United Arab Emirates. The Filipinos were assisted by representatives of the DMW and the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA) and were given financial assistance, transport services and temporary accommodation. According to the DMW, from March 5 until April 25, 7,674 OFWs have returned home since the start of the Middle East war. Among them were 7,051 Filipinos, with 5,669 OFWs included, 1,382 dependents, who elected to return via government-chartered flights. “The government continues to strengthen its repatriation and reintegration programs in line with the directive of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., to ensure the safety of OFWs and to support their smooth return and fresh start in the country,” the DMW said in Filipino.

- [UP identifies second student killed in Negros clash](#) (2026-04-25 10:08)

MANILA, Philippines — The University of the Philippines Open University (UPOU) on Saturday identified another student killed in a military encounter in Negros Occidental last week. Maureen Keil Santuyo was killed alongside UP Diliman political science major Alyssa Alano at Barangay Salamanca, Toboso, last April 19. Santuyo is an Associate of Arts student of UPOU and described as “a compassionate youth advocate who has committed to supporting and working with marginalized agrarian communities.” “The University also expresses concerns over circumstances surrounding the military encounter. We call for a transparent and thorough investigation, with full accountability if human rights violations are established,” UPOU said. “We urge sobriety in public discourse, especially in instances that promote the spread of unverified accusations and the labeling of members of the academic community without

evidence,” it added.

- [Probable cause exists to impeach Sara, says veteran lawyer](#) (2026-04-25 09:16)

MANILA, Philippines — Lawyer Lorna Kapunan said she believed that the House of Representatives Committee on Justice has seen and heard enough – from the discrepancies in Vice President Sara Duterte's declared net worth to the flagged bank transactions – to find probable cause to impeach her. “Na-meet na ng House Committee on Justice ‘yung target nila na (The House Committee on Justice has already met its target) to prove probable cause, that a crime was committed, that a violation of law was committed, and that the Vice President is probably guilty thereof. Hindi naman (But it's not) guilt beyond reasonable doubt,” she said in a radio interview on Friday. The veteran litigator also warned the public not to be swayed by the vice president's press releases, her defense team, or online trolls seeking to discredit the non-disclosure findings in Duterte's Statements of Assets, Liabilities and Net Worth (SALNs) and the Anti-Money Laundering Council's (AMLC) report. “No spin can change what is already on official record,” she said. “Siguro naman sa dami ng ebidensya, follow the numbers. Huwag tayong maniwala sa mga press release, sa mga trolls, sa mga statements outside the Committee on Justice. Maniwala tayo sa numbers (With all the evidence, follow the numbers. Don't believe the press releases, trolls, and statements outside the Committee on Justice. Believe in the numbers). Let the numbers speak for themselves.” Kapunan noted that the evidence shown were official records of government agencies: the Office of the Ombudsman for the SALNs; the AMLC reporting on suspicious and covered transactions; and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) for the companies of the Vice President and her husband, Manases Carpio. The records, she said, speak for themselves and raise legitimate questions that cannot be ignored. “So, these are records, they don't lie. Kung litigation ang pinag-uusapan natin, nandyan na ang (When speaking of litigation, there is already the presence of) hard evidence, documentary from official sources. This is not opinion, this is not hearsay. These are documents,” Kapunan said. During the April 22 hearing, committee members uncovered a more than elevenfold jump in Duterte's net worth, from PHP7.2 million in 2007 to PHP88.4 million in 2024. Despite the dramatic surge, it also found that she had failed to report her cash on hand and bank deposits under personal assets in her SALNs from 2019 to 2024. Meanwhile, the AMLC reported to the justice panel that more than 600 transactions worth PHP6.7 billion from Duterte and her husband's bank accounts had been flagged as covered or suspicious from 2006 to 2025. The AMLC also confirmed that 19 of the bank transaction entries presented by former Senator Antonio “Sonny” Trillanes IV matched its own records on the same dates and amounts, including the PHP22 million Duterte had allegedly received from Samuel “Sammy” Uy, a purported drug lord and close business associate of the Duterte family. Kapunan, meanwhile, noted that the Committee on Justice has given the Vice President ample opportunity to address the allegations and defend herself, but instead, the defense team filed a non-answer and Duterte continues to shun the hearings. She emphasized that Duterte cannot hide behind jurisdictional arguments to avoid attending the hearings, pointing out that the Constitution itself grants the House the authority to initiate impeachment proceedings. Moreover, she noted, the

hearings are clarificatory rather than evidentiary, meaning the Committee on Justice is simply examining the facts cited in the impeachment complaints and giving the respondent the opportunity to be heard before ruling on probable cause. Duterte's defense team also cannot claim to be “surprised” at the evidence and testimonies being examined, she said, given that “all hearings are being televised and subpoenas publicly issued.” The Committee on Justice is set to hold its final hearing on April 29, where the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) will present its findings on the alleged death threats Duterte made against President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., First Lady Liza Araneta-Marcos, and former House Speaker Ferdinand Martin Romualdez. The panel will then vote on whether probable cause exists for each allegation in the impeachment complaints.

- [Pasay roads closed for Quaker Fit Run 2026](#) (2026-04-25 06:56)

MANILA, Philippines — Several roads in Pasay and parts of Makati will be closed early Sunday for a marathon event. The Pasay Traffic and Parking Management Office said the closures would be implemented from 1:30 a.m. to 7 a.m. on Sunday morning for the Quaker Fit Run 2026. The affected areas are some roads around the Makati Triangle, Buendia from Makati to Roxas Boulevard in Pasay City, and the southbound lane of Roxas Boulevard from Quirino Avenue to Pasay City. Authorities said the Buendia closure would cover the inner lane, with a zipper lane to be used during the event. Motorists were advised to plan their trips ahead and use alternate routes to avoid delays during the road closure period.

- [DOH warns against cramps, exhaustion, stroke as heat index rises](#) (2026-04-25 06:53)

MANILA, Philippines—The Department of Health (DOH) warned the public against heat-related illnesses as the heat index across the country continues to rise. With many areas experiencing heat index levels exceeding 40 degrees Celsius, DOH Spokesman Albert Domingo told The Manila Times on Saturday that it was important for the public to avoid outdoor activities between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. and to stay hydrated. “The DOH warns against heat-related illnesses ranging from heat cramps and heat exhaustion to life-threatening heat stroke. Heat stroke is a medical emergency occurring when body temperatures exceed 40°C, potentially leading to seizures, coma, or altered mental status,” Domingo said. He added that while everyone can be affected, individuals with comorbidities like hypertension or diabetes are more susceptible to heat-related illnesses. “Prevention centers on staying hydrated with 8-10 glasses of water daily (for those not undergoing dialysis) while avoiding dehydrating drinks like coffee, soda, or alcohol,” Domingo added.

(UPDATE) MANILA, Philippines — The Court of Appeals has ordered a 20-day freeze on a luxury property at a posh subdivision in Makati City and dozens of bank accounts linked to former speaker Martin Romualdez and a businessman in connection with an expanding probe into alleged corruption tied to public infrastructure spending. In an order dated April 22, the appellate court said there was probable cause to believe the assets were related to unlawful activities, including possible violations of the Republic Act 9160. The freeze prohibits any withdrawal, transfer, or movement of the identified funds and properties while the case undergoes further review. Central to the order is a 3,196-square-meter estate on Tamarind Road in South Forbes Park, Makati, acquired in 2023 for ₱1.665 billion by Golden Pheasant Holdings Corp., a company wholly owned by Jose Raulito Enoy Paras. The property had previously been owned by shipping executive Doris Magsaysay-Ho. The freeze order also covers 35 bank accounts linked to Romualdez across major financial institutions, some jointly held with family members. Paras, for his part, is associated with 38 accounts in several banks, along with assets under his holding firm, including deposits and seven high-end condominium units in Bonifacio Global City. The court said a summary hearing would be conducted before the 20-day period lapses to determine whether the freeze order should be extended or lifted. The action stemmed from findings by the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC), which initiated a financial investigation following a complaint filed by the Office of the Ombudsman. The complaint accuses Romualdez and others of plunder, bribery, and graft in connection with an alleged ₱56-billion kickback scheme tied to flood control projects. Testimonies cited in the court order were drawn from hearings of the Senate Blue Ribbon Committee, where witnesses claimed that cash-filled suitcases were delivered to residences associated with Romualdez and former

lawmaker Elizaldy Co, who has reportedly gone into hiding. Other accounts pointed to intermediaries allegedly tasked with handling funds linked to public works contracts. Earlier on Saturday, Ombudsman Jesus Crispin Remulla disclosed the CA freeze order in a radio interview. In a press briefing last April 21, 2026, Remulla said the Office of the Ombudsman endorsed a complaint to the AMLC and was waiting for it to seek a freeze order on the former speaker.

- [DOH warns people with HIV at higher risk of tuberculosis](#) (2026-04-25 04:36)

MANILA, Philippines — The Department of Health (DOH) warned the public, particularly people living with human immunodeficiency virus (PLHIV), that they are more susceptible to developing tuberculosis (TB) due to a weakened immune system. In a Facebook post Friday, the DOH said that if a person has HIV, they were more likely to develop TB as the virus weakens the body's immune system. "HIV is a disease that attacks the immune system, particularly the CD4 T-cells," the agency said. CD4 T cells are a type of white blood cell that serve as the immune system's managers, helping defend against bacteria. The DOH said that when the CD4 T cells run out, the body's defense against various diseases is weakened. "This is where opportunistic infections such as tuberculosis enter. Many of us may have TB bacteria sleeping inside the body because it is usually controlled by a strong immune system. But because HIV weakens the immune system, TB wakes up and becomes an active disease," the agency said.

- [Former DPWH secretary Bonoan denies alleged box deliveries in flood control hearing](#) (2026-04-25 04:04)

MANILA, Philippines — Former Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) secretary Manuel Bonoan denied the alleged delivery of 55 boxes meant for him. "I categorically and vehemently deny and have no knowledge whatsoever regarding these vague and unfounded allegations. In the first place, let it be of record that I am not involved in any manner as regards the subject case of the former senator Revilla, Jr.", Bonoan said in a statement on Friday. Bonoan said that "in the absence of specific details surrounding his accusations or corroborating evidence to support his allegations, Garcia's statements are mere hearsay." Last Thursday, Vergel Niño Garcia testified before the Sandiganbayan Third Division that he was a former driver of state witness and former DPWH undersecretary Roberto Bernardo. Garcia testified that there was a delivery of the following as to Bonoan: 15 sealed boxes allegedly taken by a then driver of Bonoan in Nov. 2024; 20 boxes in 2025; and 20 boxes allegedly taken by the said then-driver of Bonoan in Quezon City. Garcia, who also testified on the alleged delivery of boxes meant for several other people, was testifying before the court as a prosecution witness in the bail hearing in the malversation through falsification case filed against Revilla and other people. The Office of the Ombudsman filed the case before the Sandiganbayan in January 2026 in connection with the alleged ghost project in Pandi, Bulacan. Bonoan is not an accused.

- [Ex-congressman Defensor's wife denies trafficking allegations, calls them a 'political attack'](#) (2026-04-25 03:47)

MANILA, Philippines — The wife of former lawmaker Mike Defensor denied allegations she was involved in the recent National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) operation involving a Pasay City establishment linked to her, describing it as a "political attack." In a statement late on Friday, Julie Defensor said she called the accusations against her and her daughter as baseless and malicious. "I am issuing this statement to categorically and forcefully deny the baseless, malicious allegations directed at me, my daughter, and our associated businesses," Defensor said. "Let me be absolutely clear regarding the recent NBI operation: we have absolutely no connection to the targeted establishment or its operations. Any attempt to link our family to the abhorrent acts allegedly committed there is a deliberate, dangerous, and desperate lie," she added. Defensor described the motive of the NBI operations as part of a smear campaign, saying that 1,000 employees' lives are at stake because of a "political attack." "This is a fabricated pretext designed to artificially manufacture a case, with the chilling goal of filing unwarranted, unbailable charges against me and my daughter," she said. In a statement on Friday, the NBI said they rescued 54 women in an "entrapment and rescue operation" against a suspected "trafficking-in-persons network operating" in the Chicago Nightclub and Bleu Hotel in Ortigas, Pasig City, allegedly owned by Defensor.

President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. ordered the agency to conduct a safety check to ensure that the road was safe for travel after a public utility bus caught fire on Friday. Meanwhile, the DPWH-NCR said the EDSA-Ortigas Interchange would undergo a more detailed inspection on Saturday to determine the extent of the damage and assess its structural integrity. "For the Ortigas Flyover Interchange, it is recommended to restrict access to light vehicles only," it said. "Further testing is also advised to support a more detailed structural analysis, as exposed rebars and areas of spalling were observed in sections affected by the fire incident." In a separate advisory, the Metropolitan Manila Development Authority (MMDA) advised motorists to take alternate routes while authorities continued post-incident clearing and safety measures. - [Pagasa warns of dangerous heat index levels in 14 areas](#) (2026-04-25 03:12)

MANILA, Philippines – Fourteen areas in the country will experience sweltering temperatures due to a danger-level heat index, the weather bureau said Saturday. Heat index is what the temperature feels like to the human body when relative humidity combines with air. A peak heat index of 45°C is forecast in Dumangas, Iloilo and Butuan City, Agusan del Norte, according to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pagasa). The following areas will also see danger-level heat indices: - San Ildefonso, Bulacan - 43°C- Sangley Point, Cavite - 42°C- Aborlan, Palawan - 44°C- Roxas City, Capiz - 42°C- Mamburao, Capiz - 42°C- Iloilo City, Iloilo - 43°C- La Granja, La Carlota, Negros Occidental - 44°C- Catbalogan, Western Samar - 43°C- VSU Baybay, Leyte - 42°C- Borongan, Eastern Samar - 44°C Guiuan, Eastern Samar - 42°C Cotabato City, Maguindanao del Norte - 43°C Heat cramps and heat exhaustion are likely under a danger-level heat index of 42°C to 51°C. Meanwhile, the heat index may reach 41°C in Aparri, Cagayan; San Jose, Occidental Mindoro; Puerto Princesa City and Cuyo in Palawan; Legazpi City, Albay; Catarman, Northern Samar; Tacloban City, Leyte; Dipolog, Zamboanga del Norte; Zamboanga City, Zamboanga del Sur; and Davao City, Davao del Sur. A heat index of 40°C is forecast over Dagupan City, Pangasinan; Tuguegarao City, Cagayan; ISU Echague, Isabela; Baler and Casiguran in Aurora; CLSU Muñoz, Nueva Ecija; TAU Camiling, Tarlac; Ambulong, Tanauan, Batangas; Romblon, Romblon; Daet, Camarines Norte; Siquijor, Siquijor; Mactan, Cebu; Maasin, Southern, Leyte; Surigao City, Surigao del Norte; and Hinatuan, Surigao del Sur. Meanwhile, cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms are expected over Batanes due to the frontal system. The rest of the country will experience partly cloudy to cloudy skies with isolated rain showers or thunderstorms due to the easterlies and localized thunderstorms. Light to moderate winds and slight to moderate seas will prevail across the archipelago.

- [Around P10M fuel subsidy released to taxi drivers on first day — LTFRB](#) (2026-04-25 02:30)

MANILA, Philippines — The Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB) said it distributed around P10 million in fuel subsidies to taxi drivers on Friday, the first day of a two-day payout, describing the rollout as “peaceful and orderly” while warning against fraudulent claims. In a statement, LTFRB Chairman Vigor Mendoza II said approximately 2,000 taxi drivers received P5,000 each after claiming their subsidy at designated distribution points, including the central offices of the LTFRB and the Land Transportation Office (LTO). The subsidy forms part of the national government’s broader assistance program for the public transport sector, with nearly P98 million initially allocated for taxi drivers nationwide. With the additional

P10 million disbursed on Friday, total funds released for the sector have exceeded P108 million so far, the agency said. Mendoza, however, cautioned drivers against attempting to claim the subsidy more than once after 10 individuals were flagged for alleged double claims during the first day of distribution. “We are sending this warning that once any taxi driver is caught, we will request the LTO to revoke his driver’s license,” Mendoza said. Despite the incident, the LTRFB maintained that the overall distribution process remained orderly and efficient. The agency expects more drivers to claim their subsidies on the second and final day of distribution in Metro Manila on Saturday, April 25. The LTRFB said it has intensified monitoring measures to allow for real-time intervention in case of issues during the payout. Mendoza also assured that the agency would continue the distribution process until all intended beneficiaries have received their assistance. The fuel subsidy program aims to cushion the impact of rising fuel costs on public utility drivers and operators.

- [ICC asked to order public release of redacted Duterte defense filing to avoid withholding of key info](#) (2026-04-25 02:20)

MANILA, Philippines -- Prosecutors at the International Criminal Court (ICC) have asked judges to order the public release of a redacted defense filing in the case against former president Rodrigo Duterte, arguing that confidentiality claims are unjustified and could undermine witness confidence. In a submission dated April 24, 2026 before Pre-Trial Chamber I, the Office of the Prosecutor sought the reclassification of a defense response that had been partially withheld from public view. The chamber is composed of Judges Iulia Antoanella Motoc, Reine Adelaide Sophie Alapini-Gansou, and Maria del Socorro Flores Liera. Prosecutors said the redactions concealed a key clarification by Duterte’s legal team that six individuals — Salvador Medialdea, Salvador Panelo, Martin Delgra, Silvestre Bello, Alfredo Lim, and Cesar Dulay — were not members of the defense team in the ICC case. According to the filing, the defense had “affirmed, confirmed, assured and guaranteed” that the six lawyers were not part of Duterte’s ICC counsel. However, this statement was later removed in the public version of the response. The prosecution argued that the defense’s justification — to protect the lawyers’ “dignity” — did not outweigh the court’s principle of transparency. “It is unclear how confirming to the public that these lawyers do not work for the Defense team would negatively impact their dignity,” prosecutors said, adding that court proceedings should generally remain public. The Office of the Prosecutor, led by Deputy Prosecutor Mame Mandiaye Niang, also raised concern that keeping the information confidential could create confusion among potential witnesses and victims. Prosecutors said statements and actions by defense counsel had created the impression that the six lawyers were part of Duterte’s legal team, prompting a formal request for clarification in March. They warned that leaving the issue unresolved in public records could have a “chilling effect” on ongoing investigations, particularly if witnesses fear that individuals linked to Duterte might have access to sensitive case information. The prosecution added that some of the six lawyers had held senior government positions during Duterte’s presidency, a period covered by the ICC investigation into alleged crimes. Efforts to resolve the issue privately failed after the defense declined to seek reclassification, maintaining

that the redactions were appropriate to avoid possible embarrassment to the individuals involved. Prosecutors, however, questioned that reasoning and said the defense had not explained its apparent change in position after previously agreeing to make certain information public.
